JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS
SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCETHE FIRST DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON
MAY 31, 1995

The Lay Orientation Session of the 1995 South Carolina Annual Conference was held at 10:30 a.m. in the Johnson Auditorium of the Campus Life Center of Wofford College by the Conference Lay Leader B.J. Pasley and members of the Board of the Laity.

Bishop Robert H. Spain called the Clergy Session of the 1995 South Carolina Annual Conference to order at 10:10 a.m. in Leonard Auditorium of the Old Main building of Wofford College. After Bishop Spain offered prayer, "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus" was sung. The Business Questions relating to ministerial relations were answered and are included in the Business Questions, as approved and corrected by this session.

THE FIRST DAY - WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON
MAY 31, 1995

The first full session of the 1995 south Carolina Annual Conference was called to order by Bishop Robert H. Spain at 2:00 p.m. The traditional hymn, "And Yet Are We Alive," was led by The Rev. Thom Jones accompanied by Mr. Eddie Huss. The Rev. Wyatt Minton, III offered our invocation.

The Rev. Talmage Skinner, coordinator, welcomed the session to Wofford College on behalf of Dr. Joab Lesesne and the college staff.

The Rev. James E. Hunter, III introduced Bishop Robert H. Spain as the presiding bishop. The Rev. Clyde L. Calhoun, Chairperson of the Committee on the Episcopacy, introduced Mrs. Syble Mink Spain.

Bishop Spain welcomed Ms. Josefa Bethea. Ms. Bethea addressed the session: "My father loved this conference and the Church. He would always say, "Finish the race." He finished the race on March 12th. Let us keep running like my mother and father. We will finish the race. Thank you for all that you have done in the past months. My father loved South Carolina and all of you and he loved the Church. Keep me in your prayers as I will keep you in mine."

Bishop Spain offered the following prayer: "Remember we are part of God's Church and we are here to adopt the Lord's work. Be mindful of who we are. There will be things happening this week, motions made where we will not all agree. Everything we do I want to be done in the spirit of Jesus Christ. I want it to be as if God is here. And God is here! We will be electing delegates. Some want to go and some do not want to go. Do what is best for the Church. This is the Church of Jesus Christ and we need to be mindful of whose we are."

The Secretary, Delos Corderman, made the motions for: (1) the Bar of the Conference; (2) the roll and attendance records and (3) the agenda. The motions were accepted. He next nominated the tellers for the session, and they were approved. He also made the motion that electronic balloting be used for the lay and clergy delegates to the 1996 General Conference and the process was approved. The Rev. Timothy J. Rogers was nominated and approved to be First Assistant Secretary of the Annual Conference.

The electronic balloting process which allowed write in nominations for lay ballots was explained. Eligible Clergy were added to the clergy listing and assigned permanent numbers.

The first lay ballot for eleven persons was taken at 2:32 - 2:45 p.m. The first clergy ballot for eleven persons was taken at 2:45 - 3:00 p.m.

The Rev. Jimmy J. Montgomery had the Summer Investment Program students introduce themselves to the session and identify both themselves and the sites of their missions. The Rev. DeVon Ruth asked representatives of the over 1,300 Salkehatchie workers to come forward. The Summer Investment Program missionaries along with representative Salkehatchie workers were commissioned and sent forth using the service on

page 8 of the *Worship Booklet*.

The Rev. Timothy McClendon and The Rev. John Warren presented the reports of the **Committee on Standing Rules**, pages 1-2 of pre-conference materials.

Standing Rule 35 (b) was amended to read: "The chairperson of the Conference Committee on Nominations shall notify the Annual Conference Secretary and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries within ten (10) days following Annual Conference of the names, addresses and local churches..." The motion was adopted.

Standing Rule 35 (b) was amended to read: "At the beginning of a quadrennium all quadrennial boards, councils, commissions, and committees shall be convened within sixty (60) days upon the close of the Annual Conference session...." This was adopted.

Standing Rule 35 (a.) was made an introduction to the rule. Standing Rule 35 (c.) was made Standing Rule 35.(a.) and Standing Rule 35 (b) remained as Standing Rule 35.b. This was adopted.

Standing Rule 70 (n) was adopted as follows: "Unless otherwise provided in *The Book of Discipline*, a vacancy in the membership of a board, council, commission, or committee may be filled, *ad interim*, by the board, council, commission or committee for the remainder of the Conference year in which the vacancy occurs. At its next session the Annual Conference shall fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term. The respective board, council, commission, or committee shall inform the Committee on Nominations of the vacancy and its action." This was adopted.

Standing Rule 73 (a) was amended by adding the words "with a rationale" to the end of Standing Rule 73.a. This was approved.

Standing Rule 79 was amended by adding the following: The district superintendent shall consult with the District Committee on Nominations "in the selection of persons to serve on the District Council on Ministries. The District Council on Ministries shall be composed of the following: the district superintendent, the district directors of the following program areas: Health and Welfare, Church and Society, Education, Evangelism, Worship, Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Religion and Race, Communications, Town and Country and/or Urban Ministries, Disaster Response and Congregational Development; persons representing constituency groups including the District Lay Leader, the District Associate Lay Leaders, the District Director of Lay Speaking the Presidents of the District United Methodist Men and United Methodist Women, and President of the District Youth Council; coordinators of age-level and family ministries. Representatives from cluster groups may be included in districts where cluster groups exist. Additional resource persons may be added. As noted in paragraph 752.3 of *The Book of Discipline*, the chairperson shall be elected from among the membership. A vice-chairperson and secretary may also be elected from the membership. The selection process shall be in keeping with the spirit of inclusivity as outlines in paragraph 752.2 BOD.

Standing 81(a) was amended by adding "designated Associate Lay Leader;" (the District Director of Lay Speaking added on the motion of Thornton Crouch of the Hartsville District) "the presidents of the District United Methodist Women, the District United Methodist Men, the District Youth Council; and one other representative of each selected by the respective organization's executive committee." Where there is no District Youth Council, the district superintendent shall appoint the two (2) youth members. "It is recommended that gender and racial balance be considered in selection." The two (2) Conference Nominating Committee members from the district shall also serve. This was approved.

The report of the **Committee on Petitions to the General Conference**, as found on pages 214 -126 of the pre-conference materials, was made by The Rev. Delos Corderman.

Paragraph 234.1 was amended by adding the following underlined words submitted by David Marshall a member of Lexington United Methodist Church and by the addition of section

c., on the motion of James Daniel Fulbright of Grace Church, North Augusta, to read: "c. Off-site storage and electronic backup shall be maintained." The petition was adopted. (Additions to the current document are indicated in Double underlined print. Deletions are noted with a single underline.)

PETITION TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Paragraph 234.1 The permanent church register shall be kept on either paper based or electronic media. If it is on a paper media it shall be a volume of durable materials prepared by The United Methodist Publishing House. The format and content of the record forms contained in it and the manner of its binding shall be as approved by the Committee on Official Forms and Records of the General Council on Finance and Administration (see Paragraph 905.4c). The names shall be recorded chronologically as each person is received into the fellowship of that church, and without reference to alphabetical order. The names shall be numbered in regular numerical order, and the number of each shall appear on the correcting card, page, or record in the card index, loose-leaf book, or electronic information system membership record. If the permanent church register is kept on an electronic media, it shall meet the following criteria:

- a. It shall contain all of the information required by the General Council on Finance and Administration.
- b. Conversion of the information paper records to an electronic media shall be followed by a complete audit to insure the accuracy of the converted records.
- c. Off-site storage and electronic backup shall be maintained.

On the motions of Delos Corderman, and following questions, the petitions listed below were adopted. (Additions to the current document are indicated in Double underlined print. Deletions are noted with a single underline.)

PETITION TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Paragraph 413.4 "Probationary members shall be amenable to the Annual Conference in the performance of their ministry and shall may be granted the same security of appointment as associate members and members in full connection as long as they are probationary members."

PETITION TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Paragraph 419 "Associate members of an Annual Conference are in the itinerate ministry of the church and are available on a continuing basis for appointment by the bishop. They offer themselves without reservation to be appointed and to serve as their superiors in office shall direct. They shall be amenable to the Annual Conference in the performance of their ministry and shall may be granted the same security of appointment as probationary members and members in full connection."

PETITION TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Paragraph 423. Rights and Responsibilities. 1 "Members in full connection shall have the right to vote on all matters in the Annual Conference except in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences (Paragraph 701.1a) and shall have sole responsibility for all matters of ordination, character, and conference relations of clergy. This responsibility shall not be limited by the recommendation or lack of recommendation by the Board of Ordained Ministry, notwithstanding provisions of Chapter 3 which grant to the Board of Ordained Ministry the right or recommendation. They shall be eligible to hold office in the Annual Conference and to be elected delegates to the General and Jurisdictional or Central Conferences under the provisions of the Constitution (Paragraph 38, Article IV). Every effective member in full connection who is in good standing shall may receive an annual appointment by the bishop."

Paragraph 423.2 "There are professional responsibilities which clergy members are expected to fulfill and which represent a fundamental part of their accountability and a primary basis of their guaranteed appointment."

Paragraph 436 "All Clergy members who are in good standing in an Annual Conference shall may receive annually an appointment by the bishop unless they are granted a sabbatical leave, a disability leave, or are on leave of absence or retired."

Paragraph 660.7 "A Missionary Conference that has not established the right of full ministerial membership may ordain indigenous racial and ethnic persons as deacons who, although are not associate members, shall be accorded all the rights and privileges of associate membership in the Missionary Conference except the right of guaranteed appointment, provided that they have completed all of the necessary requirement for candidacy and such other requirements the Missionary Conference may establish."

The session also adopted a petition adding the recognition of a late Retirement Date to section E.01 of the Ministerial Pension Plan Document and the definition of Late Retirement in Section B.03 of the Ministerial Pension Plan Document as follows:

**PETITION TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE
FROM THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE
MINISTERIAL PENSION PLAN DOCUMENT**

E.01 Retirement Benefits.

- a. All Persons who as of December 31, 1981, who were receiving pension benefits from the Prior Plans shall thereafter continue to receive such pension benefits in the same form and amount from this Plan.
- b. Upon retirement at or after age 62 years or upon retirement at or after the completion of 35 appointment years on or after the Early Retirement Date, and upon application, a Participant shall receive a monthly retirement benefit equal to the sum of such Participant's Service Annuity and, if any, the Personal Contributions Annuity. However, a Participant may elect to postpone his/her retirement until the Late Retirement Date at which time, upon application, the Participant shall receive a monthly retirement benefit equal to the sum of the following:
 - (1) the greater of
 - (A) Such Participant's Service Annuity; or
 - (B) the actuarial equivalent of the Formula Benefit payable at the Normal Retirement Date; and
 - (2) if any, the Personal Contributions Annuity.

If the Participant is married at the time of retirement, the form of the annuity shall be a life annuity with 70% (75% or 100% if elected by the applicable Conference and so set forth in the Addendum) to the surviving spouse Contingent Annuitant with the Participant as the primary annuitant. If the Participant is not married at the time of retirement, the form of the annuity shall be a single-life annuity.

- (1) The first payment of the monthly retirement benefit shall be due as of the first day of the month following the month in which retirement occurs or application for the pension is made whichever is later.
- 2) Notwithstanding this provision, an Annual Conference may designate the date of first payment to be the first day of the month in which the retirement takes place.

B.03 Late Retirement Date: shall mean the first day of the month coinciding with or following the date the Participant retires at any conference session after the conference session held in the year in which the Participant turns age 65 on or before July 1.

At 3:50 p.m. Bishop Spain read the results of the **first lay ballot**. There were no elections. The names and identifying numbers of John Graham Altman and Richard Wilhite were added to the lay ballot booklets. At 4:12 p.m. the **second lay ballot** was opened. On the first clergy ballot, there were no elections. The Secretary made the motion that the names of persons receiving 25 or more votes be read on the succeeding ballots. The motion passed following discussion and attempts to amend the motion. The Rev. James S. Gadsden and The Rev. Granville A. Hicks withdrew from the election. The second lay ballot was closed at 4:21 p.m. The **second clergy ballots** were distributed at 4:28 p.m. After the second clergy ballot was closed, announcements were made and the session recessed until 4:50 p.m.

The session resumed at 4:46 p.m. with the singing of "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing." The report of the Conference Committee on Nominations, as found on pages 201-209, was introduced by The Rev. Anthony Gavalas. He announced corrections and opened the floor for additional nominations. Carolyn Brashear was nominated for the Board of Camps and Retreats (page 205), Charles Appleby was nominated as an at large member of the Conference Committee on Nominations by Bishop Spain. Russell Wright was nominated as a student advisory trustee of Spartanburg Methodist College, and the **Native American Concerns Committee** was nominated by Rev. Gavalas: Richard F. Elliott, Jr., Clifford Gilmer, James H. Nates, Jr., Michael Smith, Sarah Sanchez, Herb McAmis, Cathy Nelson, Charlotte Barker, Tracey Pender, Charles Pfeiffer. Rev. Gavalas moved suspension of the Standing Rules and moved the adoption of the report, as amended, on Thursday afternoon. The motion was adopted and Bishop Spain thanked the Committee.

The Rev. Charles L. Johnson referred the reports of the **Council on Finance and Administration** on pages 3-10 of the pre-conference reports to the session at 5:03 p.m. After discussion on the impact of the proposals of the Council on Finance and the pro forma budget proposal, Bishop Spain responded to the questions of Mr. Bud Black, The Rev. George Fields and Dr. Peter Mitchell, that the proper time to make motions regarding the budget would be as the items are considered in reports or at the final presentation of the report of the Council on Finance and Administration. With the permission of the Council on Finance, Delos Corderman made the following motion to comply with a verdict of a trial court;

Motion regarding Decision of the Trial Court on an Individual Pension

In regard to a question of law brought to the 1995 session, the Judicial Council has ruled: "However, there is nothing in the *Discipline* to preclude an Annual Conference from contracting with outside parties for pension benefits. Par. 1606.11(a) does preclude such contracts for the benefit of individual effective or retired ministers." The minister under suspension by the Annual Conference is not an effective minister during the time of the suspension. The South Carolina Annual Conference may contract with outside parties for pension benefits for the clergy member during the period of suspension. However, if the clergy member does not wish to be covered by a pension plan provided by an outside party, that portion of the Trial Court's verdict may be waived by the clergy member."

The representative of the clergy member on suspension has asked that the Annual Conference comply with the verdict of the Trial Court. Therefore, I move that the 1995 Session of the South Carolina Annual Conference authorize the conference secretary to purchase an individual pension in an amount not to exceed \$8,474.44. The funds would be used to purchase an individual annuity and life insurance contract with the South Carolina Annual Conference as owner and beneficiary of the contract. The person for whom the individual pension is purchased must agree to medical underwriting and to the terms of the contract purchased by the South Carolina Annual Conference in lieu of any other pension benefits from the United Methodist Church while the minister is under suspension.

The total cost is found in the following calculation.

reading of the **second clergy ballot**, there were no elections. After the secretary made announcements, the session adjourned at 5:36 p.m.

**FIRST DAY - WEDNESDAY EVENING
MAY 31, 1995**

The Memorial Communion Service for the 1995 session was held at 7:00 p.m. in Johnson Arena of the Campus Life Building of Wofford College. Bishop Robert H. Spain served as liturgist. The sermon, "God's Gifts: Memory and Hope," on Psalm 90: 104, 13-17; 1 Peter 1:3-9; John 17:1-10, was delivered by The Rev. John M. Younginer, Jr.

THE MEMORIAL SERVICE

GOD'S GIFTS: MEMORY AND HOPE

Dr. John M. Younginer, Jr.

Psalm 90:1-4, 13-17; 1 Peter 1:3-9; John 17:1-10

Upon receiving our late Bishop Bethea's gracious, flattering – but surprising – invitation to me for this pulpit tonight, I recalled that in 38 years as an active member of this conference, I could count on one hand the number of times I had been to this microphone. Tonight is my chance to make up for lost time.

In my student days at Emory, all of us were required to take a course entitled "Practice Preaching" under Dr. G. Ray Jordan. Dr. Jordan's teaching format was to require each person to be prepared to preach a trial sermon to the class on any given day. At the appointed hour when we were assembled, the teacher would look around the room, point to someone and say, "You preach today."

Some of you who are present here tonight were in that class the day he pointed to a student from the North Carolina Conference. The young man walked hesitatingly up to the podium, held it with his trembling hands and announced: "Today I would like to speak to you about the three things that Jesus said that mean the most to me in my life. But for the life of me, I cannot remember what they are!"

A little boy wrote to his grandmother: "Dear Grandmother, I'm sorry that I forgot your birthday last month. It would serve me right if you forgot mine next Tuesday."

Without memory, we must experience everything for the first time. Learning would be impossible. Education would be meaningless. Relationships would have no value.

That is why memory is so important in the Bible. The Hebrew word "Zaccur" means "to remember," and appears over and over again in the Old Testament:

"Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8)

"Remember .. your Creator in the days of your youth." (Ecclesiastes 12: 1)

"Remember the wonderful works that he has done." (Psalm 105:5)

"Remember this and consider, recall it to mind .. remember the former things

... for I am God, and there is no other." (Isaiah 46:8,9)

The word and deeds of the Lord were not to be forgotten. They were to be remembered and told and re-told so that no one would ever forget. Someone has poetically pointed out that, "God gave us memory so that we might have roses in December."

At a military cemetery on a small island in the Pacific where a large number of Americans are buried, there is a simple marker which bears this inscription:

"They shall not grow old as we who are left grow old. Age shall not weary them nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun, and in the morning, we shall remember them."

There is not much that we have in common with God – but there is this: He wants to be remembered, and so do we.

A teacher in an inner city school one day found a note on her desk. It came from a student whom she remembered as the young man who sat quietly back in the corner of the classroom with a troubled look on his face and with a vacant stare in his eyes. The note said simply, "I wish you knew who I was." Our promise in Christ is that God knows who we are, that we matter and that Someone cares what happens to us.

One of the greatest fears we may have is that when we die, we will be forgotten and our

life here will be insignificant. We all want to be remembered.

Madeline L'Engle tells of walking one morning with her husband on the deck of a cruise ship on an excursion to which they had looked forward for a long time. It was a beautiful morning with the light of the sun glistening like jewels in the water. They came upon a member of the ship's crew and remarked how they wished they could make the morning last forever. The sailor replied, "It's a short walk from the womb to the tomb." And he was right. A member of a church I once served, the St. George United Methodist Church, closed every Sunday School class session with this admonition: "Life, however long, is still ever so short."

It was that same philosophy which led the Psalmist to pray: "Teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom." Numbering our days by remembering that life is brief brings new meaning to our sense of time as a gift. A teacher always reminded her students: "You must look at things not only as if you were seeing them for the first time, but as if you were seeing them for the last time."

The appearance of John the Baptist in the Judean wilderness was a call to repent, but it was also a call to remember the Messianic promise.

So you and I are caught tonight in a mixture of emotions – to remember those who have been a part of us and all we have experienced, and to look forward to what is yet to come. We must watch and wait – for the answers we seek, for our dreams to become reality, for our purpose to be fulfilled, for the pattern of life to be completed, and for the day of the Lord to come.

In Jesus' moving prayer for the Church, he prays for the disciples whom He must soon leave in death, and then prays for all of us in future generations who will become a part of the faith community.

So even our Lord has brought the living and the dead together in the sacredness of our memories and the blessedness of our hopes. I think this is what the New Testament must mean when the writer exclaimed:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and sin that cling so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."
(Hebrews 12:1, 2)

In the words of our great hymn, "O, God our help in ages past, our hope for those to come."

I. GOD HAS BEEN OUR HELP IN AGES PAST.

As we recall those persons who journeyed in the faith before us and remember with gratitude all they bequeathed to us, we see the hand of God in the way we have been loved and nurtured. It reminds us from whence we came, how we struggled and failed, how we rejoiced and succeeded, when we were alienated in sin and how we have been forgiven, the somber times of illness and death and the happy times of healing and hope. Let us say it and say it well: God was there.

In John Steinbeck's *Grapes of Wrath*, an Oklahoma family moving west is told not to waste critical packing space on photographs and family memorabilia. One member of the family asks: "But how will we know it's us without our past?" We cannot know it's "us" without pausing to remember people and places and events ... even words and gestures.

Our faith demands that we remember those who have run this race before us. We are not the first to risk our lives for others. We are not the first to struggle with worldliness and evil. We are not the first to call for justice. We are not the first to know and follow Jesus. We are not the first to hold a light in the darkness. We can never know who we are without our past, without those persons who have been so much a part of us.

We are told that when objects meet in outer space, they leave traces on each other forever. What we are tonight has been influenced by countless others who have touched us with their love and trust.

As Nihls Dahl, speaking of the early Church, points out: "The first obligation of the apostle to the community – beyond founding it – was to make all the faithful in it remember all they had received, and then to become a living reminder of it."

An earthquake tears the land apart. Tornadoes and hurricanes wreak their havoc in hamlets and communities among people we know and love. A terrorist bomb explodes killing

hundreds of people, some on routine errands. An illness strikes us, an accident happens.

All of this tells us that we do not know what a day may bring forth, so we must make the most of every moment, and recognize the Presence of God in all things. "For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past." (Psalm 90) Memory is a gift, and we must not forget that God has been our help in ages past.

II. HE IS ALSO OUR HOPE FOR YEARS TO COME.

Billions of people have been born and died, and no one remembers them all, unless God does. "His eye is on the sparrow," the singer reminds us, and we can be sure that He who watches over us so carefully will be there for us for years to come.

Not too long ago for many of us to remember it, a popular song entitled "I Believe in Yesterday" made it to the top of the charts.

"I believe in yesterday.

Yesterday, all my troubles seemed so far away.

Now I need a place to hide away

Oh, I believe in yesterday."

It is the melancholy cry of a generation that finds no joy in the present, and no hope for the future.

In the Church we have joined ranks with the ballad singer .. when we do not find Christ in today we have no hope for tomorrow.

"I believe in yesterday."

The early Church had no impressive furbishings, no brassware, no altar and candles; so they made the sign of the cross over each other. Instead of one cross, they had hundreds .. not just to hover over the church's sacraments .. but over every exchange, every relationship, every encounter, every mood, every event, and it gave them hope for tomorrow .. the sign of the cross.

God entered human history through Jesus and is at work for good in what happens in these days. When we remember that, we know who we are, how much God loves us, and in remembering, we have hope. It is a blessed hope which rebuilds, re-molds and makes us. When we remember, we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit who gives us hope. To remember and say "thanks" for what has been, is to say "yes" to what is yet to come. When we realize how much God has been "our help in ages past," we learn how much He is "our hope for years to come."

These are God's gifts: memory and hope. We remember all that Jesus taught and did, how he died in love and was resurrected by God's power. As Jesus himself declared: "I have said these things to you that when the hour comes you may remember." And during the Last Supper, He took the bread and wine, gave them to the disciples and said, "Do this and remember me." Jesus is telling us to remember what has happened so that we can have hope for what will happen in time to come. Amen.

SECOND DAY - THURSDAY MORNING

JUNE 1, 1995

The Love Feast was held at 7:30 a.m. in Leonard Auditorium of Old Main Building. The preacher was The Rev. Nathaniel Evans, Jr.

Bishop Robert Spain called the session to order at 8:38 a.m. After singing "Open My Eyes That I May See" and "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus," the invocation was given by The Rev. Young In Lee. The Rev. Anthony Gavalas was recognized to make editorial corrections in the Report of the Committee on Nominations.

At 8:47 a.m. The Rev. James Adams referred to the resolution found on page 221 of the pre-conference materials and made the announcement that the **Committee on Resolutions and Appeals** would meet following adjournment on Thursday afternoon to receive additional resolutions. He announced that 2,000 copies additional resolutions would be required for distribution when the session considered the proposals.

Bishop Spain called the tellers for the distribution of the **third lay ballot** at 8:48 a.m. Motions to limit the readings or to have the top fifteen vote getters make limited presentations

following the dinner recess were defeated. Mr. John R. Seiper of St. Paul's, Waccamaw moved: "Reading of names for General and Jurisdictional candidates receiving votes shall be discontinued for those receiving less than fifty votes." The motion passed the third lay ballot was closed at 8:59 a.m.

The Rev. Timothy Rogers explained the common mistakes in balloting. Some were using ink rather than pencils. Others were not voting for the number required. Vote for the number of persons required only. If one votes for more or less the ballot is not counted. There is a box for lay write ins and they must be in that box only. Some clergy are marking numbers without names.

The **third clergy ballot** was opened at 9:08 a.m. and closed at 9:19 a.m.

Bishop Spain welcomed Mr. Stephen LaPierre of the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits. Mr. LaPierre announced that he would be present during the session at an information booth in the exhibit area to explain the health program, distribute networking information and answer questions. He also provided a toll free number where he may be reached for additional assistance. The bishop asked the members to take any health care questions or concerns to Mr. LaPierre rather than discussing personal situations on the floor of the conference. This will give persons time to get specific and detailed answers to any personal concerns.

The Rev. T. Lee Bryant and The Rev. Sara A. White presented the **Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry**. Attention was called to the three items on page 213 of the registration packet: (1) available scholarship funds, (2) the Continuing Education Endowment for Effective Ministry, and (3) Residency II. The session received the information.

The Rev. Taylor Campbell announced that The Board of Ordained Ministry Policy Guidelines found in the registration packet were adopted by the Clergy Session in 1994. We have been operating under these Guidelines since last year but they are to be approved by the whole body. The Ministry Policy Guidelines were ratified by the entire session on his motion.

Motion on Combined Task Force. At 9:27 a.m. Kathy Jamieson-Ogg made the following motion: That the Board of Ordained Ministry form a task force, including members of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on Career Planning and Counseling and the Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling, to study and design an on-going career development program that will fulfill paragraph 733.1(n) of the *Discipline*. The program shall be subject to Board of Ordained Ministry approval and presented to the 1996 S.C. Annual Conference. The cost of the program shall be nominal, and shall be covered by a pastor's continuing educational fund and/or expense reimbursement, not Annual Conference Funds."

In response to The Rev. Ted Walter's question: Who is to establish the task force?, Rev. Jamieson-Ogg said that the Board of Ordained Ministry should establish the task force in consultation with the other two committees. This was accepted as an amendment to the motion.

In response to the question of The Rev. Charles Johnson, it was agreed that the task force would be funded by the three bodies named in the motion.

Ms. Hazel Bennett asked that the Board of Diaconal Ministry be added to the other committees. The response was that there could be a separate task force for Diaconal ministers.

The motion as amended was approved as printed above.

The Rev. Sara White called the names of the **Probationary Members** in the class of 1995. Bishop Spain asked the historic questions. The probationers were presented to the session and welcomed to probationary membership.

The **Associate Members** of the class of 1995 were presented by the registrar, questioned by Bishop Spain and welcomed by the session.

The Rev. Sara White named the **Full Members** in the class of 1995. Bishop Spain asked the historic questions. The newly elected elders were presented to the session and welcomed into full membership.

Bishop Spain reminded the new members: "God has called you out. Don't you ever disappoint the Lord. How important it is...Before you come tonight find someplace to pray. Pray!"

Harry Prim, chairperson of the **Board of Diaconal Ministry**, presented Charles and Gay

Hutchins the following resolution on behalf of the Diaconal ministers.

Whereas, Mr. Charles A. Hutchins, a Diaconal Minister, has served the United Methodist Church and Epworth Children's Home faithfully for twenty-two years, and

Whereas, the Board of Diaconal Ministry, supports him and his wife, Gay, in their future endeavors,

Be it resolved on this 1st day of June, 1995, that the South Carolina Conference join the Board of Diaconal Ministry in expressing its continuing love and support for Mr. Charles A. Hutchins.

Ms. Hazel Bennett referring conference to pages 41 and following of the pre-conference materials. She announced that Sue M. Parnell had transferred out on May 1, 1995.

Four candidates for Diaconal Ministry were introduced: Ronald Eugene Bentley, Donald Ralph Brown, Kathy Woodstock Joens, and Sarah Caroline Tucker. Bishop Spain questioned the candidates and offered a prayer. The candidates were elected Diaconal Ministers one by one and welcomed by the session.

On the motions of Harry Prim, III and Hazel Bennett, the report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry, the Annual Report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry, the Annual Report of Professional Christian Educators, the Annual Report of Professional Church Musicians, the Report of Persons Certified in Evangelism and the Report of Persons Certified in Youth Work were approved as amended by the registrar. Information on Diaconal Ministry was distributed by the tellers following the reports.

Mr. Tommy Brown was granted a personal privilege. Last year the Annual Conference prayed for him and he was healed from cancer. He had limited resources, but thanks to United Methodists in South Carolina, his bills have been paid.

The Report of the Cabinet was given by The Rev. H. Samuel Johnson at 10:15 a.m.

THE REPORT OF THE CABINET

Rev. H. Samuel Johnson

Ferment in the Ministry

As I stand before you, I am reminded of a book that I read some years ago written by Seward Hiltner entitled *Ferment in the Ministry*. I borrowed that title from Seward Hiltner to share with you a report from the cabinet.

As you are aware at the end of last year, Bishop Bethea had hearings in the twelve districts of our conference. I want to share with you what I heard the lay people saying to us as we listened. I heard them saying that somehow there is an inability for us to communicate clearly with each other in setting directions for our church. Some of them went further in saying that we have found that some of our pastors have great difficulty in providing a teaching ministry in the life of the local congregation. They even spoke about confirmation classes, United Methodist history classes, new membership classes. We also heard them say to us that there is no understanding anymore of what we call a mutual ministry. That is where all of us are called by God to share in the establishment of His church in His world. I also heard them say quite clearly, "We don't believe that we will have difficulty supporting any ministry in our conference if only we were provided clear reasons and a sense of direction that will help us understand what we are about." That is not all they were saying to us.

They said also, "We need to understand consultation a little clearer. Help us to grasp what it means. What is expected of us in the process and on the other hand what is expected of the pastors and we believe we can engage in effective ministry."

They also said that there seems to be a hesitancy among the clergy when it comes to challenging our people to a more effective stewardship that includes all of life. I will always remember in the Charleston District one of the members stood up and said, "It is time now that you share with us what you would have us do."

I am not saying that ferment is bad. I am saying that there is ferment and we need to find

a way to deal with it. On the other hand, in the conversations with the pastors, I heard sayings such as these: "There is a great morale problem among us because of the lack of mobility." They were also saying that somehow the system does not take care of our needs. They were also saying that there seems to be no clear vision for the annual conference. They were also saying that we are not provided the kind of support that is needed from those in authority. In other words, they were saying that we are sending them out and then not offering them the kind of support that is needed. In addition I want to say to you that with all of the ferment, with all of the discussion that we have about ministry in the United Methodist Church, I still believe we have an opportunity to provide effective ministry in God's church to enable God's people to come to Him and then to turn around and go out and bring others into God's church.

Let me suggest that before we do anything else, and I urge all of us to do this, we should pause to think clearly for a moment about our call to ministry. I share Bishop Spain's view for the ordination vow. I've never sat through an annual conference session where we were receiving people into ministry and did not feel something within me that calls me to question the answer that I made to the historic questions, that we would go where we were sent, and that we would spend our time offering the best that we have wherever we are, believing it is our responsibility to help further the Kingdom of God in that situation. One of the things that pains me most in the job that I do as a District Superintendent and also in serving as a pastor is that so often I hear my sisters and brothers rejoicing when another sister or brother falls into difficulty. Friends of mine, if we are going to be in ministry together, somehow we need to go back and look at the covenant that we made when we entered the ministry. We accepted God's call, our local churches authenticated it and sent us to our districts and ultimately the annual conference set us apart.

It pains me to have the topic of most of our conversations deal with the pain that another brother or sister is experiencing. Let me also say that the cabinet is not perfect and we are not dealing with perfect people, but I do know this, that we say that we are mutually accountable for our ministry. When we try to offer accountability that is when we experience some of our difficulty. I want to assure you that those of us who have the opportunity to sit on the cabinet realize that we are all elders in the South Carolina annual conference and we are only serving in those positions but for a few years. Friends of mine, we have got to be more responsible about our approach to ministry and how we deal with each other. I am going to share an experience that I had this year so that you can understand where I am coming from. We met to make a set of appointments and each one of us got in our cars and we went back to our various districts to begin contacting pastors and churches and before I ever called some of our churches they had already received telephone calls from both clergy and lay persons talking about the ministry of one who has been set apart. I share that with you because we only do injury to the ministry of our conference when we set ourselves up to be the deliverer for a specific church. Friends of mine, we need to learn how to leave our various appointments and do it gracefully. We need to realize that ministry will go on as long as the church is in the hands of the Almighty God. Still again, there are those of us, who for some reason have difficulty talking about our faith.

Another word that was shared quite clearly and I hope you understand that I am a part of you and what I share with you I share out of the depths of my being realizing that as family we can have a conversation with each other. The lay people are also saying our pastors have somehow lost their authority and power in the pulpit. They are also saying what we need is a more Scriptural base for what we ought to be about. Friends of mine, I've offered you, as a report of the cabinet, what I heard some of the lay people and clergy of our conference saying, and I want to close sharing with you these words from John 14 beginning at verse 25: "I have said these things to you while I am still with you, but the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name will teach you everything and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you, I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not let them be afraid. You heard me said to you, I am going away and I am coming to you. If you love me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father because the Father is greater than I and now I have told you this before it occurs for when it does occur you may believe." Two words and I offer these two words saying to you that even with ferment in our ministry with questions being raised on every hand, I want to say to

you that you understand quite clearly that Jesus was comforting his disciples because he had just said to them early on, "I am going to prepare a place for you and where I am you can also be." No doubt in my mind they were disturbed for you see Simon Peter and all the others had given all that they had and Jesus says to them what he says to us today: "Peace I leave with you, I give you this not like the world gives but I give freely of myself." What He was saying is that there is going to be ferment, there will be toil, there will be confusion, sometime we will not have a clear sense of direction, but keep your eyes on me. "My peace I give to you." The kind of peace that allows you to feel at ease even when you know you don't know what is going to happen next.

The other thing he says and I want you to know that this is important to me, in order to understand what he meant when he said to his disciples, "If you knew what I was offering you, you would be excited because I am going to the Father and when I go you can come." In other words what he was saying folks, there would be a little excitement. I don't mean to be rude, but I also heard the laypeople saying there is nothing wrong with joy in the house. As I leave you now, I leave you with this...

Bishop Spain read the report of the third lay ballot at 10:39 a.m. Dr. I. Carolyn Briscoe and Mr. James S. Arant were elected to the 1996 General Conference. At this point Bishop Spain called a recess. During the recess the order in the lay ballot was displayed on an overhead projector.

The session resumed at 11:00 a.m. with the singing of "Blessed Assurance." Bishop Spain recognized The Rev. C.J. Lupo to give the report of the **Committee to Study Communications Needs** (p. 71 of the pre-conference reports).

On behalf of the Trustees of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate, The Rev. Warren Ashmore presented a plaque to The Rev. Willie Senn Teague in recognition of his services to the Annual Conference as editor of the *Advocate*.

Dr. Lupo thanked the members of the Study Committee. He wished that we could have found a way to send the *Advocate* to United Methodist homes in South Carolina every week. Nevertheless, he is excited over the recommendations of the Committee. We need all communications under one umbrella. The recommendations of the Committee conform with South Carolina law and *The Book of Discipline*. The Conference Council on Ministries, with no dissenting vote, approved the several areas of downsizing listed. The Commission on Communications can not unelect *Advocate* trustees but, if the Committee's recommendation pass, each Advocate trustee has tendered resignation. The Conference Nominating Committee has a slate of nominees if the proposal is approved. The *Advocate* will provide up to \$100,000 for start up costs. The trustees have approved use of up to \$200,000 to provide computers and low interest loans to help churches who can not afford the computers and the training proposed. There will be a small networking fee for each church participating. Nothing in the proposal requires one to become a part of the network. Most communications will be by E-mail and that is economical. Chains to report deaths often break down but with computer

communications there is direct access to information. The proposed network could send art for bulletins, and format for newsletters. Preachers could meet together to discuss the lectionary and gain ideas for sermons. All statistical reports could be filed by computer. And there is no request for new funding. Dr. Lupo recommended adoption of The Proposal Conference Commission on Communications on pages 71 and 72 of the pre-conference reports.

Mr. James Fulbright asked if the Annual Conference will be running a commercial program? That issue could not be addressed at this time. The Rev. Gene Norris asked what authority the Conference would have? How will Annual Conference be involved? The response was that the Commission on Communications would be amenable to the annual conference just as other boards and agencies. In response to a question about what voice we would have in what would be communicated, the reply was that communication is a two way street. There would be crossover with persons on CCOM and communications. This is an opportunity for lay and clergy to become involved in theological conversations. The possibility for dialogue is tremendous.

The Rev. Jimmy Montgomery moved that in addition to the five Advocates to go to local churches, subscriptions be allocated for all persons who serve in ABLC relationships. Bishop Spain put the question and the motion was defeated.

Mr. John Redmond asked of there would be a regular quadrennial election of the Commission. The response was affirmative. The Commission would, however, elect the administrator.

The Rev. Ted Walter moved: "Combine the staff position and job descriptions of the Coordinator of the Department of Information and the Administrator of the Office of Communications found on page 72 of the pre-conference materials into one position." The amendment to combine these positions was approved.

After responding to other questions, The Proposal Conference Commission on Communications, as amended was approved.

Bishop Spain called for order at 12:00 p.m. "Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed" was sung. He welcomed The Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe, Chaplain of Emory University and a member of this conference and the Judicial Council.

Thursday Morning Preaching Service Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe

Introduction

It is an overwhelming joy to come home to be the conference preacher. It is also very unnerving. I know you and you know me! This is a family for whom I have great understanding and deep affection. It is with a sense of gratitude for the life and work of the Church as manifest in the Annual Conference that I come. It is with thanksgiving for the memory of Joseph Bethea who extended this invitation that I come. Thank you Bishop Spain for your hospitality and generous spirit!

I want to spend the "preaching moments" for the next three days reflection on vocation in several ways. Vocation is that which grounds our life and work together. Vocation is to summons, to call, to make voiced rather than voiceless. The task of the Church is to live out its calling. The task of the Church is to be vocational. How as the Church do we live a life committed to vocation? The 100 paragraphs of the *Discipline* state the ways we as United Methodists are grounded:

The heart of Christian Ministry is Christ's ministry of our reaching love. Christian ministry is the expression of the mind and mission of Christ by a community of faith that demonstrates a common life of gratitude and devotion, witness and service, celebration and discipleship. All Christians are called to this ministry of servanthood. (*Discipline*, paragraph 104)

This is the Nature of Ministry of all Christians: general/representative The fact is, we are all called to ministry. The focus for these next three days, is how we as the Church live vocationally. We do it in a myriad of ways. Basically, we live out this calling in our witness (Word), in how we pray and commune (Sacrament), and in how we order our life in the community (Order) for discipleship and service.

**For The Sins Of The Whole World
John 1:14, 15**

Some years ago a famous novelist died. Among his papers was found a list of suggested plots for future stories, the most prominently underscored being this one: "A widely separated family inherits a house in which they have to live together."

This is the great new problem of our age. We have inherited a large house, a great world house" in which we have to live together. One way of looking at the story is to talk about all kinds of differences ... black, white, Easterner/Western, Christian, Jew, Catholic and Protestant, Moslem, conservative, evangelic, liberal, radical. This family is unduly separated in ideas, culture, interest, who, because it can never again live apart, must learn to live with each other in peace. (MLK). But today I want us to reflect on what the Gospel community is (in this part of the house.) *What is it that holds this part of the household together?* I think there is a Word that binds us together. Tomorrow I will say something about the mysteries that hold us together and the next day a word about the promises which bind us together.

Bonhoeffer says, "*The Word of God seeks a Church to take unto itself.* It has its being in the Church. There is no such thing as the Word on the one hand and the Church on the other. The Word moves of its own accord, and all that we have to do is to assist that movement and try to put no obstacles in its path." (TCD, 279). *The Word of God seeks a Church, a community, if you will, to take unto itself.* While that community may not be a perfect community there is indeed, a way by which it lives. I believe we call it the Gospel. We must know and be shaped by the primary language of faith, as Fred Craddock says. The challenge to the Church is to know and speak the Gospel message. That is the Word which binds us together.

So what is that Word? The Word is radically dependent upon that which is not language. When we speak of the memory of God if nothing is shown then the Word is empty. It matters how we live the Gospel. It matters how we speak to and for the people of God. The Gospel can only be preached because it has been lived. We heard it preached in Scripture. The Gospel is the Word which sustains us. It is not unlike the story of the time Winnie-the-Pooh dropped dropped in at Rabbit's hole unannounced, in hope of finding a Little Something. Rabbit was, of course, too polite to turn Pooh down; he was too polite even to stop Pooh while Pooh ate every bit of honey, condensed milk, and bread in Rabbit's hole. And then Pooh attempted to leave. But my now Pooh was so stuck that he only got halfway through. Pooh stayed stuck until his Wise Friend, Christopher Robin, came along. It was clear that Pooh would remain stuck for a week before he would be able to be free again.

"A week!" said Pooh gloomily. "What about meals?" "I'm afraid no meals," said Christopher Robin, "because of getting thin quicker. But we will read to you."

Bear began to sigh, and then found he couldn't because he was so tightly stuck; and a tear rolled down his eye, as he said:

"Then would you read a Sustaining Book, such as would help and comfort a Wedged Bear in Great Tightness."

We want a Word, we long for Church. Most of us are Wedged Bears in Great Tightness and we need a Sustaining Word. We need a community which reads to us! It is the Word which is read, as well as the act of reading to one another sustains US.

This however, is not the end of the story. The Word is not for us only, but for all the world. Sometimes we hush to soon. When we speak of God is nothing is shown the Word is empty. An empty tomb makes no difference if there is no community to gather and to celebrate. A feast makes no difference if there is no community with whom and for whom to share it. The Word is much more than our verbal proclamations. It is dependent upon that which is unspoken, for those not present, of things not seen.

I went to a feast once. It was in church. In the beginning it did not look like that much of a feast. I knew it would be good, but it looked a little ordinary. Here is how it happened, as I saw it. The Gospel Choir, the VOIS, went to Jamaica for a concert and service trip. This was their alternative spring break which is not your ordinary student trip to Montega Bay in fancy hotels, eating wonderful food, lying on the beach, and partying the whole night. The experience was a pan-African, pan-Methodist service trip. This group of 35, predominantly African American, one Jewish student, and I stayed in Kingston, a city of 1 million people. The unemployment rate

is 40%. There is great disparity between the wealthy and those with no money. Marks of slavery and colonialism are still found. Although Jamaica has been independent for more than 20 years the move from being a British colonial power to an independent state finds Kingston with a myriad of problems not unlike those faced by most developing countries. The infrastructure is fragile. The tax rate is 12 1/2%. Public transportation is laughable.

