

KEY LEARNINGS

The following are common themes from Community Conversations

Key Learnings

- Success is relative, and supports must be responsive to specific needs and identity.
- Public access to resources (the availability of a resource or support) and accessibility of resources (the extent to which community members who need the resources are able to access them) are not synonymous. An inaccessible "public" resource may facilitate disparities
- Play, creativity and socializing are the cornerstones of identity development.
- Fear of harm or judgement hinder young peoples' ability to explore themselves and the world around them.

Key Learnings

- Safe spaces allow young people to be their full selves.
- Agency and self-determination are the ultimate goal of success.
- The current "education as schooling" model does not meet the mental, emotional or curricular needs of youth and must be redesigned.
- A caring community is as crucial as a resourceful community.
