Honoured Madam

Your letter of the 28 of Jan^y expressing your sympathy with our family for the great loss which met with in the death of my Uncle was duly received. And I hope you will excuse me for not answering it sooner when I appear you that at that time was duly expected & wanted from the Bacter then at Coombally Island & my time was employed in military works for our defence: no man in the greatest apprehension and alarm imaginable, when the joyful news of Peace was received, which caused a wonderful affect on the spirit of the Planters, and we once again have prospects of success for our labours.

I received a statement from your son who of my Uncle Bond to you who makes it appear that the principle now due to be \$1073.81 and Interest thereon up to 28 Jan^y 1815 be 601.69. It is perfectly convenient for me to comply with your request, but as you did not direct in what manner the remittance was to be made I feel myself at a loss how to act. I therefore request you to

To make a draft for any sum under one thousand
dollar or direct in what manner it shall be sent
on to you we have not as yet sold a bag of the
last crop ^{of cotton}. I contemplate of appropriating 50 bag of
of it to the payment of the Bonds to yourself and
Sons. I assure you my good Madam that every exer-
tion on my part will be made to pay off those two
Bonds the last an^d from Charlotte Cotton now at 37½ to
40 cents with gentleness of the highest regard & esteem
