

Famed biographer discusses country's best presidents

Nigel Hamilton, award-winning biographer, spoke at Suffolk last Thursday as part of the 5th annual Derek Coward Lecture.

The Coward lecture was established in 1997 by Derek W. F. Coward, an associate professor of marketing for the Sawyer Business School.

Before Hamilton spoke about his recent piece, Twelve American Ceasars-And What the Next President Can Learn from Them, he started his lecture by reminding the audience of the Roman Empire. He spoke about the great emperors of that time and how they too had "both good and awful leaders."

He then gave a brief description about the life of a biographer and explained that a biographer must commit themselves to the character and research everything there is to know "about each individual emperor."

As an interpreter and researcher, he devotes time to learning about "the man or woman's unique life" childhood to death.

"I'm interested in how he or she became that person and what he or she has accomplished,"

The biography he is currently working on, Twelve American Caesars, tells the story of twelve presidents from Franklin D. Roosevelt to George W. Bush.

a biography of the last twelve presidents, I felt a mixture of trepidation and excitement," he explained. This was Hamilton's chance to research the past and suggest a change for the future. His book is his way of sending a message to the '13th president'.

During the lecture, Hamilton read excerpts from the book and prefaced the audience with background on each of the presidents he discussed.

Iraq. Socially, McCain opposes gay-marriage and is leaving civil unions to the states. Gov. Palin has come under scrutiny for her social views. She is pro-life, even in cases of rape and incest.

Senator Barack Obama is running his campaign on the slogan of change. Obama's campaign became more than a grassroots organization when the competition between he and New York Senator Hil-

Sen. Obama became the first Black American to be a major party presidential candidate.






According to Al-Jazeera, 16 US troops commited suicide inside a former Iraqi airbase earlier this month. The soldiers from the 57th Airborne Division were found in their dormitory after dinner. Iraqi security forces have said that the soldiers used "potent narcotics" to kill themselves. Ali al-Baghdadi, an Iraqi police official, noted that members of the 57th Airborne were behind the murders of several families in Northern Baghdad. Iraqi officials estimate that close to 600 US troops have attempted suicide since 2003.

Europe

Italy has declared war on the mafia, specifically the Camorra crime family in southern Naples, according to BBC. 500 police officers were deployed to attempt to arrest members of the Casalesi part of the Camorras after a number of mob-related murders of African immigrants that Italy's interior minister called acts of "terrorism." Thirty members of the Camorra family have been arrested and police seized an estimated 100 million Euro in assets.


South America

Ecuador's new constitution was approved by 64 percent, the BBC reported on Monday. President Rafael Correa will soon ratify the country's twentieth constitution, which gives him the power to dissolve congress and run for two more consecutive terms. Also, the new constitution will allow for free health care for seniors as well as more political power for women and indigenous citizens. Correa said in a victory speech that Ecuador will be "a society with more justice, much more equality and without so much... misery."

Perhaps his most endearing statement was about Robert Kennedy in 1965, while Kennedy was considering running for president. He remarked, "[I hope] some white patriot of the Southern tier will spatter his spoonful of brains in public premises before the snow flies."

Besides quoting racist antiunion bigots, Palin also enjoys supporting fundamentalist Evangelical agendas. Besides the normal book banning, gay-bashing and anti-abortion protests, Palin had also pushed for the Evangelical take-over of the Matanuska-Susitna Borough school board.

"She wanted to get people who believed in creationism on the board," said Munger, a music composer and teacher of the Mat-Su Borough. US wallets thin, Obama shows he can

The presidential debate on Friday night didn't produce a clear winner, but it did highlight major differences beeconomic and foreign policy issues. A careful study of their comments reveals why electing Senator Barrack Obama over Senator John McCain is the best choice voters can make to get our country back on track.

McCain continues to call for \$300 billion in tax cuts for the wealthy, even suggesting that a spending freeze on all government programs except those for national defense and veterans might be necessary in light of the proposed

\$700 billion bailout. McCain gage collapse. He showed that apparently is willing to let government assistance evaporate for most Americans precisely when they need it the most.

While his efforts to cut wasteful spending in governtween the two candidates on ment are admirable, McCain he admitted that because of the doesn't seem to realize that his tax cuts for the wealthy and the exorbitant cost of maintaining a substantial military force in Iraq indefinably are straight out of the George W. Bush playbook. They would far outweigh any money he'd save taxpayers in earmark reduction and spending cuts.