Unless one is affluent enough to own a cistern, water is only available for 8 hours a day. It is very inconvenient to have such limited access to water, especially when you are painting houses. The average weekly wage is \$500 Jamaican (\$27 US). Food costs are high. Cereal is \$7.00 a box and gas for hot water is \$30 (US) per bottle.

On Sunday the VOIS sang at Coke Methodist Church. Coke was built in 1800 to serve the people of Jamaica. It has a history of faithfulness under great duress. Methodism has always believed slavery to be morally wrong. The Methodist Church in Jamaica objected to the practice of slavery.

Although the Methodist Church welcomed slaves to services of worship in the mid 1800s, British Colonial Law prohibited slaves from worshipping between sun up and sun down. Sometimes the Methodist Church would hold services at sun down. Then a law was passed that churches could not have services after 6:00 p.m. One Sunday evening Coke's service went until 6:15 p.m. Because the church was already suspect the authorities closed the church for 7 years. We would think this would be the end of the church. But no. When Coke Church was closed it had 700 members and when it reopened 7 years later it had 1700 members. Even while silenced the church continued to do its work.

Doug Hallman, the pastor invited me to celebrate communion. I was honored to serve this congregation now not only predominantly black but also international. Since this is a British Methodist Church the "old rite" is used. I had not used that rite since I served Shady Grove. I do know the rite by heart. It really is embedded in my heart. I grew up with it. It is good that I know it by heart because every member brings his/her hymnal to the service. I, of course, did not have one.

We came to the Prayer of Thanksgiving which says,

"Almighty God, our heavenly father, who of thy tender mercy didst give thy only Son Jesus to suffer death upon the cross for our redemption. Who made there, by the one offering of himself, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice for the sins of the whole world and did institute and in the Holy Gospel ... command us to continue.

Now I've said those words hundreds of times. Even at that moment, I did not hear them anew. It was later. The communion rail is in an octagonal shape and beautifully carved. It is surrounded by stained glass windows.

We began to serve the congregation. We served the elderly and disabled first by taking the elements to the pew. And that is where it began for me. The dimly sighted Reverend Jones, the oldest pastor on the island saw us coming down the aisle to bring him communion. He began to weep. No. He wailed. He cried out loud mumbling as one sometimes does when he/she has suffered a stroke. Tears were streaming down his face, his head was thrown back and there in that moment was gathered together the history, the mystery, and all the unspeakable joy and sorrow which life yields and is brought to the sacrament. I gently held his hand around the cup as he drank and I bit my lip to keep from crying.

Then the people came to the altar. Many of them were elderly, some lame, some partially sighted. There were the members of the VOIS. One student's father and mother are both disabled, one is wealthy with all the problems that some wealthy families have, one still lives in rural Oklahoma and cooks on a wood stove. On this Sunday, this little world community gathered. There were Jamaicans, Britishers, Americans, Africans, Danes. We gathered for communion.

Hands are very personal, probably most personal next to faces. In the Anatomy lab that I spend 2 hours a week each fall with the medical school students I have learned which days are most important to be there. One is the day they dissect the hand. It touches them very deeply.

As Doug, the servers, and I offered the sacrament I heard myself saying. "The blood of our Lord Jesus Christ which was given for you and for many for the sins of the world, take and drink with thanksgiving."

So the people came. I held the little communion cup for a man who reached for it. He had no fingers. Then there was the stately blind man whom I helped feel the cup until he could guide it to his mouth. The one that I could not turn loose with my gaze was the handsome fair-skinned, green-eyed African man. I looked into his eyes, and looked again as I served the next two people.

And, oh, how aware I was of the sins of the whole world. The sin of poverty, Of malnutrition, of unsafe working conditions which cause injury, of hunger, and of slavery. The sins of the whole world. The innocent children of the Basic School of the Methodist Church in Tivoli Gardens that looked like the pictures of Soweto, the National (Methodist) School for children who are abandoned by their parents because they are handicapped, were all part of this communion gathering. There, at the Table, the suffering of the innocent, the pain of those who sojourn through life, those living in the deep poverty of Kingston, we all who live in the midst of world gone crazy. Christ died not for our sins only but for the sins of the whole world. (I John 2:2). What an amazing gift. One who came and who continues to come to make us one with God and one with each other in service to humankind. It is a great feast in which we share. That morning it was more delicious and exquisite than I could image. It was a taste of glory divine. It was and is the word made flesh.

Following the sermon, the conference joined in the hymn "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing." Bishop Spain give the benediction.

Second Day - Thursday Afternoon June 1, 1995

The session opened with the singing of "I Am Thine O Lord" and "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus." Bishop Spain offered prayer.

Dr. Gordon Goodgame, Executive Director of Southeastern Jurisdictional Administrative Council was presented. He called attention to the Council Report on pages 153-155 in the pre-conference materials. He announced that an eight minute video is available for use in local churches.

Bishop Spain recognized Mr. B.J. Pasley, the Conference Lay Leader, and commended the large crowd at the Laity Luncheon. Mr. Pasley introduced Dr. Carolyn Johnson, president of the Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries, the Laity Luncheon speaker for 1995.

At 2:20 the third lay ballot was read again. Mr. Harry Kent noted that the composition of the General Conference delegation should be representative and inclusive. The tellers distributed the fourth lay ballot at 2:25 p.m. and was closed at 2:36 p.m.

The fourth clergy ballot was taken from 2:31 - 2:36 p.m. The motion to divide the house in order to expedite voting was rejected.

On a point of personal privilege, The Rev. Thomas Bowman made an appeal for a member who is suffering from lymphoma and needs a bone marrow transplant. Less than 5% of donors are African-Americans. On June 2nd the Red Cross will be on site from 1:00 to 7:00 p.m. to test for bone marrow transplant ability. If the test is approved, one's name will go on the national donor register. This is your chance to lay down your life for a friend. There is no expense to the donor. Donors must be between age 18 and 55.

The Rev. Anthony Gavalas amended the report of the Committee on Nominations. In light of the motion on the Commission on Communications, item 28, Advocate Trustees, was deleted. The nominations of the Charleston Wesley Foundation, page 135, were submitted. All nominations, other than the district nominations, were approved as forwarded by the Conference Committee on Nominations. Bishop Spain thanked the chairperson and the Committee for hard work.

At 3:00 p.m. The Rev. Ted H. Walter, Cabinet Secretary, presented the nominations for the District Boards of Church Location and Building on page 209 adding the name of Ada Charles to the Spartanburg District, the District Boards of Trustees on page 210, the District Boards of Congregational Development on page 210 and 211, the District Committees on Ordained Ministry on page 211, and the District Committees on the District

Superintendency on pages 211-212. These were approved.

The Resolution to Change the Name of Main Street United Methodist Church, Rock Hill, S.C., to Cornerstone United Methodist Church, found on page 212 of the pre-conference materials was approved on the motion of the Cabinet Secretary.

The session approved the following changes in Charge Lines:

Greenville District:

1. Discontinue the Northside-Piedmont Park Charge making Northside a station appointment and Piedmont Park a station appointment.

Greenwood District:

1. Dissolve the Lupo Memorial-Panola Charge and attach Panola UMC to Bethlehem UMC (Coronaca) to form the Bethlehem-Panola Charge. Lupo Memorial will be a TBS appointment.
2. Dissolve the Harmony-King's Chapel Charge, making Harmony a station appointment and King's Chapel a TBS appointment.

Orangeburg District:

1. Change the name of the Sandy Run Charge to Shiloh-Beulah Charge.

Rock Hill District

1. Realign the Asbury Charge: (1) Ebenezer UMC and Heath Chapel UMC will remain on the Asbury Charge. (2) Place Camp Creek UMC with Grace UMC, Lancaster to form a new charge named South Lancaster Charge.
2. Discontinue the East Lancaster Parish; (1) Make Good Shepherd UMC a station appointment. (2) Make Trinity UMC a station appointment.

Spartanburg District:

1. Dissolve the Fairmont-Gravelly Memorial Charge. Make Gravelly Memorial a station appointment. Make Fairmont a TBS appointment.

Dr. Carolyn Briscoe and The Rev. Patricia Griffith-Fallow presented Merit Scholarships to Kristen Revé Richardson and Myila Tennika Dunham, and to Matthew Allen Cunningham, who is hospitalized and unable to attend the session. The Foundation Scholarship was presented to John Fulton Evett. The Asbury Award was presented to Ms. Geneva Williams for outstanding teaching at Claflin College. Two Crusade Scholars were recognized: Alia Bines and Sang Keum Kim. Mr. Kim's father, who is visiting from South Korea, was introduced. This is 50th anniversary of the Crusade Scholarships. The several Crusade Scholars in the session stood and were recognized.

Mr. B.J. Pasley introduced fellow Board of Global Ministries member, Ms. Sara S. Shingler, and mugged Bishop Spain with a commemorative cup.

Dr. Carolyn Briscoe began the presentation of the reports of the Conference Council on Ministries by introducing Ms. June Willson, the Youth and Age Level coordinator. Ms. Willson asked Ms. Lanecia Rouse, Ms. Lisa Yebuah and Mr. Lee Lewis to make the make the Conference Council on Youth Ministry Report, page 151 of the pre-conference materials. It was reported that over \$13,600 had been raised for the Youth Service Fund making our effort one of the top in the nation. Ms. Lanecia Rouse reported on the use of the Youth Service Fund and thanked South Carolina United Methodists for their support. The report was moved to record and approved.

The Rev. Ellen Younker addressed new programs at Asbury Hills Camp and noted that the Asbury Hills staff house is being used for the first time this year. She reported on the new facilities at Sewee Coastal Retreat Center. The report of the Board of Camps and Retreats, page 119, was moved to record by Rev. Younker.

At 3:35 p.m. Bishop Spain read the fourth lay ballot and announced four elections to the General Conference: Charles A. Hutchins, Hammie L. Chaplin, Jr., Dolly Fogle and Sara S. Shingler. On the reading of the fourth clergy ballot, there were four General Conference elections: Sheila D. Rogers, Robert E. Stillwell, Charles L. Johnson, Sr., and Debra A.S. Quilling.

The fifth lay ballots were distributed at 3:45 and closed at 3:55 p.m. The fifth clergy ballots were distributed at 3:55 and closed at 4:03 p.m. At this point the conference recessed.

Bishop Spain reconvened the session at 4:15 p.m. "I Love to Tell The Story" was sung.

Mr. Francis Mack, chairperson, moved the Report of the United Methodist Center Trustees, pages 217-218 of the registration packet, to record after highlighting the report. Concern for security is still a priority. The biggest issue is the building itself. It is 13 years old and there are problems dating back to original construction, the air conditioning is one example. Changes have been made to increase comfort and improve function. As the building gets older the cost of maintenance will increase. The Conference needs to consider whether to keep this building or look at a different facility as a possibility. Now is the time to make the commitment to remain where we are and make improvements as we can or to change. Two years ago Bishop Bethea appointed an *ad hoc* committee which, after deliberate study, made the recommendation to retain the present facility inasmuch as a desirable alternative facility would be costly. The report was put to record.

The Rev. Patricia Griffith-Fallow who introduced a summer intern for the Black College fund, DeDine Jenkins who reported on the benefits of the fund.

Mr. James Salley, a lay member of this conference and a primary Africa University fund riser thanked the Conference for what has been done for the Africa University and what we will do in the future. Special thanks was given to the Cabinet who paid the way for one student who has graduated. He showed a brief video on the recent graduation, "From These Seats" and will report on progress in the future.

Dr. Briscoe asked Dr. Peter Mitchell to introduce the Senior College Funds. All apportionments used for scholarships. They enable 1000 youth to grow in wisdom love and faith in our United Methodist colleges, Claflin, Columbia College, Spartanburg Methodist College, Wofford College.

Ms. Betty Davis presented Denman Clergy Award to Susan Leonard Ray. Rev. Ray expressed what evangelism, sharing Good News, means to her and how it is expressed in her congregation. The Lay Denman Award was presented to Mr. Robert Richardson, a Belin United Methodist Church, Murells Inlet. In three years, the Church has received 460 new members in 3 years. Bishop Spain commented that the award committee would have to deliberate over the many who would qualify for the Denman Awards In Evangelism.

At 5:07 p.m. Bishop announced the election of B.J. Pasley on the fifth lay ballot. There was no election to report on the reading of the fifth clergy ballot. The sixth lay ballot was opened at 5:15 and closed at 5:22 p.m. The sixth clergy ballot was opened at 5:22 and closed at 5:28 p.m. After announcements were made about the service of ordination/consecration, Bishop Spain reminded the session that the chapel in Old Main is open for special prayers for the conference. He said: Tonight is the night to be in prayer, one of the highlights of the annual conference. Thank you for your patience. You are unruly at times. This side is noisier than the other. Bring people to Jesus is what we are all about. And he concluded with a prayer, especially for one who became ill during the session, before the 5:30 p.m. recess.

SECOND DAY - THURSDAY EVENING JUNE 1, 1995

The Service of Ordination and Consecration was held at 7:00 p.m. in Johnson Arena of the Campus Life Building of Wofford College. The preacher was Bishop John Hurst Adams of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. The liturgist was Bishop Robert Hitchcock Spain.

Amen!

I wanted to be sure that you could say that. I also wanted to be sure that this microphone was picking me up well. I was instructed by my homiletics professor to always be sure that the microphone was picking my voice up and my notes were where I could see them easily and that all the electronic support systems were working to help me with my preaching. In a class of thirty, I discovered I was the only one to whom he said that. So I simmered over that from Tuesday until Thursday and then I asked him why in a class of thirty am I the only one that you would tell to make sure all these gadgets were working. He said, "Son, you need all the help you can get." I want you to know how to say "Amen," because I need all the help I can get.

Amen! Before I leave here you might shout "Hallelujah."

Bishop Spain, you are a very kind and brave man. This invitation to preach was extended originally to me by Bishop Bethea. Bishop Bethea and I developed a very warm friendship quickly after I came back to Columbia. When we went places where nobody knew us, we would say one is a United Methodist Bishop and one is an African Methodist Bishop, can you tell which is which? So I withdrew my acceptance of Bishop Bethea's invitation to Bishop Spain's office and said I know you don't want somebody you don't know preaching the ordination service. He responded to me quickly and clearly, "Yes I do." Then he said, "We want to do things just as Joe had planned them." When he said that of course, I was compelled to come. I am glad to be here and to meet this gracious and charming gentleman and to participate in this ordination service. I looked at the program tonight and when I got my folder, I left the last ten pages of my sermon in the folder.

Reverend clergy and spouses, the delegates to this session of the South Carolina Annual Conference, members of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina, visitors and friends, brothers and sisters to this very large and distinguished looking class of persons to be set aside and apart for ministry, to the several A.M.E. clergy I see scattered through this audience, Good evening. Let me compliment the Clergy Choir on how much I enjoyed your music. I want to tell you that I know that every one of you can preach better than you can sing.

Now for these kind of occasions I like to find passages of Scripture which preach themselves. Which do not require either much scholarship or much effort. They deliver on their own, I want to read such a passage and simply highlight it briefly. I promise not to be long. I've never preached over three hours in my life. The Bishop says, "Not tonight, Bishop." I am going to read a long Scripture, and preach a short sermon. Is that fair? Now you didn't say Amen. If you didn't say Amen, maybe I'll do it the other way.

This is the Gospel of Matthew. I am in the ninth chapter starting at the 18th verse:

"While he was saying these things to them, a leader of the synagogue came and knelt before him saying, 'Master, my daughter just died, but you come lay your hand on her and she will live.' Jesus got up and followed him and with his disciples. Then suddenly out of the crowd a woman who had been suffering with hemorrhages for over twelve years came up behind him and touched his garment, for she had said to herself, 'If I can only touch his clothes I will get well.' Jesus turned and seeing her said, 'Take heart my daughter, your faith has made you well.' And instantly the woman got well. When Jesus got to the leader's house the people were playing the flute and the crowd was making a lot of noise, and he said, 'Go away, for this girl is not dead, just asleep.' They laughed at him. When the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took the girl by the hand, and the girl got up and this report spread throughout all that area. When Jesus went on from there two blind men followed him, crying loudly, 'Have mercy on us, thou son of David.' When he entered the house, the blind men came to him. Jesus said to them, 'Do you really believe I am able to do this?' And they said to him, 'Yes, Lord.' So he touched their eyes and said to them, 'According to your faith, be it unto you.' And their eyes were opened. So Jesus sternly ordered them, 'See that no one knows this.' But they went away and told everybody they encountered what had happened. After they had gone away they brought a demoniac who was mute to Jesus. When he had cast the demons out, the one who had been mute spoke and the crowd was amazed and said, 'It has never been like this in Israel before.'"

Very simply I want to talk for just a minute of that rather lengthy Scripture about the difference your ministry should make. I have more invitations to preach than I have time to prepare for. I sit on more committee meetings than I ought to sit. I am on more boards than I can attend, I'm asked for more money than I have. The demands are awesome. And finally, I reached the conclusion that I should decide to say yes and no on the basis of what difference it will make. What difference will it make to the praise of God. What difference will it make to the lifting of a person. What difference will it make to the moral climate in which we live. If it cannot pass those tests, I will likely not do it. Our mission, persons to be ordained, your mission is to continue and reproduce the life and work of Jesus Christ in your space, in your place, and in your time. This simple affirmation of the mission is frequently confused and modified by tedious theological discussion. Frequently by institutional needs and necessities and very frequently by individual priorities and prejudice. But that does not change it, it only corrupts it. What I want to say to you is that there is a difference your ministry should make and

that difference was demonstrated, illustrated and enacted by Jesus in the passage I just read. The ruler came to Jesus because his beautiful daughter was incurably ill and he had taken her to Anitoch and Ephesus, even to Rome to the Emperor's physician. But she could not be cured. He had turned to home remedies and she drank roots and ate strange diets. Still did not get well. Finally, the ruler heard about this itinerate preacher going through the neighborhood working miracles. And in a desperate last resort, came to Jesus, and I like the way it says that the ruler knelt before him, and asked Jesus to come to his house, touch his dead daughter and she would live again. And Jesus seeing the profound desperation and faith in the man's countenanced voice decided to honor his request. He went to the house and they were having the wake. Do any of you know anything about wakes? Where I come from they have a wake and they have a lot of food. They really do things. Death is liberation. What they have is a celebration. They were having the wake and Jesus said, "The girl is not dead, just sleeps." They laughed at him. Who in the world does he think he is, coming in here too late with too little. So Jesus said to the ruler, "Do me a favor, put these devils out so the Lord can get in." And so he put them out and Jesus went in and reached down and took the little girl's hand and looked up and summons the power of God and the little girl got up. Y'all, ministry is to make the difference that you must bring life to the circumstances where death is. And all death is not physical. In our world people are dead from defeat, dead from despair, dead from disgrace and you must meet them there and bring life where there was death. I think the hymn writer said it: "He speaks and listening to his voice, new life the dead receive."

On the way to the ruler's house, this woman who had been hemorrhaging for twelve years having grown lean and emaciated, and sickly said to her sisters, I am going to go touch that Jesus. That is my only hope. They said don't you go out there, he's got a big crowd following him and frail and weak and slow as you are, they will knock you down and trample you to death. She said, I am going to die anyway so I am going to die trying to live. And she got in the pathway and as Jesus swept by, she reached for him and barely grabbed the hem of his garment. Jesus turned and said, "Cheer up girl, your faith has made you well." The woman got well instantly. Your ministry should make the difference to bring help where there is sickness all around. The sickness of sin, the sickness of greed, the sickness of race, the sickness of class, the sickness of gender. Sick, sick, sick. Your ministry must bring wellness and health and wholeness to the conditions in our society that are full of sickness.

Your ministry should make the difference that you and your work and your example and your countenance and your behavior should bring life where there was death, health where there was sickness. Now, one of the most incredible things I've ever read takes place. Jesus went on and the book says, two blind men followed him. Two *blind* men? I really didn't understand this until I was in South Africa a couple of years ago and we went to meet, through the good offices of the Trans-Africa Organization, with Nelson Mandela and his inner circle. We arrived and we had two hours to go to a reception which Mr. Mandela would welcome us. All of us, exhausted from twenty hours on a plane, took a shower and rushed back down, and the reception was on and that is when I discovered that black folk and white folk are very much alike. They were having cocktails and the white folk got just as loud as the black folk. It was right noisy in there but all of a sudden, with absolutely no announcement, and no words, the room became absolutely quiet and everybody wheeled to look at the door. There stood, tall, erect, thin, strong, charismatic Nelson Mandeia. We didn't see him, we felt him. The blind men followed not what they saw, but they followed what they felt. They felt the power of God. And said, "O, thou son of David, have mercy upon us." Jesus said, "You really think I can give you back your sight?" They said, "Yes, the dead girl lives! The sick woman is well!" Listen, "According," ... when it doesn't happen, when you preach and nothing happens, remember this verse..."According to your faith be it unto you. So Jesus touched their eyes and the blind men said, 'The sky is blue, the grass is green, my wife is beautiful.'" The difference your ministry must make, you must bring sight where there is blindness, health where there is sickness, life where there is death.

Now, finally, they brought to Jesus a dumb man. Possessed, they said, of a devil. And the dumb man standing before Jesus could not tell Jesus what he wanted because he couldn't talk. Have you ever been in a predicament that was so deep and ugly and wrenching that you couldn't say it. All you could do was sort of gesture. Jesus will understand what you can't say.

He can read the tears you shed, he can read the sighs you utter. He understands the screams you make. And so Jesus waved the devil away. I know he can do that because he has waved some devils from me. The dumb man felt his tongue untie. He said, A...A...Amen! Praise the Lord! Hallelujah! Your ministry must not only bring life where there has been death, health where there has been sickness, sight where there has been blindness, you must bring intelligence where there has been dumbness. And when they saw this, they said: "It has never been like this in Israel before." I want to read about you in a few years in your ministry, where the bishop is going to say, "I don't know what happened, but it has never, ever, been like this in South Carolina before." Amen.

Following the service of Ordination and Consecration, a reception was held for the new ministers in the old field house because of the rain. The Spartanburg District United Methodist Women again hosted the event.

THIRD DAY - FRIDAY MORNING JUNE 2, 1995

Holy Communion was celebrated in Leonard Auditorium of Old Main Building at 7:30 a.m. The preacher was The Rev. Julian R. Ford. The Rev. Calvin Alston, Jr., was the liturgist and Ms. Carolyn Smith was the lay reader.

Bishop Spain convened the session at 8:34 a.m. After the singing of "*Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee*," The Rev. James Stevenson offered the invocation. Mr. B.J. Pasley, the Conference Lay Leader, gave the Report of the Laity as found on page 120 and ordered it to record. Mr. Pasley felt that a good way to report is invite participation. He asked those involved in any type of training session this year to please stand. Those involved in any type of mission or service also stood. The large number of persons standing illustrate our strengths. We need to look at the positive, at what Christ would have us do, and build on our strengths and our vision.

THE LAITY REPORT Mr. B.J. Pasley

I am here to give the State of the Laity report.

I believe the best way to do this is by letting you, the Laity, help with this presentation.

How many of you have been involved in any training event this year? Will you stand if you have been involved in any of these areas: 1. Training 2. Mission 3. Volunteers. This is all part of the lay program. Our emphasis for 1995 is SHARING THE GOOD NEWS WITH SOCIETY! What is the good news? Do you really know what is the good news? The good news is that: Christ died for us while we were yet sinners. That proves God's love for us. As forgiven and reconciled people we are a chosen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation. A peculiar people that we should show forth the praises of Him who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous light! The good news is Christ died for us, The question is: Do you have the good news to share?

Acts 1:8 "But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you and ye shall be witnesses unto it both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth. Have you tarried long enough to be empowered by the Holy Spirit? Then, go and teach all nations baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost... and Christ promise is, I am with you always even unto the end of the world! That is your commission from Christ - so share the good news with society.

Paragraph 107 - *Book of Discipline* states: "The people of God are the church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. Hear this part - There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; The Church is either faithful as a witnessing and serving community, or it loses its vitality and its impact on an unbelieving world.

Share the good news. Share the good news! Share the good news!

Because you are the best example some folk will see of Christ. Half of 1995 is gone, you can make a difference in what happens in the second half - Share the good news with society.

The laity is sharing in significant ways and we need to tell our story.

The laity has taken on a commitment to have 25% of the laity certified in some area of leadership by the year 2000. Now that's an ambitious goal, but an attainable one. What it means for a church, Green Pond with 160 members, is that 40 members must become certified. What about your church? How many? We ought to tell the story. You can make a difference. Look for the positive and tell your story.

Let me take this opportunity to inform you that the Lay Speaking Section has requested and the Methodist Publishing House has extended a 20% discount on books and Bibles to Certified Lay Speakers.

At the conclusion of his address, Mr. Pasley introduced his wife and asked his daughter, The Rev. Cassandra Pasley Jackson to sing "It Is Well With My Soul." Bishop Spain thanked the entire Pasley family for their work and witness.

The Rev. Taylor Campbell gave the first Clergy Report to the Annual Conference.

THE REPORT OF THE CLERGY Rev. Taylor Campbell

The clergy of the South Carolina Annual Conference declare to you that God is alive and at work in the people called United Methodists. The rich diversity of our church, reflected in our common life, reminds us of the richness and diversity manifested in the whole body of Christ. We are witnesses to the marvelous grace of God that has been demonstrated in the countless untold stories of a people transformed by grace and committed to the service of the gospel of Jesus Christ. We are thankful for the privilege of sharing in ministry with deeply committed laity who give unselfishly of themselves and their resources to serve the cause of Christ and the needs of hurting people. It is God's sustaining grace that has done and is doing great things in and through these people of faith. Children, youth and adults learn of God's love and power in Sunday Schools staffed by faithful laity. In our communities, homes are built and repaired for those least able to provide adequate shelter for themselves. A commitment to feed hungry people is normative among many of our churches. Rich resources of grace-filled nurture and care are offered to friends and fellow church members in their times of crisis and need. Through these and many other stories of bold witness and caring mission, the power of the living Christ among us is made known.

There are those among us who, for good reason, raise a prophetic call to the church as they see signs of sickness, paralysis, and even death in our midst. We hear and respect those prophetic voices; but we also see signs of renewal, life and hope. Small groups of Methodist Christians are growing in faith and discipleship across the church through the *Disciple Bible Study* and a host of other high-commitment, covenant group ministries. On a grand scale, Vision 2000 has helped us focus again on the lively, serving local church as the primary place of ministry in the United Methodist connection. In our congregations across the state, Sunday morning is becoming a source of new vitality as we rediscover the rich and nourishing wellspring of biblical preaching.

Yet we clergy find strangely comfortable and powerfully binding the temptation to offer lip service instead of denying ourselves, taking up our crosses and following Christ. Too often we have acted as if the church exists for the clergy rather than the clergy existing for the sake of the church and its Lord. We exhibit with alarming indifference the desire to be served rather than the passion to serve. We have compromised the integrity of our call by a refusal to listen to God's Holy Spirit. And that deafness has led to a lack of trust in one another. We can be stubbornly blind to the gifts of others, resorting all too often to competition and blaming and resentment. We have lost the courage to be imaginative and bold in our obedience. Insecure in the faith and afraid to share authority, we make excuses for our failure to entrust the laity with the ministry that they are uniquely called and equipped to do.

Despite our brokenness, we whole-heartedly affirm that the Holy Spirit is still active in the churches of this Annual Conference, calling and equipping persons for the building up of the Body of Christ. As clergy, we stand in the tradition of the patriarchs, prophets, apostles and witnesses who proclaimed to the past and present age God's Word of hope. That *lively hope*

is embodied in the fact that we worship a Risen Savior whose unmerited favor is sufficient for all persons, situations, circumstances and conditions.

It is this hope that forms us and makes us who we are. With those whom God has called in every age, we wait expectantly on God. We pray that the church will more adequately reflect God's activity among us, and hope that God's new life will be reflected in some specific ways.

We hope that the church will establish as a priority helping persons hear God's call to full-time Christian service and will support their preparation for the work of ministry.

We hope that the church will discover and value the varied gifts for ministry expressed and embodied in the pastoral leadership in the South Carolina Annual Conference.

We hope that our Conference leadership will find ways to deploy clergy members effectively and with sensitivity to the needs of the communities of faith that we are called to serve as well as the needs of clergy families.

We hope that the clergy of South Carolina will acknowledge the brokenness among us, seek to bear one another's burdens, and support one another through mutual celebration of each other's ministries.

Lastly, we hope that the walls of division between laity and clergy, ethnic groups, genders and generations can be dismantled so that Christ can be all in all and we can move forward as God's people.

As the clergy of this Annual Conference, let us model and foster servant leadership in our churches. Let us not be quick to "lean to our own understanding" and haphazardly engage in ministries that cosmetically look good and sound good, but yield no change, either in the human heart, the body of Christ, or the people we are called to serve.

We call upon this Annual Conference to center its life together around the reality of God's grace in Jesus Christ. We call upon this Annual Conference to welcome genuine movement of the Spirit that compels us to abandon lethargic tradition, to undertake bold ministry that is sure to fail apart from the power that is Christ's suffering love.

Finally, we invite you, the South Carolina Annual Conference, to a season of reflection, seeking to discern God's will for our life together. Let us search for the soul of this Annual Conference, embracing prayer, praise, self-denial, scripture study and fasting with renewed hope and energy, to the end that our church may become an ever more useful instrument of God's grace and truth.

At the conclusion of the Clergy Report, Ms. Thomasina McPhearson led conference in singing "Amen."

At 9:15 a.m., Bishop Spain announced that B.J. Pasley, Charles Appleby, and James Salley were elected General Conference delegates on the **sixth lay ballot**. On the **sixth clergy ballot**, W. Timothy McClendon and Frank J. Griffith, Jr. were elected to the 1996 General Conference. Concern that no youth delegates had been elected was expressed.

The **seventh lay ballot** was distributed at 9:25 and closed at 9:32 a.m. The **seventh clergy ballot** was distributed at 9:33 and closed at 9:41 a.m.

It was announced that The Rev. David Clyburn has suffered an apparent heart attack and that Matthew Cunningham, the hospitalized winner of a Merit Scholarship was improving. The conference learned with sadness that Smoke and Sue Kanipe had lost their child. The session paused for prayer.

Mr. Hammie L. Chaplin, Jr. and Ms. Rose E. Jackson presented the **Reports of the Board Pensions** beginning on page 46 of the pre-conference reports. Report Number One was adopted on the motion of Ms. Jackson. Report Number Two, the 1994 Payments to Annuitants, was moved to record at her request. **Ministerial Pension Plan Addendum A** for 1996, pages 48-50 of the pre-conference reports, as well as **Attachment One to MPP Addendum A**, pages 50 - 51, was adopted on Ms. Jackson's motion. **Comprehensive Protection Plan Addendum A**, pages 51 - 55 was also adopted. Report Number 3, The **1996 Board of Pensions Operating Budget** was adopted in the amount of \$4,110,442 on the motion of Mr. Chaplin. Finally, the potential pension liens listed in the registration packet, and amended by Mr. Chaplin, were adopted as **Personal Notations to the Business Question 79**.

The Rev. James S. Gadsden and Ms. Leila Carter the manager of the Columbia

Cokesbury store announced that Cokesbury will extend a 20% discount to lay speakers on the Board of Laity listings. A large number of persons who participate in Disciple Bible Studies rose in response to the question. Ms. Carter presented the Publishing House 1994 distribution check of \$20,652.66 to the Board of Pensions and gave Bishop Spain a set of books from Abingdon press.

Bishop Spain reported the Ministerial Education Fund offering from the Ordination / Consecration Service to be \$3,164.03, with Mt. Hebron United Methodist Church West Columbia giving \$500.00.

At 10:10 a.m., the conference recessed for 15 minutes.

The session resumed at 10:30 a.m. with the singing of "He Leadeth Me" It was announced that Rosa Lee Henderson had a heart attack last night. It was also announced that Mrs Clark Wilson was ill.

At 10:36 a.m., The Rev. George Riser, chairperson of the **Commission on Group Insurance**, introduced Mr. Steven La Pierre of the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits, and called attention to the Commission reports beginning on page 62 of the pre-conference materials. He prefaced the reports with a brief summary of the Commission's work during the past year. Proposals had been sought from eight carriers. In the end there were three options: (1) HealthFlex at a projected cost of \$3,083,428, (2) retention of the current Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program at a cost of \$3,843,753, or (3) another carrier's bid of \$4,209,674. The necessity of good stewardship, among other issues, prompted the Commission to unanimously recommend HealthFlex effective January 1, 1996.

Rev. Riser briefly highlighted the significance of each report; in **Report Number 1**, there are no changes in eligibility. **Report Number 2** is a summary of the Comprehensive Protection Plan death benefits. **Report Number 3** is the recommendation for the adoption of HealthFlex and implementation as of January 1, 1996. There are three deductible options, flexible spending accounts, a higher lifetime maximum and, because this is a new contract, life time maximums begin at zero. **Report Number 4** is the recommendation for adoption of the HealthFlex Medicare Carve Out. The prescription drug plan for actives is also available to Medicare eligible participants along with the Mail Order Drug Program. There were no changes in the administrative procedures in **Report Number 5** or in the Life Insurance benefits for Conference Lay Employees in **Report Number 6**. **Report Number 7**, Coordination of Benefits, has no changes. The Insurance Fund Apportionment in **Report Number 8** is reduced by \$823,014 from that of 1995. The cost to participants remains as it is in 1995. The Administrative budget in **Report Number 9** represents a 21.07% decrease in the apportionment. Rev. Riser moved the adoption of reports 1-9 of the Commission on Group Insurance. The reports were adopted as presented.

The South Carolina Annual **Conference Adoption Agreement with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits** found on pages 67-70 of the pre-conference materials was also adopted on the motion of Rev. Riser. The bishop thanked the Commission.

Bishop Spain called on The Rev. James Adams. for the report of the **Committee on Resolutions and Appeals**. Rev. Adams called attention to the resolution on page 221 of the pre-conference materials.

RESOLUTION

We resolve to disallow any person or persons who are homosexual from holding any office or position in our United Methodist Church organization. Anyone who serves as an employee or who is in a leadership role of the Church organization at any capacity and is identified as a homosexual will be released from their position immediately upon disclosure.

The Committee recommended non-concurrence with the resolution based on Paragraph 92 of the Social Principles. At this point, The Rev. George R. Gain, author of the resolution, offered to withdraw the resolution and resubmit it at a later date. This was agreed to.

The **Resolution Concerning Inappropriate Promotion of Alcohol Use** was distributed by the tellers. The Committee moved concurrence and The Rev. Ronald Singleton, author of resolution and campus minister at Clemson, S.C., gave the rationale saying that the connection of beverage alcohol with sports promotes alcohol sales to the most vulnerable persons in society. After responding to a question from The Rev. W. Donald Britt, the resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING INAPPROPRIATE PROMOTION OF ALCOHOL USE

WHEREAS alcohol use is the leading contributor to death and other problems among young people between the ages of 15 and 24, and

WHEREAS alcohol use is consequently a leading problem in both high schools and colleges throughout South Carolina, and

WHEREAS much of the advertising and many of the promotions of alcohol use inappropriately links the use of alcohol with youth-oriented events and activities such as concerts and sporting events thereby increasing the pressure on young people to use alcohol,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 1995 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church calls upon the alcohol industry in South Carolina—its manufacturers, distributors, vendors, retailers, advertisers, and promoters—to genuinely and honestly join efforts to reduce alcohol use among those most vulnerable to its adverse effects, and to do so by ceasing those advertisements and promotions that bear a particular appeal to young people, specifically those directly or indirectly linking alcohol use with such things as music, sports, and/or sex, and

BE IT RESOLVED that we call upon those organizing and sponsoring concerts and sporting events to take seriously the appeal and influence that these events have on young people and therefore resist the linking of both alcohol use and advertisements or promotions that encourage it with these events, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we affirm our commitment to working for the reduction of alcohol use among our young people and that we express our support of those state and federal lawmakers who are actively working on policies that seek to address not only the effects of alcohol after the fact, but that seek to develop and strengthen efforts to prevent the excessive and tragic use of alcohol.

At 11:00 a.m., The Rev. Timothy McClendon reopened the report of the **Committee on Standing Rules** to propose rule changes regarding the Conference Commission on Communication. Proposed new **Standing Rule 63**, the Conference Commission on Communications, is to be inserted following current rule 62 with the remaining rules renumbered. Ms. Miriam Alewine, moved to amend SR 63 by adding the Conference Secretary of Publicity and Public Communications of United Methodist Women as an ex-officio member to the Conference Commission on Communications. Her amendment was approved. New **Rule 63**, as amended, was adopted.

Standing Rule 34 was changed by replacing the words "South Carolina United Methodist Advocate" with the words "Conference Commission on Communications."

Standing Rule 54 was changed so that the Board of Trustees of the South Carolina United Methodist Advocate shall be the Conference Commission on Communications as prescribed in newly adopted Standing Rule 63.

Standing Rule 58 was amended by deleting "Editor of South Carolina United Methodist Advocate: and inserting "the Administrator of the Conference Commission on Communications."

Rev. McClendon proposed addition changes in the Standing Rules regarding certain expenses.

In Section II, **Standing Rule 96** was adopted to read: "All persons at the Annual Conference level who are officially involved in the trial process, including the members of the trial court, the witnesses at the trial, the counsel for the church, the counsel for respondent, and the respondent shall receive only reimbursement for vouchered travel, meals, and lodging expenses from the Annual Conference Contingency Fund according to the schedule of payments adopted by the Annual Conference for those involved in the the official business of

the Annual Conference."

In Section III, an addition was made to **Standing Rule 31**: "The expenses of ex-officio members on conference boards and agencies shall be charged to the boards, councils, commissions or committees on which they serve as ex-officio members."

Bishop Spain said the Clergy Choir is working hard to go to General Conference. They have not been accepted yet. Many choirs are seeking to go and they can only accept 8-10. It will cost a lot of money and we do not know if they can go but we can take an offering and will give the money to a missional concern if the choir is not invited. The tellers took up a collection for Clergy Choir. We sang "Alas, And Did My Savior Bleed" while the offering was received.

Mysteries

Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe
Ephesians 4:1-6

VOCATION – is the call to honor the sacred and the mysteries of life. Points along the way that should never be neglected by the Church. Formative years are crucial for the young, as well as for the future of the Church. (Baptism, Confirmation, high school years, and college years.)

So just how does it happen? There is a time I remember. It was 1967, my UMYF group with the care and guidance of Olene Civils decided we would involve the UMYF in the UN Seminar in New York in this program of the Women's Division and the Board of Church and Society. For a year, we studied the Middle East, had car washes, bake sales, read the Bible, and looked at maps and we teamed many exciting things about Christians, Jews, and Palestinians. As I remember even a few romances developed. In June we packed the Greyhound bus to head off to New York to learn about the Middle East every day and eat Chinese food and go to the theatre at night and return for our nightly devotions.

My parents had taken us places but never to New York city. It was exciting. On the morning of June 7, 1967 I stood on the third floor of the Church Center Building looking out the window onto the United Nations Building with guards all around I saw King Hussein of Jordan get out of his limousine and walk into the United Nations Building. The previous night the Six-Day War began in Israel. We had studied the situation for a year and knew that the world had changed. There in all my awkward, searching 16-year-old glory I stood. Guards were all around. The world was deeply conflicted. I still remember the day.

Somewhere deep inside me knew that the boundaries of my life and faith would no longer be contained in Greenville, South Carolina at Buncombe Street United Methodist Church. For as much as I loved both, my Christian consciousness changed that day. I was no longer just a citizen of the local domain in which I had grown up. The whole world lay before me there surrounded by my community of faith on the third floor of the Church Center Building.

The Church had provided the seeds for listening for God's call to ministry that became a call to be in ministry for the sake of Christ in the world. I never viewed myself, the faith, the church, and the world the same way again. Our call continues to unfold and we continue to be challenged beyond where we think we, as the Church can ever go. And yet, somehow it happens. It is always a mystery which unfolds.

In light of this call, then how are we to live! What is the Church's vocation. The text says to "lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called with humility, gentleness, with

patients, bearing with one another in love making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body, one Spirit, one Lord, one faith, one baptism. There is no place for mean-spirited living.

"To lead a life" renders the Greek word Walk. Vocation is to walk in the way that leads to service. To walk in the way of honoring that which is sacred, maintaining the unity of the Spirit with marks maintaining the unity of the Spirit.

These days we speak of division, fragmentation, disunity (1984 - United Methodists). Sometimes we act as if the Church were dispirited/disunified. In the context of Ephesians, unity which is sought derives from the Spirit. Unity is already given. It is to be honored, actualized, made manifest. Spirit of unity is God given and understood in light of our understanding that there is one Lord, one faith, one baptism. As Christians, we are baptized into the unity of the Spirit.

As we continue to discern God's call we recognize that all of our work is sacred. It is the very work which invites us to give witness, voice hope. The task is to live as witnesses of the Gospel. We are not CEO'S. We are Christian servants honoring the sacred. We are not "professionals" in the secular sense. We are to life and act as a community bound together in love. We know there are those who have titles and then there are those who have testimonies. Pharaoh had a title, Moses a testimony. Hezekiah had a title, Isaiah a testimony. King Ahasuerus a title, Esther a testimony. Herod had a title, John, the Baptist a testimony. Pilate had a title and Jesus a testimony. George Wallace had a title, Rosa Parks a testimony. Butt Connor had a title, Martin Luther King, Jr. a testimony.

Our life's work as Church is to celebrate that which is sacred. It is sacred work to which we are called and to which we are entrusted.

We are called to honor the mysteries of God's hand.

There is no other community in our society.

Whose vocation (life's work) is to name and honor mystery.

There is no other community whose life is to recognize and honor that which is sacred.

Our vocation is a way of seeing. It is a way of living in the world.

Our life in ministry is to recognize the real presence of Christ in our lives.

Sometimes we know it when we see it. Sometimes it sneaks up on us.

The mysteries of God are made real (manifest) in the rites of the Church.

Sacraments: Baptism-Communion

Other times the mysteries are unusually ordinary.

Our life – is to walk in such a way

so that from time to time we recognize the real presence of Christ.

it comes in the testimonies

Miss Lottie Metz life was a testimony – even the day she died. She died in the faith with all the ordinaniness with all the mystery.

It was July 4, and like all July 4ths in South Carolina, it was miserably hot. This day was no different than any 4th of July. Miss Lottie was 100. She lived, gave birth to her babies, and died at home.

