Down in the primeval forest, beneath the sighing pines in Pearl River County several years before the Civil War, Juniper Grove Baptist Church was organized.

It was located within just a few hundred yards of my father's old home. My father was a member of this church from the date of its organization until the date of hisdeath. For thirty years he attended every meeting.

When I was fifteen years of age I too became a member of this old church. I now own myfather's old home site and I am planning to build a home on this sacred spot where it is my purpose to live and die.

The members of this church are poor, honest, hard working farmers and it has become necessary to build a new house of worship. We need help from our friends everywhere and I trust you will not think I am imposing on you to request of you a donation for this cause.

The church will be of brick and concrete and will last a century. As my friend, I want the pleasure of presenting your name and contribution to the members of this faithful little band of God-fearing and God-serving people. Your donation will be appreciated, and I trust you will make it as large as the Lord's blessing upon you in worldly possession will permit. We are going to place in the vestibule of the church a bronze tablet upon which will be engraved the name and address of every man, woman and child who contributes to this cause.
