## Summary:

The lifetime of a fire, from its ignition to extinguishment, can be split into several key phases of interest. Past research has considered only one subcomponent of that lifetime; for example, the time it takes to attack a fire with resources to the time it's declared under control. But this leaves a crucial gap – how does a fire progress through its many phases and how are these phases interrelated?

My research investigates wildland fires located in the Ontario's Northwest Fire Region. The progression of phases from ignition to under control are examined using statistical models that allow us to link these phases together. Various effects are accounted for, including seasonality, the type of fuel burning, and whether there are any "fire-specific" effects. Our goal is to identify and understand the factors that drive a fire's progression through all the phases along with those that only influence certain phases.