She never did get it right that I was her preacher. I would visit and say, "Miss Lottie, I've come to see you." She would respond, "you are the cutest, little preacher's wife I ever saw." Over the summer she had grown quite frail. I knew she probably would not live too long.

The morning of the 4th I went by the house in the morning, about noontime, and mid-afternoon I called.

Along about sundown, the air was heavy, the haze was thick, there was no breeze, I went back. Her breathing was labored. She would not let go—but it was hard for her to hold on. What is she waiting for? I finally decided on what I thought might be comforting. The family gather around Miss Lottie's bed. Let us have a prayer and then we'll pray the Lord's Prayer together. We expressed gratitude for her life. Holding her bony little hand we prayed the Lord's prayer.

Our Father, who art in heaven

Hallowed be thy name

Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done

On earth as it is in heaven.

And she died... Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.
Through our tears we finished. Give us this day our daily bread.
She had waited for the prayer. The final words. Thy will be done on
earth as it is in heaven.
It is grace, it is mystery, it is joy to be entrusted
with the sacraments,
with the sacredness,
with the mysteries of life.

Lead a life worthy of the calling.

The final words. What a mysterious and awe-filled moment, to be there, to hold one
another's hand there at her death.

THIRD DAY - FRIDAY AFTERNOON JUNE 2, 1995

The Session was called to order by Bishop Spain at 2:10 p.m. and "*Blessed Assurance*"
was sung. The Rev. Roger Gramling offered the invocation.

Bishop Spain read the seventh lay ballot and announced that there were no elections.
On the reading of the seventh clergy ballot, Delos Corderman was elected. The eighth lay
ballot was distributed at 2:21 and closed at 2:27 p.m. The eighth clergy ballot opened at 2:27
and closed at 2:34 p.m.

Dr. Peter Mitchell presented the Shirley C. Bethea Award in volunteerism to Mrs. Lula
Rouse. Her son, The Rev. Luonne Rouse, received the award for his mother.

The Rev. Dan Batson presented the Barbara Boultinghouse Bridge Builders Award
posthumously to Bishop Joseph B. Bethea. Ms. Josefa. Bethea accepted the award on behalf
of her father.

The Rev. Lemuel Carter introduced Dr. Carolyn Johnson, president of the Women's
Division of the Board of Global Ministries, who spoke about South Carolina Conference
leadership on the Board. The Rev. Clyde Anderson, and Assistant General Secretary and
member of this conference, has the responsibilities of the Africa and Mid-East Desk. He spoke
briefly of his work especially in Burundi, Kenya and Uganda.

Rev. Carter introduced Ms. Elaine Jenkins, an Assistant General Secretary of General
Secretary of the Commission on Religion and Race. Ms. Jenkins recently wrote an article on
inclusiveness in this conference. Ms. Jenkins reminded the conference of our commitment to
inclusiveness. Each of us has something to contribute to the whole. We must not only talk the
talk but walk the walk.

Rev. Carter also introduced Ms. Lula Rouse, the recipient of the Shirley C. Bethea Award.

At 3:00 p.m. Dr. Carolyn Briscoe continued the overview of the Conference Council On
Ministries, beginning on page 100 of the pre-conference reports. She noted the change in the
process for the use of Congregational Development Funds as found in items (1), (2), (3) and
(4) on pages 100-101, and noted changes described in items (3) and (4).

Ms. Sara Shingler moved to postpone any vote on items 1-4 until the work of restructuring
has been completed. This means action would have to follow the 1996 General Conference.
The Rev. Ted Walter objected that the Shingler motion cuts off debate. Dr. Michael Watson
objected to the recommendations. Ms. Shingler said the intent of her motion was to postpone
rather than table. The Rev. Samuel Johnson spoke against her motion saying that the CCOM
items clarify the process and that clarity is needed. The process offered permits both groups,
the Board of Missions and the Committee on Congregational Development, to have a say.
There is frustration at the local church level in trying to provide information to more than one

agency. The Rev. Roger Gramling, the Parliamentarian, interpreted the Shingler motion as one
to postpone and not to table. When the vote was put the Shingler motion was defeated.

Conference Council on Ministries Report Number One was approved as proposed on
the motion of Dr. Briscoe. CCOM Report Number Two was moved to record. CCOM Report
Number Three was moved to record after Dr. Briscoe invited ongoing input.

Motion on Program Emphasis. Mr. Fletcher Carter noted that in 1994 the emphasis was
"Becoming An Inviting Church." Are there statistics that tell us if there was an increase in
membership? Mr. Carter moved: "That in future annual conferences, the Conference Council
on Ministries will include in its report to the Conference the results of the previous year's
annual program emphasis." The motion was approved.

Conference Council on Ministries Report Number Three was adopted on the motion
of Dr. Briscoe.

The Rev. Morris Thompson and The Rev. William C. Reid, recognized Mr. William Patrick
for his services to Epworth Children's Home. Mr. Patrick returned to Epworth from retirement
to serve as interim Chief Executive Officer. Rev. Reid presented Mr. Patrick an award on
behalf of the Epworth Board of Trustees.

Rev. Thompson read a statement from Ms. Betty Jo Thompson, Chairperson of the Board
of Health and Welfare describing the support United Methodist homes in South Carolina can
offer senior citizens.

The report of the Board of Health and Welfare, pages 136-139 of the pre-conference
materials was moved to record by Rev. Thompson and approved.

On behalf of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, The Rev. Risher
Brabham addressed issues in campus ministry. He asked that the Advocate insert on campus
ministry be shared throughout our congregations.

Rev. Brabham recognized part-time ministers who serve on campuses: The Rev. Kay
Adams Best at the College of Charleston; The Rev. James H. Williams at the Citadel; The Rev.
Steve A. Patterson at Frances Marion University; The Rev. Susan Leonard Ray at Furman
University and The Rev. Glenn McCoy at Lander University and Greenwood Methodist Home.
He also recognized those who work full time at state universities: The Rev. J. Ronald Singleton
at Clemson University; The Rev. Tom H.B. Wall at the Columbia Wesley Foundation and The
Rev. Jimmy J. Montgomery at the Orangeburg Wesley Foundation.

The reports of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry were moved to
record.

At 3:34 P.M., the session recessed.

The conference resumed at 4:00 p.m. with the singing of "*It is Well with my Soul.*" Ms.
Annette Bond of the United Methodist Publishing House that the Conference will sponsor a
training event at Adam's Mark, Columbia on Disciple Bible Study Currently 115 churches
enrolled 256 persons. There are trained leaders and 12 district coordinators. The Rev. Phillip
Thraikill commented on the 100s in South Carolina who have completed the initial 34 weeks
study. Disciples Bible Study II is the next logical step.

Dr. Michael Watson, chairperson of the Board of Missions presented his personal report.

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS Dr. Michael C. Watson

It is with some regret that I stand before you to give this report as it will be my last one. I
am rotating off the Board of Missions as I complete my eighth year of board membership. I
have previously served eight years in the 1950's so I am really completing my sixteenth year
of board service.

It has been a pleasure to serve with this board as its membership has been outstanding.
We managed to meet four times a year while budgeted for two, even though it caused a
hardship on some members who got up early in the morning and drove long distances to save
a motel bill. Some members did not submit vouchers for reimbursement of their expenses. The
attendance was excellent and few members missed meetings - the majority have had perfect
attendance. They all were vitally interested in missions and did a grand job. It has been a
pleasure leading this group of very dedicated people.

As I leave this position I have a heavy heart about our denomination. I love the United

Methodist Church and have spent a significant part of my life involved in its life with local church, district, annual conference, jurisdictional conference, and general church responsibilities, including serving 16 years with UMCOR and 8 years with the GBGM. I have had the honor of being elected delegate to 3 General Conferences and 5 Jurisdictional Conferences. I have had the pleasure of being named a representative of our denomination to the National Council of Churches, The World Council of Churches, The World Methodist Council, Church World Service and to The British Methodist Conference as well as the Conference of the Caribbean and the Americas. Not many laypeople have had these kinds of opportunities and I am grateful for them. This experience has enabled me to know firsthand what a wonderful church ours is.

I have two concerns that trouble me greatly. The first is a decline in membership over a period of thirty-four continuous years that shows no signs of reversing itself. The other is an almost absolute disregard for our ministry to the poor and the disadvantaged.

I have spent much time pondering about this situation and find that these two problems seem to be related. Today I have decided to bare my soul to you and give you the product of some of my thinking. I have arrived at the point that perhaps, as Senator William Fulbright once said, "It is time to think of unthinkable things."

What I am going to say is from my own heart concerning a church to which I am devoted, our United Methodist Church. I hope that these ideas will serve as a starting point for the thoughtful consideration of others.

First I would like to call your attention to the church of our ancestors one hundred and fifty years ago. In 1850, our denomination was the largest Protestant denomination in America after aggressively evangelizing society, with emphasis on the poor, for decades. Then the emphasis seemed to change and by the end of the War Between The States, we were becoming a middle class church and were losing our emphasis on the poor. By the 1870's and 80's major divisions were developing within our church due to the drift away from ministry to the poor. This led to the separation of the "holiness churches" and by the 1890's, we had lost our position as the largest denomination in America.

The tremendous success of the early 1800's gave us a charge which subsequent generations have failed to keep.

Today we find that we are far from the largest denomination. The more evangelical churches are growing and are getting most of their converts from among the poor and within the prisons. The prison converts are usually converted by fellow convicts. Other faiths are growing, also. It is estimated that 40 - 60% of the new converts to Islam are former Christians.

Last year our church lost a greater percentage of our membership (1.6%) than any of the other top 15 churches in America. However, our denomination is growing in areas outside the United States. In some of these areas the growth is spectacular. It is in this country that we are losing heavily.

As I look at what has happened to our church to make it so different from the church of my grandfather, I find at least two outstanding differences.

The first is the abandonment of our former major emphasis to minister to the poor. The second is the change in the roles of the laity and the clergy since the early days.

In the very beginnings of the Methodist Movement, the laity had a major role in mission and ministry while the clergy, also concerned with mission and ministry, were more concerned with the teaching and motivation of the laity than today. This particular division of responsibility is in keeping with our instructions in Ephesians 4: 11-12.

During those early days the lay people felt a real calling to lead the unchurched to Christ, to establish new congregations and then to call for a clergyman to superintend the new church and administer the sacraments. Often the laity continued the work of the church between the periodic visits of the itinerant clergy. A major factor in the rapid, world-wide spread of the Methodist Movement was, in fact, the accomplishments in mission and ministry by the laity.

Many of these early untitled missionaries were members of the military who were assigned to countries around the world and matter-of-factly carried their church with them. Others simply felt the call to **"go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."** (Mark 16:15)

In those days, the laity had, in the vernacular of today, "a piece of the action" and a very

significant piece at that.

What is expected of the laypeople of 1995? It is that we be loyal to the United Methodist Church and do all in our power to strengthen its ministries. We also promise to support our own congregations and faithfully participate in its ministries by our prayers, our presence, our gifts and our service. We have all promised to do these things.

How are these promises being translated into the life of the church today?

In the average congregation of our church today it almost appears that we have deliberately and methodically sought to remove our laity as far as possible from the "action." We have built a huge, multilayered, bureaucratic structure that consumes tremendous amounts of our time, money and energy - often with major programs that are thought by some to be of only marginal significance to the central theme of the Gospel. Some of the laity have felt that their primary role is to support the expenses of this structure and attend church services. They feel that the message is loud and clear, "Just send your money. We have the expertise to develop and implement programs that serve our church best. Just you busy yourselves with the committees and commissions and work areas of your own congregation and send your money to us. We will do the rest." Unfortunately, many of them have limited their church participation to doing only this.

In order to support the almost insatiable appetite of this large superstructure, we have given birth to an apportioned budgetary system, known as The Apportionment's. This system has the good feature that it asks for funds from the membership by a fair and carefully prepared proportionate method. However, it moves the laity even further from the "action" by deciding how their contributions will be used without having any local input into the decision-making process. It seems that we have shifted from a "voluntary and personalized" system of giving into a kind of "church tax" system.

The development of this huge structure beyond the local church with its attendant material requirements has made us seem almost obsessed with the material factors of church administration. This inordinate emphasis on money often lead the laity to feel that their obligation to Christ and the Church is largely satisfied by being generous to the church in a financial way. Of course, the Scripture requires much more of us than this. We have become very efficient in fund-raising and continue to collect more and more money from fewer and fewer members. As a result, considering all of our assets we, as a church, have become very rich.

Bishop Felton May expressed his dismay at our situation with the following paraphrase: **"Jesus met the rich church, and the rich church said, 'What must we do to inherit eternal life?' And Jesus said to the rich United Methodist Church, 'Sell an you have and give it to the poor.'**

"And the rich church said, 'Before we give that consideration, we must restructure. Before we can even begin to appropriate funds, we must move our missions arm from one place to another at the tune of \$16 million'

"It does not make sense to me that we can think about spending that kind of money restructuring the denomination when the children are starving and bludgeoned and murdered and misused."

What progress are we making with this present system?

The Board of Global Ministries recently released its statistical report for 1995. This report stated that its missionary force had declined again this year from 1,055 in 1994 to 1,038 in 1995. This includes World Partner missionaries (from other countries) 249 in 1995, 255 in 1994; National Division mission personnel 364 in 1995, 372 in 1994; World Division missionaries 425 in 1995, 428 in 1994. This is a decline in all categories. One of the stated reasons for this decline is that there are not funds available for sending more. The staff employed in this effort numbers between 425 and 450 persons. The GBGM receives a major share of the apportioned gifts.

A century ago, the local churches and their members felt almost a hand-to-hand relationship with our missionaries to whom they related directly. Now they are related to our major mission arm chiefly by apportioned funds through several layers of councils on ministries, boards or areas of interest.

The GBGM also released the news that the United Methodist Volunteers in Mission had increased from 6,209 persons in 1994 to 9,520 this year. This is slightly more than a 65% increase. You will recall that is a "grass-roots movement" that was accepted as "an authentic form of personal missionary involvement" by our church at the 1980 General Conference, some 20 years after its inception. This movement receives no apportioned funds and has a paid staff of less than 15 persons.

UMVIM is virtually our only denominational program that challenges the laity and clergy to direct personal mission and ministry. Does its extraordinary success have a message for us regarding the readiness of our people for a challenge to personal ministry? What church planner would have predicted that the largest group of missionaries representing our church today would be the volunteers? But isn't this the way it was in our church of our grandparents?

One of the most effective mission agencies in our church is the UMCOR whose 9 history is a thrilling story of relieving human suffering all over the world regardless of race, creed, or the governmental structure in the area. It is usually on the scene within 24 hours. It has never received any apportioned funds but is supported by free-will gifts. Its staff numbers about 9 persons.

An independent mission agency, The Mission Society for the United Methodist Church, now deploys 122 full-time United Methodist missionaries, 72 directly to areas of activity of the worldwide Methodist Church and 50 through other Christian missionary organizations. These missionaries are all fully funded. The employed staff for the Society for this effort varies from 16 - 17 persons. This organization is not a part of our regular mission program and receives no apportioned funds.

It seems that some agencies that are supported by funds directly from the donor are doing quite well because they are carrying out the types of missions with which the donors can identify and which they wish to support.

John Wesley delivered around 40,000 sermons during his 50-year ministry. One of his biographers stated that in one three-month period he preached over 500 times, but only 8 times in a church. Today our church has an operating style that would seem to lead to the thinking that ministry can take place only in well-appointed churches conducted by ordained clergy, with few exceptions.

Dennis Campbell, dean of the Divinity School at Duke University made an analysis of a study by Duke University entitled "United Methodism and American Culture." At the conclusion of this analysis, he urged the UMC to **"preach the good news of Jesus Christ without regards to attempts at institutional well-being."**

Dr. Will Willimon, also of Duke University, said, **"Moving out toward the unchurched forces us to confront the problem in humanity for which the gospel is God's great answer. Failing that, we merely 'keep house' in the church, going back over yesterday's solutions, reducing the gospel to something which is tired and boring."**

To a national committee directing the efforts of the Shalom Zone ministry, Bishop Kenneth L. Carder said, **"Our best hope is not theological orthodoxy, new planning processes, new programs or new legislation. Our best hope is to turn toward the poor."**

Ministry to the poor was exactly the emphasis of our church in the past. Why do we insist on trying to make a functional system out of one whose strategy is fundamentally flawed, especially when we have a proven pattern for success?

Our task is that of giving our very best in our response to our Lord's commandment to spread the Good News to as many of those in need as we possibility can. From our record of the past 34 years, clearly our system is dysfunctional as our membership is growing older as well as declining in numbers.

Let's try to take a look at what is in our future if we continue trying to operate this same flawed process. If you take the rate of decline in membership in the past and the rate of increase in the average age of our membership over the past thirty years and project these rates into the future, a picture of our church in the future will emerge.

About 2015, 20 years from now or perhaps sooner, the superstructure will have collapsed. The average United Methodist church will be a large and well-appointed building, well maintained with central heating and air-conditioning, carpeted floors, cushioned pews, a paved parking lot and occupied for one hour on Sunday morning by a handful of silverhaired

parishioners.

I hope and pray that we won't let this happen to the church that we all love so dearly.

My purpose in giving you this report is to start, or to add to, constructive thought and dialogue concerning the situation in which we find ourselves. I hope no one will hear it as a call to immediately or radically change their support of our church. That would be the last thing I would encourage.

I know firsthand that we have a wonderful church which, largely through the strength of its connectional structure, has many, many really good programs, including some in our own conference as you have heard today. These programs impact the lives of literally millions of people in many positive ways. They deserve our loyal support.

I do hope that all of you will go home and continue to try to make our church stronger and more effective by looking at some of our weaknesses that I have tried to make more apparent. We must all work together to bring about positive change.

We must watch the development of the Shalom Zone ministry for guidance as it unfolds. We must take "Vision 2,000" seriously and develop mission programs in our own areas that challenge the laity as well as the clergy for ministry to the poor and the disadvantaged. We must train and equip our laity for ministry in the "highways and byways" and in those communities where the church is not visible. We must encourage the flame of **evangelistic zeal to be rekindled throughout our conference and our denomination in order to bring our church back into being a more effective agent for "going into all the world and preaching the Good News to every creature."** Thank you.

Dr. Watson received a standing ovation at the conclusion of his address.

Mrs. Anne Beazley said "We may know about missionaries who work in the Amazon area. People in South Carolina may not know about the work that is being done in missions in South Carolina. An *ad hoc* mission support network and the Board of Missions developed an educational tool, **South Carolina in Mission Sunday**, for the first Sunday in November each year. Using the South Carolina Mission Sunday materials, participation by churches has increased from 9% to 15% in one year. Use the first Sunday in November as an opportunity to learn about mission programs in this state...where projects are located and what is being done. All have needs and programs for the needy that can not be funded. South Carolina in Mission Sunday is a time to celebrate the Advance Special Programs listed on page 105 of the pre-conference materials and to learn how the United Methodist Church reaches out to help people. There are 17 ministries to learn about. Put South Carolina in Mission Sunday on your calendar and celebrate!"

While the tellers distributed **Volunteer In Mission** materials, Dr. Watson noted that the **Volunteers In Mission** newsletter has a centerfold **Service of Sending Forth**. He invited the session to participate in this service. Dr. Watson moved the reports of the Board of Missions to record. It was done Bishop Spain thanked Dr. Watson and Mrs. Beazley.

The Rev. Gene Norris moved that the Annual Conference request the Conference Council on Communications to furnish each church with a copy of Dr. Mike Watson's speech or a tape or whatever media it chooses. The motion was approved.

At 4:43 p.m. Bishop Spain read the report of **lay ballot number eight**. Polly Gramling Harper was elected a General Conference delegate. **Clergy ballot number eight** had no elections. The **ninth lay ballot** was opened at 4:45 and closed at 4:50 p.m.

On a point of personal privilege, The Rev. John W. Culp appealed to the clergy to elect persons from the African-American Church. The **ninth clergy ballot** began at 4:54 and closed at 4:57 P.M.

The Rev. Harris Parker, chairperson of the **Board of Church and Society** called attention to the Board's reports beginning on page 123 of the pre-conference materials. He prefaced the report by noting that one year ago the annual conference authorized a panel to come up with a report on alternatives to incarceration. He also noted the action of the Board on three resolutions referred by the 1994 session: (1) The Confederate Battle Flag, (2) Cuba, and (3) The Church and Homosexuality.

The Task Force on Alternatives to Incarceration Report (as amended) was recommend to the local churches of the South Carolina Annual Conference. The report was approved.

Dr. Parker next called attention to the report: **Volunteer Opportunities in the Criminal Justice System and Its Supporting Non-Profit Agencies for United Methodists**, pages 126-127. The report was approved.

The Resolution on the Confederate Battle Flag, page 127, an affirmation of action previously taken by the Annual Conference, was approved following discussion.

The Resolution Concerning Cuba, page, was approved following discussion and an attempt at amendment.

Dr. Parker referred to the Commentary on the Church and Issues of Homosexuality on pages 128-129 of the pre-conference materials. Inasmuch as the Board has not yet sensed a consensus on such matters, no pronouncement will be offed on this issue at this time. He noted that the Rocky Mountain Annual Conference Board of Church and Society is sponsoring an event, "Building Bridges: Christian Responses to Homosexuality, a Dialogue on the Report of the Committee to Study Homosexuality" on November 10-12, 1995 and that we will send at least one participant. Dr. Parker moved acceptance After learning that the page 221 resolution on Homosexuality had been withdrawn by its author, the Parker motion was approved.

The Rev. Michael Vandiver, on behalf of the Shalom Zone ministry churches of the S.C. Annual Conference asked that Bishop Spain and these who have responsibility for planning the 1996 Annual Conference, be requested to invite Bishop Felton May to our Conference and that a significant amount of time be allotted during the Council on Ministries Report for a presentation on the Shalom Zone Ministries. The request was accepted.

On a point of personal privilege, Mr. Laurence F. Campbell, who is 101 years old, and a guest at the session, was recognized.

The conference adjourned at 5:25 p.m. following prayer.

THIRD DAY - FRIDAY EVENING JUNE 2, 1995

Bishop Spain called the session to order at 7:30 p.m. and the conference sang "How Firm a Foundation." The Secretary announced the agenda changes and they were accepted.

A Celebration of Epworth Children's Home

The Rev. Thomas N. Brittain and The Rev. William C. Reid, chairperson of the Epworth Trustees, commented on the positive growth in service and programs that Epworth Children's Home has enjoyed since 1972, the year Charles A. Hutchins joined the staff.

Charles and Gay Hutchins were recognized for their service. Mr. Hutchins noted that even 100 years ago the Epworth charter was written so that everyone could be accepted. It has not had to be rewritten in a century.

Rev. Reid recognized the Epworth trustees, past and present. He had a good response when he asked those with any relationship to Epworth to stand. Special recognition was given to The Rev. Kenneth L. Nelson. He spent much of his life at Epworth, finished Newberry and graduated from the Duke Divinity School, where he was president of the student body. Rev. Nelson is now the associate pastor at St. John's Church, Aiken.

Dr. Richard Hodges, newly elected President and Chief Executive Officer of Epworth Children's Home was presented by Rev. Reid.

Epworth's youngest Choir sang for the session.

The Rev. Thomas Brittain observed that at the 1895 Annual Conference session in Rock Hill, the committee established to consider a children's home reported that a superintendent had been found. In 1896 the first two children entered care. Since that time Epworth has served thousands. During Epworth's Hundredth Year Celebration, seven dinners are planned for Laurens, Rock Hill, Columbia, and the Grand Strand. On the 100th birthday there will be a massive dinner at the state fair grounds with noted speaker. Plan to establish an educational endowment fund for our educational program on the Epworth campus. We will ask YOU to give \$100 and become member of Century Club. We hope to raise \$100,000. Over 200 churches gave nothing to Epworth Children's Home last year. The goal this year is to reach 100%

participation in the Epworth offerings. Rev. Brittain presented Bishop Spain the first Epworth 100th year T-shirt and a mug.

At 8:06 p.m. Bishop Spain read the results of the ninth lay ballot. There were no elections. On the ninth clergy ballot Charles L. Johnson, Sr., and William C. Reid were elected to the General Conference.

The tenth lay ballot was opened at 8:08 and closed at 8:14 p.m. The tenth clergy ballot was opened at 8:14 and closed at 8:21 p.m.

Mr. Herbert Hames, a lay member of Union Church, Irmo, presented a Christian flag and a United States of America flag on behalf of the Woodmen of the World. Mr. Hames led the session in the pledge of allegiance to the Christian Flag and in the pledge of allegiance to the United States flag. It is the practice of Woodmen of the World to return profits to the community. Upon request churches may be provided with similar flags. Bishop Spain accepted the flags on behalf of the Annual Conference.

Mr. Richard Murphy presented the reports of the Commission on Equitable Compensation beginning on page 56 of the pre-conference materials. Report Number One, the mission statement, was adopted on the motion of Mr. Murphy. In Report Number Two, section B. through section N. remain as they current are. Section O. contains the 1995 Computation of Average Salary of \$39,864. The 1994 average was \$38,509. Sections P. through S. remain unchanged from the current report. Section U. on page 61 is new and concerns recommendation on reimbursement of travel and professional expenses. Section V., a new recommendation, defines reimbursement as an administrative cost. Finally, Mr. Murphy referred to Section A., page 57, and noted the apportionment decrease of \$41,000.

Mr. Murphy explained the reason for travel and professional reimbursement in accordance with the IRS decision to not consider clergy as self-employed. (The Webber decision.) This recommendation makes salary known. Travel and professional expenses will not have to be taken from it.

The Rev. Gary Phillips moved to delete the italicized part of section A, section U. and V. Following questions and comments, the Phillips motion was defeated. Report Number Two was adopted as presented by the Commission.

Report Number Three, page 61, was moved to record without reading, and the motion was approved. The report of the Commission on Equitable Compensation was adopted as a whole.

Following announcements, The Rev. Harrison Ervin called attention to the importance of caring for persons with handicapping conditions. Some have traveled to the conference and found difficulty. We need to plan for those who are disabled.

At 8:55 p.m. Dr. Briscoe introduced The Rev. Richard Allen, the Vision 2000 coordinator, who called for distribution of Vision 2000 plans. The attempt is to provide churches with tools for vital ministry. This tri-district training was offered. In 1996 additional training events are planned. The Lenten attendance crusade resulted in a 2.5% increase in worship attendance, 2,476 people. This was the highest increase in over 20 years. We need to develop strategies to enhance the quality of or worship and increase the number of persons attending. He asked for three things: (1) Pray for the crusade and the training of the people who are leading it. (2) Form a task force of five persons. (3) Bring them to the training event in August. The Vision 2000 Committee will provide quality training leaders and materials to seek to raise visibility of the United Methodist Church throughout the state.

The Rev. James D. Dennis is coordinator to raise visibility. Jeff Harrison, in charge of marketing for Quincys, and talented professionals determined that signs with no more than seven words could be put up as we approach the Christmas season. Call it evangelism and outreach. We have something to offer. An example of the billboard message, "Receive God's Gift! Come Worship With Us." and the United Methodist Church logo were distributed. It will cost \$62,000 to blanket the state from mid-November through Christmas. They will be placed strategically in high traffic locations. Be ready for company!

The Rev. Richard Allen moved that the Conference approve the placement of the Vision 2000 worship attendance crusade billboards and authorize solicitation of funds for their placement outside the Annual Conference budget. This is a request for permission to place billboards and solicit funds to do that so that there is no cost to the conference. In response to

Bishop Spain's question, The Rev. Charles Johnson said the request should be brought before CF&A and submitted to the Conference on Saturday. It was agreed to sent the request to C.F.&A. The report of the Vision 2000 Committee was concluded.

Bishop Spain read the results of lay ballot number ten There were no elections. On the reading of clergy ballot number ten, Angelin J. Simmons was elected to the General Conference. Lay ballot number eleven was distributed at 9:20 and closed at 9:27 p.m. Clergy ballot number eleven was distributed at 9:27 and closed at 9:32 p.m.

It was announced that The Rev. James E. Hunter's daughter, Anne, had been hospitalized. At 9:34 p.m. Bishop Spain offered prayer and the session adjourned for the day

FOURTH DAY - SATURDAY MORNING JUNE 3, 1995

Holy Communion was celebrated in Leonard Auditorium of Old Main building. The preacher was The Rev. Joanne E. Brown. The liturgist was the Rev. Sara White. Judge Robinson was the lay reader.

Bishop Spain convened the session at 8:30 a.m. "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus" was sung. The Rev. Raymond Paul Litts offered the invocation. Bishop Spain noted that we have important reports to hear and actions to take. "If you came with a good long speech in your pocket, please abbreviate it or set it aside. Offer what you must clearly and briefly."

Dr. Carolyn Briscoe called attention to page 103 of the pre-conference reports, Conference Council on Ministries Report Number Four, Special Days. Section B, proposals for sixteen Special Days and Months in 1996, was accepted on her motion. (Funding proposals will be considered during the reports of the Council on Finance & Administration.)

The Line Item Requests for 1996, Section II and the 1996 conference Advance Specials, Section III, page 104, were affirmed without funding at this time, on her motion.

Dr. Briscoe made a combined motion that we adopt Section IV, the Programs, Events, Publications, Grants, Awards Programs described on pages 106-116. This was approved

Conference Council on Ministries Report Number Five, pages 117-118 was approved pending adoption of the C.F.&A. reports on Dr. Briscoe's motion.

The report of the Board of Education, page 119, was moved to record. Ms. Earlene Ulmer, who finishes her term as Board chairperson was recognized and thanked

The reports of the Board of Evangelism (pages 119-120), The Commission on Worship (pages 120-121) with special thanks to Ms. Madie Robinson, The Commission on Religion and Race (pages 141-142), The Commission on the Role and Status of Women (page 142), The Committee on Career Planning and Counseling (pages 142-144), The Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling (pages 144-145), The Native American Committee (page 147), The Conference Council on Older Adult Ministry (pages 151-152), and The South Carolina Annual Conference Council on Ministries Committee on Research and Planning (pages 152-153) were moved to record. This was done. Dr. Briscoe asked the members to read the reports if they have not already done so. We may have run short on time, but the reports reflect a lot of work by good people who are good stewards and good witnesses.

The Rev. Joel R. Jones asked the session to turn to page 218, the LARCUM COVENANT Document, pages 218-219. United Methodists have been involved in dialogue with Lutherans, Episcopalians and Roman Catholics. Recently the dialogue with Bishop Edward Salmon, of the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina, Bishop David Thompson of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charleston, and newly elected Bishop Dorsey Henderson of the Episcopal Diocese of Upper South Carolina resulted in the confirmation of the LARCUM Covenant by the bishops.

Bishop Spain said: "We are asking for this conference to endorse this document signed by the participating bishops at the Bishop's Ecumenical Dialogue on April 25, 1995. If you approve, say yes. The affirmative response was overwhelming. On behalf of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, Bishop Robert H. Spain signed the LARCUM Covenant document.

Rev. Jones moved the adoption of the Report of the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. It was done.

The Rev. Jack C. Washington brought information on Shalom Zones in South Carolina.

SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE SHALOM ZONE MINISTRY Rev. Jack C. Washington

In August of 1994 I was asked by the CCOM Director Dr. Lemuel C. Carter if I would be willing to serve as contact person for Shalom Zone Initiative. Not knowing what all that meant I answered, "Yes." Two weeks later he asked if I would be willing to go to Stamford, Connecticut to represent South Carolina Conference at a Shalom Zone Summit. Again I answered, "Yes." On October 14, at 6:30 p.m. I arrived at the Sheraton Hotel in Stamford for a 7 p.m. meeting. When the meeting began we were asked to introduce ourselves and share with the group what we had expected to learn during our time together. When everyone was through, Bishop Felton E. May stood up and said "Yes, all of those and then some." And I said, "Oh-oo I did it again." He began by saying that, in the aftermath of the acquittal of Los Angeles Police Officers for the beating of Rodney King, people took to the streets to vent their frustration. The destruction of that event coupled with years of poverty and neglect, called for a response. The United Methodist Church at its 1992 General Conference committed that we in solidarity and consultation with indigenous persons and local churches in a selected neighborhood would commit ourselves to the creation in Los Angeles of a Shalom Zone ... with the hope that the Shalom Zone concept become a prototype for proactive ministry in other places.

As Communities of Shalom developed in Los Angeles, it became clear that there was a need for the development of Communities of Shalom across the country. The concept enables the necessary help, hope, and healing which congregations and neighborhoods need to address the internal and external pressures of poverty, racism, lack of vision, lack of resources, and demise of the Spirit. In light of this need, a training program was developed to provide skills to neighborhood residents, initiate contacts with business and civic leaders, and exchange information between Communities of Shalom.

The training Program is designed to organize and mobilize people and resources to carry out the strategies which they have selected and on which they are willing to act. Those who live and work in the community and church are valued as the experts who provide the information, design the plan, and carry out the action. This asset based process uses a series of questions that identifies the vision, resources, needs, strategies, and action steps.

The training sessions are designed to be conducted on five Saturdays over a six month period of time. Training is done on location and involves three to five Communities of Shalom from an annual conference or area. The training program covers a variety of subjects which provides sufficient information for participants to plan for their Shalom Zones. Tasks and assignments between training sessions and follow-up technical assistance identify and provide more specific training. Comprehensive coverage of specific topics will be offered in specialized courses to be held as the need arises.

We here in South Carolina responded to the challenge of Shalom Zone ministries, expressing our vision in this way: in response to God's call, we will build partnerships with others to create, participate in and support models of Shalom: communities where persons find healing, justice, peace, dignity, economic opportunity and self-realization.

The Shalom Zone ministry of the South Carolina Conference is a response to the prophetic call to "seek the shalom of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf for in its shalom you will find your shalom." Jeremiah 29:7.

We are happy to report that five Shalom Zone areas have been identified within the bounds of our Annual Conference and have been approved by the National Shalom Zone Committee of the General Bd. of Global Ministries.

On December 11, 1994 The first Shalom Zone meeting of the South Carolina Conference was held at the Methodist Center with 18 people present. From this group the Annual Conference steering committee was formed. The Rev. Jack C. Washington, Associate Director of the Conference Council on Ministries-Outreach Section was assigned Shalom Zone ministry coordinator for the South Carolina Conference by Bishop Joseph B. Bethea and the Cabinet.

The dates for the five training sessions were set, four were group sessions to be held on Feb. 11, March 11, and April 8. Each group had one individual session. The fifth and final

session was held on Sat. May 20, with a graduation celebration at New Francis Brown UMC, Charleston, SC. A total of 62 people registered for the training and 52 completed successfully.

The five areas of Shalom in South Carolina and their contact person are:

Bennettsville/Cheraw Community - Rev. Janice Frederick-Watts

Bluff Road Community - Rev. Ellis White, Jr.

Chicora/Cherokee Community - Rev. Mike Vandiver

Eau Claire Community - Rev. Joe Alley

North Charleston/Charleston Height Community - Rev. Willis T. Goodwin.

The goal of communities of Shalom is the empowerment of individual lives and the transformation of churches and communities. The training program develops leaders who can enable communities and congregations to take responsibility for the decisions which shape their destiny.

We express our sincere thanks and appreciation to the Rev. John Schol, Executive secretary, office of Urban Ministries, National Coordinator, Shalom Zone Initiative, General Board of Global Ministries for making several trips to South Carolina to lead us in our training, with the help of some of his adjunct staff members.

After recognizing the members of the Shalom Zone team, he presented Bishop Spain with a T-shirt Bishop Spain responded: "I hope we take to heart what we have just heard. I hope the day will come when we get out of the doors of our churches. The whole world belongs to the Lord and all the people are God's people. We must be out there. I will support it and wear my shirt."

Bishop Spain read the results of lay ballot number eleven. Lisa Yabuah was elected to General Conference. The Rev. William Willimon was elected on clergy ballot number eleven. The persons elected to the Jurisdictional Conference will be the alternates, in order of election, to the General Conference. At this point we returned to the electronic balloting process. Eligible lay members will be asked to vote for eleven persons and eligible clergy will be asked the same. The Secretary read the names of the persons already elected. The lay write-in nominees were identified, and assigned clergy numbers were reviewed. The twelfth lay ballot was distributed at 9:16 and closed at 9:28 a.m. Clergy ballot number twelve was opened at 9:31 and closed at 9:40 a.m.

The session adopted the motion of The Rev. Roger Gramling that only the names of those receiving 15 votes or more be read. Mr. Andrew Williams made the motion that on the lay ballot only the names of those receiving 25 or more votes be read. It was approved.

The Rev. Harlan Wilson, chairperson of the Committee for Congregational Development referred to the report on pages 145-147. After reporting the utilization of information from PERCEPT, the following substitution was made on regard to the Disposition of Church Property on page 146:

SUBSTITUTE MOTION

Substitute for the policy recommendation from the Conference Committee on Congregational Development found on page 146 of the 1995 Pre-Conference Journal. The policy recommendation is entitled: "Disposition of local church property".

"In light of the functions assigned to the District Board of Church Location and Building in paragraphs 2540 and 2541 of the Book of Discipline, the following recommendation is made: When a church ceases to be used by a congregation, it is recommended that the District Board for Congregational Development provide supplemental input regarding the immediate and future needs of the community surrounding the church and the needs of other United Methodist churches in the community. It is recommended that this input be submitted to the District Superintendent and the District Board of Church Location and Building."

The substitute was approved. After commending on aspects of the Committee's work, the motion was made to adopt the report as amended. It was done.

At 9:45 a.m., The Rev. Delos Corderman made the report of the Committee on the

Conference Journal, page 220 of the pre-conference materials. The report was adopted.

The Secretary gave the Report of the Committee on the Annual Conference, page 71. The dates for the 1996 session have been set by Bishop Spain for Sunday May 26 through Wednesday May 29, 1996. Rev. Corderman asked the session to accept Wofford College as the site. The site was approved.

Mr. James Salley gave the report for the Committee on the Episcopacy. He said that the Committee has been working on a memorial for Bishop Joseph Bethea. The report, found on page 217, was moved to record. This was approved.

The Rev. Gene A. Gene Norris recommended that we no longer have the district conferences. This was not sustained.

At 9:52 a.m. the report of the United Methodist Women was given by Dolly Fogle, Conference UMW President.

United Methodist Women

United Methodist Women is not an option. It is mandated by General Conference of the United Methodist Church. "In every local church there shall be an organized unit of United Methodist Women with a connection system that relates from the local to the district and to conference organizations to the jurisdiction, and to Women's Division of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church." Why? Because Women's Division is one of the three divisions of the General Board of Global Ministries as well as National Division and World Division. The program of the Women's Division is mission - mission that affirms the wholeness of the Gospel and our commitment to proclaiming that Gospel in its many forms. We have two directors from our South Carolina conference serving on Women's Division: Mrs. Sara Shingler, and Mr. B. J. Pasley. Our South Carolina conference United Methodist Women number over 29,000 members from 857 local units. Although no accurate number can be given due to not all local units filling out their year-end reports, we received year-end reports from 819 local units. These reports are vital in order to measure growth in all areas of our Purpose, to know how to improve or to make changes when something different is needed.

How have we, as United Methodist Women, made a difference over these 125 years being in mission beginning in 1869 with only eight women giving two cents a week and prayer? During 1994 our conference began writing our history book. Over 540 local units gave food to the needy. Over 410 local units helped to clothe the poor. Remember, we give finances out of two pockets. We give through undesignated pledge to mission through the United Methodist Women, as well as give through the local Church World Service Fund.

Although last year was a difficult year, the conference mission team nurtured local units and made our purpose come alive through Bible study, prayer and action. This provided several signs of hope and renewal. Outstanding goals were met in the areas of strengthening spiritual growth, understanding inclusiveness, studying issues in order to expand our concept of mission and acting on the information we learned.

In 1994 United Methodist Women continued to give to mission. A total of \$442,571.23 was remitted to Women's Division of the

General Church and \$71,784.89 was given to our South Carolina Mission projects. This was an increase from 1993. Over \$81,000 more was given to mission, although this was a very difficult year. Our United Methodist Women are reading to better educate their mission perspective. Over 521 local units subscribe to Response (the United Methodist Women's magazine), with over 2,100 women reading articles of our involvement in mission. Over 365 local units are a part of the reading program, or over 1,100 women reading from our special United Methodist Women's reading list. The local units participated through the School of Christian Mission studies. "Making the World Safe for Children" was number one with "Families from Scripture to Today" number two, and the geographical study of "African Churches Speak" coming in third. Their favorite program from the Program Resource Book was on the Purpose of United Methodist Women, with environmental issues coming in second, and the homeless children program coming in third.

The United Methodist Women all across this conference are organized as a community of women whose purpose is to know God and to Experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

This means we are continuing to grow spiritually, physically, socially, and mentally. We are involved in issues concerning social, legislative, family, community, national and worldwide. We share by caring and we care by daring to be in ministry. If your local church has a United Methodist Women's organization you are blessed. If your local church does not have a United Methodist Women's organization, I challenge you to become involved by seeking your district president and her mission team to help you to activate a local unit within your church.

My hopes and dreams for South Carolina United Methodist Women is that we will continue to build trust and support by sharing the positive experiences which are happening. There are still some negatives, but to dwell there is to miss some of the best experiences of life.

MISSION IS NOT A PROGRAM OF THE CHURCH, IT IS THE PURPOSE OF THE CHURCH. United Methodist Women understands this mission as a "call" from God to be lay volunteers in order to fulfill the mission of the church.

Mrs. Fogle moved the adoption of the **United Methodist Women Report**, page 148. This was done.

At 10:00 a.m. Mr. William Burroughs presented report of the **United Methodist Men**, pages 148-51 of the pre-conference materials. He corrected the report on page 149 to read: Central Region Vice President is William E. Unthank Jr. PO Box 4044 West Columbia, SC 29171. Office phone 791- 1880, Home phone 794-6701. The amended report as a whole was moved to record.

Bishop Spain announced that the drive belt on the machine that reads ballots is broken and can not be fixed so the last ballot will be taken again as a written ballot. Full names rather than numbers must be used. **Valid lay and clergy ballots number twelve** were opened at 10:10 and closed at 10:30.

At 10:32 a.m., the Conference recessed.

At 10:47 Mrs. Thomasina McPhearson led Conference in singing. and Bishop Spain called the session to order.

The Rev. Kenneth Phelps presented the scouts who have won the **Bishop's Award for Excellence**. Bishop Spain commended the United Methodist Men, the sponsoring churches and the scout leaders for their involvement.

The Rev. Delos Corderman, presented **Resolution to the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits** on page 215 of the registration packet requesting an actuarial study on the impact of the recognition of the Late Retirement Date in accordance with the provision of paragraph 1604.1 of *The Book of Discipline*. This is in accordance the action approving a petition recognizing the Late Retirement Date in the Ministerial Pension Plan Document. The resolution, referred on Monday, was approved.

