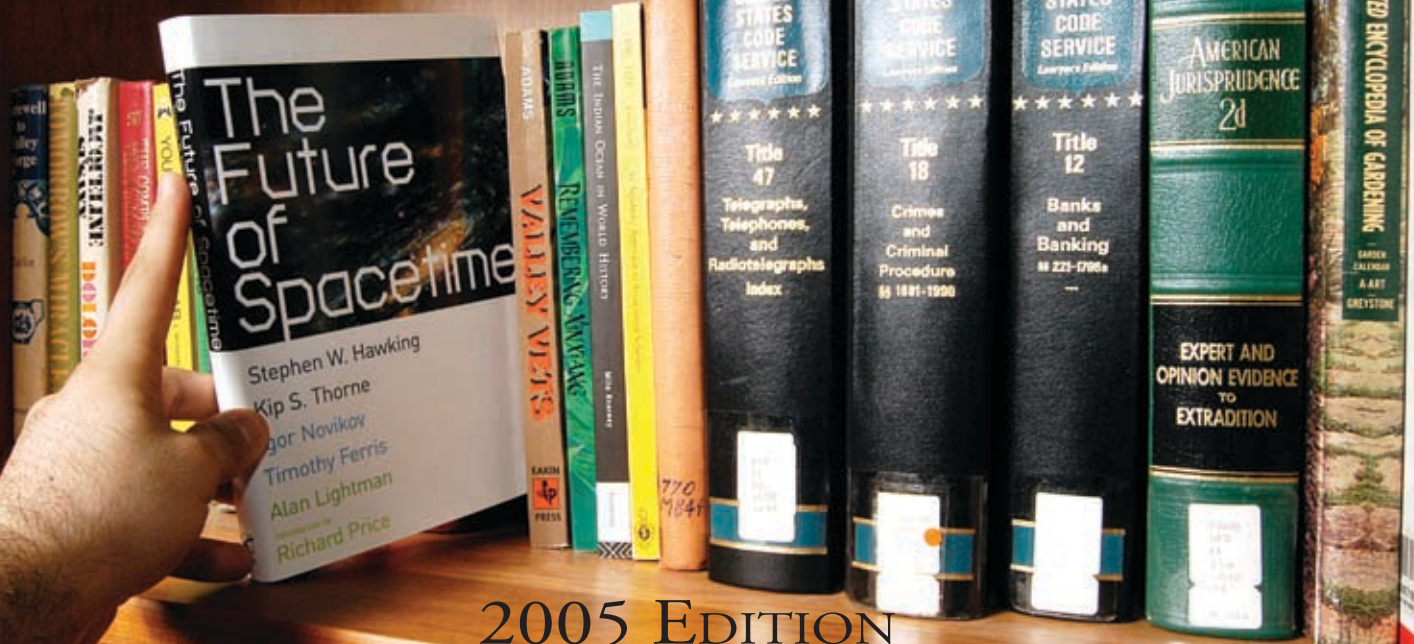



Citing the impact of George Inness and Samuel Colman upon Tiffany's early career, this book explains how Tiffany combines traditional painting methods, influenced by the color and prismatic iridescence of glass and theories of color-light optics, to create shimmering pastels and paintings. Tiffany's final work uses jewel, like color to illustrate landscapes, interiors, and images of virtuous women. The paintings are a visual record of Tiffany's journeys to Europe, North Africa, and Canada.

Wildflowers and Other Plants of Texas Beaches and Islands

Many visitors to Texas beaches see only the sands between the surf and the first low dunes. Because few plants grow there, it's easy to get the impression that Texas beaches consist mostly of barren sand while just the opposite is true. Beyond the dunes grow an amazing variety and abundance of native plants. Many of them, like Indian Blanket, Goldenrod, and Seaside Gerardia, produce splashes of flowering color. Others display more modest flowers or are interesting for their growing habits. In all, over seven hundred species of flowering plants grow on Texas beaches and islands. This handy field guide will aid you in identifying some 275 common and/or noteworthy flowering plants of the Texas beaches and islands from the Rio Grande to the Louisiana border. Electoral Structure and Urban Policy: The Impact on Mexican-American Communities

This work deals with minority politics and city elections. In traditional at-large elections, in which the entire population votes as a whole, a city with a 50 percent white and 50 percent Hispanic population usually produces a white victory because more whites than Hispanics vote. Now, however, many cities are divided into electoral districts, and, in some districts, Mexican-Americans are 80 percent of the population, so Mexican-Americans have been elected to city commissions. With this dynamic in mind, "Electoral Structure" investigates the question of whether public policy is changed when minorities are elected.

At a Bend in a Mexican River

Long known as the River of Destiny, the Rio Grande has been the focus of both conflict and peace between Mexico and the United States. Although rich in history, the river's delta also supports a rich legacy of natural history. Twisting and turning from the Chihuahuan Woodlands to the Gulf of Mexico, the last 250 miles of this great river form a rich delta, a transition zone between the semiarid tropics and the temperate north. Since 1900, most of the delta's native vegetation has been lost, but many small islands of endangered habitat survive at the edge of farms and cities. These islands harbor an incredible number of endangered or threatened species. Some are known only from the delta or reach their northern limits here.

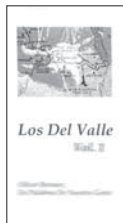

Los del Valle Project

The Los del Valle Project is a collaborative effort between Dr. Manuel Medrano and the UTB/TSC Media Services Department to produce a series of autobiographical oral history video recordings.