Although Senator Obama does have a big spending plan, bailout he wouldn't be able to pursue all of his priorities. Neither is he willing to sacrifice his most important initiatives, which he views as necessary for the future well-being of the country. These include investing in alternative fuels in order to end dependence on foreign oil and making college education more affordable so that America can remain competitive abroad.

Both candidates wore bracelets to commemorate soldiers who had fallen in the Iraq War, yet each took a different lesson from their sacrifices. As a result, McCain and Obama have two very different views of how the Iraq War should progress.

McCain said that we can't afford to leave Iraq without victory because otherwise the sacrifices of our soldiers will have been in vain. Due to his inflexible morality, McCain has made clear that if large scale violence reemerges in Iraq on his watch we can count on being there for a long time.





It has not been a good summer for the Smashing Pumpkins, or what remains of them. Billy Corgan and Jimmy Chamberlin had big plans that came to a big crash on July 24.

Mere days before the Pumpkins' late summer tour began, former Smashing Pumpkins members James Iha and D'arcy Wretzky-Brown filed a suit against Virgin Records America, claiming that Virgin had negotiated a deal with Corgan and only Corgan in 2005, five years after the break up of the original four, over "electronic transmissions." This refers to ringtones, computer digital files, etcetera.

How does this affect Corgan and Chamberlin, who now represent the Smashing Pumpkins name? The planned "Gish" (Caroline/Virgin Records, 1991) box set, a release of all the b-sides and original tracks of the band's first recordings, is now put on hold. Put this on the list of recordings that Corgan and Chamberlin have stowed away in their Macs and PCs. From the legendary

"Final Metro Show" to Billy Corgan's infamous solo show "Chicago Songs," these may be more of the Smashing Pumpkins tracks we may hear being released when we're forty or fifty.

The Pumpkins have also recorded a new single, "G.L.O.W." but aside from hearing a poor quality live recording, the only

place you'll be able to hear it currently is on the radio or on the new Guitar Hero! Talk about a tease.

Aside from that, as the fall progresses, things are getting better and better for the Smashing Pumpkins. They announced the release of a new DVD entitled, "If All Goes Wrong." How ironic. The DVD is listed to be, "115 minutes long and will feature fifteen songs from The Fillmore residency shows."

Corgan and Chamberlin also announced that they'll be kicking off their Twentieth Anniversary Tour and be appearing on the Jimmy Kimmel Show Oct. 24. Two days later they'll be playing the 22nd Bridge School benefit in Mountain View, California. Corgan has also stated that





C is for championship, Celtics look to repeat

Two years ago, the Boston Celtics finished the regular season with the worst record in the Eastern Conference and the second worst record in the NBA, at 24-58. Last season, the team finished with a NBA best 66-16 record and went on to become world champions. The Celtics have all the momentum to be tough competitors come next season.

Since their previous title in 1986, the Celtics went through a 22 year drought, until winning their 17th championship in 2008.

In recent years, veteran and team leader Paul Pierce attempted to carry the team on his back, sticking with Boston since being drafted in 1998. He decided to stay for 2007-2008 despite missing the playoffs the past two years and 5 of 9 overall. Pierce was expected to carry mostly the entire load. In the summer of 2007, the Boston Celtics would take on a whole new look, signing veteran stars Kevin Garnett and Ray Allen. Needless to say, the rest was history; The "Big Three" led the Celtics to another World Championship. Although they did not appear in the top five among league leaders in major offensive categories (i.e., points & field goal percentage) working together, Garnett, Allen and Pierce made the entire team stronger in 2007-2008. They not only were effective individually, but made other players like Rajon Rondo, Glen "Big Baby" Davis and Kendrick Perkins better. Players like Lebron James, Kobe Bryant, and Dwayne Wade have proven that it is impossible for

ing their positive momentum coming off of last season. The most notable loss from the 2008 championship team was forward James Posey, who signed with the New Orleans Hornets as a free agent. Posey was a key to the Celtics championship, especially in the playoffs both offensively and particularly defensively. Usually allowing Paul Pierce a chance to rest, Posey was known for his shut-down defense and clutch three-point shooting, where he lead the team with a .398 three-point percentage in the postseason.

Despite this loss, most of the championship team is back, including Head Coach, Doc Rivers, who signed a three contract extension on Sept. 10. Rivers brings back his knowledge, tenacity and controlled aggression to the sidelines this season. His patience for his players and respect for the game helped guide the Celtics to their championship and he will be essential if the Celtics hope to continue their success. Along with Rivers, important role players Tony Allen and Eddie House also re-signed during the offseason. Newcomers include, #30 pick in the 2008 draft J.R. Giddens, #40 pick Bill Walker and free agents Patrick O'Bryant and Darius Miles. As second line role players, these players can only strengthen an already well-rounded Celtics team.