Resolution

WHEREAS pension payments related to clergy service with pension credit prior to 1982 are provided by Supplement One of the Ministerial Pension Plan, and

WHEREAS Supplement One states that clergy will receive the greater of the Service Annuity or the Formula Benefit calculated in accordance with the provision of Supplement One, and

WHEREAS most clergy who are eligible for a Supplement One benefit receive payments calculated according to the Formula Benefit provisions of Supplement One,

WHEREAS according to paragraph 452.21 of the Book of Discipline clergy are first eligible for normal retirement because of age at the conference session that occurs in the year the clergyperson reaches age 65 before July 1, and

WHEREAS clergy who retire after the year they are first eligible for normal retirement because of age forfeit the amount of the Formula Benefit they would otherwise have received during the years they continued to serve after reaching the normal retirement age, and

WHEREAS the conference benefits twice by such late retirements at the expense of the clergyperson, first by retaining the services of the experienced clergy person and second by not having to provide pension payments for the years the clergyperson serves following the nominal retirement date,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference requests the General Conference to change the provisions of Supplement One of the Ministerial Pension plan so that persons who retire at any conference session after the conference session at which they would have first been eligible because age for normal retirement under paragraph 452.2c will receive the greater of the Service Annuity or the actuarial equivalent of the Formula Benefit, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT because this proposal changes a benefit that is presently in effect, the South Carolina Annual Conference, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 1604.1 of the Book of Discipline, hereby requests an actuarial opinion of the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits concerning the cost and other related aspects of this proposed change.

At 11:00 a.m. The Rev. Harry Mays was asked to give the report of the **Commission on Archives and History**. He invited all to join the South Carolina Annual Conference Historical Society. The Commission provides a marker to deceased clergy that designates the grave site of a United Methodist clergy person. He would like to provide markers for all graves. He also said that there is a corn crib in Pickens county that once was a log cabin that hosted Bishop Frances Asbury. If you know of historic sites to be recognized, let him know.

THE REPORT OF COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The Commission on Archives and History is but a tiny part of the Annual Conference organization as the budget of the Commission illustrates. The proposed budget of the Annual Conference for the 1996 fiscal year contains an item for the Commission that is just one five-hundredth of one percent of that total budget.

With that budget the 1992 *Book of Discipline* states that "it shall be the duty of the commission to collect and preserve the historically significant records of the Annual Conference and its agencies, including data relating to the origin and history of the conference and its antecedents; to encourage and assist the local churches in preserving their records, compiling their histories, and celebrating their heritage; to provide for the permanent safekeeping of the historical records of all abandoned or discontinued churches in the bounds of the Annual Conference and its antecedents (see par 2549.3); to maintain a fire-safe historical and archival depository and to see that all items which obviously will have value for future history are properly preserved therein; to provide for the ownership of real property and to receive gifts and bequests; to maintain contact with officially designated Historic Sites, Historic Shrines, and Historic Landmarks in their bounds; to assist the bishop or the appropriate conference committee in planning for the historical hour and other appropriate historical observances at Annual Conference sessions; to establish retention and disposition schedules for Annual Conference and local church records under standards or guidelines developed by the General Commission on Archives and History; to cooperate with and report, when requested, to the General and Jurisdictional Commissions on Archives and History; and to engage with other Wesleyan, Methodist, or Evangelical United Brethren-related denominations in lifting up our joint heritage." And "the Commission may organize a conference Historical Society and encourage membership therein for the purpose of promoting interest in the study and preservation of the history of the Conference and its antecedents." Can you imagine how the Commission could do all of that with one five-hundredth of one percent of the Budget of the Annual Conference?

Thanks to the generosity of Claflin College and Wofford College, space in the libraries of these two colleges is provided at no cost to the Annual Conference to house the archives. The Annual Conference owes a deep debt of gratitude to the Boards of Trustees of these two colleges for this service.

Some years ago the Conference Historical Society was organized and deserves the active support of all members of the Annual Conference. The next meeting will be Saturday, October 21, 1995, at Columbia's Francis Burns United Methodist Church.

Possibly the most appreciated one activity of the Commission comes when a small bronze

marker is provided to be placed on the gravestone of the deceased clergy to identify the grave as that of a member of the clergy in the Methodist tradition. There may be as many as 1,200 or more graves of clergy related to this Annual Conference and its antecedents. To furnish a marker for such a number would cost at least sixty thousand dollars. Yet the Commission knows how appreciative the families and descendants are for this token of appreciation for the gift of service of these who have answered God's call through those whom John Wesley liked to call "the people called Methodist."

At 11:15 a.m., The Rev. Ray K. Smith, chairperson of the Conference Board of Trustees, called for adoption of their report on page 73. The report was adopted on his motion.

It is necessary that the South Carolina Annual Conference vote on incorporation. The resolution is found below with the recorded vote: Total membership: 2,789. Total members voting: 925. Members Voting For: 922. Members Voting Against 0. Members Abstaining: 3. The resolution on incorporation is adopted.

RESOLUTION ON INCORPORATION OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Annual Conference finds itself with two outstanding charters incorporating its Conference Board of Trustees, one having being previously issued by the General Assembly of South Carolina in 1851 and the other having been issued by the Secretary of State in 1973 on the occasion of the merger of the white and the black Methodist Conferences, and

WHEREAS, the Trustees of each of the two corporate bodies (who are the same individuals) have concluded that only one corporate body should remain in existence and they have unanimously determined that the two corporate bodies merge into a single corporate body in accordance with the Plan of Merger hereto attached. The Trustees of each corporation have unanimously executed the Plan of Merger and recommend that the Annual conference, as MEMBERS of the corporate body chartered by the General Assembly of South Carolina in 1851, consider and approve of such Plan. The law requires that a two-third (2/3) majority of the votes cast by the membership approve of such Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, now in session in Spartanburg, South Carolina, do hereby approve of the Plan of Merger, a copy of which is hereby attached, whereby THE SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION, INC. shall merge into THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH BOARD OF TRUSTEES, INCORPORATED with the name of the surviving corporation to be changed to SOUTH CAROLINA UNITED METHODIST CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, the surviving corporation to have no members.

This is to certify that the above Resolution was approved by the South Carolina Annual

Conference of the United Methodist Church, in session at Spartanburg, South Carolina, on June 3 1995, by more than a two-thirds (2/3) majority of votes cast.

Total membership 1,789: Total members voting: 842. Members Voting For: 842. Members Voting Against: 0. Members Abstaining: 0. The resolution has been adopted.

RESOLUTION ON INCORPORATION OF THE CHARTER OF EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME

WHEREAS, The Epworth Orphanage of The South Carolina Conference was first incorporated by a Legislative Act on February 13, 1896 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and

WHEREAS, the charter has been amended on several occasions to accommodate the changes in the structure of the Methodist church in South Carolina and to amend the name of the corporation which is now known as Epworth Children's Home, and

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, did reserve the right under the legislative charter of 1896 to elect the Board of Managers or Trustees of the corporation, to prescribe the number and tenure of office of such Managers or Trustees and to prescribe rules and regulations for its government, and

WHEREAS, recently the South Carolina Legislature adopted a modern, comprehensive Non-Profit Corporate Code, and under the terms thereof Epworth even though it is a legislative chartered institution, may irrevocably elect to be governed under the new Non-Profit Code, and

WHEREAS, the new Non-Profit Code authorizes a simplified method for the Annual Conference to exercise control over the corporation, such as inserting a provision in the charter that no future amendment may be made without the written consent of the Resident Bishop being endorsed in the Application for Amendment to Charter.

NOW, THEREFORE, Epworth requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference grant its permission to Epworth to irrevocably elect to be governed under the new Non-Profit Code as a Religious corporation, without members; and to further amend its existing charter as set forth in the attached Articles of Amendment of Charter. You will note that under the charter amendment the Annual conference specifically reserves also the right to elect the Board of Trustees of the corporation and to prescribe the number and tenure of office of such Trustees.

On motion made and duly seconded, the following Resolution was duly adopted.

Resolved, that Epworth Children's Home be authorized, empowered and permitted to irrevocably elect to hereafter be governed by the Non-Profit Corporation Act of South Carolina and that its present charter be amended in the manner as set forth in the attached Articles of Amendment to Charter.

This is to certify that the above Resolution was approved by the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, in session at Spartanburg, South Carolina, on June 3, 1995, by more than a two-thirds (2/3) majority of votes cast.

At 11:40 a.m., The Rev. Charles L. Johnson asked all members of the Council on Finance and Administration to join him. He announced that C.F. & A. authorizes VISION 2000 to solicit funds for billboards.

The Rev. DeArmond Canaday asked that the Annual Conference petition The Judicial Council to make a ruling in the nature of a declaratory decision. After an explanation by Bishop Spain, the following request was approved.

A MOTION PETITIONING THE JUDICIAL COUNCIL TO MAKE A RULING IN THE NATURE OF A DECLARATORY DECISION

I move that the South Carolina Annual Conference petition the Judicial Council to make a ruling in the nature of a declaratory decision as to the constitutionality, meaning, application, or effect of Paragraph 36 (Division H, Section VII, Article II of the Constitution) and Paragraph 2626.1(h) (Power of a Trial Court) on the following questions relating specifically to the case ruled on by the Judicial Council in its Decision 716:

- (a) Do Paragraph 36 (Division II, Section VII, Article II of the Constitution) and Paragraph 2626.1h (Power of a Trial Court) allow the Annual Conference as "the basic body" to alter or negate, in whole or in part, the penalty fixed by the Trial Court which was ratified by the clergy members in executive session on May 30, 1994 and was ruled on by the Judicial Council in its Decision 716 on October 29, 1994?
- (b) Is it a violation of Paragraph 2626.1(h) (Power of the Trial Court) or Paragraph 36 (Division II, Section VII, Article II of the Constitution) for the Annual Conference to be allowed to vote on the question of whether or not to implement, in whole or in part, the penalty fixed by the Trial Court in this case when the Executive Session of the Annual Conference has already voted to ratify the penalty fixed by the Trial Court (May 30, 1994) and the Judicial Council has ruled (October 29, 1994) that the penalty fixed by the Trial Court can legally be implemented?
- (c) Is it a violation of Paragraph 2626.1(h) or Paragraph 36 for the penalty fixed by the Trial Court in this case not to be implemented immediately after the clergy members in executive session have ratified the action of the Trial Court and the Judicial Council has ruled that the penalty fixed by the Trial Court can legally be implemented?
- (d) In the light of Judicial Council Decision 240, Paragraph 36, and Paragraph 2626.1h, do the clergy members in executive session have the authority to withdraw the credentials of ordination or to extend the suspension for an additional specific period of time beyond that designated by the Trial Court because some of the specifications added by the Trial Court have not been satisfied?

The Council on Finance and Administration amended Report Number One by substituting the 3rd column heading in Report No. as "Anticipated Income" rather than the former heading "Recommended for 1996." This was approved.

Dr. Peter Mitchell moved to amend C.F.&A. Report Number One in the following manner: (1) "That the section beginning "In addition to the Conference budget, we recommend that the following funds be distributed to churches on the basis of percentages of average net funds as ASKINGS: .. through the total figure \$879,031." be deleted. (2) That line items 9, 10, 12, and 14 be reinstated to their "1996 Requested" amounts. (3) And that a committee composed of 1/2 representatives of the Council on Finance and Administration and 1/2 representatives of all groups that receive apportionments, including General Conference apportionments, be established to develop a process for budgeting that analyzes and justifies all 19 line items."

Mr. Frank Haddon spoke for the amendment "We are trimming the top of the tree when we should be fertilizing the roots. We need to hear more on giving and tithing from our pulpits." Bishop Spain asked if Report Number Two has anything to do with Report Number One.

Charles Johnson replied that the Mitchell motion has no impact on Report Number Two.

The Rev. C J Lupo noted that C.F.&A. Report Number Two has apportionments in the same amount as 1995. The Conference Commission on Communications had asked that there be complete funding of the new commission. There is a shortfall of about \$20,000. He moved 100% funding for the Conference Commission on Communications, Report Number Two, Item 1, Advocate Operations." Bishop Spain asked that we hold Dr. Mitchell's motion and consider the Lupo amendment to Report Number Two. The Lupo motion was approved

Mr. William Burroughs asked if C.F.&A. Report No. 4 relates to Report No. 2. Rev. Johnson said that it does not. Mr. Burroughs moved adoption of C.F.&A. Report No. 4 omitting section 11 of Report No. 4. He asked that 10 cents per mile be the travel allowance and that meals be \$3, \$4 and \$6 only. Ms. Martha Thompson moved to amend the Burroughs motion on Report No. 4 keeping \$4, \$6 and \$10 for means; 14 cents per mile for one person, 19 cents per mile for two people, 22 cents per mile for three people, and 22 cents per mile for 4 or more persons.

Bishop Spain put the question on the Thompson motion and it failed. The Burroughs substitute for Report No. 4 failed also. Section 11 of Report No. 4 was approved as submitted by the Council.

Report Number Five was approved as submitted by the Council. It was adopted.

Mr. John Smiley Requested that the Council on Finance and Administration read the motion made last year which described a pattern of implementation. "It was requested that a process be presented this year and give the conference a chance to fix weaknesses but also present some idea of the impact of the motion. I wish you had brought a process to us. I support very fervently the motion of Dr. Mitchell. Hopefully that will help us with a process."

Council on Finance and Administration Report Number 6 was approved as submitted.

Council on Finance and Administration Report Number 7 was approved as submitted.

The conference returned to C.F.&A. Report Number One. Bishop Spain asked if Dr. Mitchell wanted to delete the section on askings and return those allocated to askings to the 1995 requests and establish committee to consider all expenditures of administration and staffing as well as our mission efforts. That is the understanding.

The Rev. Bundy Bynum moved an amendment to the amendment of C.F.&A. Report No. 1: "That we include a review of administration and staffing as well as line items." Industry is cutting administrative costs and we need to look at this."

Dr. Carolyn Briscoe noted that Item 1 of Report No. 1 does involve Administration and staff.

Bishop Spain said that the Bundy amendment to Dr. Mitchell's amendment is now under consideration.

The Rev. Samuel George moved to delete references to General Church askings in item 3 of Mitchell amendment. Since we can not adjust General Church askings it is superfluous to have such representatives on the committee. Bishop Spain said this could be handled without the George motion.

The Mitchell amendment to Report Number One was approved. Council on Finance and Administration Report Number One, as amended, was approved.

The Rev. Ted Walter moved that the Mitchell Amendment Committee, appointed by Bishop Spain, meet without funding. This was approved.

The Rev. Charles Johnson changed the line items in Report Number One to agree with the Mitchell motion. \$17,582,114 is the total budget recommended. That represents a decrease of 3.1%. On the motion of Charles Johnson, the Reports of the Council on Finance and Administration as a whole were adopted Charles Johnson expressed thanks to committee and to the churches. Bishop Spain expressed thanks to Rev. Johnson for his work.

Mr. Bud Black moved that we encourage our delegations to General and Jurisdictional Conference to be cost concerned as they consider financial demands and needs. This conference requests that the Smiley concept of cost containment and downsizing be considered and used where appropriate. The motion was approved.

Bishop Spain adjourned the session for lunch at 12:40 p.m. We were scheduled to reconvene at 2:00 P.M.

**Fourth Day - Saturday Afternoon
June 3, 1995**

Bishop Robert H. Spain called the session to order at 2:05 p.m. and The Rev. Thom Jones led in the singing of "I Love to Tell the Story" and "Work For The Night is Coming." Bishop Spain read lay ballot number twelve. John Redmond and June Willson were elected lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. On the motion of Mr. Nick Chambers the session decided to take next nine highest lay members at delegates to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference with the next five highest vote getters as alternates. The thirteenth lay ballot was opened at 2:20 and closed at 2:30 P.M.

Bishop Spain asked the members of the General and Jurisdictional Conferences to meet immediately after the session. The Conference sang "And Are We Yet Alive."

At 2:35 p.m. made the motion that the entire report of the Conference Council on Ministries as amended be adopted. This was done. Dr. Carolyn Briscoe introduced The Rev. and Mrs. Charles L. Johnson. Rev. Johnson presented a plaque in appreciation for service as Conference Council on Ministries Director to Lemuel C. Carter.

Rev. Lemuel C. Carter said that he felt many emotions as he looked back over the past years. "I had the wonderful opportunity to be associated with a family whom I have grown to love immensely and only wish that I had longer to enjoy Shirley and Joseph Bethea. They were two of the most significant people in my life. Last night the phone rang and it was Josefa. She was just checking in to let us know that she is okay. To Josefa I say 'God Speed and love,' for she is part of the Carter family."

"I would like to say for those elected it is a high honor and privilege and responsibility to which you all have been called. I congratulate you and commend you. I want to say to Bishop and Mrs. Spain, 'We have been blessed by your presence. He wanted to know if I was comfortable with my appointment. I said 'Yes it is a wonderful opportunity. It is a wonderful opportunity to serve.' He seemed relieved because I don't think he wanted to change any decision made by Bishop Bethea. I want to thank all those who preceded me in this office. All have done well and I thank them for their help. I want to thank God for guiding me and helping me in the task. God has helped me stay focused and true to myself. I did not always agree to all decisions but I believe in consensus. I felt that I was remaining true to myself."

"I want to thank the Chairperson of the Council on Ministries, Carolyn Briscoe, the associate directors and the support staff. It is a privilege to commend to you Charles Johnson as director of this council. Thank you, thank you very much for the opportunity to serve. I would not have lasted these years without the one who stands beside me. I am grateful to my family. I owe so much to so many." The session received Rev. Carter's remarks with a standing ovation.

At 2:50 p.m. The Rev. Delos Corderman make the Omnibus Motion: "All reports distributed in the pre-conference materials and the registration packet not previously acted upon be moved to record." This was done.

On a point of personal privilege the Secretary thanked the volunteers who make the session of the Annual Conference seem more organized than it really is. It is an annual miracle. Mr. Walt Forrester and the lay members of the Spartanburg District run the information desk and make registration possible. The Rev. Talmage Skinner coordinates the session for Wofford College and is the indispensable person. Among many others to thank are: The Rev. Timothy J. Rogers, The Rev. Alice D. Linder and The Rev. James C. Lane for their work as assistant secretaries; The Rev. David E. Lupo for the electronic voting process; Mrs. Jeanette Mack and Mrs. Patricia Mack of Print Media Services for their work in processing and distributing materials; Ms. Madie Robinson and the members of the Commission on Worship for their thorough planning; and special thanks must be given to the tellers who carried out a thankless task with good grace and dispatch. Thanks to The Rev. Thom Jones and Mr. Eddie Huss for serving as the song leader and primary musician. And special thanks to Bishop Robert Spain for presiding.

Mr. Charles Appleby thanked Delos Corderman for all the work he does and hours he puts in. Bishop Spain reported on the health of The Rev. Edward E. Jenkins and The Rev. B.J.

Cooper.

The thirteenth lay ballot was read at 3:58 p.m. Rubielee Addison, Betty Moss McGuirt, Becky L. Buie, R. Fletcher Carter, Hazel C. Bennett, Peter T. Mitchell, Harry R. Kent, Harriet A. Mays and C. Daniel Williams were elected to the Jurisdictional Conference. The reserves elected were: Rhett J. Jackson, Lanecia A. Rouse, Martha F. Thompson, Matthew Cunningham and Joseph E. Heyward.

The thirteenth clergy ballot was read at 4:20 p.m. There were no elections. Motion: The Rev. Thomas Brittain, after a call for inclusiveness in voting, moved that on the following clergy ballot the top sixteen vote getters be elected to the Southeastern Jurisdictional Conference; the first eleven, in order of election will be the delegates, and the next five will be the alternates. The motion was approved. The fourteenth clergy ballot was distributed at 4:34 p.m. and the ballot was closed at 4:43 p.m.

Bishop Robert Spain called the district superintendents to the podium. "There has been no cabinet anywhere that has been put to the test more than your cabinet here. My first session with them was in the appointment making process. There is no way anyone could make appointments that make everyone jump up and down with joy. But we try and I want to thank the cabinet, especially Ben Cunningham and Bob Howell, for their work. Bishop Bethea made two appointments to the cabinet, Fred Reese and Lem Carter. Welcome them!"

The 1995 appointments were fixed at 4:45 p.m. At 4:55 p.m. the conference joined in the Covenant Renewal Service. The Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe was the preacher.

**Covenant Renewal Service
Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe
Promises To Keep
John 14:8.17, 25-27**

Our vocation is to order the life of the church for service in the world for Christ's sake. I teach polity (*Discipline*) every year ordering the life of the church is really about covenant. It is about the promises which are made to live together in service. (It really does matter whether or not we honor paragraph 4 on inclusiveness.)

This passage today really is about how we live as community – how we live as church.

Christopher Robin was going away. Nobody knew why he was going; nobody knew where he was going; indeed, nobody even knew why he knew that Christopher Robin was going away. But somehow or other everybody in the Forest felt that it was happening at last. Even Smallest-of-All, a friend-and relation or Rabbits who thought he had once seen Christopher Robin's foot, but couldn't be sure because perhaps it was something else, even S.-of-A. told himself that things were going to be Different; and Late and Early, two other friend-and-relations, said, 'Well, Early?' and 'Well, Late?' to each other in such a hopeless sort of way that it really didn't seem any good waiting for the answer.

Then suddenly again, Christopher Robin, who was still looking at the world, with his chin in his hands, called out 'Pooh!'

'Yes?' said Pooh.

'When I'm ... when ... Pooh!'

'Yes, Christopher Robin?'

'I'm not going to do Nothing any more.'

'Never again?'

'Well, not so much. They don't let you.'

Pooh waited for him to go on, but he was silent again.

'Yes Christopher Robin?' said Pooh helpfully.
'Pooh, when I'm – you know – when I'm not doing nothing, will you come up here sometimes?'
'Just me?'

'Yes, Pooh.'

'Will you be here too?'

'Yes, Pooh, I will be, *really*. I promise I will be, Pooh.'

'That's good,' said Pooh.

'Pooh, promise you won't forget about me, ever.'

Not even when I'm a hundred.'

Pooh thought for a little.

'How old shall I be then?'

'Ninety-nine.'

Pooh nodded.

'I promise,' he said.

Still with his eyes on the world Christopher Robin put out a hand and felt for Pooh's paw.

'Pooh,' said Christopher Robin earnestly, 'if I, if I'm not quite --' he stopped and tried again - 'Pooh, whatever happens, you will understand, won't you?'

The disciples are sad and confused. They don't understand anymore than we do now to understand the ascension – not having known Pentecost.

If John 1 (Word made flesh) is about incarnation, John 14 is about the opposite. It is about divinity of Christ. We are afraid that in Jesus' physical absence we won't know where to look for signs of hope or how to live.

Thomas and Phillip ask the questions:

1. Where are you going?
2. Can we go with you?
3. Will we ever be together again?

One of the most painful times I remember was when I was 7 years old. My father whom I loved very much left to work out of town for awhile. Washington, DC was like another universe to me. "Up to six months" was more than my 7-year-old mind could absorb. I cried asking, "Will you come back again?" Thomas and Phillip ask the questions. Jesus makes three promises to them. Believe in me because I am in God and God is in me. But if that is too hard, believe in me because of the works themselves.

Remember how the sick/healed, the lame/walked, and the poor had good new preached.

1. I promise you - the one who believes in me will do the works I do, and in fact, you will do greater works than these.

Because I am going away you will do even greater works

You will preach, teach, administer the sacraments

pray

work at Salkehatchie

support the mission of church

see that our young people have nurture, care, to make contributions to the world.

You will even come to love one another more deeply and more lastingly.

2. I promise you—if you love me—you will continue to love me and love one another. You will not be divided by your differences of opinion, your politics, your hurts, fears, betrayals, sins....In spite of it all you will continue to love me and love each other.

(It looks as if—they are changes of leadership,—two women are leading the delegation. That is good but it also is painful to some. It really is hard to have some people retire, but they are not dead).

Jesus says, I promise. I will give you an Advocate/Helper. I will give you One who will help you through the pain, the fear, the terror, the hurt, the grief. This is the Spirit of Truth.

Not everyone will be able to receive it but you will because the Spirit will be among us. You

don't even have to depend upon yourselves. The Spirit will be among you. If the Spirit is of God—it will not lead the church away from the historical Jesus but will tie the church by instruction with memory of Jesus. To be Christian is to be enrolled in a tradition, as well as to be set free for the future.

There is an African saying, *I am because we are*. In other words, for Christians there is no such thing as I Am. I AM BECAUSE WE ARE.

3. I promise, I will not leave you orphaned. I am coming to you. You will not be left alone in the world.

A Sunday school teacher of a class of 8-year olds told me she was talking about what it means to be anxious. One little boy said: It is when your mom has done crack, she's passed out, the landlord is pounding on the door—you think he's going to throw you out...but you are afraid to open the door...cause he'll see her, but if you try and wake her up she will be really made. The Sunday school teacher said, yes....

The world is going crazy. We have work to do. There will be more people who need to be fed. As funding cuts are made for mental health services, medicine, AIDS, Social Security, Services for Children, and public education, the Church has its work cutout for it. We have our work cut out. It is important/meaningful. There is not time to squabble over red/green pews or how wide to open the church doors.

Jesus says, I will not leave you alone. I will be among you. Even more so, remember how God instructed me. God tells Moses to tell the children of Israel of God's identity saying, "I am who I am." This is interpreted as God saying, "Although I was with you in your past, I am also a God who invites new possibilities for the future. Your past, while essential to your identity, does not exhaust all that you can become, as individuals or as a community."

When I tell you that there is a Promised Land out there, I am telling you that the future can be different from the past, that you and your community can become something new. How exciting it is to know that tomorrow can be different from yesterday.

"Peace I give to you. Peace I leave with you. Do not let your hearts be troubled neither let them be afraid. Rise, let us be on our way."

The **fourteenth clergy ballot** was read by Bishop Spain at 5:40 p.m. Edward H. McDowell, Jr., Lemuel C. Carter, George E. Strait, A. Clark Jenkins, Sinclair E. Lewis, Thomas N. Brittain, Robert J. Howell, Jr., Michael B. Henderson, A. Mickey Fisher, and Sara A. White were elected to the Jurisdictional Conference. Inasmuch as there was a tie, a run off was held for the eleventh slot. The final clergy ballot was opened at 5:42 and closed at 5:45 p.m. At 5:50 p.m. Bishop Spain announced the results of the run-off. B. Susan Ulmer was elected to complete the Southeastern Jurisdictional delegation. The reserves elected were: James E. Hunter, III, Calvin Alston, Jr., J. Taylor Campbell, Cassandra P. Jackson and Gene A. Norris.

It was announced that the C.F.&A budget allows for one lay and one clergy reserve delegate to the General Conference. The first lay and clergy alternates to the Jurisdictional Conference will also have their expenses to the Jurisdictional Conference paid.

Bishop Spain called the delegates to the podium. "You represent us in the General Conference as part of the Church. It is important that you remember who you are. It is very important You are making the laws of the church -- what we do and how we do it. From now on it is work and a lot of work. You have to read it all and be faithful to your responsibilities." Bishop Spain also recognized The Rev. Ted H. Walter and The Rev. Susan Henry-Crowe as members of the Judicial Council.

At 5:55 p.m. Bishop Robert Spain adjourned the 1995 session of the South Carolina Annual Conference *sine die* with a prayer.

Report No. 3

A. The compensation for the District Superintendents for the year 1996 will be as follows, with the understanding that the item for in-district travel, which is paid from the District Administration Fund only by voucher, varies from district to district.

B. The Council on Finance and Administration of the South Carolina Annual Conference, The United Methodist Church, hereby designates up to 15% (\$8,452) of the district superintendent's salary for the year 1996 as allocated for parsonage utilities and maintenance, not including maid service and such expenses as paid by the district.

C. The District Administration Fund will be handled as follows:

1. The item "Office Expense" in the District Administration Fund will be for the operation of the District Office to pay such items as secretary, postage, and supplies and will be set at \$17,500 per district.
2. Exception: Inasmuch as the Columbia District Office must be in The United Methodist Center, one-half of the rent of that office will be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
3. The funds for program in each district are based on the membership of the district, beginning with a base of \$3,000 for the smallest membership district and adding 100 for each one thousand (1,000) members, or major fraction thereof, above 15,000. The schedule for 1996 will be as follows:

4. Travel (in and out-of-district) is set at \$90,000 for the total of all districts (or an average of \$7,500 per district), insurance & pensions at \$128,400 (\$10,700 per district), and continuing education at \$500 per superintendent.

5. There will be no shifting of funds between travel, program, and office expense.

6. Vouchers for continuing education must be approved by the District Committee on Continuing Education prior to payment. The unused portion of the Continuing Education allowance may be carried forward from year to year during a district superintendent's tenure, not to exceed a total amounting to three year's Continuing Education allocation. Not more than fifty percent of accumulated funds shall be used for travel expenses. The accumulation is cancelled in full when a district superintendent leaves the superintendency. It does not carry forward to the new district superintendent. However, by application to the CF&A in advance of leaving the superintendency, the district superintendent may within a reasonable length of time use the unused portion of the Continuing Education allowance to take training which would assist in his/her return to the parish ministry or other appointment. For the year in which there is a move, one-half of the Continuing Education allowance will be available for each superintendent.

D. Each District Board of Trustees shall elect a treasurer from the elected trustees of said district. The treasurer of the Board of Trustees shall administer all funds for the District Parsonage Fund, writing all vouchers for parsonage payments, repairs, insurance and

furnishings (not to include parsonage utility payments). The moving expenses of an incoming district superintendent may also be paid from the District Parsonage Fund, not to include more than \$150 packing expenses. The treasurer shall report to the board all receipts and expenditures of the District Parsonage Fund.

Report No. 4

A. We call attention to the "Special Days" designated by the *Book of Discipline* and recommend that they be observed with appropriate free-will offerings and that the following special observances be a part of the program of each local church.

B. An offering may be taken to support the Bessie Parker Memorial Scholarship Fund as a part of the observance of Women in the Pulpit Sunday, March 24, 1996. Also, it is recommended that all gifts from individuals or churches designated for this cause may be received for the scholarship.

C. We offer the following recommendations:

1. That all boards, commissions and committees receiving funds from the conference treasurer shall submit with each voucher adequate supporting data.
2. That boards, agencies and conference institutions which are allowed to withdraw lump sums from the conference treasurer shall submit an annual audit, with management letter, by a certified public accountant to the Council on Finance and Administration, along with evidence of fidelity insurance coverage.
3. That all boards, commissions and agencies of the conference pay a standard rate of 24 cents a mile when a representative travels on church business. In order to encourage car pooling, we recommend that if a car contains two persons traveling on church business, the mileage rate be increased to 29 cents; if a car contains three persons all traveling on church business, the rate be 32 cents; and if a car contains four or more persons all traveling on church business, the rate be 34 cents per mile.

We recommend that other expenses for travel on church business be paid; also, that the maximum paid to a person for meals shall be \$4.00 for breakfast, \$6.00 for lunch and \$10.00 for the evening meal, or no more than \$20.00 per day.

4. That each church place in its budget an amount of at least \$500 per year to be used by the pastor as a continuing education fund, and that if the full amount is not used in a given year, the unused portion may be carried forward from year to year during the tenure of a pastor, not to exceed a total amounting to three year's continuing education allowance. Not more than fifty percent of accumulated funds shall be used for travel expenses. The accumulation is cancelled in full when there is a change of pastor. It is also recommended that the health insurance premium be paid by the local church directly to the Office of Ministerial Affairs, even if it is done on a compensation reduction basis, and that if this is done, the amount be included in the charge conference worksheet which itemizes compensation and benefits for 1996.
5. That the balance held for each board, commission, committee or agency on the books of the conference treasurer shall be carried forward from one year to the next and that this shall be taken into consideration in the subsequent budget request.
6. That conference boards and agencies may not spend in excess of funds budgeted for the given conference year. Any expenses beyond the approved budget will not be paid by the treasurer.
7. That "average net funds" as used in the calculation of 1996 apportionments shall mean for each church the four-year average of net funds in the years 1991, 1992, 1993 and 1994. When a church has declined for two years in "net funds," the term "average net funds" shall mean the average of the last two years only. Newly organized churches will be treated in the same manner as other churches of the conference. A four-year average of net funds will be used, but for the years prior to the organization of the new church, the net funds figure will be zero.
8. That "net funds" be defined as the total of figures reported on lines 64 through 72 (inclusive) of Table II.
9. That once the apportionments are calculated from Table II statistics for any given year, those apportionments cannot be altered. Needed corrections can be made on Table II reports for use in future year calculations.
10. That the funds received on the apportionment for Methodist Homes (item 12, Report No. 1) be divided 55% to Orangeburg Methodist Home, 30% to Greenwood Methodist Home, 15% to Methodist Manor of the Pee Dee; that the funds received on the apportionment for Senior College Scholarship Fund (item 9, Report No. 1) be divided in three equal parts, one-third each going to Wofford College, Columbia College and Claflin College; that the funds received on the apportionment for Methodist Camps and Retreat Centers (item 13, Report No. 1) be divided 60% to Asbury Hills Methodist Camp and 40% to Sewee Coastal Retreat Center. Funds received on the askings for Methodist Homes and Senior College Scholarships will be divided according to the same proportion as the apportioned funds.
11. That the granting of a sabbatical leave by the Annual Conference shall carry with it automatic authorization from the Contingency Fund to provide pension credit and insurance for the person granted the sabbatical, provided there are not funds in the budget of the Board of the Ordained Ministry for this purpose. No more than two sabbatical leaves will be funded by the Conference in any one year.
12. That the Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration be authorized to grant amounts up to \$7,500 from the Conference Contingency Fund to meet any individual emergency or unanticipated need.
13. That the program agencies of the Conference Council on Ministries be funded 100% of budget if needed, by using funds from the Contingency Fund and interest earned from the corpus of the Contingency Fund.

Report No. 5

The following information is reported to Annual Conference in accord with the resolution passed at its session in 1985. Upon recommendation of the Bishop and the Cabinet, a sustentation grant was made to William H. Church for the period January 1, 1994, through May

30, 1994, in the amount of \$ 605.35.

Report No. 6

The Council on Finance and Administration has studied for the past year the motion made by Mr. John Smiley, Jr., which was passed at the 1994 session of Annual Conference, reading as follows:

I move that by the 1995 Annual Conference the Council on Finance & Administration present to the Annual Conference a budget process that will result in a budget for 1997 that is no higher than the real average income for the previous five years, or the real income from the previous conference year, whichever is greater, plus a maximum inflation/growth rate of 3 percent, if economic conditions warrant such an increase.

Because strict implementation of the Smiley motion would cut so deeply into the ministry of this conference, the Council on Finance & Administration recommends a combination of the Smiley motion and a reduction of individual line items beginning with the 1996 budget, in the hope that the conference might be faithful to the intention of the motion with more consideration for specific ministry needs.

The example below illustrates in the first column the proposed budget for 1996 from CF&A and in the last column strict implementation of the Smiley motion and its potential crippling effect upon certain line items.

THE BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

**THE BOARD OF PENSIONS
 Report Number 1**

- A. The Board of Pensions requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference fix \$340.00 per service year as the rate for annuity payments to retired ministers, which shall include approved supply time prior to admission into full connection. In the case of Special Conference Claimants, the rate shall be 100% of the rate for full conference members. The Board requests that the service annuity rate for a surviving spouse be 75% of the minister's service annuity rate.
- B. The Board of Pensions requests that an appropriation be made that will give the Board of Pensions (The Pension Fund) \$3,452,422.00 for the pension program of the South Carolina Annual Conference for the fiscal year ending December 31, 1996 and that this sum be apportioned to the charges of the South Carolina Annual Conference on the basis established in continuing resolutions.
- C. RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed, and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the South Carolina Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the years 1995 and 1996 be and is hereby designated as a

rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the South Carolina Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability.

2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rule. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

- D. Each institution, organization or district to which a minister is appointed shall pay to the South Carolina Annual Conference Board of Pensions an amount equal to sixteen and four-tenths percent (16.4%) of the Denominational Average Compensation as determined by the General Board of Pensions for the year 1995-1996. Such payments shall be made for each minister so appointed and paid monthly in equal payments each month during the year 1995-1996 or in advance for monthly crediting in twelve equal installments from deposits made in the Deposit Account of the South Carolina Annual Conference with the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits by the treasurer of the South Carolina Annual Conference. In the event that monthly credits to the minister in special appointment's Church Account exceed the funds deposited for the minister in special appointment, and the Deposit Account is overdrawn, an interest charge made at the current monthly rate of interest credited to the STIRA investment program shall be made. This interest payment is due the following month with interest charges on a daily factor until the institutional account of the minister in special appointment is current.
- II. The fiscal year of the Board of Pensions shall be the same as that of the South Carolina Annual Conference.
- III. We recommend that the Annual Conference approve the distribution which the Board of Pensions has made to claimants during the year as set forth in detail in our Report No. Two, Payments to Annuitants and Beneficiaries during the year 1994.

THE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION

Report Number 1

Mission

The Commission on Equitable Compensation exists for the support of ordained ministers and local pastors, both full-time and students, in the charges of the South Carolina Annual Conference. (See *The Discipline*, Par. 722.2: "It is the purpose of the Commission on Equitable Compensation to support ordained ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by (1) recommending conference standards for clergy support; (2) administering funds to be used in base compensation supplementation; and (3) providing counsel and advisory material on clergy support to district superintendents and Committees on Pastor-Parish Relations.") The Commission on Equitable Compensation supports the overall ministry of the local church, especially in situations in transition. The Commission on Equitable Compensation is the usual means whereby the Annual Conference supports a variety of local church missions through providing pastoral support which cannot be provided locally.

Implications

1. The Commission on Equitable Compensation supports parish ministers, both ordained pastors and local pastors. It is through this support of the clergy that the Conference also supports the overall mission of the church, through giving flexibility to the appointment of pastors. But our primary task is to encourage churches to provide a minimum base of compensation for ordained ministers and their families. Where local churches temporarily are unable to provide this support the Annual Conference enables pastors to maintain their focus on their tasks, not their own support, through the Equitable Compensation Fund.

2. The Commission sees its function as supporting all Clergy in the SC Conference. Clergy include ordained ministers, but also include Local Pastors and Student Local Pastors. The Commission has in the past included such persons in its support, and intends to do so in the future. We affirm the calling and the ministry of such persons.
3. The Commission on Equitable Compensation is especially important in ministries in transition, where the local church or charge is temporarily unable to bear the full load of pastoral support. The Commission on Equitable Compensation seeks to foster the growing independence of churches and charges, and an interdependence between local congregations and the Annual Conference. Our ultimate goal is for each charge to sustain fully its own ministry at no less than a minimal, equitable level. Some of the many examples of ministries in transition might include: a situation where there is no church but one is being started; a community where a small church might reach a larger population under full-time ministry; a church in decline that needs support for full-time leadership while it explores options for its long-term future; a church in a changing neighborhood that is willing to risk a new "style" of ministry or different ethnic leadership. It is the Commission on Equitable Compensation's hope that even these transitioning situations will find ways of supporting pastors on their own, and that the Conference will be called on for temporary support, not perpetual dependence. This list is not meant to be exhaustive or exclusive, but an example of kinds of ministries in transition.
4. The Commission on Equitable Compensation affirms that appointment decisions rest with the Bishop and the Cabinet. Making appointments is inherently complicated, and many factors must be considered. The Bishop and the Cabinet alone determine appointments of clergy, and clergy, once assigned, have the right to expect no less than equitable compensation. Once an appointment of a pastor is made, the Annual Conference, through the Equitable Compensation Fund, is obligated to support that pastor at the minimum level if that pastor's charge cannot provide compensation.

Total Compensation for Clergy

1. The Commission on Equitable Compensation reminds churches and charges that salary is only one portion of total compensation, and churches and charges are urged to consider dispersing compensation in ways that will assist clergy and their families to retain as great a portion of their income as is legally possible. Churches and charges are reminded to consider total compensation and not just think of salary when thinking of clergy family needs. Likewise, clergy are reminded that they are supported in a variety of ways, and total compensation most often exceeds salary.
2. In light of recent IRS and court rulings, churches and pastors are urged to keep informed of their income tax responsibilities and rights. Pastors are advised to seek qualified assistance in making decisions that will affect their income tax liabilities.

Report Number 2

A. MINIMUM BASE COMPENSATION SCALE

In accord with the mandate of the DISCIPLINE, the Commission recommends that the South Carolina Annual Conference fix the following as its minimum base compensation scale, effective January 1, 1996, and continuing until changed by the Annual Conference. The Commission on Equitable Compensation requests that a line item apportionment of \$230,000.00 be made to fund the base compensation support required and/or provided under these recommendations.

FOR FULL-TIME APPOINTMENTS:

Category	Amount
1. Effective Members	\$ 28,900.00*
2. Probationary and Associate Members	\$ 26,000.00*
3. Local Pastors	\$ 24,300.00*

*[Please note that this recommendation is the same as for 1995 to enable churches at or near these levels to provide for the pastor's business expenses to be paid no longer from salary, but from the

administrative budget of the church. This should in every case increase the pastor's effective "take home" pay and decrease his or her tax liability, while giving churches a more accurate picture of business expenses and salary. Please see sections "U." and "V." below, entitled "Reimbursement for Travel and Professional Expenses" and "Reimbursement as Administrative Cost."

FOR STUDENT APPOINTMENTS:

Each person serving a local church student appointment shall receive the compensation for his or her category, proportional to the percentage of time serving in a pastoral charge. (i.e., One-half time service would receive one-half the Equitable Compensation for that person's category.) The percentage of time serving the charge shall be determined by the Cabinet.

B. Charge/Church Visits

When a church or charge is initially being considered for Equitable Compensation supplements and at the beginning of its third year of receiving such supplements, the Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that the following representatives of the larger covenant connection shall meet with the Administrative Board(s) or Administrative Council(s) of the church/charge: (1) the District Superintendent, (2) a representative from the District Board for Congregational Development, (3) a member of the District Board of Building and Locations and (4) a member of the Commission on Equitable Compensation. The meeting will be convened and chaired by the District Superintendent. The purpose of the meeting will be:

- (a) to discuss the current mission of the local church or charge;
- (b) to hear the needs of the church or charge; and
- (c) to help develop a plan for the church's or charge's future outreach ministry.

C. Length of Time for Equitable Compensation Support

Effective January 1, 1994, churches or charges receiving Equitable Compensation support shall be limited to four and one-half years. Such churches will in no case receive more than 35% of total compensation from the Equitable Compensation Fund. Assistance will be provided over a 4-1/2 year period and will decrease by 25% each year after the first year and a half.

