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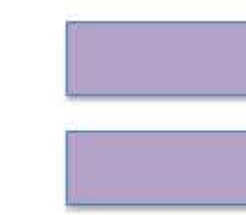
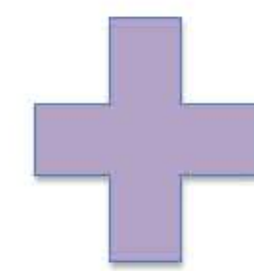
# What We Learned Adopting 4 Children

## Introduction

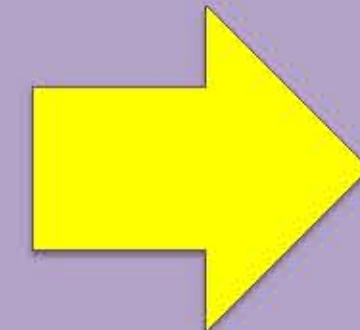

## OUR PROCESS

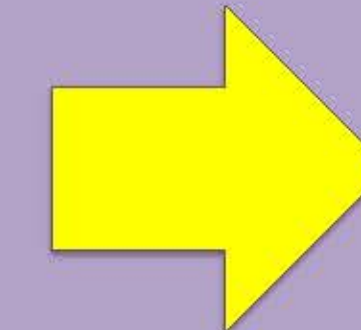
### Decide

- Everyone has to be ready



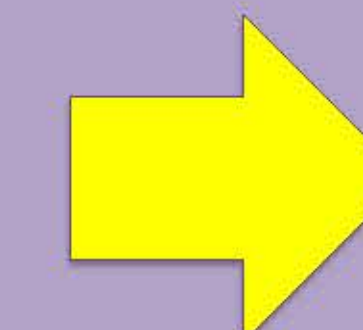
### Prepare