Boston's record in the East-

ern Conference last season was staggering. In addition to their NBA leading record, the Celtics were also 41-11 in the conference. Based on last year's record, Detroit and Orlando are the next closest teams who can even begin to challenge Boston for a conference title. In the Atlantic division, Boston finished last season 25 games ahead of Toronto. This season looks to end up the same way, as the Celtics are a much more talented and well-rounded team than the Raptors, 76'ers, Nets and Knicks. These teams have relied on one or two players to be responsible for most of the offensive and defensive load, such as Chris Bosh, Allen Iverson and Stephon Marbury. And while Garnett, Allen and Pierce are obviously well-known, the Celtics bench is nothing to scoff about either. Players like Eddie House and point forward Leon Powe were crucial in both the regular season and the playoffs. In the entire Eastern Conference, no one held a candle to the 2007-2008 Celtics. The only team to show a chance of breaking the Celtics is the Washington Wizards, who handed the Celtics three of their 16 losses. Cleveland and Orlando also proved to be tough opponents, each with two wins over the Celtics last season. Despite failing in the postseason, Detroit is always a team to be reckoned with, as is Cleveland and


even the newly re-energized Orlando Magic. In the entire league, the Lakers, Spurs and Suns are all teams the Celtics should also be wary about. In terms of tough competition, the Celtics don't have much of it.

Specifically since the New England Patriots and Boston Red Sox championships in 2004, the Celtics have faded into the background in the world of Boston sports. However, ever since the signing of media magnets like Garnett and Allen, Celtics fans began taking notice and filling the Garden again. The 2008 title certainly revived basketball in Boston, however, the Patriots and Red Sox have proved over time that they can repeat, which the Celtics have yet to do.

There is no doubt the Garden will be sold out, but this 2008-2009 season still determines the fate of basketball in Boston and whether the 2008 title was the start of returned glory or simply a fluke.

The Celtics had one of the biggest comeback seasons in all of Boston sports, capping it with some hardware. It solidified the Celtics as a top contender in the NBA and raised expectations for the upcoming season.



For the past few years, the Boston Bruins have been the ugly stepchild on the Hub sports scene, out of sight and, for many, out of mind. The Red Sox have won the World Series twice since 2004, and the Patriots have hoisted the Lombardi Trophy three times since 2001.

Growth of Suffolk stunted in athletics

In 1991, the Suffolk University Athletic Department opened the Ridgeway Building on Cambridge Street, a facility whose resources were adequate to meet the needs of the student population at the time. However, with the recent onset of massive growth at the school and school population specifically, and the continued high expectations of student athletes, the building that Athletic Director James Nelson once referred to as "the Taj Mahal" seems to be bursting at the seams.

Though Coach Nelson still has great affection for the facility, he believes that it is time to start looking ahead expansion opportunities.

"Time and circumstance now dictate that new and stateof-the-art resources be a concern and a call for moving forward," said Nelson. "Over the past 17 years, the Suffolk community has grown to over 5000 undergraduate students with the biggest number of incoming Freshman this past year... It's only in the best interest of the school

to explore a greater opportunity of gymnasium space and recreation space as well."

The school has expanded (and continues to expand) in different departments as needed, but nothing has been solidified in terms of plans for expansion of the athletic facilities.

to provide expanded resources for the students and student athletes within community. university

"At this time we have had some discussion with the city of Boston to provide a private partnership to update and modernize a 'City of Boston Field,' primarily at the University's expense," said Nelson.

With this field, the hope is that Suffolk would be the primary user during the academic year. Although this investigation looks promising to build upon, nothing firm has been established by Suffolk or the city.

It's been rumored that one potential piece of real estate that might be obtained for expansion is City Hall Plaza. Coach Nelson stated that, "any property in proximity to our campus is always an option that we wish to explore, but there is nothing of substance at this point."

As with any aspect of school expansion, Suffolk's tenuous relationship with its Beacon Hill neighbors is something that the University and the athletic department must be mindful of. Not only is land hard to come by , but clearing any plans with the city and the BHCA has proved to be difficult for Suffolk University in the past.

As with any undertaking as large as creating a new athletic facility, Suffolk has been granted the gift of time. The planning stages of a new facility are in the back of everyone's heads in the department, and the wheels of progress are slowly being put in motion. The current focus of expansion at Suffolk is the renovation of the Modern Theatre and of 20 Somerset Street, though with the ever growing