D. Mission Statements and Growth Goals

Churches or charges receiving or applying for Equitable Compensation support shall submit annually to the District Board for Congregational Development and to the Commission on Equitable Compensation its Mission Statement specifying its understanding of its unique ministry and a statement of membership growth goals for the coming year, with ministry plans for reaching these goals.

E. Experience Merit

A pastor who has served for 5 or more years in full time service, in the South Carolina Annual Conference, shall receive, in addition to the minimum base, a supplement of \$100.00 per year of service for up to 10 years of service.

Example:	Year 5:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$500.00;
	Year 6:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$600.00;
	Year 7:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$700.00;
	Year 8:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$800.00;
	Year 9:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$900.00;
	Years 10+:	Equitable Compensation base plus \$1,000.00.

F. Housing Allowances

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that all money given to the pastor for housing by the charge he/she serves be considered income if the pastor is not a resident in the charge which he/she serves.

G. Application for Equitable Compensation Support

The District Superintendent shall request the base compensation assistance required by each charge, which must be approved by the Commission on Equitable Compensation before payment can be made. This request from the District Superintendent shall be accompanied by an application form provided by the Commission on Equitable

Compensation and completed by the pastor, the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, and the District Superintendent, indicating income from all sources.

H. Cross Racial Appointments

If the Bishop and Cabinet, in making a cross racial appointment, find it necessary to request equitable compensation supplement, special consideration will be given on an individual basis. Guidelines under Section L. will apply.

I. Cooperative Parish Ministries

Directors or Coordinators of Cooperative Parish ministries which have been approved by the Board of Missions, and application made by the District Superintendent to the Commission on Equitable Compensation by January 1 preceding the appointment in June of the same year may be eligible for funds not to exceed \$7,000.00. No pastor shall be eligible to receive funds unless the charge he/she serves agrees in writing to release him/her for these added duties. Assistance will be provided over a 4-1/2 year period and will decrease by 25% each year after the first year and a half.

J. Missional Situations

Missional Situations are when areas – rural, inner city, transitional or engulfed neighborhoods, or areas where new churches are organized, demand an effective ministry but are not capable of providing such ministries without Equitable Compensation assistance. To be eligible for Equitable Compensation assistance the following procedure must be followed:

1. The District Board for Congregational Development shall be the authorizing body to project a new missional situation.
2. The District Board for Congregational Development will refer this to the Conference Committee on Congregational Development for verification that it is indeed a missional situation, and its priority rank among conference needs.
3. It will then be referred to the Cabinet for approval. The Cabinet will then designate a pastor with at least 4 years experience and request an appropriate base compensation for that particular missional situation.
4. Each missional situation will be reevaluated annually by December 31st each year.
5. Each step of the above procedure must be documented in writing to the Commission on Equitable Compensation by January 1st.

Other provisions:

If known at the time, the District Superintendent shall notify the Commission on Equitable Compensation of a potential missional situation a year ahead of the time it is expected to be effected. In all cases where a new missional situation is to be effected, the District Superintendent shall notify the Commission on Equitable Compensation by January 1st preceding the Annual Conference at which an appointment is to be made providing, at that time, the projected base compensation cost to be incurred in June.

Decreasing Support: Equitable Compensation assistance will be provided over a 4-1/2 year period decreasing 25% each year after the first year and a half as follows:

First Year and a Half: The amount of Equitable Compensation support will be according to the pastor's category.

[Special Note: The District Superintendent may apply to the Cabinet for a compensation that is more in keeping with the amount received by this pastor in his or her previous appointment. If this previous compensation is less than the conference average for that year, the compensation may increase by no more than \$2,000.00, to an amount not more than the conference average. (See Section Q. for definition of amount.) If this previous compensation is more than the conference average, the compensation will be no higher than an amount equal to the conference average compensation plus 1/2 the difference between the previous compensation and the conference average.]

Second Full Year: The grant depends on amount received the first year and a half. At the beginning of the second full year, the church must assume one-fourth of the pastor's compensation.

Third Full Year: The grant depends on amount received the second full year. At the

beginning of the third full year, the church must assume one-half of the pastor's compensation.

Fourth Full Year: The grant depends on amount received the third full year. At the beginning of the fourth full year, the church must assume three-fourths of the pastor's compensation.

After the first year and a half, an annual "cost of living" increase will be added at the beginning of each calendar year to the amounts paid from the Equitable Compensation Fund in missional situations. The amount of this increase will be determined by the Commission on Equitable Compensation at its June meeting each year. The total amount of Equitable Compensation support, including the cost of this "cost of living" increase, to be provided in the following year will be communicated to each church by September first for use in the budgeting process for the new year.

During the time the pastor in a missional situation receives any salary from the Equitable Compensation Fund, his or her mileage and business expenses shall be reimbursed by the Equitable Compensation Fund as outlined below. When the church assumes all salary support, the church will also be responsible for these business expenses, just as other operating expenses. (A) Travel reimbursement. Travel costs will be reimbursed at the current IRS rate (30 cents per mile in 1995) by voucher to the conference treasurer, and will be paid up to 12,000 miles per year. (B) Expenses. Business expenses, including books, educational materials, subscriptions to journals, dues to professional organizations, or other expenses will be reimbursed by voucher and receipt up to \$600.00 per year. When the church assumes these costs, it will also be responsible for setting amounts.

Note 1. No base compensation funds will be granted to a church after the fourth full year.

Note 2. The local church's share of this base compensation schedule is interpreted to mean all sources of income from the local church or from any other source.

Note 3. In all cases where a missional situation is attached to an existing charge, these become charge figures.

Note 4. The moving expenses for pastors assigned to newly set-up congregations will be paid out of the Equitable Compensation Fund.

K. Disbursement

Equitable Compensation Funds shall be disbursed monthly, and shall be given only to the pastor involved.

L. Utilities Allowance

The Commission on Equitable Compensation requests that the South Carolina Conference designate 15% (or actual expenses) of base compensation support funded by this commission as parsonage utilities allowance. This request is made to satisfy the requirements of the Internal Revenue Service.

M. Charge Lines Adjustments

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that any charge receiving Equitable Compensation assistance for three consecutive years or failing to pay more than 65% of the minimum base compensation shall be studied by the Commission on Equitable Compensation for the purpose of making recommendations regarding a realignment of that charge.

N. Investment of Reserve Fund

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that all funds held in "reserve" be invested.

O. Computation of "Average Salary"

In its usage, the Commission on Equitable Compensation computes the "Average Salary" by adding the most recently available compensations (excluding the 12 District Superintendents' compensations) for full-time Effective Members of the South Carolina Annual Conference serving churches under appointment, and dividing this figure by the

number added. This figure for 1995 is \$39,864.

P. Interpretation

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that an interpretation of its task and policy procedures be given as a part of the District Pastor/Staff Parish Relations Committee Workshops. It is further recommended that this interpretation be done by a member of the Commission upon invitation by the District Superintendent.

Q. Compensation Guidance

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that District Superintendents assist churches and charges in setting appropriate compensation and work load packages in accordance with Paragraph 523.3 of *The Book of Discipline 1992*.

R. Ineligibility

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that the following not be eligible for Equitable Compensation support:

1. Retired supplies;
2. Part-time local pastors;
3. Pastors on leave of absence except as provided in Standing Rule 95;
4. Special appointment categories within the itineracy of The United Methodist Church as defined in Paragraph 443.1. a, b, c of the *The Book of Discipline 1992*.

S. Equality and Inclusiveness

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that, beginning on moving day of 1996, Equitable Compensation funds not be used to supplement the base compensation of pastors serving separate charges in the same geographic area.

T. "Grandfather" Clause

Any pastor under appointment in the South Carolina Annual Conference, serving churches and receiving Equitable Compensation support on December 31, 1993, may choose to continue to receive support under the policy set forth in the 1992 Conference Journal's "Equitable Salary" policies, for as long as that pastor is in that same appointment.

U. Reimbursement for Travel and Professional Expenses

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that each church set up a reimbursement account for travel and professional expenses incurred by the pastor in performing pastoral duties. Reimbursement for non-commuting church-related travel shall be at the IRS rate (currently .30 per mile). The pastor(s) shall submit a voucher and a log each month for reimbursement. For reimbursement for actual professional expenses (books, subscriptions, periodicals, etc.) the pastor(s) shall submit a voucher with supporting documentation for reimbursement. The amount set by the charge as reimbursement for travel and professional expenses should be determined after consultation with the pastor(s) (and the District Superintendent, if desired or needed) by the Pastor/Staff-Parish Relations Committee. We do not recommend a dollar amount because the amount of travel may vary from charge to charge. Each charge should annually evaluate the local needs and expectations of its pastor(s) and set an amount for reimbursement accordingly. Also, the procedures for reimbursement should be clearly stated.

V. Reimbursement as Administrative Cost

The Commission on Equitable Compensation recommends that, beginning January 1, 1996, the reimbursement for travel and professional expenses be a part of the administrative cost of each local church and not considered or reported as part of the pastor's compensation.

THE COMMISSION ON GROUP INSURANCE
Report Number 1

The insurance program of the South Carolina Conference is designed to provide its eligible employees (as defined herein) with a comprehensive plan for major medical and life insurance. The program is administered through a group plan supervised by the Commission on Group Insurance. The following are eligible for coverage under the program:

1. Those fully employed by a church either in full membership, probationary membership, associate membership, or full time local pastors or full time diaconal ministers related to and serving a local church within the South Carolina Annual Conference.
2. Certified candidates for ministry or Probationary Members in the last two years of seminary.
3. Ministers who are full time employees of the Annual Conference boards, agencies, or institutions.
4. District Superintendents.
5. Student local pastors who are serving work within the boundaries of the Conference.
6. Lay persons who are full time employees of the Annual Conference.
7. Retired or disabled employees (except for those referred to herein as lay persons) immediately eligible to receive pension or disability benefits from the General Board of Pensions at the beginning of the month following the month in which the retired relation or disability leave with disability benefits takes place, and who had a minimum of ten (10) continuous and consecutive years of active participation in the South Carolina Annual Conference group health plan at the time of retirement or the grant of disability benefits by the General Board of Pensions, and their respective dependents.
8. Those retired or disabled employees, referred to herein as lay persons, immediately eligible to receive pension or disability benefits from the General Board of Pensions at the beginning of the month following the month in which the retired relation or disability leave with disability benefits takes place, and who had a minimum of ten (10) continuous and consecutive years of active participation in the South Carolina Annual Conference group health plan at the time of retirement or the granting of disability benefits by the General Board of Pensions, and their respective spouses.
9. Ordained ministers from other United Methodist Annual Conferences and ordained ministers from other Methodist denominations and other denominations fully employed by and under episcopal appointment to a local church of the South Carolina Annual Conference to a charge in the South Carolina Annual Conference under the

provisions of Paragraph 426 of the 1992 *Book of Discipline*.

10. Full-time employees, and their eligible dependents, of a local church of the South Carolina Annual Conference currently enrolling no less than 75% of all full-time employees in the Annual Conference group insurance plan. The funding basis to be established by the local church with the annual conference on the current advanced premium.

Eligibility requirements are set forth in a guidebook, YOUR GROUP INSURANCE PLAN, published by the carrier from time to time and available from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, P.O. Box 11284, Columbia, South Carolina 29211.

Report Number 2

In accordance with the provisions of Section 5, PROTECTION BENEFITS, of the Comprehensive Protection Plan effective January 1, 1982:

1. The minimum Surviving Spouse Annuity Benefits will be those described in Section 5.1 of the Comprehensive Protection Plan documents.
2. The Surviving Children Benefits will be those described in Section 5.2 of the Comprehensive Protection Plan effective January 1, 1982.
3. Death Benefits
 - (a) In the event of the death of an Active Participant or Retired Participant, death benefits shall be payable in accordance with the provisions of this Subsection 5.3.
 - (b) Active Participants who are receiving disability benefit payments in accordance with Subsection 5.4 shall continue to be eligible for the death benefit coverage set forth in this Subsection 5.3.
 - (c) An Active Participant who ceases to be eligible for the death benefit for any reason other than retirement shall continue to be eligible for the death benefit coverage or a period of thirty-one days following the date on which participation was terminated.
 - (d) Upon the death of an Active Participant or a Retired Participant eligible for death benefit coverage hereunder, a benefit shall be paid, based upon
 - (i) the age of the Active Participant at the time of death.
 - (ii) whether the person is an Active Participant or a Retired Participant at the time of death.
 - (iii) the Denominational Average Compensation in effect at the time of death of the Active Participant or Retired Participant, and
 - (iv) the following table of percentages of the Denominational Average Compensation payable as a benefit:

- (e) The benefit shall be paid to the Beneficiary of the Active Participant under this Plan in twelve equal monthly installments; a benefit payable due to the death of a retired Participant shall be paid in a single-sum for the full amount of the benefit.
- (f) Upon the death of the spouse of an Active Participant or a Retired Participant eligible for death benefit coverage hereunder, a single-sum spouse death benefit equal to 15% of the Denominational Average Compensation shall be paid to the Active participant or the Retired Participant.
- (g) Upon the death of a Surviving Spouse of a deceased Active Participant or Retired Participant, a surviving spouse who is receiving a pension benefit from a conference on December 31, 1981, or a surviving spouse of a bishop elected by a Jurisdictional Conference, a single-sum Surviving Spouse death benefit equal to 10% of the Denominational Average Compensation shall be paid to one of the following in the order of precedence as indicated
 - (i) The designated beneficiary, if any survives
 - (ii) The contingent beneficiary, if any survives
 - (iii) The decedent's estate
- (h) Upon the death of a natural or legally adopted child, who is at least 14 days of age and under 18 years, of an Active Participant or a Retired Participant eligible for death benefit coverage hereunder, a single-sum death benefit of \$1,500 shall be paid the Active Participant or Retired Participant.

Report Number 3 Major Medical Insurance Benefits

Effective January 1, 1996, the South Carolina Annual Conference will participate in HealthFlex, the managed health care plan of the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

Each active participant shall annually select one of three available annual deductibles.

The lifetime maximum coverage for each eligible insured and eligible dependent shall be limited to \$2,000,000.00.

Other details of the major medical expense plan are contained in the HealthFlex plan summary, available from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, Post Office Box 11284, Columbia, SC 29211.

Report Number 4 Medicare Benefits

The South Carolina Annual Conference elects Plan I (Carve Out) as the Medicare Supplement Plan Option effective January 1, 1996.

Medicare is a Federal health insurance plan, administered under the Social Security Act, for the benefit of persons 65 years of age or older. The Medicare Program consists of two parts: (a) hospital insurance, designed to pay for physicians' service and related medical services. Under the terms of the Medicare Program, hospital insurance (Part A) is provided for all persons under the plan. The medical insurance (Part B) is an optional feature for which the insured pays a stated monthly premium.

The Conference Insurance Program is so designed that it provides certain benefits which begin at the point where Medicare coverage terminates, and in addition, makes provision for some benefits not covered by Medicare at all. Therefore, it is required that all retired participants and/or dependent spouses aged 65 or older shall enroll in Medicare Part A and Part B and, in any event, benefits for retired enrollants and eligible dependents who have attained age 65 shall be computed as though the enrollant or eligible dependent were enrolled in Medicare Part A and B.

Inasmuch as the insurance coverage for normally retired ministers and their eligible dependents who have attained age 65 is provided for them by the Conference without cost to the insured, all persons who are or who could be covered by Medicare Part A and Part B shall have their benefits computed by the Benefit Reduction method; and each insured or

dependent age 65 or over should be positive that any hospital he/she enters is one which participants in the Medicare program. Our plan does not pay benefits which are or could be paid by Medicare.

Eligible retired enrollants and their eligible dependents as well as participating active enrollants and their eligible dependents who have attained age 65 shall have benefits calculated by the Benefit Reduction approach with the same deductible(s) applicable and the same co-insurance as those enrollants under age 65. This assumes Part A and Part B the same co-insurance as those enrollants under age 65. This assumes that the active age 65 and over enrollant and dependent shall be enrolled in Medicare Part A and Part B immediately upon reaching the age of eligibility.

A handbook explaining the provisions of Medicare is available from any district office of the Social Security Administration.

Report Number 5 Administrative Procedures

Billing: The Office of Ministerial Affairs sends a quarterly statement to everyone enrolled in the Conference Insurance Program. Statements are mailed in January, April, July and October. Although statements are mailed quarterly, payments for premiums may be made on monthly basis.

Cancellation of Coverage: It is imperative that each participant in the Conference Insurance Program keep this premium payments current. The Commission on Insurance has instructed the Administrator of Ministerial Affairs to cancel the insurance coverage of any participant who does not pay his/her premium by the end of the quarter for which he/she has been billed.

Ministers Serving Beyond The Local Church Appointments: For the purpose of proper cost analysis, it is required that all Conference Boards and Agencies, served by ministers and others eligible for group insurance, pay for the "institutional share" of the insured's premium. This provision shall apply to the District Superintendents, Conference Staff and those serving United Methodist agencies directly related and accountable to the South Carolina Annual Conference, should they elect coverage under the South Carolina Annual Conference Insurance Program. In every case the full cost of coverage must be paid by the insured, the employer, or through the combined payments of the insured and the employer.

Premium payments: Premium payments shall be made in accordance with the instructions printed on the quarterly "Statement of Account".

Application for Insurance Coverage: Eligibility for enrollment begins with recognition as a probationary member, full-time employment as a local pastor or student local pastor, or as a transfer from another Annual Conference, and so noted in report of the Board of the Ordained Ministry. Enrollment at any other time classifies an applicant as a "late entrant". Enrollment for local church employees under the provisions of section 10 of Report Number One may be made only in the months of January and July.

Applications for enrollment in the Conference Insurance Program are available from the Office of Ministerial Affairs. If not completed and in the hands of the Administrator within 31 days from the date of eligibility, the applicant will be classed as a "late entrant". It will then be necessary for a health statement to be furnished, and in most instances, a physical examination will be required at the expense of the insured.

Claims Procedure: The cost of medical care continues to rise, therefore, the Office of Ministerial Affairs and the carrier audit every claim with great care. Conference Insurance Program participants can render valuable assistance in the claims process by:

1. making certain that they have received all the services for which they are requesting payment.
2. supplying the documentation required to validate the claim.
3. refraining from asking for reimbursement for services clearly excluded under the terms of the insurance program.

Claims should be submitted at least quarterly, but not more often than once a month.

The Commission on Group Insurance is charged with oversight of the group insurance

program of the South Carolina Annual Conference, the benefits of which program are outlined in the reports of the Commission submitted to and approved by the Annual Conference. The budget of the Commission on Insurance is approved by the Annual Conference and the Commission is authorized to negotiate and contract with carriers or the HealthFlex plan administrator to maintain the level of benefits approved by the Annual Conference for the eligible participants as defined by the Annual Conference.

Report Number 6 Coverage for Conference Lay Employees

The Commission on Insurance receives from time to time requests from conference boards and agencies for insurance coverage for lay employees. Accordingly, the Commission has adopted the following policy in this connection.

Conference insurance coverage is available to all employees of the United Methodist Church directly related to the South Carolina Annual Conference and working within the boundaries of the Annual Conference, including fully employed diaconal ministers fulfilling the requirements of Paragraphs 302-315 of the 1992 *Book of Discipline* and recommended by the Committed on Diaconal Ministry of the South Carolina Annual Conference, provided the insured and the agency concerned bear their full share of the cost of the insurance.

Coverage under the major medical insurance shall be the same as for all other persons covered, and all provisions governing eligibility for the Conference Insurance Program shall apply.

Report Number 7 Coordination of Benefits

The purpose of health care insurance is to help meet actual expenses. In line with that purpose, the Conference Insurance Program contains a nonprofit provision which coordinates our plan with other plans under which an individual is covered so that the total benefits available will not exceed 100% of the allowable expensed. Under this plan, if a dependent, employed spouse is covered by another group plan, application for insurance benefits should first be made under the employee's own policy, then application may be made to the Conference Insurance Program for any additional benefits that might be due.

Strict adherence to this policy is essential if we are to maintain good benefits under our program at a reasonable cost. A detailed explanation of the "coordination" provision is contained in the Health Flex plan summary.

Report Number 8

The Commission on Insurance makes the following recommendation for action by the 1995 South Carolina Annual Conference.

1. That the Council on Finance and Administration apportion to the churches the sum of \$3,083,428.00 for the Conference Insurance Program to be used as follows:
 - a. \$89,898.00 for administration of the program.
 - b. \$2,993,530.00 for the Conference's share of the cost of the insurance program in providing coverage for eligible enrollants of the South Carolina Annual Conference.
2. That enrollant premium payments be set as follows:

- a. Categories 1-10 of Report Number 1. shall be \$75.00 monthly for single coverage and \$50 monthly for dependent coverage.
 - b. Premiums for retired ministers 65 and over be fully paid by the Annual Conference except in cases where the spouse is under age 65; in which instance the premium shall be \$ 50.00 monthly.
 - c. Premiums for the surviving under age 65 spouse will be \$ 50.00 monthly.
 - d. Premiums for the actuarially retired member under age 65 with dependent shall be \$75.00 monthly and \$50.00 monthly for dependent coverage.
3. Participants in the Conference Insurance Program shall pay their premiums in advance, for which the insured is billed.
 4. Every participant in the Conference Insurance Program shall become familiar with the provisions of the program as outlined in the plan summary copies of which are available from the Office of Ministerial Affairs, P. O. Box 11284, Columbia, SC 29211.

- I. PARTICIPATION IN HEALTHFLEX: The Annual Conference below (hereinafter referred to as the "Plan Sponsor") does hereby agree to participate in a cafeteria plan administered pursuant to the HealthFlex option of the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program (hereinafter referred to as the "Plan"), which is administered by the General Board of Pension and Health Benefits through its appropriate constituent corporations (hereinafter referred to as the "General Board").
- II. CONDITIONS OF PARTICIPATION: The Plan Sponsor hereby agrees to follow the provisions of the Plan, the rules and regulations of the Plan which re from time to time adopted and revised by the General Board pursuant to the Plan, and the underwriting Guidelines which are from time to time adopted and revised by the General Board for each of the programs administered by the General Board through the HealthFlex option under the Plan.
- III. ELIGIBILITY: "Employees" described in Section 3.02 of the Plan Document are eligible to participate in HealthFlex, and
 1. The following categories of "employees" described in Section 3.03 and Section 3.06(d) are also eligible (mark all that apply):
 PREMIUM FACTORS: The premium of each of the options shall be determined based

upon various factors, such as: state-mandated provisions, including benefits, pre-existing conditions, proof of insurability, and subrogation; the cost of health care by region; and community rating.

CONTRIBUTIONS:

If the Plan Sponsor fails to timely elect a new contribution basis, the previous election shall be valid for the next period of coverage.

If the service allows the parties to choose the number of arbitrators, unless another number is mutually agreed to, any arbitration hereunder shall be before at least three arbitrators. The award of the arbitrators, or a majority of them, shall be final, judgment upon the award rendered may be entered in any court, state or federal, having jurisdiction. The fees and costs of arbitration shall be allocated to the parties by the arbitrators.

VIII. TERMINATION/AMENDMENT

1. Amendment by Plan Sponsor: This agreement may be amended by the Plan Sponsor at any time, provided that the effective date of such amendment is the first day of the plan year following a 90-day period after a written notice of such amendment has been received by the General Board.

2. Termination by Plan Sponsor: This agreement, and the Plan Sponsor's participation in the Plan, may be terminated by the Plan Sponsor at any time, provided that the effective date of such termination is the first day of the plan year following a 60-day period after a written notice of such termination is received by the General Board.

3. Amendment/Termination In Accordance With The Plan: No Provision of this agreement shall prevent the Plan and the rules and regulations promulgated thereunder from being amended or terminated in accordance with the Plan.

4. Failure to Meet Underwriting Guidelines: The General Board reserves the right to terminate the Plan Sponsor's participation in the Plan on the effective date or on the first day of the plan year following the plan year in which the Plan Sponsor fails to meet the underwriting guidelines established for the Plan provided that reasonable notification is provided to the Plan Sponsor

THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Conference Board of Trustees sold the Renfrew Church, which had been discontinued, to the Seventh Day Adventist for \$31,289.00. This church was located in the Greenville District.

Sixty percent of this money will go to Conference Development and Redevelopment program and forty percent will go to Development and Redevelopment in the Greenville District. This division is in compliance with the conference policy on the division of such a sale.

The Trustees have requested that the Conference Parliamentarian serve as an ex-officio member of the Conference Board of Trustees. This has been referred to the Committee on Standing Rules.

It is necessary that the 1995 Annual Conference vote on the Plan of Merger of the two corporations our Conference is now operating under. This must be approved by a 2/3 vote of the Annual Conference. It is vital that we bring about this-merger. It will in no way change or effect the 1972 merger of the White South Carolina Conference and the Afro-American South Carolina Conference. The Conference Trustees have voted unanimously for this merger and we urge the delegates to Annual Conference to vote for the merger.

The By-Laws of "THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH BOARD OF TRUSTEES, INCORPORATED" shall become the By-Laws of the surviving corporation.

The officers and trustees of "THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH BOARD OF TRUSTEES, INCORPORATED" shall become the officers and trustees of the surviving corporation.

No future amendment may be made to the Certificate of Incorporation of the surviving corporation, without the written consent of the Presiding or Resident Bishop of The South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church endorsed upon any such application for amendment. This endorsement shall be required in addition to the other requirements set forth in the Code of Laws of South Carolina with reference to amendment of charters of non-profit religious corporations.

Upon dissolution of the surviving corporation, assets shall be distributed to the South Carolina Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church or its nominee or designate, provided that the Annual Conference, its nominee or designate is then a 501(c) (3) organization within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code, or shall be distributed to the federal government, or to a state or local government, for a public purpose. Any such asset not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the court of common pleas of the county in which the principal office of the corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such 501(c) (3) purposes.

The surviving corporation is to be operated exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, directors, trustees, officers, or other private persons, except that the corporation shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth above. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of or in

opposition to any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of its charter, the corporation shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on (a) by a corporation exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future Federal tax code, or (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code, or the corresponding section of any future federal tax code.

WHEREAS, the Trustees of each of the two corporate bodies (who are the same individuals) have concluded that only one corporate body should remain in existence and they have unanimously determined that the two corporate bodies merge into a single corporate body in accordance with the Plan of Merger hereto attached.

The Trustees of each corporation have unanimously executed the Plan of Merger and recommend that the Annual conference, as MEMBERS of the corporate body chartered by the General Assembly of South Carolina in 1851, consider and approve of such Plan. The law requires that a two-third (2/3) majority of the votes cast by the membership approve of such Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, now in session in Spartanburg, South Carolina, do hereby approve of the Plan of Merger, a copy of which is hereby attached, whereby THE SOUTH CAROLINA METHODIST CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION, INC. shall merge into THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH BOARD OF TRUSTEES, INCORPORATED with the name of the surviving corporation to be changed to SOUTH CAROLINA UNITED METHODIST CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, the surviving corporation to have no members.

RESOLUTION ON INCORPORATION OF THE CHARTER OF EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME

WHEREAS, The Epworth Orphanage of The South Carolina Conference was first incorporated by a Legislative Act on February 13, 1896 by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and

WHEREAS, the charter has been amended on several occasions to accommodate the changes in the structure of the Methodist church in South Carolina and to amend the name of the corporation which is now known as Epworth Children's Home, and

WHEREAS, the South Carolina Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, did reserve the right under the legislative charter of 1896 to elect the Board of Managers or Trustees of the corporation, to prescribe the number and tenure of office of such Managers or Trustees and to prescribe rules and regulations for its government, and

WHEREAS, recently the South Carolina Legislature adopted a modern, comprehensive Non-Profit Corporate Code, and under the terms thereof Epworth even though it is a legislative chartered institution, may irrevocably elect to be governed under the new Non-Profit Code, and

WHEREAS, the new Non-Profit Code authorizes a simplified method for the Annual Conference to exercise control over the corporation, such as inserting a provision in the charter that no future amendment may be made without the written consent of the Resident Bishop being endorsed in the Application for Amendment to Charter.

NOW, THEREFORE, Epworth requests that the South Carolina Annual Conference grant its permission to Epworth to irrevocably elect to be governed under the new Non-Profit Code as a Religious corporation, without members; and to further amend its existing charter as set forth in the attached Articles of Amendment of Charter. You will note that under the charter amendment the Annual conference specifically reserves also the right to elect the Board of Trustees of the corporation and to prescribe the number and tenure of office of such Trustees.

On motion made and duly seconded, the following Resolution was duly adopted.

Resolved, that Epworth Children's Home be authorized, empowered and permitted to irrevocably elect to hereafter be governed by the Non-Profit Corporation Act of South Carolina and that its present charter be amended in the manner as set forth in the attached Articles of Amendment to Charter.

THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Report No. 1

As the last year of the quadrennium approaches the Conference Council on Ministries continues to affirm and make real the vision adopted by the annual Conference in 1992: "We affirm God's call to experience new life in Christ for the creation of more vital congregations and more faithful disciples." The four Quadrennial Areas of Concern and the Annual Program Emphases serve to guide the Council in evaluating former efforts and in planning for the final year of the quadrennium. To this end, the Council on Ministries is presenting a coordinated program for 1996 of fifty programs, twenty-five events, three publications, six grants, three awards, support of twenty Advance Specials, support for six Line Items, and an operating budget.

Under the leadership of Dr. Robert McKeown the CCOM Committee on Planning and Research continues its work with emphases in four general areas: 1) racism, racial diversity, and unity in the church and culture; 2) demographic, geographic, and ethnographic portrait and projections for South Carolina; 3) empowerment of lay ministry; and 4) current and future funding issues. We look forward to additional reports from this committee and the information it can provide on the issues facing the United Methodist Church in South Carolina.

Throughout the Conference many hours of high quality, sacrificial service are rendered by hundreds of United Methodists who are members of boards, commissions, committees, and agencies that give life to Conference programs. We are indebted to them and to the capable members of Council for their service to God and humankind through the connectional church. To all clergy and lay participants in training events and other activities and to churches that provide the financial commitments to make these programs possible, the CCOM expresses deep appreciation.

Both the professional and the support staff of CCOM continue to give the very best of themselves in service, dedication, and commitment as they respond to the challenges their various jobs present. Following the retirement of Clarence O. Pittman in June 1994, Paul A. Wood, Jr., was appointed Associate Director for Congregational Development with primary responsibilities in the areas of new church formation, church re-formation and church vitalization. In December 1994, we bade farewell to Tom Meares, CCOM Coordinator of Communications, and wished him well in his new job. Bishop Bethea announced that Dr. Lemuel C. Carter will be appointed as Superintendent of the Marion District at the close of the 1995 Annual Conference Session. We accept this announcement with regret, Lem. We celebrate your positive and dynamic style of leadership as Director of the Council; you brought to us new skills, insights, visions, and gifts. We celebrate the exemplary model of patience, acceptance, and love you provided as you worked with us individually and collectively.

We celebrate the person you are, one who actively lives out his faith and whose actions are in harmony with his words! Our love and prayers go with you and Mary Harriet as you make the transition to your new appointment.

I commend to you for your prayerful consideration the additional Council Reports: The S.C. Conference Council on Ministries Vision Statement, the Proposed Coordinated Program for 1996, and the 1996 Proposed Budget. You are urged to give careful attention to the annual accountability reports of the boards, commissions, committees, and agencies. The quality, and quantity, of their work and their service to the church is reflected through these reports.

Finally, CCOM recommends the following process for the use of Congregational Development Funds:

1. Project proposals with requests for funds are to be received by the Associate Director of Congregational Development from the District Superintendents and checked for completeness.
2. The completed project proposal with request for funds will be forwarded to the Conference Committee on Congregational Development (CCCD) as well as the Committee on Congregational Development and Revitalization (CD&R) of the Conference Board of Missions (BOM).
3. The project proposal with request for funds will be processed and given a priority ranking by the CCCD in accordance with its own procedures and priorities and the

Congregational Development vision statement and guidelines. This shall be done in consultation with persons or institutions requesting funds.

4. The CCCD will present its findings to a joint meeting of seven (7) representatives of CCCD and seven (7) representatives of the BOM. Final funding decisions rest with this joint committee.

(It is recommended that one-third of the members of each group be lay persons).

ADVANCE SPECIALS 1996

Bennettsville-Cheraw Area Cooperative Ministry: Finding strength in numbers, 13 small churches are in a cooperative to develop strong, informed and active members within the individual congregations. The ministry provides programs for children and youth; leadership training in Christian education, evangelism and missions; and joint Bible studies. Working together has brought encouragement and challenges which have resulted in membership growth, improved physical plants and a group of trained lay leaders. \$13,200

Bethlehem Community Center-Columbia: An agency of the Board of Global Ministries which strives to create a climate in which people may grow in democratic living, and to strengthen family life, to promote understanding between racial, religious and economic groups, to work with the people in the community to bring about desirable change. Activities include: year-round kindergarten and day care; after-school programs for youth; summer day camp; adult education; Bible study; transportation; information and referrals; crisis assistance. \$11,558

Bethlehem Community Center-Spartanburg: To help people develop mentally, physically and spiritually, the following services are offered: day care, information and referrals, transportation, crisis assistance, summer day camp, senior citizens club, life-skills program for girls, teen drug and alcohol abuse program. \$11,558

Interfaith Community Services, Inc.: An interfaith organization which responds to those community needs which are too great for one congregation to meet alone. It works for care coordination for the health-impaired elderly, food for children, shelter services, support of public education, crime prevention, and provides companionship services. \$8,800

Crisis Ministries-Anderson: The ministry serves as an outreach to the community, especially those of adolescent age, responding to physical, emotional and spiritual needs. Services include: 24-hour crisis line; summer camp for inner-city youth; rape, drug and spouse-abuse counseling; crisis assistance information and referrals. \$12,650

United Ministries of Greenville: The United Ministries is a Christian Service Organization in Greenville County reaching out to the lost and forgotten. Services include: providing essential goods, emergency assistance, counseling, a place of hope, and day services for the homeless. \$13,200

Killingsworth: A ministry to provide a supportive community for adult women in crisis, Killingsworth offers the following services: room and board, counseling, adult education, spiritual development, job development and community re-orientation. \$13,200

Rural Mission, Inc.: Rural Mission, Inc. provides human and social services to Sea Island residents, migrant workers and transients through: a developmental reading program for children, work camp volunteers, child-care services, clothing ministry, crisis intervention and assistance, information and referrals. \$12,628

United Methodist Volunteers in Mission: South Carolinians get personally involved in short-term mission projects at home and overseas. Teams have worked in Haiti, the Dominican Republic, Honduras, Mexico, Jamaica, the Philippines and Ecuador, providing services in medicine, construction, education and agriculture. UVMIM has worked in nine of the 12 districts in South Carolina in building-renovation projects. Other services include the collection and shipment of prescription drugs and eyeglasses, midwifery and TB kits, and support for the school lunch program in Haiti and the medical clinic in Les Cayes. \$3,000

Wallace Family Life Center: This center, begun by the Conference United Methodist Women, provides a place where adults and children can gather to learn skills relating to family life and enriched living. Assistance is given in job application, referral service, tutoring, nutrition and parenting education. Cultural opportunities are brought to a depressed area of our conference by this mission. \$13,200

Appalachian Development Committee: Sponsored by the Southeastern Jurisdiction, this project gives assistance to the people of the Appalachian region. \$1,500

Commission on Religion in Appalachia (CORA): Also sponsored by the Southeastern Jurisdiction, CORA is a partnership of denominations, community groups and congregations whose mission is to work for justice and to express God's love in the empowerment of the people of Appalachia. \$1,500

Phoebe Taylor Medical Clinic: Many persons who live on the islands near Charleston are suffering from lack of medical attention (including migrant workers). A retired medical doctor is operating a clinic to care for some of these patients. Bethlehem United Methodist Church has donated the space. Funds are needed to operate the clinic. \$11,025

Alston Wilkes Society: This ministry gives assistance to former offenders in their readjustment into the local community and advocates for reform in the South Carolina criminal justice system. Services offered include: family assistance and counseling, parole by planning, employment placement, community residential programs, youth home for juvenile boys and recruitment and training of volunteers. \$13,200

Christian Action Council: This ecumenical agency's purpose is to develop and implement programs which promote cooperative Christianity and foster Christian social witness through information, conferences, consultations, continuing education and cooperative study. \$12,000

Grand Strand Crisis Ministries: This ministry is a cooperative ecumenical effort of five churches. Funds from the South Carolina United Methodist Conference are distributed as needed through First United Methodist Church, Myrtle Beach, to the following ministries: Helping Hands, North Strand Helping Hands, the Grand Strand Pastoral Counseling Services, Campground Ministry, Surf and Sand Mission (Kindergarten) and Snow Birds and Sea Gulls (Senior Citizens). \$8,000

Oliver Gospel Mission: The Oliver Gospel Mission, founded by Methodist minister the Rev. Robert C. Oliver in 1888, has been reaching the "poor and neglected" for more than a century. Supported by public response to human needs, the mission provides beds and meals and spiritual guidance for the homeless. \$10,900

Church and Community Worker: A salary support grant for Bennettsville-Cheraw Area Cooperative Ministries - Church and Community Worker approved by the National Division, Board of Global Ministries. \$6,500

United Methodist Relief Center-Mount Pleasant: This ministry began after Hurricane Hugo revealed deplorable living conditions in the Charleston District. Through the use of grant funds and volunteer work teams, the mission is to rehabilitate or replace the homes of impoverished families in rural areas of Berkeley, Charleston and Dorchester counties. An additional component, the advocacy program "Helping Hands," trains volunteers from local neighborhoods to assist families in elevating their living standards. \$13,200

Myrtle Beach Campground Ministry: The Myrtle Beach Campground Ministry is an Advance Special that ministers to children and adults visiting six of the area's campgrounds. Services include day camps, crafts, drama, music and evening and Sunday services. A seminary student serves as the campground chaplain and is provided with room and board from Memorial Day until Labor Day. The main goal is to advance Christian education while meeting the religious and social needs of families and individuals visiting the Grand Strand area. \$2,000

IV. PROGRAMS, EVENTS, PUBLICATIONS, GRANTS, AWARDS

PROGRAMS

Advocacy Section

1. **WEEK OF PRAYER FOR CHRISTIAN UNITY** - A program of the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns that encourages churches in each district to celebrate the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, Jan. 18-25, 1996. With input from the Commission on Religion and Race and COSROW, CUIIC will present information on the CCOM Page of the S.C. *United Methodist Advocate*, suggesting ways a community might celebrate this week.

COMMISSION CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

2. **CARE: CONNECTING AND RESPONDING EXPRESSIONS** - A program designed to offer support to the pastor and/or the congregation in times of crisis.

COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING

3. **A TIME TO CELEBRATE** - A weekend retreat for clergy, diaconal ministers and spouses on March 15, 16 and 17, 1996 at Springmaid Beach for a time apart.

COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING

4. **FEE SUPPLEMENT PROGRAM: PASTORAL COUNSELING SERVICES** - This program supplements fees for Pastoral Counseling in centers located throughout the state. These fees are provided for pastors, diaconal ministers, and their families. The maximum for one hour of therapy is \$40 and for group therapy is \$15.

COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING

Age-Level Ministries Section

5. **FALL FESTIVAL** - An opportunity for adults to explore the outdoors and the autumn leaves, as well as a personal exploration of wholeness. Asbury Hills provides the accommodations, evening resource persons, breakfast and supper. Groups will organize their own day trips. This event will be held October 17-20, 1996.

BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

6. ***OFF-SEASON PROGRAMMING** - Will use site resources to provide ongoing programming for ministry. Site resources could include swimming pools, ropes, courses, forests and trails, etc.

THE BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

7. ***SIMPLE HOW-TOs** - A training course for persons who are interested in learning a

little more about some of the practical aspects of living in and caring for house and church buildings. Areas to cover would include: plumbing, electrical, small engines, safety, plans and blue-prints.

THE BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

8. **SUMMER CAMP** – A summer camping program, held June - August 1996, which will allow all age levels to experience Christian living in the out-of-doors.

BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

9. **EFFECTIVE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION WORKSHOPS** – A program of workshops designed to help districts to be more effective in Christian education. Districts will have an opportunity to hold a variety of Christian Education workshops: Teacher/Leader Training, Strengthening the Sunday School, Innovative Christian Education workshops, Drug Prevention Education, and Human Sexuality Education. Workshops will be held on Conference and District levels to provide training in all areas of Christian Education Training through the Leader Development Center.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

10. **SINGLES RETREATS** – Two weekend retreats (one in April and one in September) are planned. The April retreat will be held at Springmaid Beach. These retreats will promote Christian fellowship, worship, personal enrichment and strengthening spiritual growth. Workshops and training sessions will address issues that are relevant to singles and the special challenges that single lifestyles present. These gatherings provide singles the means to share their common concerns and joys and to offer each other support and friendship.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

11. **SINGLES MINISTRY TRAINING** – Designing a training model to be implemented at the local church and district level which will enable churches and districts to be in ministry with singles.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON SINGLES MINISTRY

12. ***DISCIPLE BIBLE STUDY TRAINING** – Three-day training by Cokesbury staff to be held in Columbia.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

13. **CONFERENCE YOUTH CHOIR** – A two-week conference for local church youth who must apply to participate. Selected to comprise a choral and ethnic balance, the youth unite to rehearse and learn a musical, which they perform on tour across South Carolina. In addition to singing in churches, youth experience the connectional church.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

14. **ADULT WORKERS WITH YOUTH TRAINING** – A weekend conference to be held in the fall of 1996 in Columbia. This weekend provides training for youth workers (i.e., ministers, DCEs, youth coordinators, Sunday school teachers and youth counselors). This format provides for a keynote address, skill workshops and worship.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

15. **LEADERSHIP WEEK** – A one-week conference to be held at Columbia College in July 1996. This Conference is an educational experience for youth to learn about their role in the United Methodist Conference, to learn about the Youth Service Fund and Mission projects sponsored by USF.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

16. **MISSION POSSIBLE** – An exchange between South Carolina and another country. Teenagers and adults from South Carolina will spend two weeks in a country during

the summer months. After their return to South Carolina a delegation from the partner country visits South Carolina. This is a study/action/reflection model involving both countries. Participants learn about the countries, churches, cultures and resources.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

17. **SPIRITUAL LIFE RETREATS** – A eight-weekend enrichment program for youth, grades 7-12, and counselors from local churches. Weekends will be held in January, February, October and November of 1996. Two weekends will be for Junior High only; one for Senior High only.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

18. ***INTER-GENERATIONAL WORKSHOPS: STRENGTHENING FAMILIES FOR CHANGE - GROWING IN LOVE** – Inter-generational programs that will be held in four different districts on May 11, 1996. Emphasis will be on improved communication within families, encouraging stewardship of time and money. Instructions for using inter-generational learning during Sunday School hours.

