Dear Senator Bilbo:

My reply to your letter of April 28 has been delayed somewhat because of my absence from the city.

Mr. Dennis Murphree, the present State Director for the National Emergency Council for Mississippi, was recommended by Mr. Evon Ford, the former State Director for Mississippi. Also Mr. Lamar Hardy, a personal friend of mine and a former resident of Mississippi, in response to my request advised me that in his judgment Mr. Murphree was qualified to perform the duties of the office. Mr. Murphree was thereupon called to Washington for a conference with the officials of the Council. As his qualifications appeared to be those which were required for the position in question, he was appointed at a salary of \$4,500 per amum.

Mr. Murphree entered on duty March 16, replacing Mr. Evon Ford, the former State Director for Mississippi, whose resignation was effective March 15. Mr. Ford's salary was the same as that paid Mr. Murphree.
