

LANGUAGES OF THE WESTERN MADANG DISTRICT

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The Western Madang District of New Guinea covers roughly the area of the triangle formed by the Gogol River east of Madang town, the Ramu River and the Central North-East Coast of New Guinea. The area comprises 8160 square miles, with an approximate population of 122,900.

NOTES ON THE LINGUISTIC HISTORY

The linguistic history of the Madang District and of the Territory of New Guinea begins with the Russian scholar N.N. Miklukho-Maclay in 1871. Comprehensive linguistic studies were made of Monumbo (72)² by Vormann and Scharfenberger (1914) and by Höltker (1964), of Gedaged (77) by Mager (1952) and Dempwolff (undated), of Bilbil (78) by Dempwolff (1909) and of Karam (84) by Pawley (1966).

Comparative studies were undertaken by W. Schmidt and A. Capell. Schmidt (1900) provided the first linguistic picture of the North-East coast of German New Guinea. In a study parallel to that of Sydney Ray on the south coast (of Papua), he established two main groups of languages for the North New Guinea coast: Melanesian (Austronesian) and Papuan (non-Austronesian). Schmidt had the disadvantage of having to rely entirely on sources other than his own; these were often incomplete and insufficiently recorded and as a consequence of this, much of his assessment has had to be revised in the light of recent studies. Capell had the opportunity of visiting the New Guinea coast himself as part of an extensive survey in 1949. His study "A Linguistic Survey of the South Western Pacific" gives, for the first time, a language map for the Madang District.

Both the Lutheran and the Catholic Missions undertook a considerable amount of language work in the area concerned. The Lutheran mission is still the only organisation making use of vernacular languages for educational purposes. Gedaged (77), Amele (3) and Garuh (7) languages, for example, are still used for missionary activities, and pupils at the District Bible School of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of New Guinea (ELCONG) at Amron are still instructed in the Gedaged language.

Missionaries and scholars of the Catholic Mission carried out a considerable amount of theoretical and practical work. Father W. Schmidt (1907), founder of the periodical *Anthropos*, worked out a new alphabet for transcription purposes. Father Schebesta (1934) provided a basic introduction for linguistic research in the New Guinea area and Father Kirschbaum (1935) compiled a large word and sentence list of 1085 items as a guide to the collection of linguistic material. However, the efforts of the Catholic mission came to a tragic end with World War II. Father Kirschbaum, who surveyed large areas of the north-east coast and of the Sepik region, died in an air-crash in 1939. Father Schebesta died on a Japanese boat in February 1944. The many manuscripts stored in the basement of the Cathedral at Alexishafen were lost when the Cathedral was bombed in 1944. Nowadays, in accordance with policy, English is used in schools and in religious activities at the higher levels of education, but Neo-Melanesian is used in church and religious activities in general.

THE PRESENT LINGUISTIC SITUATION

From the above, it can be seen that our knowledge of the languages of the Western Madang District has been very limited so far. This is regrettable in the light of the fact that linguistic research in the Territory of New Guinea originated in the Madang District or, more precisely, in the Astrolabe Bay district and in the vicinity of the present town of Madang. The position is complicated by the fact that often no criteria are given in various sources as to what is meant by 'language' and 'dialect'. Capell's language map of the Madang District gives only very rough language boundaries with no information as to the numbers of speakers. No systematic linguistic survey of the entire area had previously been carried out, nor has any satisfactory comprehensive study of the published materials been undertaken. Klieneberger's bibliography (1957) is in many respects very valuable, but he had insufficient knowledge of the New Guinea area; unfortunately, also, his bibliography does not include publications which are not in letterpress, nor publications which are primarily anthropological, but contain

valuable linguistic information. Loukotka's language map (1957) is unsatisfactory, but it would have been better if the information contained in his bibliography had been more thoroughly utilised. Voegelin's (1965) classification of the languages of the Madang District is unrealistic; there is too great a tendency to relate languages whose interrelationship has not been proved.