FAMILY COUNCIL

19. **OLDER ADULT CARAVANS** – This program will provide a team of senior adults who are experienced in working with local church older adult programs to consult with local church leadership and older adults in initiating, broadening and making more effective the senior adult program in the local church.

THE OLDER ADULT COUNCIL

20. **OLDER ADULT HAPPENING** – A program seminar designed to focus on the changing conditions of older adults in our society. It will study home sharing, better health care, and develop plans to help older adults live independently for longer periods.

THE OLDER ADULT COUNCIL / BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

21. **OLDER ADULT SPIRITUAL RETREAT** – A two and one-half day midweek program that will be held at Springmaid Beach during winter months. It is designed to provide spiritual enrichment for persons 55 years and older.

THE OLDER ADULT COUNCIL

Nurture Section

22. ***EVANGELISM NETWORKING AND RESOURCING** – This three-part program will 1) encourage networking by a) an evangelism newsletter, b) piloting a district evangelism network and c) working with more local church sponsored programs; 2) resources, training opportunities, motivation for "want to," promote videos in the Conference Audio Visual Library, mobilization for ministry concept, written and video resources and ministry in the community; and 3) encourage pastoral leadership with a passion for evangelism, energizing the Laity, with enthusiasm, and knowing resources that are available for the local church.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

23. ***MINISTRY WITH HARD LIVING PEOPLE** – This program will offer training and resources in the following areas: 1) teaching churches to witness beyond their comfort zone; 2) helping to open the doors to the poor; 3) offering alternative worship opportunities that will attract community people, and 4) models for ministry in the community.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

24. **VISION 2000 LAY LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATION** – The program's goal is to train and recognize 25% of the members of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina by the year 2000. Existing training will be recognized such as lay speaking, Christian Education, Church Leader Orientation, Lab Schools, United Methodist Women, United

Methodist Men, United Methodist Youth, Evangelism, Worship, Age-Level and Family Ministry, and others. A database will be created to store the names of all persons trained. A resource list will be generated for reference. When a lay person attends training they will be recognized in their local church with a certificate.

BOARD OF LAITY

25. **LAY SPEAKING PROGRAM** – A program in which the Lay Speakers Instructors' School is a key component. Participants from each district are trained to lead Lay Speaking Schools in their districts. The program also provides opportunities for the district directors to come together for strategizing and planning for program enhancement.

BOARD OF LAITY

26. **CAREER COUNSELING FOR MINISTERS** – This program provides funding to give limited consultations with ministers who are seriously evaluating their call and place in ministry. Dr. Dickey Evans, Director of Virginia Wingard Memorial Pastoral Counseling Center will provide consultations. Dr. Larry Salters, Director of the University of South Carolina Career Center, will conduct upon request an Assessment Workshop during the year. Information concerning this program will be shared with the Cabinet and Leaders of Residency I and II.

COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

27. **CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS: THE CALL TO MINISTRY** – This program funds the work of the Office of Christian Vocations, which provides one counselor for each district. They are available to churches, districts and schools to consult with persons considering full-time Christian service.

COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

28. **DISCOVERING CAREERS** – An annual program to train new leaders for the "Discovering Careers" workshops, which can be conducted in local churches, districts, or conference and college events. The workshop allows participants to explore God's call in their vocations. For 1996, the event will be held in Columbia on September 28 with leadership provided from the Career Planning Committee.

COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

29. **DISTRICT WORSHIP TRAINING EVENTS** – This program is designed to provide worship training and instruction to meet district and local church needs. Each district will be offered the opportunity to have one training event during the year. A coordinated listing of program possibilities and planning/publicity guidelines will be provided to the District Council on Ministries by the Commission on Worship.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

30. ***WORSHIP AS A SOCIAL WITNESS** – This is a program of pilot projects to be developed in three urban centers (Columbia, Greenville/Spartanburg and Charleston) in South Carolina. At least three churches in low income areas plan and carry out worship in these communities "outside the church in the streets." The Commission on Worship will provide resources, funding, personnel and ideas. Alternative worship services, tent type meetings and seedplanting will be the focus of their services.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Outreach Section

31. **ASBURY MISSIONERS** – This program of four to six retreats held in the spring and summer is designed for inner-city youth, ages 14 to college, who go to Asbury Hills United Methodist Camp and Penn Center for one week. They focus on coping skills and identify formation and nurturing needs. This program includes lectures, discussion groups, videotapes and handouts.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

32. ***ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE** – A program that gathers information on current issues such as the continual misuse of the environment and mails these resources to alert citizens of the stewardship role of the United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

33. ***ORGANIZATIONAL MEMBERSHIP IN METHODISTS UNITED FOR PEACE WITH JUSTICE** – This program will assist the Board of Church and Society to do advocacy work in Washington and put several of its members on their mailing list to receive action alerts and the quarterly bulletin, "Peace Leaf."

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

34. **TASK FORCE TO ATTEND THE SEMINAR ON DEVELOPING LOCAL SUBSTANCE-ABUSE MINISTRIES** – A program designed to involve the task force in learning experiences about substance abuse and related violence. This seminar will include field experiences to learn about preventive models of drug-investment programs, church-based programs to minister to the plight of incarcerated persons and the prevention of such.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

35. **TRAINING FOR AIDS MINISTRY** – A program of workshops developed upon request by local churches, districts, clusters, etc. A brochure describing the program will be distributed to local churches, pastors and leaders. Leadership will come from persons within the annual conference as well as community experts in this area of concern.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

36. **COLLEGE BOUND** – This program provides United Methodist high school students with information and assistance in college preparation by admissions representatives or local alumni from each of the four United Methodist colleges. Representatives from the colleges will be present at the Youth Rally, Youth Annual Conference and Spiritual Life Retreats. This provides access to about 4,000 youths.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY/
COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

37. **THE SEJ UNITED METHODIST STUDENT CONFERENCE (formerly the SEJ Student Convocation)** – A three to four-day conference to be held during the break between Christmas and the New Year. The conference is being planned by a student committee selected from the Jurisdiction.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

38. **YOUTH/COLLEGE LINK-UP** – A program designed to maintain a computer registry of high school sophomores, juniors and seniors from the churches of the Conference. The registry is maintained at Spartanburg Methodist College. Lists are made available to each of the colleges for recruiting purposes. A brochure describing the four United Methodist colleges will be mailed to sophomore and juniors each year.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

39. **CHURCH EXTENSION PARTNERSHIP** – A program of the Conference Board of Missions to aid churches financially to build or expand facilities and parsonages. A Partner is an individual (or perhaps a church school class) who pledges to give \$10 or more for each Partnership Call to benefit churches in need. Calls are scheduled to be made at Lent, Conference and Advent.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

40. **HARVEST OF HOPE** – An ecumenical gleaning/educational project with rich biblical roots. Individuals from across the state will come together to salvage produce left in

the fields after harvest. The Harvest of Hope project will be held in July and October on James Island.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

41. **HUNGRIEF** – A program of self-denial calling S.C. United Methodists to give support to hunger projects. Giving in the spirit of Jesus Christ helps to alleviate world hunger and poverty.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

42. **MISSIONS IN SOUTH CAROLINA SUNDAY** – A program to print promotional interpretation materials for local churches in observance of Mission in South Carolina Sunday, which is the first Sunday in November. It provides a mission packet which is distributed upon request to each local church.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

43. **SALKEHATCHIE SUMMER SERVICE** – A servant-mission ministry at selected sites in South Carolina. This program involves youth, adults, community leaders and persons of different cultures who are engaged in upgrading housing and motivating community cooperative efforts by helping persons to help themselves.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

44. ***SHALOM ZONE INITIATIVE** – A Shalom Zone is a defined geographic area where the church and community target its resources to change the negative forces within a community to positive actions for shalom. Five areas have already been targeted: the Bluff Road, the Chicora/Cherokee, the Charleston Heights and the Eau Claire communities and the Bennettsville-Cheraw area.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

45. **SUMMER INVESTMENT PROGRAM (SIP)** – This program is designed for United Methodist young adults, ages 18-24, who have completed at least one year in an institution of higher education. It is an opportunity to serve as a missionary for the summer at mission sites in South Carolina. Each missionary selected receives a \$1,200 honorarium from the S.C. United Methodist Conference. Housing, meals and incidental expenses are furnished by the mission site.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

46. ****"WE LOVE TO TELL THE STORY" – A VIDEO PRESENTATION OF THE S.C. ADVANCE MISSION SPECIALS** – This program will produce a video of the 17 Advance Mission Special Agencies, telling their ministries, the number of people served, and the special needs of each mission agency. This video will portray "A Day in the Life of . . ." Each agency will be given a copy of the video and a copy will be placed in the Conference Media Resource Center for use by local churches and groups.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

47. **MINORITY PRESENCE PROJECT** – A program that works with District Councils on Ministries to intentionally seek ethnic children and youth to participate in the conference camping endeavors at Asbury Hills. The primary goal is to increase ownership and investment in our conference camps and retreats by the ethnic local churches.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

48. **PROJECT EQUALITY** – A program that employs the staff of the Commission on Religion and Race to revisit Wofford College and Columbia College to follow-up on previous audits.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

49. **SENSITIVITY BUILDING WORKSHOPS** – These workshops are designed to examine cultural and racial prejudices and to foster sensitivity to racial and cultural diversity. Scheduled by districts and local churches to be held during the year, this program will use local leadership.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Congregational Development Section

50. **FOSTERING ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH CONCERNS** – This program continues the emphasis on strengthening Ethnic Local Church Concerns in the conference. It oversees and administers the Conference Comprehensive Plan to include programs for all minority constituencies in the S.C. Annual Conference. Funds will assist in leadership development and stewardship programs for African Americans, Native Americans, Hispanic Americans and Korean Americans. Emphasis will be placed on outreach ministries and concerns for Christian family life, youth and critical needs.

COMMITTEE ON ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH CONCERNS

EVENTS

Advocacy Section

1. **ECUMENICAL BREAKFAST** – This event will be a 7 a.m. breakfast during the 1996 S.C. Annual Conference to provide an ecumenical and interfaith enrichment experience. Representatives of other denominational judicatories in South Carolina will be invited to attend. A guest speaker will be featured.

CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

2. **LUTHERAN, ANGLICAN, ROMAN CATHOLIC, UNITED METHODIST (LARCUM) DIALOGUE** – This two-day event, held in March 1996, is sponsored jointly by Lutherans, Anglicans, Roman Catholics and United Methodists. It brings people from these bodies together for dialogue on a topic selected by the steering committee while providing worship and a keynote address. A limited number of scholarships will be available for interested participants.

CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

3. **PARTNERS IN DIALOGUE** – This weekend event will be held in February, 1996 and is co-sponsored by the Dept. of Religious Studies, the University of South Carolina and Partners in Dialogue, a coalition of Hindu, Buddhists, Jewish, Christian, Muslim, Unitarian-Universalist, Bahai'i, and other groups in the midlands of South Carolina. Two afternoon-evening sessions provide opportunities to learn more about each group, share in spirituality, hear a keynote address, and participate in dialogue groups.

CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

4. **WOMEN IN THE PULPIT SUNDAY** – The Commission on the Status and Role of Women will prepare resource material that can be used on Women in the Pulpit Sunday (March 24, 1996). Resources will include suggested Scripture passages, hymns, prayers and "sermon helps" on a theme related to the changing roles of women. Information on the Bessie Parker Memorial Scholarship Fund will also be provided.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

Age-Level Ministries Section

5. **A DAY AT ASBURY HILLS** – A one-day event to be held from 10 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. in May 1996, at Asbury Hills United Methodist Camp. It is designed to help children, youth and parents experience events that are a part of summer camp: fellowship, crafts, hiking, swimming. It includes promotion for summer camp.

BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

6. **A DAY AWAY** – This event involves adults and families in a one-day experience of hymn singing, preaching and eating together. It will be held from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m. in October 1996 at Asbury Hills United Methodist Camp.

BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

7. ***FIT FOR LIFE . . . SUNDAY SCHOOL EVENT** – A one and a half day event to be held in Columbia on August 23 and 24, 1996. This will include a keynote speaker, workshops and more.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

8. ***SINGLES - "HEART FEST"** – A one-day event to be held the first Sunday of February 1996 in Columbia to gather singles together from across South Carolina for fellowship, motivation and spiritual growth.

COUNCIL ON SINGLES

9. **BASKETBALL TOURNAMENTS** – Area tournaments, consisting of local church teams, will be held in four areas of South Carolina. Winners from the area tournaments play in the state tournament, which is held the third week in March.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

10. ***VISION '96** – A one-day event that will be held in Columbia in March 1996. Its goal is to reach 4,000 to 6,000 youth and to inspire them to be the church of today. It will be a day of singing, preaching, promotion, fun and fellowship.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

11. **YOUTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE** – A weeklong conference to be held at Columbia College in July 1995. This conference is an educational experience for youth to learn about their role in the United Methodist Church, the Youth Service Fund and the mission projects sponsored by YSF. CCYM officers and members shall be elected.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

12. **YOUTH FESTIVAL** – A one-day enrichment event for youth and counselors from local churches. Youth Festival will be held in the spring in the Columbia area. During the rally, youth and counselors will study, play, fellowship and worship together. A Christian vocation counselor will be invited to be a part of the Youth Festival.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRIES

13. ***OLDER ADULT WORK CAMP** – A three-day event for older adults who wish to be in a service ministry at a mission worksite within the South Carolina Conference. Its purpose is to provide an opportunity for older adults to be in mission and to give them hands-on assistance with a South Carolina mission project.

OLDER ADULT COUNCIL

Nurture Section

14. **BISHOP'S DAY WITH CONFIRMATION CLASSES** – A one day event to be held on March 30, 1996 that will allow persons enrolled in confirmation classes to spend time with the Bishop and Cabinet, learn about United Methodist History, and know more about the connectional system.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

15. **FIVE DAY ACADEMY FOR SPIRITUAL FORMATION** – An event designed to provide a setting for a spiritually disciplined community where laity and clergy can open their lives to receive God's love and grace to the end that they increasingly become spiritual leaven within the Body of Christ. The five-day model is like the two-year academy, presented on a shorter, five-day basis for any group registered participants. Two new areas of study will be presented in the 1996 Academy.

BOARD OF LAITY

16. **LAITY CONVOCATION** – A weekend retreat planned for August 9-11, 1996 to promote spiritual growth of the laity in the South Carolina Conference. This event will motivate laity for spiritual growth.

BOARD OF LAITY

17. **VISION 2000: STEWARDSHIP WORKSHOP** – A one-day event held along with the VISION 2000 Training Session that will share vision toward stewardship ministry, give tools for success, and a plan to increase giving in the local church.

BOARD OF LAITY

18. ***BISHOP'S CONVOCATION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS (formerly the Bishop's Convocation for Persons Exploring Ministry** – A conference convocation on persons exploring ministry. It will be held on March 6, 1996 at a Columbia area church with PRCs, Christian Educators, pastors, youth coordinators and interested persons exploring ministry with motivational speakers and smaller workshops. This event will take place in 1996 and 2000. District events of a similar nature took place in 1994 and will be held again in 1998.

COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

19. **THE BISHOP'S RETREAT FOR PERSONS EXPLORING THE MINISTRY** – A retreat to be held in May with persons considering ministry as a vocation. They are nominated to attend by their pastors and/or Christian educators. Various forms of ministry will be lifted up and a Bible study concerning the "call to ministry" will be included. Special speakers will challenge and guide retreat participants. This is a component of the Bishop's Plan for Persons Exploring the Ministry. In 1997, this event will be at Claflin College and in 1998 at Wofford College.

COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

Outreach Section

20. ***CHILDREN'S SABBATH: A NATIONAL OBSERVANCE IN COOPERATION WITH THE CHILDREN'S DEFENSE FUND** – A special Sunday that will be observed on October 13, 1996. The Conference Board of Church and Society will support local churches and ministers with resource materials from the Children's Defense Fund and other allied resource groups which will enable creative worship planning, educational resources, and follow up materials. We hope to involve 100 congregations in this national observance.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

21. ***JUSTICE JOURNEY II** – A three to four-day event to be held in November 1996 that would deal with justice issues that relate to the needs and concerns of the Board of Church and Society. The Rev. Carol Windrum and Tim Fickenscher will host the program. The Board of Church and Society will work with the Christian Action Council and the Carolina Peace Resource Center to set up seminars, retreats, etc.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

22. ***NEW PATHS OF THE SPIRIT: IONA AND TAIZE** – A trip to Edinburg, Scotland, which includes 10 students and two staff. Participants will spend several days living with Scottish families and working on local mission projects. The trip will be built on a model of spirituality called "Four S's: Simplicity, Service, Silence and Solidarity.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

23. **S.C. UNITED METHODIST STUDENT CONVOCATION** – A three-day cross cultural, gender, racial and college campus retreat involving worship, fellowship, discussion and recreation. Significant emphasis will focus on challenging students to reconcile their faith and talents with needs that exist in their community.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

24. **STUDENT LEADERSHIP FORUM** – An event sponsored by the General Board of

Higher Education and Campus Ministry that will send students to a national forum to interact with other students, exchange ideas, experience spirituality and spiritual formation in a different setting among a diverse group.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

25. **CONTINUING JOURNEY SUNDAY EVENT** – An event that is designed to encourage, worship, fellowship, study and minister with persons, groups, or congregations across racial and ethnic lines. Brochures/bulletin inserts will be prepared and distributed to promote this special day on September 22, 1996.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

PUBLICATIONS

Advocacy Section

1. **THE GENERAL COMMISSION NEWSLETTER ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN (The Flyer)** – COSROW will mail *The Flyer* twice a year to all pastors and local church chairpersons on the Status and Role of Women. Its purpose will be to educate, encourage, stimulate and support persons serving in this local church position and to increase awareness and openness of pastors to this continuing concern in the church.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

2. ***SOUTH CAROLINA WOMEN IN MINISTRY ADVOCACY AND INCLUSIVENESS PAMPHLET** – To inform and promote COSROW and the work of COSROW in the conference.

3. **FAMILY MINISTRIES BULLETIN INSERTS AND NEWSLETTERS – *Strengthening Families for Change: Growing in Love*** - These inserts and newsletters will be used to promote activities and as discussion/study guides for use in local church to emphasize and nurture the needs of families. Both will serve as a format for communicating information to local church elders about family ministry opportunities for training, resources and activities.

THE FAMILY COUNCIL

GRANTS

1. **LOCAL CHURCH GRANTS FOR CHRISTIAN EDUCATION WORKSHOPS** – Grants will be given to local churches to help defray the costs for holding Christian Education workshops. Grants will be given based on requests that demonstrate need. Small membership churches (300 or less) will be given priority for grants until April 1 each year.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Nurture Section

2. **FELLOWSHIP GRANT (formerly the Annual Music/Worship/Arts Workshop for Youth Choir Festival)** – The Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music and Other Arts sponsor workshops to train worship personnel. The fellowship workshop, the youth choir festival and the children's choir workshop. The grant helps defray the costs of outstanding clinicians for each event.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

Outreach Section

3. ****"MAKING CHURCH FACILITIES ACCESSIBLE"** – Two matching \$500 grants that will be given to local churches eliminating architectural and/or communication barriers at their facilities. The projects will be expected to be in keeping with the American

Disabilities Act and the "Accessibility Audit for Churches" provided by the General Church.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

4. **JUVENILE DELINQUENCY - STOP THE VIOLENCE MINI-GRANTS** – Mini-grants funded in each district to enable existing local churches and/or community programs to address the problem of juvenile delinquency and to combat violence. This is co-sponsored by the Commission on Religion and Race, the Board of Church and Society and the Board of Education.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE/

5. **PEACE WITH JUSTICE GRANT** – Designed to administer the Peace with Justice Conflict Resolution Program through the Carolina Peace Resource Center.

6. **INTERFAITH COMMUNITY SERVICE GRANT** – Designed to assist with ecumenical ministry focusing on the needs of children and youth, prevention programs and the special problems of low income ethnic minority problems.

Nurture Section

1. **EVANGELISM AWARDS** – The Denman Evangelism Award and the Bishop's Five Star Award will be presented each year at Annual Conference for outstanding work in evangelism. Both awards are – selected by a Board of Evangelism subcommittee following stated criteria: Denman Evangelism Selection and recognition of one layperson and one clergyperson for outstanding work in evangelism in the local church; Bishop's Five Star Award – selection and recognition of churches that have achieved excellence in five areas: 1) church school growth, 2) new ministries that impact growth, 3) new members received by confession of faith, 4) emphasis on youth ministry, 5) all apportionments paid in full or increased payment of at least 25 percent of total amount apportioned.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

2. **SHIRLEY BETHEA VOLUNTEER AWARD** – An award presented to a layperson in the S.C. Annual Conference for significant contribution in service to four areas: volunteerism in the life of the local church, leadership in the local church, volunteerism and leadership at the district and Conference level, and volunteerism in the community.

BOARD OF LAITY

Outreach Section

3. **BARBARA BOULTINGHOUSE MEMORIAL BRIDGE-BUILDER AWARD** – This award is given annually to one person or organization of the South Carolina Annual Conference who has built bridges of understanding by promoting equity and inclusiveness of all persons without regard to race, gender, age, handicap or economic condition. Nominations shall be solicited through the *South Carolina United Methodist Advocate* and a selection will be made by a committee from the two sponsoring commissions. Funded in alternate years by Commission on Status and Role of Women. In 1996, it will be funded by the Commission on Religion and Race.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education has taken strides forward toward providing opportunities for all age levels to experience growth in their Christian faith. Disciple Bible Study allows churches to provide intense Bible study for adults, young adults, and youth. The board members prayerfully hope that through intense Bible study, persons will commit themselves to become disciples of Christ thus strengthening the total education program of the Church. Partial scholarships are provided for minority, small, and new churches. It is our hope that every church becomes a Disciple Bible Study Church.

In 1994, the board's successes provided training opportunities that have increased participation fifty percent.

The following events were held: 9 teacher training events, 3 curriculum events, 2 Human Sexuality events, and 1 Sunday School event. Two small churches were provided grants to assist with training events.

The Board of Education has experienced some success establishing the Age Level Councils. The Older Adult, Family, and Singles Councils have gotten off to a great start; for example, the Older Adult Council has been working and promoting aging programs in all Districts. The Board of Education is developing and maintaining a system of communication working with local churches and districts to design training events to address their needs in the area of Christian Education.

THE BOARD OF CAMPS AND RETREATS

Asbury Hills Camp

With "Come Follow Me" as their theme, over 831 summer campers combined mountain air, outdoor Christian education, strenuous activity, and lots of fun to make Asbury Hills United Methodist Camp a great place to go last summer. Summer camp participation was up seven percent this summer as the Board of Camps and Retreats, through its Programming Committee, continues to evaluate programming at the camp, dropping some and adding others. The outstanding feature of Asbury Hills continues to be volunteer participation with our facility. In 1994, volunteers were at Asbury Hills United Methodist camp for 46 weeks out of the year.

A staff retreat building is nearing completion at the writing of this report and will be used by staff during the summer. During the other nine months of the year, it will be open for small groups of United Methodists on an "as available" basis. This building was built from start to finish during 1994 by the United Methodist Volunteers in Mission, with major participation from the Anderson and Greenville Districts. As the end of 1994 neared, the staff and board turned their attention to the Rice, Lodge, which was built in 1964. Money has begun to be raised and continues to be received to re-do the main meeting room with carpeting and furniture that is more conducive for its use as a retreat facility.

Sewee Coastal Retreat Center

1994 marked the completion of eight adult-type motel rooms at Sewee Coastal Retreat Center. The retreat center now has a completely modern dining faculty that will facilitate up to forty persons comfortably and more if needed. Completion of the bathhouse facility and swimming pool in 1993 opened the camp back up for day use. Day use and camping have continued to grow at the facility and the board of Camps and Retreats looks to 1995 as the first year that the facility will be completely back on track after the tremendous damage reaped by Hurricane Hugo.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Evangelism is spreading the "Good News." It is a vital ministry of the church. The Board of Evangelism, recognizing that evangelism is done at the local church level, launched on a one year study to discover the needs for local church evangelism. One-hundred-fifty churches were surveyed as part of the Operation E.A.R.S. program. The result is a change in the philosophy and programs of the board. The major component of the programs will be to create a network for local church evangelism. This program will have several ingredients including: An Evangelism Network Newsletter which will include motivational articles, resource ideas, "it worked for us," and other articles. It will include pilot projects where churches meet together to share ideas and motivation for evangelism ministry. It will also promote pastoral leadership with a passion for evangelism ministry. The goal is to energize the pastoral and lay leadership for ministry in spreading the good news to the world. In 1994 the Board of Evangelism confirmed their support of the Covenant for Evangelistic Churches and plan cooperative efforts in future work.

Another program emphasis will be ministry to the unchurched, particularly ministry with hard living people. This will help people witness beyond their comfort zone, helping open the church doors to the poor, offering alternative worship opportunities that attract community people, and models for ministry in the community.

In 1994 district workshops were encouraged. Four lay visitation workshops were held in three districts. Over 60 people were trained. The School of Ministry attracted over 250 clergy and lay participants.

The Board of Evangelism continues to be concerned about membership trends in South Carolina and supports the effort to continue to print a recapitulation of net gains/losses for each church in the conference and the conference net change which is currently printed as an *Advocate* special edition for Annual Conference.

The Board of Evangelism further supports the efforts made through Vision 2000. It is a process that energizes the local church to do ministry, to change the minds of people about ministry, and therefore make the church grow.

THE BOARD OF LAITY

Programs of the Board of Laity are designed to enhance the role of the laity in the life and ministry of the local church. The board offers many opportunities for lay leader development and discipleship development. When the Board of Laity is successful in its endeavors the church grows and becomes stronger.

Programs of the Board of Laity include: Lay Speaking, Laity Convocation and Giving in the Local Church. Fifty-eight people attended the Lay Speaker Instructor School. These events trains persons to lead District Lay Speaking Schools. In 1994 the Basic Course, Worship, United Methodist Heritage and Evangelism were offered. The Laity Convocation was held at Lake Junaluska on August 12-14, 1994. Nine-hundred-thirty-eight attended. Rev. Joe Harding was the keynote speaker for the weekend. The Theme was Transformation 2000. For the first time a children's convocation was held as part of the week. Giving in the Local Church was held as part of the Vision 2000 Intensive Training Event on April 9, 1994. Two-hundred-eighty-three persons attended the workshop led by Helen Bell of the General Board of Discipleship, Section on Stewardship.

Future plans are for the Board of Laity to sponsor a five day Academy for Spiritual Formation. This five day event is designed to enhance the spiritual lives of persons that attend that they may become spiritual leaven for the congregations with which they relate. A major goal of the board is to have 25% of all lay persons trained by the year 2000. This endeavor will be in cooperation with other training currently offered from other conference boards, commissions and committees.

THE COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The major emphasis of the Commission on Worship in 1994 was the District Worship Workshops. The idea of the program is to get more worship training closer to the local church. Areas of emphasis are Book of Worship, Hymnal Training, Advent and Lent Services, and Worship Nuts and Bolts. Districts were allowed to choose a workshop from one of the currently listed or to pilot new innovative worship training projects.

The partnership with the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music, and Other Arts continues to be another program emphasis of the commission. Training for professional and lay persons related to music and other worship arts is provided through the Annual Fellowship Workshop, the Youth Choir Festival, and the Children's Choir Festival. Top clinicians are brought in to lead these workshops.

Along with the training events printed material is available to help with worship in the local church. These materials are available throughout the year. Worship Nuts and Bolts, a directory of speakers and other worship leaders, advent and lent services are among the printed resources available.

Another major responsibility of the commission is to plan and carry out the worship opportunities at the Annual Conference. Opportunities for new creative forms of worship are included in the week's events. Leadership in these services reflects the rich diversity of the United Methodist Church. Among the services in 1994 were communion services and a love feast. In the opening memorial service diaconal ministers joined the cabinet in serving the communion.

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions continues to focus on mission education, mission service and encouraging mission involvement and giving.

We glory in our worldwide program and connectionalism. To lift this up and encourage our participation in the mission programs of our denomination, we hosted a conference-wide Workshop on Missions led by Mr. Abraham Carey, staff person with GBGM. Participants included members of the Board, District Mission Secretaries, representatives from the

Conference Advance Special Ministries and chairpersons of the Work Area on Missions of several local churches.

We also launched an Urban Initiative for our conference whose stated purpose is:

"To extend the Gospel of Jesus Christ into urban areas of our conference that are not now reached by our church. This initiative will seek to first extend the spiritual aspect of our faith to those persons whose lives are so empty without it, especially the poor and the powerless."

The strategy for this initiative is:

- A. To focus on individuals, not institutions;
- B. To focus on developing programs – not buildings;
- C. To encourage the wider use of laypeople, Lay Speakers, Lay Pastors and Lay Evangelists;
- D. To encourage the appointment process to reflect the peculiar needs of urban ministry; and
- E. To work in conjunction with the CD&R for program funding beyond those funds provided by the mission effort of the local churches.

We enthusiastically support the formation of the "Task Force on Ministry with the Poor" by the Board of Evangelism and pledge to them our cooperation and best efforts.

We supported the work of the CCCD by paying the second installment of a three-year commitment to pay for the demographic study of our conference that CCCD requested. We feel that this study will undergird the efforts of CCCD in its work of being an advisor to the Board in congregational development. We welcome them as a member of our team in congregational development.

We call attention to the formation of the conference-wide Consultation Ministry initiated by Reverend C.O. Pittman, the first Associate Director for Congregational Development until his retirement and now under the leadership of Reverend Paul A. Wood, his successor. Beginning in June of 1995, consultants, both lay and clergy, will be trained for work with churches of all sizes and ethnic makeup in the area of congregational development and redevelopment. Please use this program if your church has needs that may be helped by this program. Its success will depend on how much it is used by the conference. This ministry is funded by the Board of Missions.

We ask that you find out more about the Conference Advance Special Ministries. These are 17 wonderful ministries of which we can be proud because they are *ours* and are partially funded by the Board of Missions. They are waiting for an invitation to come to your church and interpret their work to your congregation.

We enthusiastically approved the request of the United Methodist Relief Center in Charleston to make its program of rehabilitating substandard housing for low-income families a conference-wide program. It has been so highly successful in the Charleston area since its being formed after hurricane Hugo that we welcomed its interest in widening the scope of activity of this Specialized Ministry.

We are overjoyed as we see our conference coming alive with the new emphasis on Ministry to the Poor as mandated by the Annual Conference in 1994. The Board of Missions has been concerned about this issue for the past few years as this is an area that we have largely neglected for the past several decades. Change does not come easy. We are all going to have to give this our consideration and fullest support.

SPARTANBURG METHODIST COLLEGE

In 1994 Spartanburg Methodist College, operating beneath the Annual Conference Board of Missions, helped develop the lives of 2,401 individual persons through its educational

ministry. Strong missional links between the colleges, local churches, and the Conference offices helped provide a variety of educational programs to serve these persons. Our students, faculty, staff, and trustees join me in thanking United Methodists for SMC's place in the mission of the church and for the resources that the Church provides for serving students.

Spartanburg Methodist College continues its proud heritage since 1911 of serving the disadvantaged by providing over \$3.7 million of financial aid to needy persons. Over 30% of all students came from families with incomes below the federal poverty level. Over 95% of the students received some form of financial aid. In addition to the South Carolina Tuition Grants and federal aid, the college provided \$2.1 million of institutional funds to students. While helping these needy students, the college also saved the taxpayers of South Carolina \$3.0 million in subsidies which would have been required for the same enrollment at a state college.

As a two-year college, SMC continues to have a strong enrollment. The enrollment in 1994 was 1092 in college credit curriculum, 270 in vocational and job training programs, and 1039 in summer Workshops and conferences. SMC is one of the nation's largest two-year independent colleges. In the two-year college community, SMC has become a national leader. The college's practice of maintaining the lowest fees of its peer accredited colleges in South Carolina enables a wide variety of students to get the excellent education offered in the independent sector. As a missional institution, this institution is unique in the independent sector by maintaining a flexible schedule in college degree programs for over 300 working adults. The high quality of the college program is measured by the success of its graduates when 82% transfer to a senior college or university to earn a baccalaureate degree.

After two consecutive years of decreasing church support, support of the college's ministry increased 8% from \$340,696 in 1993 to \$368,130 in 1994. In fact 73% of the \$503,000 apportioned to the churches in 1994 was paid compared to 68% last year. This increase in support strengthened the missional programs helping needy students. Each dollar contributed by United Methodists was spent in the following way: 40 cents for financial aid to needy students, 9 cents for campus ministry programs, 16 cents for scholarships to United Methodists, 15 cents for prison classes serving 97 inmates, and 20 cents for special learning equipment to help disadvantaged students. Church support becomes more vital each year as state and federal funds for student aid decline.

The college develops its mission as a learning community based on reason, faith, work, and service. The percentage of college students involved in jobs and service positions both on and off campus increased again to over 90% in 1994. The college has a 1998 goal for all full time students to participate in a job or a community service project.

In our ministry together in missional higher education, we are challenged to build even stronger programs to help persons develop abundant lives. The college appeals to each local church to strengthen three missional links with us: 1) full payment of the SMC apportionment; 2) mission specials from local church groups to take the place of Federal Pell Grants lost by students in two prison centers; and 3) encourage United Methodist students to study at a United Methodist college. The college has staff and students who will visit churches to explain college programs when invited. Let us know how we might in a special way serve you.

THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The items included in this year's report to the Annual Conference reflect a responsible, though perhaps modest, exercise of the Board's current assignments. We have endeavored to work carefully within the mandates of the Conference while, at the same time, keeping in mind our commitment to the prophetic ministry of the church. Please note with special interest each of the following:

- 1) Report of the Task Force on Alternatives to Incarceration,
- 2) Resolution on the Confederate Battle Flag,
- 3) Resolution concerning Cuba, and
- 4) Commentary on the Church and Issues of Homosexuality.

Perhaps a brief introduction to these items is appropriate.

Alternatives to Incarceration. You will recall that the 1994 Annual Conference approved an addendum to the report of the Board of Church and Society authorizing the appointment of a panel to investigate alternatives to incarceration. Such a panel named by the chairperson of the Board included the following: John Altman, William Belvin, William Deemer, Jennifer Cox, Harrison Ervin, Parker Evatt, James Gadsden, Rhett Jackson, Reid Montgomery, Jr., Fred Reese, Angelin Simmons, Diane Thompson, Jack Washington, and Harris Parker (ex officio). At the initial meeting of this group, William (Bill) Belvin was elected chairperson and Fred Reese recording secretary.

With responsible attention to their assignment, this panel met, studied, discussed, and in time produced the document which comprises part of our Board's report to the conference. It is our belief that implementation of such a proposal as that developed by this panel and approved by the Board would serve constructively the interests of our state.

The Confederate Battle Flag. This proposed resolution is consistent with the position adopted by this conference in 1986. Must we repeat ourselves? We must. While recognizing honest differences of opinion which exist among the people of our state, and without questioning the devotion, bravery, and personal sacrifice of the soldiers of the Confederacy, we believe the Confederate Battle Flag should be removed from the state capitol.

To a large number of South Carolinians this flag is a troubling reminder of slavery and injustice. Its place is in a museum of cherished symbols of the past. The legislature should act promptly and without resort to political expediency.

A Resolution Concerning Cuba. Times and circumstances change. So, at times, should

the foreign policy of our government. This resolution on Cuba does not represent an endorsement either of Fidel Castro or the guiding philosophy of his administration. What it recognizes is the fact that significant changes have occurred in the international scene since the era of the "Cold War" and the period of lively conflict between two powerful nation-blocks and their competing world views. A continuation of the United States embargo against Cuba, we believe, fails to serve our national interest and creates unnecessary hardships on the people of that island nation.

The Church and Homosexuality. The 1994 Annual Conference clearly indicated its unwillingness, at least at this point in time, to confront the potentially divisive issue of Christian faith and homosexuality. The Board of Church and Society listened and offers no resolution on this matter to the 1995 Annual Conference. What we do offer, however, is simply an invitation to study groups within the churches of our conference to request curriculum materials from the Board of Church and Society and the promise of sharing relevant insights on this subject if future developments so indicate. Believing it important to place decisions concerning homosexuality in the context of Christian theology, the Rev. Gene Norris, a member of our Board, has prepared a document titled "Atonement and Homosexuality" which is available to United Methodist groups wishing to inquire further into this difficult and challenging issue.

The Task Force on Alternatives to Incarceration (as amended)

United Methodists have a long history of social justice advocacy. We conceive that justice is fairness under the law. Justice is the only way that God's love and human love can be expressed in a society. In particular, Christians are called on to be healers, peacemakers, and reconcilers in a world where there is brokenness, violence, and vengeance.

As United Methodists, we share in the growing concern and anxiety expressed by our fellow citizens when confronted by the increase in crimes against both persons and property which now appears so prevalent. We recognize that victims of crime include not only the victim of the criminal act itself, but also the families of both victim and perpetrator as well as citizens who bear the cost of punishing and rehabilitating the criminal.

This cost is staggering and represents a tragic diversion of limited public resources from areas of great need such as education, health care, environment, and infrastructure. In the current state fiscal year, the \$220 million budget of the South Carolina Department of Corrections represents 5.6% of the entire State General Fund. We incarcerate 499 people per 100,000 population, one of the highest rates in the world. The average cost to incarcerate one person was \$12,381 in FY94. And yet, the number of persons incarcerated in state-operated correctional facilities continues to grow, now approaching 18,000.

Despite this, we continue to hear calls for "solutions" whose sole emphasis, it would appear, is upon a growing reliance on incarceration as a deterrent to crime. We firmly believe that incarceration is often necessary, and we do not suggest that it is an inappropriate or ineffective method for punishing the criminal and protecting the public. We are nevertheless convinced that lost in the clamor for "truth in sentencing," abolition of parole, and longer prison terms is an awareness of an array of alternatives to incarceration which offers a cost effective means for punishment and rehabilitation. Adequately funded and properly administered, these alternatives, we believe, represent a potential savings to the taxpayer in the millions of dollars while also serving to limit the disintegration of families and the attendant increase in welfare costs which too often follow when a head of household is imprisoned.

These alternatives represent a scale of increasing community sanctions through which the offender is subject to varying degrees of supervision. In no case, however, is the alternative a mere "slap on the wrist." Each represents a curtailment of the freedoms which each of us takes for granted. Thus, the offender does repay his or her debt to society. When compared to the daily cost of incarceration, which now averages \$33.68 in Department of Corrections facilities, the cost of most of these alternatives is far less.

Among those alternatives currently available to the courts are the following programs with the associated daily cost:

- **Probation:** Provides basic community supervision to offenders receiving a suspended sentence. May not exceed five years by law. Offenders pay a supervision fee of up to \$100.00 per month. Special conditions may be imposed, and violation of

any of the standard or special conditions may result in imposition of more stringent conditions or revocation. Average daily cost is \$1.55.

- **Intensive Supervision:** Provides increased accountability for offenders on probation or parole through enhanced surveillance and control techniques. Administered by probation/parole agents with limited caseload, thereby allowing for proper balance of control and assistance. Offenders remain under supervision for up to six months, paying a weekly fee of \$30.00. Average daily cost is \$7.88.
- **Home Detention:** A special condition of intensive supervision, three to six month in duration, wherein offenders are confined to their residence at all times with exceptions authorized only by the Court, Parole Board, or Probation Agent. Enhanced surveillance and control techniques are employed. Average daily cost is \$10.49.
- **Electronic Monitoring:** Used for offender considered at greatest risk of violating conditions of supervision. Employs radio frequency technology linking a transmitter attached to offender's ankle to a monitoring device attached to the offender's telephone line. Generates reports, documenting compliance with established curfew and restrictions on offender movement in community. Average daily cost is \$13.56.
- **Restitution Centers:** Community-based residential facilities providing a strictly supervised environment for non-violent offenders while they maintain employment, pay victim restitution, and perform unpaid public service work during off-hours. Educational and other rehabilitative programs are provided. Offender's wages are applied directly to restitution, court-ordered fines and fees, and room and board. Placement is for three to six months. Average daily cost is \$28.11.
- **Community Control Centers:** Provide a highly structured residential environment offering a range of rehabilitative services to high-risk offenders. Placement in this setting is from 30 to 180 days, with the average length of stay at 120 days. Offenders in community control centers must perform unpaid public service work. Average daily cost is \$41.67.

These alternatives can be further augmented by additional requirements for periodic random urinalysis, unpaid public service employment, alcohol and drug abuse treatment, or job and life skills classes. Common to each alternative is the high probability that the offender can remain gainfully employed, pay taxes, support his or her family, and make restitution to the victim.

Believing in the effectiveness of these alternatives to incarceration, the Board of Church and Society offers the following recommendations for adoption by the 1995 Annual Conference:

1. The Board of Church and Society recommends that the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church support and commend efforts of the State's criminal justice system to expand the use of alternatives to incarceration as being in the best interest of the State in these times of economic and social crisis.
2. The State's prison system is overcrowded and will require additional expensive prison beds in the immediate future. The use of these beds should be reserved for only necessary incarceration. For non-violent offenders, the expanded use of alternatives such as community control centers, restitution centers, day reporting centers, electronic monitoring, home detention and intensive probation would reduce cost without sacrificing community security and would contribute to strengthening family life.
3. The Board encourages local churches to initiate and support programs which increase awareness and understanding of the issues associated with criminal behavior, alternatives to incarceration, and rehabilitation efforts.
4. The Board of Church and Society will make resources available to enable local churches to become more involved in prison ministries in their community, remembering the words of Jesus, "I was in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:36). (List of contact persons will be added.)
5. The Board urges local churches and their members to increase volunteer involvement with both public and private agencies in the criminal justice field.

United Methodists need to be in ministry to persons who should experience the redeeming love of our Lord and Savior. State agencies (Department of Corrections; Department of Juvenile Justice; Department of Probation, Parole and Pardon Services) as well as organizations like the Alston Wilkes Society and Prison Fellowship have many possibilities for service and will provide training for volunteers.

6. The Board further recommends that a copy of this report be sent to the office of the Bishop with the request that he send it to the Governor of South Carolina and all appropriate agencies.

