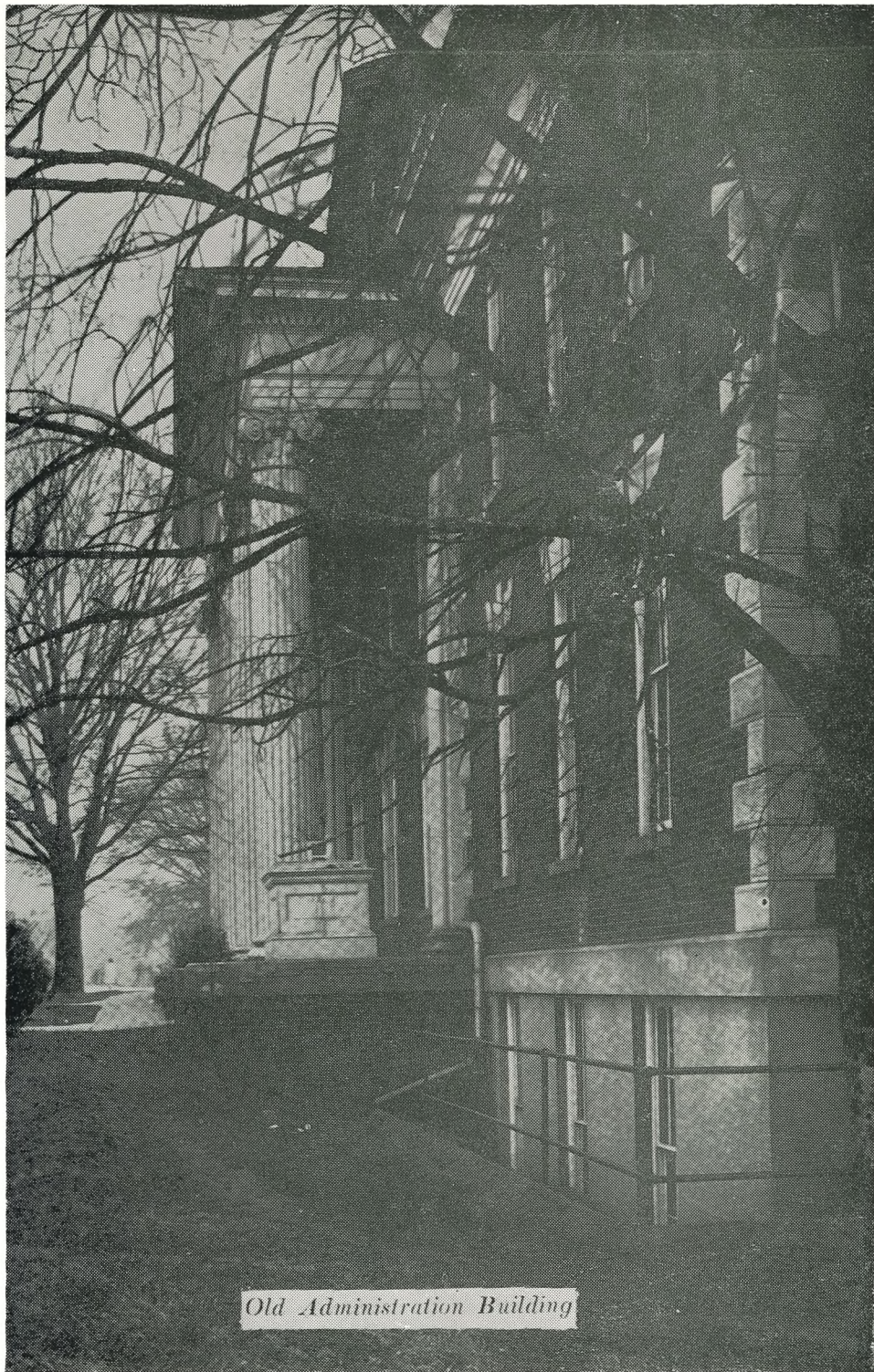

MEMORIAL TO DR. C. W. DAUGETTE AND TO
DEPARTED FACULTY AND CLASSMATES:

We as students knew Dr. Daugette as a close personal friend to whom we could carry all of our problems and troubles. He was always ready to help us with our school problems and even in our love affairs when the sailing was not so smooth.

In the meantime, few of us realized that bleakness of the Alabama education picture at the turn of the century when he became head of this institution. The great progress which has been made in public education in this state since that time is largely the fruit of our educational pioneer leaders, among whom he was outstanding. He was at the forefront of those who provided the brick and mortar of our modern educational edifice.
