S. MICHAEL SHUMAN is currently an Instructor of Voice and Lyric Diction at the University of Arkansas. Since 2006, he has served the Music Department in various roles: director of Opera Theatre Workshop; instructor of Vocal Literature; pianist for faculty and student recitals; rehearsal pianist for Schola Cantorum, Women's Chorus, Master Chorale, University Chorus, Opera Theatre, and Music Theatre. Shuman is the Director of Music Ministries at First United Presbyterian Church in Favetteville, where he directs all the musical ensembles and coordinates musical events. He can also be found in musical collaborations with John Brown University and local community groups.

As a singer, Shuman appeared in performances of Gianni Schicchi (Simone & The Notary), Anna Bolena (Lord Rochefort), Trouble in Tahiti (Sam). A Game of Chance (The Representative), Amelia Goes to the Ball (The Husband), and Hello Dolly! (Rudolph Reisenweber). Recent conducting engagements include: Five Mystical Songs (R.V. Williams), Gloria (J. Rutter), Nun komm der Heiden Heiland (J.S. Bach), The Boyfriend (S. Wilson), The Secret Garden (L. Simon), Man of La Mancha (M. Leigh). Shuman's most recent piano recital, Dreams and Visions: A Multimedia Recital, is an artistic combination of 20th century piano works, pictures from the Hubble telescope, interactive program notes, and lighting effects.

Originally from Laurel, MS, Shuman received the Bachelor of Music Degree in Piano and Vocal Performance from Delta State University in Cleveland, MS. He also holds the Master of

Music Degree in Piano Performance from the University of Nebraska at Omaha and the MM Degree in Conducting from the University of Arkansas. Teachers include: voice – David Malis, Mary Lenn Buchanan; conducting – Stephen Caldwell, Nancy Moore; piano – James Johnson, Karen Fosheim, Patsy Bateman.

HANNAH MINDEMAN is a sought-after collaborative pianist and music educator. She debuted at Lincoln Center in 2013, performing in Reflections of a New York City Park Bench, a multimedia concert with flutist Julian Rose that combined 20th century flute-piano repertoire and original visual art. As a founding member of Colibri, a violin-piano duo with Evelyn Petcher, Ms. Mindeman performs all over the United States and recently gave an acclaimed concert at the DiMenna Center in New York City.

Ms. Mindeman received a Graduate Certificate in Collaborative Piano from the University of Arkansas, a Master of Music in Collaborative Piano from the University of North Carolina School of the Arts, and a Bachelor of Music in Piano Performance with a minor in French, summa cum laude, from Covenant College. Her teachers have included Lisa Emenheiser, Jeanell Brown, Allison Gagnon, and Tomoko Kashiwagi.