The present study aims to fill some of the gaps in our knowledge of the languages of the Western Madang District. The findings represented in this paper are the preliminary results of a research period of four and a half years, with fieldwork periods from August 1964 to February 1966 and from January 1967 to March 1968.³ Fieldwork was resumed again in July 1969. The following classification of languages must be regarded as tentative because only a short word list of 64-67 items was considered and sound correspondences have not yet been fully established.

LIST AND CLASSIFICATION OF LANGUAGES

There are two types of languages in the Western Madang District: Papuan (or non-Melanesian, non-Austronesian) and Melanesian (Austronesian) languages.

The Melanesian languages are divided into two families: the Meseman Family on Manam Island and in some villages on the mainland in the Bogia Subdistrict, and the Belan Family in the vicinity of Madang town.

Most of the Papuan languages of the Western Madang District belong to three newly established local phyla:

a) The Madang Phylum is composed of the Mabuso Stock west of Madang town and the Usur Group in the Upper Ramu area. The eastern boundary of the phylum, although roughly established in a recent study by Claassen and McElhanon (1969), could not be included in this study.

b) The Adelbert Range Phylum extends from opposite Karkar Island across the Adelbert Range towards the Middle Ramu River area, and is at present composed of four stocks: Isumrud, Pihom, Josephstaal, Wanang and one stock-type isolate (Mugil).

c) The Ramu Phylum extends from the mouth of the Ramu River to the Middle Ramu River area as far as Atemple Village and is composed of the Ruboni and Goam Stocks, the Annaberg Group and the Agoan Family: Aion and Kambot are only tentatively included in the Phylum.

Two other phyla overlap into the district from other areas: the Torricelli Phylum in Monumbo (72) and Lilau (73) and the East New Guinea Highlands Phylum in Karam (84) and Gaintj (85).

The following list and classification of languages is subdivided on this basis. The first column gives the name of the stock, the second those of the families or groups, and the third those of the languages. Column four contains the number by which each language is identified on the language map. Column five contains the abbreviation of the language name, and column six the approximate number of speakers. The approximate number of speakers of families and stocks are put under the corresponding family or stock name and those for a phylum after the phylum name. Unbroken lines indicate established relationships, whereas broken lines denote uncertain relationships. 'Groups' in the family column indicate tentative groupings with insufficient evidence available to determine whether they have family or stock status; the fact that material is inadequate, or that large unstudied areas surround such groups, is the reason for the uncertainty in such cases. Although indicated by branching, no names for subfamilies have been suggested at this stage of research.


LANGUAGE MAP

The following language map, which is based on Administration maps at the District Offices at Madang, Bogia and Angoram, shows the approximate location of the languages surveyed in this study. Languages are indicated by numbers, and stocks and isolates by shadings. For further explanatory notes see the map itself.

NOTES ON THE TYPOLOGY OF THE LANGUAGES

Each of the three above mentioned phyla and the Melanesian Group presents a picture in which the lexical and typological agreements run largely parallel to each other, i.e., a number of typological features are universally or almost universally observed in one particular phylum only.

A. The Madang Phylum is characterized by the following features:

- 1) The absence of the following phonemes: /c/, ⁴/ñ/, /g/, /x/, /ŋ/ and /+/ which are present in other languages under consideration. A high central vowel type /+/ has been observed only in Usino; a velar nasal is present, as part of the prenasalized voiced stops in Kare (13) and Uriogina (16).
- 2) No number marking on nouns.
- 3) No Concordance Class System.
- 4) A special dual form, derivable from the corresponding plural form is found for pronouns and subject- and object-markers; this feature could, however, not yet be established for Usur.
- 5) There is no distinction between the second and the third person in the non-singular forms for pronouns and subject and object markers. Usur is doubtful in this respect.
- 6) The suffixing Two Possessive Class System is universally present. In fact, the suffixing of the Possessive Marker for terms of relatives and Body parts is one of the basic characteristics of the Madang Phylum. Garuh (7) and Foran (8) deviate in part from this system in employing possessive nouns on the Melanesian pattern.
- 7) The tense-subject markers are suffixed to the Verb base.
- 8) Object markers in transitive verbs are immediately suffixed to the verb base; this is another typical characteristic of the Madang Phylum.
- 9) Great predominance of suffixes over prefixes onto noun and verb bases.