A RESOLUTION ON THE CONFEDERATE BATTLE FLAG

WHEREAS at an earlier Annual Conference (1986) the United Methodists of South Carolina indicated their belief that the Confederate Battle Flag should be removed from atop the State House in Columbia, and

WHEREAS the continued display of this flag from atop the State House is understandably offensive to a large number of South Carolinians who associate it with the era and cause of slavery, and

WHEREAS this flag, though understandably cherished by a large number of South Carolinians who associate it with courage, personal sacrifice, and loyalty to region and perceived principle, yet represents no viable political unit to which the citizens of this state are responsible, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED that the 1995 South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church respectfully petitions the legislature of this state to take immediate, responsible, and effective action to remove this flag from its position atop the State House, placing it in some appropriate place of historic remembrance and respect, and this without resort to referendum or delay for action by the judicial branch of government.

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING CUBA

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church, its predecessors, and particularly the Methodists of South Carolina have had a relationship with the Methodist Church in Cuba for almost a century, and

WHEREAS, even now three United Methodist missionaries and one Mission Intern are serving there, and

WHEREAS, The Methodist Church of Cuba, in spite of severe economic conditions, is enjoying a period of growth and spiritual renewal, and

WHEREAS, the Constitution of Cuba no longer proclaims their society to be atheist but states that it is a secular society which does not discriminate against practitioners of any religion, and

WHEREAS, the government of the United States is enforcing an embargo against Cuba which serves no purpose except to wreak hardship on the people of Cuba, making food,

gasoline, machine parts, soap, and medicines, among many other items, very hard to get,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH:

1. Express its prayerful support of the courageous Methodist people in Cuba through a communication to the Bishop of that church from the office of the South Carolina Conference Bishop;
2. Encourage more contact with the Cuban people through Volunteers in Mission teams, invitations to Cuban Methodist Church leaders to speak in our conference, and sister church relationships between churches in South Carolina and churches in Cuba;
3. Communicate with President Clinton and with the South Carolina congressional delegation through a letter from the office of the Bishop of the South Carolina Conference deploring the continuation of the United States government's embargo against Cuba.

A COMMENTARY ON THE CHURCH AND ISSUES OF HOMOSEXUALITY

By its action in 1994, the Annual Conference rather clearly instructed the Board of Church and Society not to propose pronouncements on the homosexuality issue until we sensed a consensus on such matters in the Conference. Please let us quickly assure the delegates to the 1995 Annual Conference that we have not yet sensed such consensus and, thus, have no intention of offering a pronouncement on this issue at this time.

We would be quite derelict in the exercise of our responsibilities as a Board, however, were we persistently to ignore issues of sexuality merely because they are controversial and potentially divisive. With appropriate humility, therefore, we will continue as a Board to study such issues, to encourage local churches to do the same, and perhaps at times to provide both suggested designs and study materials to those church groups in our conference which wish on their own to pursue such inquiry. Study is an integral part of the Methodist heritage and an almost essential context for growth in wisdom and for instruction by the Holy Spirit.

The Rocky Mountain Annual Conference Board of Church and Society is sponsoring an event in November, 1995, which they are calling "Building Bridges: Christian Responses to Homosexuality, a Dialogue on the Report of the Committee to Study Homosexuality." That group has asked us to publicize this important meeting, indicating their hope to have at least one person attend from each United Methodist Annual Conference. "The purpose of this event," writes the chairperson of that Board, "is not to persuade anyone to a certain point of view. It is to discuss and examine the many sides of the homosexuality issue in an atmosphere of concern and respect for one another as brothers and sisters in Christ. Free from confrontations and accusations, we hope to move together with the Holy Spirit to a place of understanding to celebrate our diversity and unity in our faith."

Our Board of Church and Society has decided to send one member to this conference, scheduled for the weekend of November 10-12, 1995, in Denver, Colorado, and to assist in publicizing what the Rocky Mountain Conference Board describes as "the major national event on homosexuality before the General Conference." Perhaps some insights will emerge from this promising meeting which the South Carolina Conference Board can helpfully share with the churches in our conference.

In the meanwhile, our Board would be pleased to make appropriate materials available to churches wishing to organize study groups of their own on the issue of homosexuality. One such document is the Report of the Committee to Study Homosexuality of the General Council on Ministries of the United Methodist Church as adopted by the 1992 General Conference, May 11, 1992.

In addition, the Reverend Gene A. Norris, a member of our Board of Church and Society, has written a position paper on "Atonement and Homosexuality" in which he has attempted to place the issue of homosexuality in the context of Christian theology. "If the original purpose of sex gave us the ability to transcend ourselves and to express oneness with another," writes Norris, "that intent has been perverted. In sin sex is used to manipulate the other rather than to express intimacy." We are sinners all, suggests Norris, and all of us, heterosexuals and

homosexuals, stand in need of the atoning grace of God found in Jesus Christ.

While the specific views on sexuality expressed in this position paper are those of its author and do not necessarily capture the collective perspective of the Board of Church and Society, they are carefully and thoughtfully written and would almost certainly prove helpful to church groups involved in a study of homosexual issues.

THE BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry continues to reflect the commitment of the South Carolina United Methodist Conference to the Wesleyan mandate to combine knowledge and piety through our three senior colleges and eight campus ministry units.

This present generation of young adults is particularly vulnerable to the uncertainties and vicissitudes of modern society and we intend for them to know that their welfare is a central concern of United Methodists.

We are committed to seeking the financial resources which will enable our Wesley Foundations and colleges to provide the contexts in which faith is nurtured and discipleship formed. The financial difficulties of higher education are increasing as society's priorities change, but we believe that United Methodists will continue to respond to the needs of our students. We have recommended that the basic support fund for our colleges be entitled the "Senior College Scholarship Fund" which more accurately reflects the use of those funds. A committee has been named to explore the appointment of a person to promote and interpret United Methodist higher education to the churches. We will continue to support the annual Student Day Offering which makes Merit Scholarships to some of our brightest and neediest students possible, as well as strengthening our College Bound and College Link-up programs.

Our Board is very supportive of the proposal to fund the full time Wesley Foundation Directors on the same basis as other full time personnel of the Conference Council on Ministries. This will provide a more secure funding base and will enable us to plan for future campus ministry programs. We have requested that we be allowed to establish a permanent Endowment Fund for Campus Ministry, the proceeds of which would be used for programs. The goal of the endowment is to raise \$100,000 by the year 2000 to be invested through the United Methodist Foundation. In 1994, 57 students from eight South Carolina campuses spent the first week of their vacation on the Sea Islands of S.C. providing more adequate housing for the people of these islands. Six students from Winthrop, Clemson, USC, and Claflin attended the United Methodist Student Forum in May at the University of Evansville on "Being A Global Christian Today." Ron Singleton and Tom Wall helped to coordinate a large number of students from S.C. attending a national gathering for those considering the ordained ministry in Richmond, Va. in November. During the Christmas break one bus and two vans full of college students from S.C. made the trip to St. Louis to participate in a national ecumenical Christian student conference which featured such persons as James Forbes, Tex Sample, Edwina Gateley, and Rita Nakashima Brock. In February, a state conference was held with the Presbyterians which featured Dr. Tony Campolo and drew almost 200 students from S.C. colleges. Our Wesley Foundation Directors continue to administer the Summer Investment Program for the Board of Missions which placed eleven young adults last summer in challenging mission sites in S.C. Our young people on college campuses are more and more committed to the Gospel of Jesus Christ and are responding in great numbers to the call to service. We applaud their dedication and pledge to support and nurture their journey.

Lastly, our Board was pleased to recognize and honor the Reverend Risher Brabham for his unique contributions to ministry in higher education by naming him the first South Carolina recipient of the Francis Asbury Award.

CLAFLIN COLLEGE

The 1994-95 academic year has been very productive and full of excitement as we celebrate the College's 125th Anniversary. In terms of enrollment, the College continues to attract an increasing number of students. The Fall 1994 enrollment was 1023, an increase of 6% when compared to the Fall 1993 enrollment of 966. The fiscal year 1994 ended June 30 with an increase of \$102,974, marking the 12th consecutive balanced budget. In addition, Claflin finished her second capital campaign, raising nearly \$1 million above the established campaign goal of \$5 million.

This year we adopted as our theme, "The Claflin Imperative: Building on Excellence." True to our theme and our commitment to the pursuit of excellence, we have launched several major academic initiatives this year designed to move the College to new levels of excellence. To date, new academic initiatives include the establishment of the Presidential Scholars Program, the Claflin Honors College and the Center for Excellence in Science and Mathematics.

This year we are also moving forward with several facilities enhancement and campus beautification projects. Since June, some of our accomplishments include the following: (1) air conditioned Dunton Hall; (2) installed new cooling towers in the J.S. Thomas Science Center and the Hi-Rise dormitory; (3) installed new energy efficient lighting retrofits throughout the campus; and (4) renovated Corson Dining Hall. The following facilities enhancement projects have been approved by the Board of Trustees and are expected to be initiated this year: (1) air conditioning of Asbury and Corson halls; (2) complete retrofit of HVAC system in the Hi-Rise dormitory, (3) installation of campus drainage system (phase I); and (4) planning a new dormitory for women/living and learning center.

While we proudly celebrate our rich legacy and tradition of excellence, we are also beginning a new era at Claflin. As we look to the future, my vision for Claflin is that of a premier private liberal arts institution in the southeastern region. I envision an institution of the highest quality that demonstrates its commitment to excellence in carrying out her mission and doing the best she can with what she has and by continuously striving for better.

We enter this new era firmly committed to providing high quality, affordable education in a nurturing, Christian environment that encourages personal and professional development. We endeavor to accept nothing less than challenging and relevant academic programs, highly qualified and committed faculty, enhanced facilities, and a continuing commitment to achieving academic excellence.

COLUMBIA COLLEGE

The 1994-95 academic year has been extraordinarily exciting, productive, and spirit-filled. In September U.S. News & World Report rated Columbia College the Fourth Best Liberal Arts College in the South. Bishop Bethea and the Cabinet joined students, faculty, staff, trustees and alumnae in celebrating this milestone achievement. The impact on recruitment has been phenomenal with applications up over 25%. Even more impressive, applications with SAT scores above 1,000 are up 48%.

The calibre of student continues to improve as evidenced by an increase of 49 points in the average SAT of the current freshmen. In addition to standardized test scores, students choosing Columbia College have stronger high school grades and leadership experiences in school, church, and community. The combination of challenging academic coursework, leadership development, and a strong emphasis on moral and spiritual growth creates a unique environment for Columbia College students to mature into women of substance and integrity.

The COLUMBIA COLLEGE CAMPAIGN FOR LEADERSHIP received an enormous boost with a second-million dollar gift by trustee Johnnie Cordell Breed. This gift will be used to enhance technology across the campus and connect the College to the Internet. Knowing our students, they will be in the passing lane of the computer superhighway. When the COLUMBIA COLLEGE CAMPAIGN FOR LEADERSHIP began in 1990, our \$10.5 million, five year goal seemed very ambitious. With this recent gift, the campaign is expected to exceed

\$16 million when concluded on June 30, 1995. Exceeding the goal by over 50% is a powerful tribute to the heritage, current mission, and strategic plan for the future of this noble college.

The goal of Columbia College is to be a major force for women, for leadership, for values, for spirituality, and for progressive change in our state and region. The Leadership Institute, the close ties with the Annual Conference, the dedication of faculty and staff, the loyalty of alumnae and friends, and the enthusiasm of students will make our goal a dynamic and meaningful reality.

WOFFORD COLLEGE

In 1994 Wofford College continued to make strides in its effort to increase the quality of the faculty, student body, and academic programs. We are grateful for the role that the United Methodist Church played in these advances.

The student enrollment averaged 1,050 for the year, with students coming from thirty states and nine foreign countries. The cost of educating these students continues to rise, and cuts in federal and state grants are making it increasingly difficult for students and their parents to find funds to meet the cost of higher education. Of the 1,050 Wofford students, nearly 75% received some form of financial aid totalling over \$9 million from state, federal or private sources. The United Methodist Conference provided \$296,378 in scholarship funds, an increase of 48% over last year. These funds were crucial for students having an opportunity to attend Wofford, and those who received the benefits of this aid, as well as those of us who work with them, are most grateful for this support.

Chaplain Talmage Skinner has continued an aggressive program of student activities. In addition to our weekly worship services, he holds Holy Communion on Tuesday and special services on four weekends a year. The Campus Ministry office directs an ever-growing number of projects of community volunteerism through the Twin Towers Project. There are ninety-two Bonner Scholars who form the nucleus of the volunteers by providing ten hours a week tutoring in public schools, working at the Y.M.C.A., nursing homes, the hospitals, Habitat for Humanity, and numerous other activities. Because of the success of this program, Ms. Charlotte Holden, a 1992 Wofford graduate, has become its full-time director. The chaplain continues to be associated with the program, and is available to all students, faculty and staff members with his ministry of presence.

The South Carolina State Board of Education granted approval for Wofford's Teacher Education Program for the period 1994-2001, and the faculty has adopted requirements for each student to take a short course in career planning. A supplementary grant from the F. W. Olin Foundation of New York enabled the college to complete the purchase of computer equipment and audiovisual technology for the F. W. Olin Building.

The college is now building a Physical Activities Building and expanding its campus. Community support for these additions resulted from the quest of Spartanburg to obtain the Carolina Panthers training camp at Wofford during July and August of each year. This expansion of the campus will provide flexibility for the college in years to come.

There is one item I would like to call to your special attention. We are currently in a national discussion of the role which government aid will play in the support of students attending college. The proposed cuts in aid fall heaviest on students attending independent church-related colleges. These cuts will increase the gap between a student's ability to pay for an education at an independent college and one that is directly supported by the state, even as state educational resources are also being squeezed.

The impact of this movement could not only be detrimental to the church-related colleges, but could also lead to higher state tax expenditures, since it would drive students out of the church-related colleges and into those that must be supported with limited state revenues. Thus, people who are involved with church-related colleges must be more active in the political arena this year; I hope you will understand why and will support them.

Once again, I thank each of you for your support of this college during the year, and I trust that the bonds of mutual support which have characterized the college and the church through the years will be strengthened as we go forward.

Gathering at the Crossroads event at St. Louis, as did their campus minister. Fourteen cadets attended the SC United Methodist Student Gathering in Columbia with the campus minister.

The campus minister works with other campus ministers at The Citadel under the Chaplain with ecumenical efforts and counseling. One of our responsibilities is to assist with the freshman orientation event, The Gathering, where students and their families worship together and meet with the campus ministers. We also assist with the Religious Emphasis, as well as the annual religious banquet for the freshmen. Campus ministers also meet regularly with the chaplain of The Citadel.

It continues to be my pleasure to work in cooperation with Rev. Kay Best of the College of Charleston Wesley Foundation in Monday evening meetings and other joint projects. We regret the loss of Kathy James and wish her well in her full-time work elsewhere.

We have experienced capable leadership from our students and anticipate several will be involved in the Sea Island Work Project as well as some other events during the summer.

Our thanks to the Charleston District Campus Ministry Committee and to Jennie Goodman for her help, guidance and encouragement. And special thanks to Asbury-St. James Church for their patience and support in sharing their pastor with campus ministry.

The Church is like a stream of water that flows from God by way of the purifying fountain of Jesus Christ. Campus ministry is like a fork of that stream that runs through the wilderness of college journeys where young people are faced with all sorts of distractions and temptations, and where they are deciding whether or not to accept and embrace the faith for themselves. The Clemson Wesley Foundation is the branch that runs through the wilderness at Clemson.

In the past year we have offered the refreshing, strengthening, and sometimes challenging water of God's love to the students of Clemson University through regular worship and Sunday School opportunities at CUMC (including a new, student-led evening worship service), our continuing Tuesday Discussion Group, establishment of Holocaust Awareness Month at Clemson University, co-sponsorship of the Clemson CROP Walk for World Hunger, and trips to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, the National Ecumenical Student Gathering, and our state convocation.

Recently our Board of Directors developed a plan for renovation to ensure that our facilities are inviting, welcoming, and accessible to students as we enter the next century. This, I think, illustrates our continuing commitment to helping young people in Clemson experience college as a time when their faith in God deepens and becomes their own. We are grateful for the support we receive from the Conference, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, and our Board of Directors. We are especially thankful for the substantial local support we receive from Clemson United Methodist Church.

THE COLUMBIA WESLEY FOUNDATION

The Columbia Wesley Foundation in partnership with Lutheran Campus Ministry is known as PALM (Partnership Among Lutheran and Methodists) on the campuses of the University of South Carolina and Columbia College. We seek to witness to the "good news" of Jesus Christ by providing opportunities for ministry and mission to, with, and by students, staff and faculty.

The Wesley Foundation continues to provide a place of hospitality for a variety of people and groups. The community is enriched and strengthened by the sharing that goes on among the people of diverse denominational, racial, cultural, and national backgrounds. We have two campus ministry associates who are African-American preministerial students. They are particularly helpful in keeping us tuned in to the needs and perspectives of minority students. We offer a Come-As-You-Are Bible study particularly for African-American students. Arkwork, our multi-cultural, multi-racial action and study group, works to raise awareness and create dialogue on campus regarding issues of race, culture, and gender.

The weekly Body and Soul (a meal, devotion, and program) and Sunday morning worship and dinner are our most popular activities. The worship experience regularly involves student leadership: preaching, reading, music, drama, etc. The service always includes the Eucharist and yet varies in style.

Students have been very involved in serving others this year. Habitat for Humanity, nursing home visitation, work with children at the Columbia Bethlehem Center and regular activities. Additionally, PALM again organized a campus-wide hunger banquet, fast, and inter-faith Thanksgiving service. Students raised some \$1,300 for Oxfam America. They were also involved in the AIDS Walk.

The small group experience has also become an important part of our campus ministry. Six Covenant Discipleship groups have been organized for a more intentional, disciplined spiritual growth. A weekly Mid-day Prayer service is also core to PALM. PALM also has a Thursday night Coffee House with live Christian entertainment in a relaxed atmosphere, attracting students from all over our campus.

Thirteen students from USC and Columbia College attended Exploration '94 in Richmond to test their calls to the ministry. We also participated in other national and state-wide meetings: National Ecumenical Student Gathering in St. Louis, United Methodist Student Forum, S.C. United Methodist Student Gathering, and the annual Sea Islands Work Camp.

United Methodism began on a college campus, and it is still true today that the future direction of both church and world is in great measure determined by experiences of students both in classrooms and in extra-curricular activities of our colleges and universities. It is essential that the message of Christ be heard among the other competing voices within the academic community. It is imperative for United Methodism to remain a vital voice, and your continued support makes that possible.

The Wesley Foundation at Furman University seeks to provide a context for spiritual growth and support for United Methodist students and their friends. Interspersed among our regular programming, we had a winter spiritual life retreat, sponsored a child living in the third world through Compassion International, hosted a dinner for United Methodist faculty on the Furman campus, and journeyed to Clemson for an evening of food, fellowship and music with our Clemson Wesley Foundation family. It has been a very busy and exciting year!

Wednesday evening continues to be the primary gathering night for the Wesley Foundation. A fellowship meal begins at 5:45 p.m., with the program following at 6:30 p.m. In addition, many in the Wesley Foundation also worship together on Sundays at a nearby United Methodist Church. Without a doubt, there are many strong, capable and committed student leaders who give direction to the group.

Through outside speakers, Bible studies, fellowship events, worship experiences, service projects, weekend retreats and more, the lives of many are being nurtured in the faith through the Wesley Foundation at Furman University. We are grateful to the United Methodists of South Carolina for providing these and other opportunities for significant ministries within the Furman community.

THE ORANGEBURG WESLEY FOUNDATION

This report includes memories of the ministries that were implemented during the 1994-1995 academic school year at Claflin College and South Carolina State University. Past reflections enable us to become "re-joined" and "re-connected" to events in our tradition which we have become estranged due to time, space and distance.

Dr. Melva Wilson Costen in her provocative book African American Christian Worship reminds us that "memory can be painful when we seek to find ourselves, meaningfully documented in the history of the people of God...However, probing personal and corporate memories . . . is an adventuresome journey".

We collected and gave Churches and Community Ministries of Orangeburg clothes to distribute to families. Boxes were placed in several dormitories by students on both campuses

to receive clothing. We also assisted in providing Thanksgiving Baskets for needy persons in our community.

Additionally, our mission involved sponsoring a child for Christmas in our community. Clothes and toys were given to the child at Christmas time. Monthly, our students visited a nursing home and provided worship and fellowship with the patients. Students participated in our Summer Investment Program and spent a week repairing homes as a part of our Rural Mission Workcamp.

Retreats involved student attendance at The United Methodist Student Forum, Evansville University, Evansville, Indiana; 1994 Exploration on Ministry Conference, Richmond, Virginia; The National Ecumenical Student Gathering, St. Louis, Missouri; South Carolina United Methodist and Presbyterian Students Convocation, Columbia, South Carolina.

Weekly Bible Study is provided for students to study and grow in the knowledge and wisdom of the Word of God. Additionally, opportunity for discussion, fellowship and a meal is provided.

Leadership from the local community was solicited to speak to our students during these discussions. A few topics discussed were "Exercising the Right to Vote: A Moral Obligation", "Sexual Abuse on College Campuses", "Community Agency Volunteer Service", "The Black Presence in the Bible", "AIDS and Caring for Victims of AIDS".

Gratitude is expressed to the churches and members of the South Carolina Conference for their spiritual, and financial support.

THE WINTHROP WESLEY FOUNDATION

The United Methodist presence on the Winthrop University campus continued its partnership with the Presbyterians (USA) by providing a faith community which nurtured young adults as they engaged in ministry to both campus and community. We continued our gatherings on Wednesday evenings beginning with suppers prepared and served by local churches and following with programs which dealt with many contemporary issues and personal concerns. Each Sunday evening during the year we continued to meet for an informal worship service and a snack supper. We had three small support groups which met each week for study, discussion, and prayer. Our students helped to raise \$1,300 through the Alyce T. Guettler Hunger Run, \$11,000 in the York County CROP Walk, \$1,800 for Pilgrims' Inn Homeless Shelter, and sold over \$600 worth of Guatemalan crafts to support a women's cooperative. They got 700 Winthrop students to give up a meal for the Oxfam Fast; held a campus wide Hunger Banquet in which 60 students participated; sent seven students to Homestead, Fla. during the Spring break and sixteen to the Sea Islands Work Project in May to repair damaged homes; and solicited over 200 letters from college students to Congress to increase WIC funding. We provided three state wide retreats and one local retreat for our students. The United Methodist Convocation was led by the Reverend Richard Elliott on the theme "Christianity and Culture" and we had seven students attend. We sent two students to the United Methodist Student Leadership Forum in Evansville, IN and two to Exploration '94 in Richmond for those considering the ordained ministry as a vocation. We had 16 who attended the National Ecumenical Christian Student Gathering in St. Louis. We continued our special ministry to homeless school age children through the Tuesday's Child program. Sarah Davis, a member of Central UMC in Florence, continued to coordinate the 60 student volunteer tutors/mentors and the 20 or so kids. We are now operating out of two sites: one for elementary children and the other for middle and high school. We received a grant from the Youth Service Fund to help with this mission. We look forward to developing our ministry to the homeless, the poor, and the children of our community while providing a nurturing community of faith for our students.

THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE

In September workshops were held in Marion and Sumter to provide resources to help persons in the church understand the impact of AIDS upon individuals and their families and to provide guidelines for ministering to persons with AIDS.

Response to the two workshops was poor which may indicate reluctance to get involved. The program committee decided to continue to offer resource speakers to local churches or clusters that want the training in their area. The committee feels that people must feel the need for training before it can be successful.

Also in September the Board of Health and Welfare sponsored meetings in all the districts in the conference to determine if there was a need for residential housing for persons with mentally handicapping conditions. Persons attending the meetings filled out a questionnaire developed by Dr. Bob Pitzer of the Southeastern United Methodist Agency for Rehabilitation. Based upon attendance and information gathered at the hearings the state seems to be doing a relatively adequate job of providing housing in each of the counties. Families expressed concern that churches need to intentionally eliminate the barriers to full participation for persons with mentally handicapping conditions. The greatest need expressed is for respite care. Some areas of the state have pretty adequate services, other areas do not. A task force has been appointed to explore the possibilities of developing a respite care program in the Anderson-Pickens county area.

Fifteen churches in the conference applied for one of the accessibility grants from SEMAR. The grants were created to assist churches in making their buildings more accessible to persons with handicapping conditions. Duncan Memorial United Methodist Church in Spartanburg was the recipient of the grant in this conference. The number of churches seeking assistance precipitated the Board of Health and Welfare's decision to emphasize the

importance of churches being determined to make their facilities accessible to persons with handicapping conditions. To that end the conference will offer two grants of \$500 each to churches to assist in meeting accessibility goals. The committee challenges congregations to make their facilities accessible to all people by following the American Disabilities Act guidelines.

Every church is encouraged to celebrate Access Sunday and act upon the findings of your churches' accessibility audit.

The Golden Cross Fund continues to provide medical assistance to Methodist members and allied health scholarships to students in need of financial assistance who plan to enter an allied health profession.

Our, three Methodist retirement homes continue to rapidly expand to meet the ever increasing housing needs for our aging population. The Epworth Children's Home also has new facilities for boys with special problems. All of these additions and expansions are discussed in more detail in the Homes reports.

Two of our homes, the Greenwood Methodist Home and Epworth Children's Home have seen their faithful chief executive officers retire this year. Dr. Ted Morton has led the Greenwood Home in its development since its beginning twenty six years ago and Charles Hutchins completed twenty two years at Epworth. Both of these outstanding christian leaders have given many years of able untiring visionary leadership demonstrating sustained caring for the children and for the aging. Their leadership in developing the Greenwood Methodist Home and Epworth have greatly enriched the lives of many families across this conference and even to other states. Their leadership has brought hope and security in critical times for many lives. We shall be forever indebted to them for their ministry.

THE GREENWOOD METHODIST HOME

Greenwood Methodist Home is now in its 27th year of operation. Through the cooperative efforts of the citizens of Greenwood and the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church, it provides long-term nursing care for chronically sick elderly persons and independent living for healthy, active persons. The first building, the Health Center, has 102 private rooms and provides a full range of care and therapy services. In addition to those served in the Health Center, the Home serves approximately 150 persons in a variety of residential housing units.

The Health Center was constructed in 1969-70 and opened on May 9, 1971. Since that date it has provided round-the-clock Skilled Care for the elderly in need of such care. While the building has been well maintained over the years, the wear and tear and technological advances mandate major improvements. It was determined two years ago that improvements in the range of \$1 million were needed. Those improvements included the replacement of major heating and cooling components, replacement of exterior windows, stonework on the facing of the front wall, a nurse call system, whirlpool tubs in physical therapy, computer system upgrade, security system, newly designed nursing stations, improved lighting of patient rooms, new ambulance entrance, and a much needed resident wandering system.

Thanks to the generosity of many persons and Foundations, particularly residents of Greenwood Methodist Home who have been so generous in their support, the improvements will be completed. Approximately half of the work is already finished. With funds becoming available, the project will move toward completion.

Greenwood Methodist Home continues to be in ministry serving those in need of care. A special thank you to all of you for your prayers and support. May we all be faithful stewards in this vital part of the ministry of the United Methodist Church in South Carolina.

THE METHODIST MANOR OF THE PEE DEE

"... Adding Life to Years ..." has become a motto for The Methodist Manor of the Pee Dee. These words describe our philosophy of providing services for our residents and their families. Each of our residents - from our oldest, who celebrated her 100th birthday in June, 1994, to our youngest - is encouraged to take part in the every-lengthening list of activities and opportunities: art class, exercise program, a drive through the countryside, viewing a favorite movie or seeing a new one, attending the community theater or symphony, munching burgers at a cookout, browsing current magazines in the library, nurturing plants in the garden, packing for the next trip to some popular resort, and many others.

The security of having three levels of care (independent apartment living, assisted living and skilled nursing care) in one location means not having to ask the question, "Where to next?!" By the 1995 meeting of Annual Conference the two new wings will be complete and ready for occupancy. The Methodist Manor will be serving about 200 residents with 100 apartments, 53 assisted living suites and 22 nursing beds.

Because of the support of United Methodists in the churches of The South Carolina Conference, and their contributions through The Methodist Homes Support Fund item in the Conference budget, no resident needing financial help has been turned down.

The Chapel Fund has been established and initial architectural drawings are complete for the future Chapel at Methodist Manor. Gifts in excess of \$25,000 have already been received.

We are proud of our ministry at Methodist Manor and are pleased to have the confidence of so many people in giving us a chance to have a part in their lives and the lives of their loved ones. Through our facilities, services and programs, we are making a difference: "... adding life to years ..."

EPWORTH CHILDREN'S HOME

Epworth continued its Wesleyan tradition of providing care for neglected, abused and orphaned children of South Carolina. Those being referred to us are mostly high-risk children - meaning that they are difficult to reach and we are taking some degree of risk in caring for them. But we remain committed to the knowledge that we are in God's will which sustains and directs us in every aspect of the program. We have a wonderful staff that does a tremendous job.

Recognizing the special needs of certain younger children, a \$950,000 state-of-the-art

facility was completed to house the Special Care program. At the dedication in May, the Board of Trustees named the building the Charles A. Hutchins Special Care Center. Now 87% occupied, it is designed in such a way that even more disturbed children may receive care in the future. When completed, the building was free of indebtedness.

Until the Shandon Fire Station is rebuilt the City of Columbia is using property which belongs to Epworth. They have improved the property with a new fence, painted the interior and exterior of the house and constructed a shed for the fire truck. These improvements will remain when they have vacated the property.

The Epworth Learning Center continues to be our greatest asset. "At-risk" children who cannot live at home become "at-promise" children who succeed academically, socially, and emotionally. Richland School District One refers some day students who are not having success in the public school system. Children in this program read and passed tests with 80% mastery on over 1500 books. Standardized CTBS tests given in October, 1993 and again in May, 1994 showed an average gain of 13.7 percentile points over the national average. The Arts-in-Education Program through the South Carolina Arts Commission and the Joseph Miller Foundation provided grants to produce, with the assistance of The Southeastern Players of Columbia, the musical, "Oliver Twist." All of the students in the Epworth Learning Center participated in the production, playing the various roles, learning sound and lighting technology, set and costume design. Preparation has been completed for the 5-year review by the Southern Association.

Two students graduated from high school and matriculated to higher education. Five students are currently enrolled in higher education.

The self-study for reaccreditation by the National Council of Accreditation is underway. The arduous self-examination involves staff, trustees, service users and referral sources, and is followed by a peer team review. Epworth is the only church-related agency in South Carolina which holds this accreditation and is a full member of the Child Welfare League of America.

Plans were begun by the Building Committee for the renovation and expansion of the Education Building. Plans are also underway to add handicap access to the church, two cottages and the health center, to change the windows in the central dining room and the health center and to redecorate the administration building. These plans will proceed when funds are available.

All buildings are in good repair, assuring the right of children to live in well-maintained, attractive housing. Our beautiful grounds are being constantly improved. Tom Brittain, Vice-President of Church Relations, and Charles Hutchins spoke in many churches to many groups during the year. J. William Martin was added to the Development staff as Vice President of the Endowment.

During the year 164 children were served in residential group care, 11 in foster family care, 61 in in-family care, and 9 in higher education. 543 referrals were received, 190 applications were processed, we had 143 exploratory visits, and 63 children were admitted into care. We provided 40,859 days of care in direct services with an additional 13,477 days of in-family care, for a total of 54,336 days of care in fiscal year 1994. In some ways, Epworth has touched the lives of more than 1400 families through programs such as residential group care, foster family care, higher education, family preservation, family counseling and mental retardation services.

Vital to the Epworth ministry is the continuing support of the churches through First Sunday, Mother's Day and Work Day offerings. We must always stand firm that we are the church without apology, providing the best possible services.

Without strong church support, Epworth will not only be in a serious financial situation but would lose some of its closeness to the churches. It is essential to maintain this strong tie. We never want to say "no" to a child who hurts. The Board of Trustees continues to be committed to providing as much service as our supporters are willing to underwrite.

Epworth saw the end of an era under the able direction of Charles A. Hutchins as President and CEO. With his retirement in December, the Board appointed J. W. Patrick as interim administrator while they search for a highly regarded professional to steer this ministry into a new century.

We covet your continued prayers and support.

THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

The New Testament speaks of the unity of the Church as God's gift. As Christians, this God-given unity is to be part of the daily life of the church. To be open to the life-giving energy of the Holy Spirit, one must pray with others for the healing of our fragmented world, and offer a visible sign that we are working towards this unity God intends for all.

We see this occurring in local communities through joint Thanksgiving and Lenten services, pulpit exchanges, and shared Vacation Bible School programs. As these fellowships strengthen, they often work together on local programs dealing with justice or race.

In a larger context, organizations such as the National and World Council of Churches provide a broad range of services for ministry. The Interdenominational Cooperative Fund provides our connectional support.

Our Commission highlights the "Week of Prayer for Christian Unity" each year and acts as a resource for helping churches celebrate this week.

As this report is made, the 5th Bishops' Ecumenical Dialogue will have been completed, where members of the Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic and United Methodist bodies gather annually for a time of dialogue on such topics as *Covenanting*, *Inter-Church Marriages*, and the *Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry* document of the World Council of Churches. In 1994, we had a good participation from S.C. United Methodists as we heard Episcopal Bishop Roger White share on *Covenanting*. We will invite other Methodist bodies such as the AME, Zion, and CME churches to participate with us in our 1996 dialogue.

At our 15th Annual Ecumenical Dialogue in 1994, sixty-four persons heard Dr. Larry Pickens, United Methodist pastor and member of the Consultation on Church Union Steering Committee, share the history and current status of COCU. Our commission has presented a resolution to the 1995 Annual Conference asking our Conference to go on record as supporting the covenanting proposal of the Consultation on Church Union that will come before the 1996 General Conference.

The 1992 *Discipline*, Paragraph 739.4 charges Conference Commissions on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns with taking the initiative in encouraging dialogues with persons of other faiths. We are excited about becoming a part of an on-going event called "Partners in Dialogue" in 1996, which is designed to promote harmony and understanding between our various faith groups in our state.

Ecumenical work is ongoing and alive in our state and we appreciate the Conference support for the work of our commission.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE COVENANTING PROPOSAL OF THE CONSULTATION ON CHURCH UNION

S. C. COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

WHEREAS, the Scriptures call us to one hope; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and

Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all (Ephesians 4:4-6), and

WHEREAS, Jesus prayed for the church "that they may all be one" (John 17:20), and

WHEREAS, despite the brokenness of the Church, the Holy Spirit works among us to break

down the dividing walls between Christians, and

WHEREAS, the diversity of gifts among Christians is for building up and strengthening the

Body of Christ, and

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church has pursued and supported the unity of the Church

through prayer, study, and leadership in the ecumenical movement, and

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church has been a member of the Consultation on Church

Union (COCU) from its beginnings, giving leadership to the work of the nine

churches in the U.S.A. as they have sought to make visible the unity of the Body of

Christ, and

WHEREAS, The COCU Consensus: In Quest of a Church of Christ Uniting, was given

overwhelming support by the 1988 General Conference, as an expression of the

Apostolic Faith, and "a sufficient theological basis for the covenanting acts to be proposed by the Consultation...." (1922 Book of Resolution, p. 206) and WHEREAS, the COCU covenanting proposal, Churches in Covenant Communion, has been developed by the representatives of the nine member churches of the Consultation, and studied by The United Methodist Church over the past eight years, and WHEREAS, the United Methodist Council of Bishops stated in May, 1992, "we celebrate God's call to the concept of covenant relationships expressed in Churches in Covenant Communion ... [and] long for the day when the covenant may be realized among us, and acknowledge with joy our eagerness to enter into covenant" (1992 Book of Resolutions, p. 217); and WHEREAS, this covenanting proposal offers to open doors to greater unity in theology, worship, sacraments, ministry, and mission among Christians in the U.S.A., THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church adopt the covenanting proposal of the Consultation on Church Union, *Churches in Covenant Communion: The Church of Christ Uniting*, and

- (1) approve this text as the definitive agreement for joining with other participating churches in covenant communion, including the acts sufficient to enable it,
- (2) declare its willingness to enter into a relationship of covenant communion with the member churches of the Consultation on Church Union and other churches which similarly approve this agreement and *The COCU Consensus* which is its theological basis, sealed by the proposed inaugural liturgies, and
- (3) begin to identify for itself such steps and procedures as may be necessary to prepare for the reconciliation of ordained ministries and for entering into covenant communion as set forth in this document."

(*Churches in Covenant Communion: The Church of Christ Uniting*, p. v.)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church entrust to the Council of Bishops, in cooperation with the General Commission on Christian Unity and interreligious Concerns, the guidance of The United Methodist Church and its various agencies at national, regional and local levels into the covenanting acts and relationships described in *Churches in Covenant Communion* including the steps and procedures necessary to prepare for the recognition and reconciliation of ordained ministries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church send greetings of grace and peace in Christ to the other member churches of the Consultation, offering prayers that we may all be one so that the world might believe.

THE COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Progress is being made at the local church level in breaking down barriers and attempting to eliminate racism. The committees on Religion and Race of Highland Park UMC, and Cumberland UMC, Florence, held their second joint meeting, January, 1994 and asked me as chairperson of CORR to meet with them. The meeting was well attended, informative and the fellowship afterwards was enjoyed by all. Information received during other various meetings tell of cross-racial Bible study groups, ministers directing their congregations in becoming informed about "Racism" and how the congregation can successfully journey towards inclusiveness. Please inform the Commission on Religion and Race of other (CORR) efforts toward inclusiveness so that we may support you with our resources.

The Barbara Boultinghouse Bridge Builder Award recipient for 1994 was Reverend Debra Quilling, former chairperson of Religion and Race (1988-1992). Her commitment to building bridges of understanding and promoting inclusiveness is appreciated. Thanks to Reverend Dan Batson, his committee members from CORR along with committee members from COSROW for their efforts.

Promotion of Continuing Journey Sunday is important. Local churches are urged to celebrate our progress since merger. Some suggested cross-racial activities are pulpit exchanges, choir exchanges with fellowship, Bible study groups, church picnics and any other activities to bring Christians together for fellowship and understanding. Resource materials are available from CORR.

The number of minority children and youth attending Asbury Hills the summer of 1994 increased because of the efforts of Anderson Mack, his committee members and Wesley Voigt, the camp director. We will continue these efforts.

Several Minority Self Determination Grants, from the General Commission on Religion and Race, have been awarded to projects in the South Carolina Conference. I will list the grant recipients. Additional information may be secured from the commission chairperson or pastor of the church. Grant recipients are: (1) "The African American Spiritual and Cultural Enrichment Project", Wesley UMC, Columbia. (2) "Bennettsville-Cheraw Area Cooperative Ministry Tutorial Program", Bennettsville. (3) "Bluff Road Reclamation Project", Bluff Road UMC, Columbia. (4) "Project Vocation Phase II", Emmanuel UMC, Camden. (5) "Saint James Outreach Ministries", St. James UMC, Seneca. (6) "Stop-the-Violence -Teen Leadership", Columbia Urban League, Inc., Columbia and (7) "Wesley Community Outreach Services." Wesley UMC, John's Island.

Commission members will monitor assigned church-supported institutions for inclusiveness. Project Equality, and Elaine Jenkins-Pearson have provided adequate training.

The "Sensitivity Building Workshop" has been held on the Hartsville District. We urge other districts or clusters to sponsor this workshop. It is designed to enable christians to break down barriers and work toward eliminating "racism." Mrs. Carleathea Benson is the workshop leader.

"Stop-the-Violence, Prevent Juvenile Delinquency" mini-grants are to be awarded to qualified applicants. Recipients are not available at the writing of this report. This information will be available by annual Conference and distributed.

THE COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

The Commission on the Status and Role of Women is mandated to "challenge The United Methodist Church, including its general agencies, institutions, and connectional structures, to a continuing commitment to the full and equal responsibility and participation of women in the total life and mission of the Church, sharing fully in the power and in the policy making at all levels of the Church's life." (1992 Discipline, Para.2202). "We serve as advocate, catalyst, and monitor to empower women and to transform the church so that an inclusive people of God might be in ministry and mission to a hungry and hurting world" (General Commission on the Status and Role of Women). The South Carolina Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women is currently refocusing and redefining our priorities in order to better serve as an advocate, catalyst, and monitor to empower women in our local churches.

This Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women has provided excellent leadership in past years which has been instrumental in bringing about an increased awareness of women's gifts and leadership in all areas of the church. COSROW continues to monitor women's participation on the floor of Annual Conference as well as the makeup of Conference boards and agencies. Systematic efforts toward equity continue to be in place within the Conference Nominating Committee. Salary issues concerning women clergy continue to be monitored while salary issues concerning diaconals are being explored.

In 1994, our commission was involved in one program and two awards:

1. Women in the Pulpit Sunday: Resource materials were prepared and distributed to each charge to aid churches in observing Women in the Pulpit Sunday, the third Sunday of March. These resources are designed to encourage and promote equity and inclusiveness for women by setting aside a Sunday where local churches are encouraged to have a woman preach. Information on the Bessie Parker Memorial Scholarship Fund and offerings taken on this Sunday

for this fund provide opportunities for women in South Carolina to prepare for the ordained Ministry.

2. **The Barbara Boultinghouse Bridge Builder Award:** This award, jointly sponsored by COSROW and the Commission on Religion and Race, recognizes persons or organizations who have built bridges of understanding by promoting equity and inclusiveness for all persons without regard to race, gender, age, handicap or economic condition. The 1994 recipient is Rev. Debra Quilling.
3. **Women's Sermons on Inclusiveness Award:** This award, based upon the 1994 program emphasis "Becoming A Welcoming Church," sought to provide quality sermonic material. Manuscripts were solicited through advertisements in the Advocate and with the help of District Superintendents. Rev. Elizabeth George, the contest winner, received a \$200.00 award to be used for continuing education or for the purchase of books at Cokesbury.

COSROW also sent representatives to a seminar on sexual harrassment, mailed the newsletter of the General Commission to local church chairpersons and other interested persons, and invited a representative from the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women to speak, at the 1995 Bishop's School of Ministry. We continue to explore ways of disseminating information and resources throughout the Conference. As we continue to refocus and redefine our goals we seek to become more inclusive of women who are economically challenged, disenfranchised, and/or marginalized.

THE COMMITTEE ON CAREER PLANNING AND COUNSELING

The South Carolina Conference Committee on Career Planning and Counseling is pleased to present the following report of its activities during the Conference years 1994 and 1995 and its upcoming plans for 1996.

The committee is focused upon the encouragement of persons toward choosing careers in ordained ministry, diaconal ministry and other Christian vocations. One of the most important enlistment means has been the Office of Christian Vocations. This Office is composed of part-time Christian Vocational Counselors assigned within each District in the South Carolina Annual Conference. These Counselors were trained by staff of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry of Nashville.

