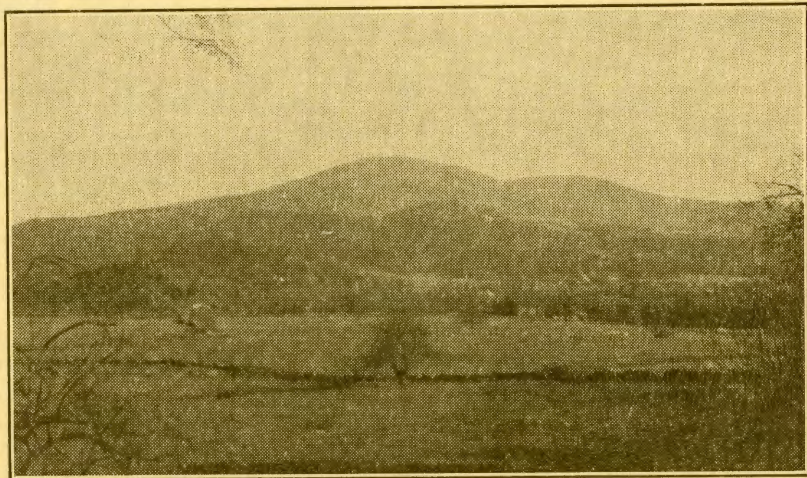

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Wilmot in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Wilmot on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Town highways.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day.
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and negotiate the extention or renewal of the notes securing such loans, when it is necessary.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$477.00, the State to contribute \$2,281.17 for Town Road Aid on Class V highways.

or

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$477.00, the State to contribute \$1,000.00 for State Aid Construction on the Fourth New Hampshire Turnpike.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

9. (Requested) To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate any money for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the Town in connection with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for the hire of Log Sites.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

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The growing interest which the citizens of Wilmot have cultivated toward their Public Library in past years has been steadily maintained during 1940.

The Board of Trustees has labored earnestly with the Librarian and Assistant Librarian to increase the facilities of the library and also to bring the library endowment fund to the \$1,500.00 mark or over. Two rummage sales have resulted in substantial financial aid and the books purchased, though fewer in number, have been of a high order.

The New Hampshire Library Commission has continued service by means of the Bookmobile and the placing of circulating libraries in the library and school-houses. A gift of books for 1940 to the value of \$25.00 has been granted, but the books have not yet been received.

Reading has been diligently pursued by the Center and Mountain schools, with a record of 551 and 471 books read, respectively. The Mountain school still maintains the highest average of books read per pupil. Frequent changes of teachers in the Wilmot Flat school have made it difficult to conduct a contest in that school, but it is expected that during 1941 the pupils in all the town schools will be included in promoting this important phase of education.

The gratitude of the Trustees and Librarian is extended to the New Hampshire Library Commission, to the school teachers, and to all those who by the contribution of books, magazines and public interest have helped the library to record another successful year.