B. The languages of the Adelbert Range Phylum share the following typological features:

- 1) The velar nasal is very common.
- 2) A high-central vowel and a velar fricative type are found in the Josephstaal-Wanang Stocks, but (except in one or two cases), in the Isumrud and Pihom Stocks.

- 3) None of the languages appears to be tonal.
 - 4) The prefixing Two Possessive Class System appears to be common. The possessive markers for the class of nouns denoting body parts and terms of relatives are prefixed to the noun base, this being a typical feature of the languages of the Adelbert Range. There is also a subgroup of the Two Possessive Class System within the Adelbert Range which divides nouns into terms of relatives and others.
 - 5) The verb base always has tense-subject markers suffixed to it.
 - 6) The object markers, if incorporated into the verb, are prefixed to the verb base; this is a typical feature of the Adelbert Range Phylum.
 - 7) A Concordance Class System is found only in the Pomoikan Family (36, 37, 39).
- C. The following typological features are observed in the Ramu Phylum:
- 1) Number marking with nouns is very common.
 - 2) No Concordance Class System is found.
 - 3) The One Possessive Class System occurs throughout the phylum.
 - 4) A dual number is present in number markers and personal pronouns.
 - 5) The tense markers are suffixed to the verb base.
 - 6) Subject and object are not incorporated into the verb.

D. The Melanesian Languages:

- 1) No number marking with nouns occurs.
- 2) The Two Possessive Class System is present.
- 3) Aspect markers are suffixed to the Verb base or to the verb base plus object marker.
- 4) Subject markers are prefixed to the verb base.
- 5) Object markers are suffixed to the verb base.
- 6) The negation marker is an enclitic preceding the verb.

Despite a considerable general uniformity in the structure of these Melanesian languages it is worth while pointing out a few characteristics observed in only one or some of the languages under consideration.

- 1) The presence of /+/ only in Gedaged.

- 2) The presence of a trial form for pronouns and verbs in Manam.
- 3) Many adjectives or words corresponding to adjectives in European languages function in Matukar and Megiar as nouns belonging to the class of terms for relatives and body parts.
- 4) A differentiation of Subject-marker sets for present, past and future has been observed only in Manam.

INTERPHYLIC RELATIONSHIPS

Referring to Capell's observation but not comparing the available material himself, F.M. Voegelin (1965:50ff) postulated a Madang (Bogia) phylum for the area concerned. Utilising Capell's and Kasprus's material Wurm (1971) postulated a Bogia Phylum for the same area. Wurm seems very generous in his cognate identifications as his cognate percentage figures are much higher than those of the present writer. Considering the typological features of his proposed phylum, Wurm finds it more satisfactory to distinguish three types typologically, which means, in the present writer's term, the Ramu, Adelbert Range and Torricelli Phyla. Wurm lists his Bogia phylum among those phyla which 'may have some remote connection with the Central New Guinea Macro-Phylum.'

The present writer arrived at the preliminary classification presented in this paper independently of Wurm's pioneering classification. The division into three phyla instead of one seems lexically and typologically more appropriate and more promising in giving a more uniform picture. The classification as proposed in this paper displays a considerable agreement between a lexical and typological comparison. For a remote connection it seems to be more promising to look for the Ramu phylum in a westerly direction, i.e., towards the Sepik, and for the Adelbert Range and Madang Phyla in an easterly direction, i.e., towards the Finisterre and Huon Phyla (see Hooley and McElhanon 1970).
