I am very much gratified my dear child by your kind attentions to me in my ~~great~~ solitary situation nothing can cheer me more than to hear of the <sup>Health</sup> & improvement of my dear children. How my love you take a lively interest in the great events which have taken place in Europe within a few weeks, it is indeed wonderful we may indeed say "God works in a mysterious way his purpose to fulfill." it would be a very extraordinary circumstance if the King of France & the Dey of Algiers should meet in Italy & become friends, in their misfortunes. Tho I feel for the afflictions of my fellow creatures, my interest for one darling youth is much stronger & I would hear every minute circumstance which pains or gives him pleasure with more interest

than all <sup>the</sup> splendor & pomp that surrounds the most  
magnificent Crowned Heads could afford therefore  
my love let me know all about your dear self & what  
you are I have my dear Julia now with me  
she left your dear Mother & little pet quite well.  
I do not think Julia has grown fatter <sup>but</sup> she says she  
is well. Mr Rutherford & Walter came here today  
Walter is not taller than you are he is going  
on with his improvement & I trust he will  
make a very clever man.

My dear Mother,  
as Grandmama has left a little room for me  
to fill up I have found a stick with which I am  
writing. I left Butternuts on Tuesday and arrived here  
on Friday. So days we are going to Bellville and  
on Monday I shall return to my lessons. All  
our friends in Butternuts were very much disappointed  
at not seeing you this summer.

Uncle John came down with me to New York from  
whence he proceeded to Philadelphia to attend  
the Great Anti-Masonic Convention. I hope you  
will now answer some of my letters and let me  
know all the news if there be anything of the sort  
in your present world abode. The Palmers and Lawrence  
are all well. Lodovica is better. Elizabeth Town continues  
deafly, but Newark is very sickly. I have nothing new  
to tell you. Adieu mon cher frere. Je t'embrasse de tout mon