The Vocational Counselors are available to meet with conference and district groups of clergy and laypersons, local churches and individuals who are interested in the encouragement of persons for full time Christian service. These Counselors are available to meet and advise persons who are contemplating entrance into a field of ordained and diaconal ministry before such persons consult with the District Superintendent. Our Committee continues to be very excited and supportive of the special work of the Office of Christian Vocations and its significance for ministry in this Annual Conference.

The Christian Vocations Counselors for the South Carolina Annual Conference are as follows: Anderson - Mrs. Carleathea Benson; Charleston - The Rev. Jim Williams; Columbia - Mrs. Jacqueline Carter-Harris; Florence - The Rev. Larry McCutcheon; Greenville - The Rev. C.E. "Smoke" Kanipe; Greenwood - The Rev. Carol Peppers Wray; Hartsville - The Rev. Roger Dodds; Rock Hill - The Rev. Ben Barnett; Spartanburg - The Rev. Theron Smith; and Walterboro - The Rev. Elizabeth Burgess Drennen.

The Committee on Career Planning and Counseling continues to be extensively involved in the Bishop's Plan for Christian Vocations. This is an intensive and long-term program sponsored by Bishop Joseph B. Bethea, Columbia College, Spartanburg Methodist College, Claffin College, Wofford College and our Committee. The plan has been supported financially by the Conference Council on Ministries budget and by grants from the National Methodist Foundation and the Youth Service Fund. We appreciate the efforts of both Columbia and Spartanburg Methodist Colleges in securing these grants.

The Bishop's Plan consists of three components - 1) Bishop's Retreat for Persons Exploring Ministry (to be held annually and rotated between the various South Carolina United

Methodist colleges), 2) Bishop's Convocation on Christian Vocations (to be held in 1996 and 2000) and 3) District Workshops on Christian Vocations (held in 1994 and scheduled for 1998). The Bishop's Retreat in 1995 will be held at Columbia College and in 1996 is scheduled to be sponsored by Spartanburg Methodist College in Spartanburg.

In 1995 nearly 50 persons exploring ministry participated in this event. The Bishop's Conference Convocation is scheduled for April 1996 at a Columbia area United Methodist Church. District Workshops were held in 1994 coordinated by the District Christian Vocational Counselors and the District Superintendents.

"Exploration '94," a national convocation on ministry for persons ages 16-25 was held in Richmond, Virginia from November 11-13, 1994. Again our Committee provided coordination of registration and travel plans for participants from this Annual Conference. Forty-three persons participated from the South Carolina Annual Conference. The Career Planning Committee is deeply grateful for the support of The Reverend Ron Singleton at Clemson and our other campus ministers for Exploration '94.

The Committee has in the past provided funding for ministers within the Annual Conference who are evaluating their careers with possibilities toward emphasis in new areas of ministry or exiting from full-time Christian service. Dr. Dickey Evans of the Virginia Wingard Pastoral Counseling Center provides this consultation. This counseling must be coordinated through the offices of the District Superintendents. Beginning in 1996 it is hoped this program will be funded by use of the matching program at the Counseling Centers.

"Discovering Careers" is a general career/life planning experience for persons of all ages. It is adaptable in length and content to suit the needs of intended audiences. The participants also have follow-up career counseling available to them after the workshop. The workshop can be a wonderful program for part or all of a meeting of many groups in local churches and Annual Conference organizations and institutions. During September 1994 a workshop was held to train additional persons to lead "Discovering Careers" workshop as requests are received for these events and in their local congregations.

The South Carolina Annual Conference Committee on Career Planning and Counseling is most excited about our efforts in career planning. We are consistently appreciative for the strong support of Bishop Joseph Bethea; his Administrative Assistant, Hazel Colcock and the Conference Council on Ministries staff, especially the Print Media Center, Director Dr. Lem Carter, Naomi Mart and Mr. James Arant of the Nurture Section. All United Methodists in this state are invited to become significantly involved in these enlistment and career planning efforts which are offered for the strengthening of Christ's work and outreach to needy persons.

THE COMMITTEE ON PASTORAL CARE AND COUNSELING

HISTORY

The Conference Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling traces its beginnings to the 1967 Annual Conference when a standing committee was established. In the 1984 *Conference Journal* this committee's mandate centered around the need for healing and included the following responsibilities:

1. Communicating with Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, Office of Ministerial Affairs, and the Cabinet regarding clergy care systems;
2. Strategic planning regarding pastoral care and counseling needs in the conference.
3. Recommending goals and programs for meeting goals;
4. And providing policy guidelines, connectional linkage, and evaluation of conference programs of pastoral care and counseling.

MISSION STATEMENT

With the vision Caring for the Caregiver, the Pastoral Care and Counseling Committee understands that clergy, diaconal ministers, and laity sometimes experience pain while attempting to be in ministry. On behalf of (and through the resources of) the S.C. Conference we wish to offer a healing presence by:

1. supplementing counseling fees for clergy, diaconal ministers, and their families in the

- widest geographical area possible and in strict confidentiality. (see Report 1)
2. providing times apart for pastors, diaconal ministers, and spouses to relieve the stress of pastoral responsibility and parsonage life. (see Report 2)
 3. being available to offer signs of reconciliation, healing, and care to both laity and clergy/diaconal ministers in times of crisis within the local church. (see Report 3)

Report 1
THE FEE SUPPLEMENT PROGRAM
Guidelines

- I. Funding of Supplementary Fees
The Fee Supplement program was initiated in 1984. The amount of supplement is based upon the financial ability of persons to pay as determined by the counselor. The maximum is \$40 for individual/couple/family sessions and \$15 for group sessions. These maximums fluctuate with availability of funds.
- II. Providers of Service
Providers of counseling services must be licensed counselors with the state of South Carolina. Counselors outside the state of S.C. may become providers on a case by case basis. Active members of the Pastoral Care & Counseling Committee are excluded from being a provider of services.
- III. Eligible Recipients of Supplementary Fees
The following persons are eligible to receive supplementary funds for counseling:
 - A. Clergy/Diaconal Ministers who are related to the South Carolina Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church as follows:
 1. Full Connection
 2. Probationary member
 3. Associate Member
 4. Local Pastors (Full-Time and Part-Time)
 5. Student Local Pastors
 6. Certified Candidates for Ordained Ministry
 7. Retired
 8. All Diaconal Ministers
 9. Diaconal Ministerial Certified Candidates
 - B. Family Members of Clergy/Diaconal Ministers listed in "A" above in the following categories:
 1. Spouses
 2. Surviving spouses who have not remarried
 3. Children never married and under the age of 23
 4. Children who for mental or physical reasons are legal dependents of the clergy/diaconal minister family.
 5. Divorced spouses for a period of six months from date of divorce.
 6. Premarital counseling of engaged clergy/diaconal ministers and their dependent children in the case of re-marriage.
 7. Step Children never married and under the age of 23.
- IV. 1994 Activity
In 1994, fee supplement was provided for 85 cases, involving 114 anonymous persons, receiving 713 hours of individual counseling and 32 sessions of group therapy.

Report 2
RETREAT

The Pastoral Care and Counseling Committee also sponsors a biannual retreat for Clergy, Diaconal Ministers and spouses called "A Time to Celebrate." This is a weekend apart from the hectic pace of parish life. It provides a little intellectual stimulation and a lot of relaxation and free time to spend with spouse and friends. A highlight of the weekend is the worship service on Sunday morning. The next "A Time to Celebrate" is scheduled for March 15, 16, 17, 1996, at Springmaid Beach. Minerva G. Carcano is the keynote.

Report 3
THE CARE TEAM

The Committee is on-call with a CARE team (Connecting And Responding Expressions). At the invitation of the Bishop this team becomes a listening ear to churches undergoing crisis. The team might suggest ways the conference can assist the church and/or pastor. 1995 is the first official year of this program.

OTHER INVOLVEMENT

The Pastoral Care & Counseling Committee has representation on the Committee on Ethnic Minority Concerns and on the Disaster Response Committee.

THE COMMITTEE FOR CONGREGATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The CCCD had been very active in 1994. We began to receive information from our contract with PERCEPT. The research data has been shared in two meetings conducted by their representative, Peter Wemett and has been enthusiastically received.

The Board of Missions has approved the funding for the second year of the contract, which will focus on in-depth study of specific population areas and the churches therein. These are known as Collaborative Potential Areas, and each church within the population area will be asked to have representatives involved in a cooperative effort to expand ministry. There will also be an intensive training event in the summer of 1995 for persons who will assist congregations in interpreting the PERCEPT material and re-visioning their ministry.

Only one new church was started in 1994, and no new churches are planned for 1995. The studies indicate significant growth in certain areas of the state where a new mission would appear appropriate if we are to engage these residents in ministry within a United Methodist congregation. The New Church task force will make a detailed study of the need for new churches and report in the fall of 1995. From this there should develop, in cooperation with District Superintendents and District Boards for Congregational Development, a Conference strategy for new church development. This will be done concurrent with the re-visioning of existing congregations.

The CCCD is taking seriously the Annual Conference concern for ministry among low-income persons. Several congregations ministering in low-income areas are being proposed for grants this year.

The Committee was represented on the COM ad-hoc task force to study the relationship between the CCCD and the Board of Missions. The CCCD is agreeable to the recommendation worked out by that task force.

We are very concerned that we do not spend time and energy in debate over power and procedure, but move on with the tremendous task before us.

Policy Recommendations

District 20% Fund:

The CCCD recommends to the Annual Conference the following policies concerning the twenty percent of the Congregational Development Funds available to the districts for their use in congregational development efforts.

Money in each districts 20% Fund is to be allocated by the District Board for Congregational Development for the following purposes:

- Capital expenditures, such as land purchase and building renovation.
- Program expenses in local churches.
- Programs in the district which promote congregational development, such as leadership training.

Requests for 20% Fund monies are to be made in writing to the Office of Congregational Development by the District Superintendent or the Chair of the District Board. Requests must include a copy of minutes for the meeting of the District Board for Congregational Development and a brief summary of the use of the money.

Disposition of local church property:

When a church ceases to be used by a congregation, the District Board for Congregational Development shall consider the disposition of the property in light of community needs and need of nearby churches. (See the *Book of Discipline, 1992* paragraphs 2540 and 2541.) The District Board shall present a recommendation to the District Superintendent regarding possible future use of the property.

THE ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH CONCERNS COMMITTEE

The Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee continues to seek, explore and plot new strategies for the empowerment of the Ethnic Minority Church in South Carolina. This year demographics has been attached to the Comprehensive Plan to show the ethnic make-up in the cities of South Carolina. The ELCC will continue to review and update this plan on an annual basis and report its findings to members of this Annual Conference. Four sub-committees organized in 1994 to assist with program concerns and ministries with ethnic groups in South Carolina are up and running. Those four subcommittees namely African-American, Korean-American, Native American and Hispanic are meeting to plan programmatic strategies for their groups.

THE NATIVE AMERICAN COMMITTEE

The Native American Committee was organized in March, 1992, under the guidance of Dr. Lemuel Carter, Conference COM Director. During 1994, we met four times as a committee. The NAC has several goals: promoting inclusion of Native Americans in this Conference, exploring and implementing ministry opportunities, raising awareness of Native American issues, promoting Native American Awareness Sunday in this Conference, and dispensing funds contributed on Native American Awareness Sunday (NAAS).

One-half of funds collected remain in the Conference. Sarah Sanchez and Herb McAmis attended a training session for N.A. Committees sponsored by SEJANAM (Southeastern Jurisdiction Agency for Native American Ministries) in July. National Family Camp for Native Americans was held at Lake Junaluska in July. Sarah Sanchez attended this camp and the NAC sponsored sending Cathy Nelson of the committee and two women from the Edisto Indian community in Ridgeville, SC to this conference.

Herb McAmis of the NAC has been active in working with the Edisto Indian tribe. The Methodist connection has supplied numerous work teams for repair of substandard housing. The NAC donated \$2000 in NAAS funds to the Edisto Indian Health Care Initiative, a building fund to construct a health clinic in the Edisto Indian community.

The NAC publishes the Native American Newsletter two times per year; this publication is mailed to all pastors in the conference as well as to identified Native Americans in the Conference.

The NAC supports SEJANAM on an annual basis with a contribution of \$2000; this money was provided by ELCC.

THE UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

As United Methodist Women, we are challenged as were our foremothers to minister to women, children and youth. We attempt as women united for mission to be communicators of God's love through our action and Service.

1994 was a very hard year for our organization. There was some, disagreement about an ecumenical event that United Methodist participated in. Because of this, more women began to think and read and more have become involved in issues. Our concepts of mission can be expanded by studying these issues and acting on the information we learn. Many of us did lots of reading, praying, soul searching and writing, and many were very patient, keeping the faith and knowing with God's help we would overcome all the obstacles that were before us.

Although this was a difficult year, it provided several signs of hope and renewal. Outstanding goals were met in the areas of strengthening spiritual growth, understanding inclusiveness, reaching younger women and doing more for children, older people, the poor and homeless. More women learned how to use our financial resources to plan budgets and handle their money.

The connectional system of our organization provides us with the opportunity to participate in events outside our local unit. Annual Meetings, Spiritual Growth Retreats, Schools of Christian Mission, Legislative Workshops, Leadership Training and Development opportunities, Mission Trips and Assemblies are available to each member. Attendance is not enough. Active involvement is required in order to expand our concepts of mission. Here, too, we must be willing to listen to new ideas, to visit people who are different from us; and to work on areas of common concern.

Our challenge today lies in nurturing local units, attracting more younger members and continuing to make our Purpose come alive through prayer and action. By using our Bible and Prayer Calendar we can form spiritual community. As we read scripture and pray daily for persons in mission, we form a bond that enriches our lives and gives encouragement to those who carry the gospel throughout the world.

In 1994 United Methodist Women continued to give to mission. Although our membership declined and some districts did not meet their pledges, a total of \$442,571.23 was remitted to Women's Division of the General Church, and \$71,734.89 was given to our Mission projects.

This was an increase from 1993.

Phase II of the, Campaign for Children, "Making the World Safe for Children and Youth" will continue for the next five years. Included in the second phase is an emphasis on action through advocacy, a greater focus on the needs of youth, including issues of violence and teen pregnancy; and an effort to make connections between the local and global need of children. The spirit is yearning within each of us to pray daily for the world's children and to turn those programs into action.

The future of United Methodist Women rest with each member, and I pray for an informed, dedicated and mission-minded membership. May the year 1995 move us closer to that reality.

THE UNITED METHODIST MEN

United Methodist Men of South Carolina continue, through goals of evangelism, mission and spiritual life, to be a vital and growing force in the life of conference churches.

In evangelism, sponsorship of Scouting activities continues to be our largest outreach program, with the ultimate goal of these activities being to serve as a port of entry for the unchurched. Another focal point of evangelistic endeavor is the Moving Member Program, which helps retain and care for mobile members of the church.

In mission, we support the Living Prayer Center, with a 24 hour toll-free hot line (1-800-624-4130) for those in immediate need of prayer. For the past several years, participants in the Men's Congress at Myrtle Beach have been offered the blessing of participating in this ministry, with training and hands-on experience in manning these phones. We are promoting the concept of voluntary pledging by each men's unit member to support projects, mission and ministries of local units in the conference, as approved in the annual business meeting.

The thrust of activity in spiritual life goals is in our support for camps and retreats. Materials telling the story of Sewee and Asbury Hills have been distributed to each local church, along with forms for remitting contributions to our conference treasurer. The goal is \$10 per church member, over a three year period, with men's units to oversee raising of this money through special fund raisers. In addition, local and district units have adopted projects or buildings in these camps for maintenance and/or repair missions. Such activities promote fellowship, and strengthen the connectional concept of our church. Correspondingly, the name of the annual October South Carolina United Methodist Men's Congress at Springmaid in Myrtle Beach has been changed to the South Carolina Conference United Methodist Men's Spiritual Retreat. Business session previously conducted during this Congress will be held in Columbia annually on the last Saturday in August.

Emphasis is being placed on connectional activities, at the district, conference, jurisdictional and national levels through chartering and/or certification. Through this activity, we hope to reach compliance with *The Book of Discipline*, 1992, par. 265, which mandates a men's club in each charge.

THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY

The Conference Council on Youth Ministry continued to be a strong and vital ministry in the South Carolina Annual Conference during 1994. Over 7,000 youth and adults participated in the eight programs offered by the CCYM. These programs were: Spiritual Life Retreats, Basketball Tournaments, Youth Festival, Youth Choir, Youth Annual Conference, Leadership Week, Mission Possible, and Adult Workers Training.

In addition, the CCYM sponsored monthly seminars for persons employed in Youth

Ministry – "Forum for Youth Ministry Leadership." Seminars were: Theology of Youth Ministry; Understanding the Teen Years; Programming for Youth Ministry; Curriculum; Recruiting and Training Volunteers, and Youth and Bible Study.

Youth from South Carolina were elected to serve in the Southeastern Jurisdiction and the National Youth Ministry levels. Matt Cunningham was elected to the SEJ Youth in Missions Design Team; Kristi Kaiser was elected Chair of the Southeastern Jurisdiction Youth Ministry Organization; and Lanecia Rouse was elected to the National Youth Ministry Steering Committee. As a member of NYMO, Lanecia Rouse serves on the Executive Committee, the Personnel Committee, and the International Affairs Committee.

South Carolina youth continue to be involved in Youth Service Fund. In 1994, youth from South Carolina were in the top 10 for giving to Youth Service Fund from across the United Methodist Church. Youth in South Carolina contributed \$12,000 To Youth Service Fund.

Elected as officers for the 1994-95 year are: Chair, Lisa Yebuah; Vice Chair, Lee Lewis; Secretary, Matt Cunningham; Youth Service Chair, Lanecia Rouse; Project Review Chair, Jenarda Robinson; Communications Chair, Alice Lofton. These teenagers with the twelve District Representatives and Members at Large continue to strengthen Youth Ministry throughout the South Carolina Conference.

THE CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON SINGLES MINISTRY

The focus in 1994 for the Conference Council on Singles Ministry was to make programs easily accessible to singles throughout the Conference. In addition, members of the council attended several training events. Three members attended the United Methodist National Conference for Singles held in Nashville in July. Four others attended the Fall Conference for Singles sponsored by the Southeastern Jurisdiction in Atlanta.

The full council continues to meet quarterly to plan the overall work of singles ministry in the conference. Teams meet, when needed, to plan specific events.

THE COUNCIL ON OLDER ADULT MINISTRY

The Council on Older Adult Ministry is enthusiastic, energized, and effective. Since their organization in September of 1993, they have had their first annual *Happening* at Columbia College, their first annual *Workcamp* at Asbury Hills, and their first annual *Spiritual Retreat* at Myrtle Beach. The Council, chaired by Hazel Bennett, is composed of representatives of each of the twelve districts plus additional persons who have expertise in gerontology.

Most exciting among their activities is the *Senior Adult Caravan Program* which will be launched this year in three pilot churches in the Spring and opened to other churches in the Fall. Older adults are trained in seven areas and will, upon invitation, in groups of three or four, spend a weekend in a local church assisting the older adults to enhance and make more effective their ministry in that church.

Plans are underway for the following, which all adults 55 or older are encouraged to attend:

October 3-5, 1995 – Workcamp, Asbury Hills
February 13-15, 1996 – Spiritual Retreat, Springmaid Beach.

**THE SOUTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES
COMMITTEE ON RESEARCH AND PLANNING**

The Research and Planning Committee began its work in 1993 and presented its first report to the 1994 Annual Conference. At that time our primary focus had been to identify the critical research and our planning needs for the Annual Conference, clarify questions to be addressed, and initiate and support research efforts directed at those areas. We reported several themes on which work was beginning.

The first theme dealt with Racism, Ethnic Diversity, and Unity in the Church and Culture. A working group chaired by Cheryl Walker and co-chaired by Sarah Sanchez raised challenging questions and stimulated remarkable discussion in the committee. That work has resulted in a paper and proposal which has been shared with the CCOM and several other groups. After some revision, the paper and proposals have now been passed on to the Board of Church and Society and the Commission on Religion and Race, with the request that they work with the Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns, Black Methodists for Church Renewal, the Cabinet, and the Boards of Higher Education, Ordained Ministry, and Diaconal Ministry. We are asking these groups to work together to respond to the concerns raised in the paper and study the suggested proposals.

A second theme has been empowerment of lay ministry. Beverly Coates chaired the working group which developed a statement offering suggestions and directions to enhance lay ministry. This statement has also been presented to CCOM and has been referred to the Board of the Laity for response and action.

In order to address our concern for the demographic and cultural trends in the state, the Committee endorsed the awarding of the contract to PERCEPT for research which could provide guidance in several areas of ministry and mission. We have recently received an overview of the present state of that research and are now studying the implications of this research for our planning and future directions for the conference.

Perhaps the largest immediate item on our agenda is the directive from the December 1994 CCOM meeting for the Committee "to lead the conference in discerning a vision and implementing goals for ministry and mission for the next quadrennium and beyond the year 2000." This is indeed a large order, but one which the Committee, in typical fashion, has undertaken with dedication, creativity, and insight. Almost immediately there was consensus that we should design a *process* and not simply produce a *product*, i.e. our desire was to provide a means for broad conference participation in discerning our vision. That meant that listening to others was essential as we attempt first to discern what the church and the conference ought to be and do and then to construct a compelling and encompassing statement which calls us to that identity and mission. This perspective on our task was consistent with our earlier discussions about church structure and management. We also agreed that our vision should encompass a number of critical issues and characteristics we had already identified:

- the centrality of our Christian witness, which needs to be taken more seriously;
- the need for more open, theologically based dialogue within the church;
- the problems of intolerance and mean-spirited polemic in society, which sometimes characterize even discussions within the church;
- racism and other divisions in the church and the larger culture;
- pressing missional needs, especially to poor and vulnerable populations;
- the rich diversity of our church which needs to be embraced, celebrated, held up as a model, and put to use;
- the need for lay empowerment as well as recruitment and training for more effective clergy leadership;
- creating church structures which facilitate ministry.

While we continue to work on designing a process that will allow broader input into the development of the vision statement, we have crafted a proposed statement to initiate discussion. That proposed statement is included in the Annual Conference registration packet. Although we consider this a working draft, to be perfected as we receive response from across

the conference, we do ask the Annual Conference to approve the work the Committee has done thus far toward developing the vision statement for the conference.

THE MEMORIAL SERVICE
GOD'S GIFTS: MEMORY AND HOPE

Dr. John M. Younginer, Jr.

Psalm 90:1-4, 13-17; 1 Peter 1:3-9; John 17:1-10

Upon receiving our late Bishop Bethea's gracious, flattering – but surprising – invitation to me for this pulpit tonight, I recalled that in 38 years as an active member of this conference, I could count on one hand the number of times I had been to this microphone. Tonight is my chance to make up for lost time.

In my student days at Emory, all of us were required to take a course entitled "Practice Preaching" under Dr. G. Ray Jordan. Dr. Jordan's teaching format was to require each person to be prepared to preach a trial sermon to the class on any given day. At the appointed hour when we were assembled, the teacher would look around the room, point to someone and say, "You preach today."

Some of you who are present here tonight were in that class the day he pointed to a student from the North Carolina Conference. The young man walked hesitatingly up to the podium, held it with his trembling hands and announced: "Today I would like to speak to you about the three things that Jesus said that mean the most to me in my life. But for the life of me, I cannot remember what they are!"

A little boy wrote to his grandmother: "Dear Grandmother, I'm sorry that I forgot your birthday last month. It would serve me right if you forgot mine next Tuesday."

Without memory, we must experience everything for the first time. Learning would be impossible. Education would be meaningless. Relationships would have no value.

That is why memory is so important in the Bible. The Hebrew word "Zaccur" means "to remember," and appears over and over again in the Old Testament:

"Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." (Exodus 20:8)

"Remember .. your Creator in the days of your youth." (Ecclesiastes 12: 1)

"Remember the wonderful works that he has done." (Psalm 105:5)

"Remember this and consider, recall it to mind .. remember the former things

... for I am God, and there is no other." (Isaiah 46:8,9)

The word and deeds of the Lord were not to be forgotten. They were to be remembered and told and re-told so that no one would ever forget. Someone has poetically pointed out that, "God gave us memory so that we might have roses in December."

At a military cemetery on a small island in the Pacific where a large number of Americans are buried, there is a simple marker which bears this inscription:

"They shall not grow old as we who are left grow old. Age shall not weary them nor the years condemn. At the

going down of the sun, and in the morning, we shall remember them."

There is not much that we have in common with God – but there is this: He wants to be remembered, and so do we.

A teacher in an inner city school one day found a note on her desk. It came from a student whom she remembered as the young man who sat quietly back in the corner of the classroom with a troubled look on his face and with a vacant stare in his eyes. The note said simply, "I wish you knew who I was." Our promise in Christ is that God knows who we are, that we matter and that Someone cares what happens to us.

One of the greatest fears we may have is that when we die, we will be forgotten and our life here will be insignificant. We all want to be remembered.

Madeline L'Engle tells of walking one morning with her husband on the deck of a cruise ship on an excursion to which they had looked forward for a long time. It was a beautiful morning with the light of the sun glistening like jewels in the water. They came upon a member of the ship's crew and remarked how they wished they could make the morning last forever. The sailor replied, "It's a short walk from the womb to the tomb." And he was right. A member of a church I once served, the St. George United Methodist Church, closed every Sunday School class session with this admonition: "Life, however long, is still ever so short."

It was that same philosophy which led the Psalmist to pray: "Teach us to number our days

that we may get a heart of wisdom." Numbering our days by remembering that life is brief brings new meaning to our sense of time as a gift. A teacher always reminded her students: "You must look at things not only as if you were seeing them for the first time, but as if you were seeing them for the last time."

The appearance of John the Baptist in the Judean wilderness was a call to repent, but it was also a call to remember the Messianic promise.

So you and I are caught tonight in a mixture of emotions – to remember those who have been a part of us and all we have experienced, and to look forward to what is yet to come. We must watch and wait – for the answers we seek, for our dreams to become reality, for our purpose to be fulfilled, for the pattern of life to be completed, and for the day of the Lord to come.

In Jesus' moving prayer for the Church, he prays for the disciples whom He must soon leave in death, and then prays for all of us in future generations who will become a part of the faith community.

So even our Lord has brought the living and the dead together in the sacredness of our memories and the blessedness of our hopes. I think this is what the New Testament must mean when the writer exclaimed:

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and sin that cling so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith."
(Hebrews 12:1, 2)

In the words of our great hymn, "O, God our help in ages past, our hope for those to come."

I. GOD HAS BEEN OUR HELP IN AGES PAST.

As we recall those persons who journeyed in the faith before us and remember with gratitude all they bequeathed to us, we see the hand of God in the way we have been loved and nurtured. It reminds us from whence we came, how we struggled and failed, how we rejoiced and succeeded, when we were alienated in sin and how we have been forgiven, the somber times of illness and death and the happy times of healing and hope. Let us say it and say it well: God was there.

In John Steinbeck's *Grapes of Wrath*, an Oklahoma family moving west is told not to waste critical packing space on photographs and family memorabilia. One member of the family asks: "But how will we know it's us without our past?" We cannot know it's "us" without pausing to remember people and places and events ... even words and gestures.

Our faith demands that we remember those who have run this race before us. We are not the first to risk our lives for others. We are not the first to struggle with worldliness and evil. We are not the first to call for justice. We are not the first to know and follow Jesus. We are not the first to hold a light in the darkness. We can never know who we are without our past, without those persons who have been so much a part of us.

We are told that when objects meet in outer space, they leave traces on each other forever. What we are tonight has been influenced by countless others who have touched us with their love and trust.

As Nihls Dahl, speaking of the early Church, points out: "The first obligation of the apostle to the community – beyond founding it – was to make all the faithful in it remember all they had received, and then to become a living reminder of it."

An earthquake tears the land apart. Tornadoes and hurricanes wreak their havoc in hamlets and communities among people we know and love. A terrorist bomb explodes killing hundreds of people, some on routine errands. An illness strikes us, an accident happens.

All of this tells us that we do not know what a day may bring forth, so we must make the most of every moment, and recognize the Presence of God in all things. "For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past." (Psalm 90) Memory is a gift, and we must not forget that God has been our help in ages past.

II. HE IS ALSO OUR HOPE FOR YEARS TO COME.

Billions of people have been born and died, and no one remembers them all, unless God does. "His eye is on the sparrow," the singer reminds us, and we can be sure that He who

watches over us so carefully will be there for us for years to come.

Not too long ago for many of us to remember it, a popular song entitled "I Believe in Yesterday" made it to the top of the charts.

"I believe in yesterday.

Yesterday, all my troubles seemed so far away.

Now I need a place to hide away

Oh, I believe in yesterday."

It is the melancholy cry of a generation that finds no joy in the present, and no hope for the future.

In the Church we have joined ranks with the ballad singer .. when we do not find Christ in today we have no hope for tomorrow.

"I believe in yesterday."

The early Church had no impressive furbishings, no brassware, no altar and candles; so they made the sign of the cross over each other. Instead of one cross, they had hundreds .. not just to hover over the church's sacraments .. but over every exchange, every relationship, every encounter, every mood, every event, and it gave them hope for tomorrow .. the sign of the cross.

God entered human history through Jesus and is at work for good in what happens in these days. When we remember that, we know who we are, how much God loves us, and in remembering, we have hope. It is a blessed hope which rebuilds, re-molds and makes us. When we remember, we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit who gives us hope. To remember and say "thanks" for what has been, is to say "yes" to what is yet to come. When we realize how much God has been "our help in ages past," we learn how much He is "our hope for years to come."

These are God's gifts: memory and hope. We remember all that Jesus taught and did, how he died in love and was resurrected by God's power. As Jesus himself declared: "I have said these things to you that when the hour comes you may remember." And during the Last Supper, He took the bread and wine, gave them to the disciples and said, "Do this and remember me." Jesus is telling us to remember what has happened so that we can have hope for what will happen in time to come. Amen.

JOSEPH BENJAMIN BETHEA
September 9, 1932 – March 12, 1995

Bishop Joseph Benjamin Bethea was born in Dillon, S.C., on September 9, 1932, the son of a Methodist minister, the Rev. Rufus Emory, and Ella Johnson Bethea.

He was a graduate of Claflin College and Gammon Theological Seminary and did further study at Union Theological Seminary in Richmond, Va. He held honorary degrees from Gammon/The Interdenominational Theological Center, Claflin College, North Carolina Wesleyan College and Columbia College.

In April 1993, Bishop Bethea was honored with the presentation of the Order of the Palmetto by former Governor Carroll Campbell.

In May of 1994, he was elected chairman of the board of trustees of Gammon Theological Seminary and elected to the Interdenominational Theological Center board of trustees. He also served on the board of trustees of Emory University.

Bishop Bethea was ordained a deacon in October 1954 and an elder in 1956 by Bishop J.W.E. Bowen. He joined the S.C. Annual Conference while a student at Gammon. He served the Walhalla and Ninety Six charges in the S.C. Conference before transferring to North Carolina, where he served the Elkin Charge; St. Paul United Methodist Church, Reidsville; and St. Matthews United Methodist Church, Greensboro.

Between service at the Reidsville and Greensboro churches, he served as district superintendent of the Virginia District in the North Carolina-Virginia Conference of the Central Jurisdiction.

Following the Greensboro appointment, he served as director of the Black Church Studies Center at Duke Divinity School. In 1977, he was appointed district superintendent of the Rockingham District of the N.C. Conference. In 1983, he was appointed administrative assistant to the bishop of the Raleigh Area, and in 1986, he was appointed district superintendent of the Raleigh District.

The Reverend Joseph B. Bethea became Bishop Bethea in 1988 and was assigned to the Columbia Area.

Bishop Bethea was very active at every level in the life of the church. In addition to serving on several boards of the Annual Conference, he served on the General Board of Church and Society, and most recently as president of the General Commission on Religion and Race. He also was a member of the World Methodist Council.

Bishop Bethea died at his home March 12, 1995.

Funeral services were held at Shandon UMC, Columbia, S.C., and Centenary UMC, Winston-Salem, N.C., with burial in the cemetery at First Presbyterian Church of Boonville, N.C.

Bishop Bethea is survived by his daughter, Josefa, of Greensboro, N.C. His wife, the late Shirley Ann Cundiff Bethea, is also buried in the Boonville cemetery.

Some denominations refer to a bishop as "Your Grace." We United Methodists do not, but because of Bishop Bethea's life among us, that seems an appropriate form of address. Joe Bethea knew of his dependency upon the grace of God and was constantly reminding himself and us of our call in Christ to be gracious people.

In his Notes of June 8, 1989, he reminded us that, "It is not enough to simply celebrate God's grace . . . We are compelled by our experience of God's grace to share the good news of God's love and grace with our neighbors . . . I covet for all the people called United Methodists in South Carolina an experience of god's grace that will make us happy about who we are and anxious to tell the story."

The marriage was blessed with twin sons, Dr. Curtis Bell a Professor at Wofford and Cobb Bell a C.P.A. in Georgetown. The Bells also had five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

Curtis O. Bell served his God and the Church well at Warrenton, Cayce, Central-St. James in Laurens, Dunbar, Duncan Memorial in Georgetown, Whitmire, Triune in Greenville and Buford in Lancaster. Under his leadership many improvements were made to the churches he served. He served on many District and Conference Boards after retiring in Greenville. He served as pastor of Sampit Charge, Union Charge, First Church Hemingway, Ruffin Charge, Pelion charge where he was pastor for twenty-four years, Minister of Evangelism, Union and Irmo (1989) and as Associate Pastor of Main Street, Columbia (1990). He loved people and delighted in sharing the Good News of the Gospel with everyone. During a revival which I helped him with in Pelion, for the first time in my life I saw two African-Americans attending services in a white congregation in South Carolina. Several years later I attended a Christmas program in one of his church where an African-American, a member of his church, directed the program.

A few weeks before Enoch's "going home," I received a generous check from him and Mary and a letter with these words: "This is to help some child in Brazil to find Jesus." That reminded me that Enoch had led countless children, young people and adults to Jesus in the Hemingway Camp which he had started and the Epworth Camp where he was president for twenty-four years. As far as I know, no one in S.C. has held more revivals or brought more people into the ministry than Enoch Finklea. He loved everyone and had such faith in people that at times he was hurt.

Enoch was unique. One could look on the inside of his car's trunk and see gifts for everyone: key rings, chains, cakes, balloons, cookies, candies, crosses, and so many other good things which he would give to others. By giving me my first suit from a thrift shop, he taught me how to buy clothes. We can never forget the occasion of his first heart operation. There was quite a group in the waiting room. How surprised we were when lunch was served to all of us. Enoch had ordered and paid for it. He wanted us to have a picnic while he had surgery. Truly Enoch walked with God in his desire to reach and help everyone in his or her relationship with God. The "Good News" for Enoch was really the good and joyful news.

Years ago, I told Enoch that I wanted him to direct my funeral, however he will not be able to do this because Enoch Sidney Finklea, Jr. walked with God and was not, for God took him.

One of the great joys of his ministry was "his boys" - persons who had entered the ministry under his ministry or influence.

He served churches in Spartanburg, Seneca, Starr, Enoree, Lyman, Sumter, Saluda, Gramling,

and Easley. After retiring in 1977, he served for eleven years as pastor of Hopewell and Sharon United Methodist Churches in the Greenwood District. Two of his Annual Conference responsibilities were Chairperson, Town and Country Committee, 1948-52, and Chairperson, Evangelism, 1964-67. His beloved wife and partner in ministry for 55 years was Inza Turner Gilliam. His devotion to her and care for her during her last years were indicative of both his spiritual and physical stamina.

At age 80 he married Gladys Hipp Corley who was an understanding and loving companion.

Hunting fishing, golf and gardening were his recreation. He approached each of these with the same determination and enthusiasm by which he lived each day. His funeral service was held at St. Paul UMC, Saluda, August 2, 1994, with Rev. Joe Alley, Bishop Joseph Bethea, Rev. Sheila Rogers, Rev. Clayton Childers and Rev. Denise Childers officiating. James Cecil Houston was born July 30, 1923, the son of John Robert and Madge Barton Houston. The service of Death and Resurrection was celebrated on April 10, 1995, in Easley, S.C. His earthly body was laid to rest at Greenlawn Memorial Park beside his beloved parents.

Cecil was an active layman at Ariel United Methodist Church. It was in this church he witnessed to God's call in his life. "The earth is the Lord and the fullness thereof..." Cecil found pleasure in the earth. Hunting in the woods and fields, fishing in streams and ponds was where he was most in tune to life and God. He served as athletic director of Drayton Mills; and during World War II, he directed the training program for the mill.

From 1945 through 1974, Reverend Johnson served nine appointments in South Carolina towns including: Chesnee, Union, Spartanburg, Langley, Ninety Six, Lancaster, Newberry, and Aiken. After his retirement he substituted for ministers throughout the Lancaster area. To show how much he was appreciated and loved, Reverend Johnson was named Minister Emeritus of St. Luke United Methodist Church on October 21, 1985. A true Christian, he was a clear and strong preacher.

He was a most devoted and sympathetic pastor. His primary purpose in life was that of preaching the Gospel of Christ in order that lost souls might be won to Jesus. This dedicated minister of the Gospel was called home by his Heavenly Father on Saturday, July 9, 1994 to be eternally with all also have died in the Lord.

People who knew and loved Reverend Johnson are deeply saddened and grieved by the loss that has been sustained in the passing from the earthly scene of a dear friend and brother in Christ Jesus.

Once in the middle of a sermon Bill Jones suddenly launched into a funny story that seemed appropriate, but when he was well into it he realized the punch line was unsuitable for pulpit use! He turned aside from the story and never returned to it, leaving many wondering where he lost them.

We know that because Bill told on himself. And that was some-thing people loved about Bill.

He had a supreme sense of humor. "Next to repentance," he said, "humor is the most religious attitude." But humor was never at someone else's expense, rather his own; Bill was not afraid to tell how long he had worn a favorite pair of tattered pants, or how once he nearly lost his swimsuit diving into a resort pool.

This ability to see the humor in a situation and deal with it gently arose from a sturdy self-confidence. Bill knew who he was and that God loved him, and that enabled him to stand calmly in the middle of a storm. His Christian ministry grew out of that strong sense of self.

Bill was the least defensive of persons—like a giant wrestler who didn't get mad and just let his opponents wear themselves out. If Bill did get protective it was to guard his family.

When he sensed the Conference wanted to move him away from Columbia to get Maryneal out of the editor's chair at the Advocate, Bill quietly took a leave of absence instead.

He was generous to all. The parsonage door was open, and it was not unusual to find him in a

group on Sunday night drinking coffee, talking about the day's sermon and the week's news, and even watching evangelists on TV.

Bill was interested in many things. He studied theology beyond the minimum required for continuing education. He liked music. He traveled. He read Shakespeare for fun. He learned all the kings of England in order, and introduced one of his favorites— Ethelred the Unready. He understood stock options and enjoyed playing the market. (If he made some money he was glad to say so. If he lost some, he would glance around and say, "Now don't tell Maryneal").

In everything Bill displayed an honesty that inspired confidence. With Maryneal and Mark and Eric, and any friends who dropped in, he would evaluate Sunday's sermon. He might say, "I really did good this morning; it was one of the best sermons this church has ever heard." Or, "I tried but it just didn't come together; I've preached better."

Bill was honest to the core. If he said something about himself, or the Bible, or the world, it was the truth as he knew it. His intellectual integrity, hard work, gentleness, and humor combined to make him a most winsome Christian.

His faith compelled consideration: if Bill believed there is a God, then it must be so; if Bill gave his life to the ministry and the church, then they must be worthy vocations; if Bill believed marriage and family are God's blessings, then it's worth working hard to make them both succeed.

Another thing marked him. When Bill moved into a parsonage he began to dig in the lawn. He planted impatiens and begonias and canna lilies and marigolds and salvia, and tended the grape vine and fruit tree.

In the Bible a garden is the symbol of God's good creation and His special delight. To make the garden blossom is man's highest calling. Bill Jones did that with grace and zeal.

1. The procedure of the Annual Conference shall be governed by the following in the order listed: *The Book of Discipline* of the United Methodist Church, *The Standing Rules of the Annual Conference*, *The Rules of Order of the preceding General Conference* and the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised*. For the purpose of transacting business, the quorum shall be those present and eligible to vote. (90)
2. The official roll call of the Annual Conference shall be the roll cards signed by the clerical and lay members present. The record of attendance shall be made from these cards. (94)
3. Lay members of Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees; lay members of the Conference Staff; and lay persons who are heads of Conference institutions supported by the Conference, who are not members of the Annual Conference, shall have the privilege of the floor without vote. (97)
4. In order to secure the floor a member desiring to speak to the Conference shall stand at his or her seat, if able, with one arm raised, but shall not move to a microphone until recognized by the chair. At the microphone the member shall first state his or her name and the charge or appointment represented.
5. No member who has the floor may be interrupted except for a point of order, a misrepresentation, a parliamentary inquiry, a point of information, or to call attention that the time has arrived for a special order.
6. A member of the Conference may not speak more than once on a question before the Conference until every member who wishes to speak has spoken, subject to rules limiting debate. A member shall not speak for more than three (3) minutes at any time, except by permission of the Conference. (98)
7. When the report of a board, council, commission, or committee is under consideration, the chair shall ascertain, when recognizing a member of the Conference, to which side the

member desires to speak: the chair shall not give the floor to any member to speak on the same side of the pending question as the speaker immediately preceding if any member desires to speak to the other side. Except for undebatable motions, no report shall be acted upon or question relating to the same decided without opportunity having been given for at least two speeches for and two speeches against the said proposal. After three speeches for and three against, the question shall be put automatically. However, the chairperson or designated member presenting the report shall be entitled to speak before the vote is taken. This right shall prevail in like manner to a limit of three minutes when a vote is about to be taken on a motion to amend, to substitute, to postpone, to refer, to lay on the table, or any other motion whose adoption is pertinent to the report under consideration.

8. A copy of any motion made on the Conference floor shall be sent to the secretary's desk as soon as the person making the motion returns to his/her seat. (99)
9. The report of a board, council, commission or committee duly presented to the Conference for its action shall be deemed properly before the Conference without the necessity of a motion to adopt and a second thereto.
10. A member rising to a point of order shall state the point as briefly and concisely as possible citing the rule or disciplinary provision invoked in the point of order. A point of order shall be decided by the chair without debate unless the chair submits the question to the body for advice or decision. When the chair rules on a point, debate is closed; but the decision may be appealed to a vote of the body.
11. When a motion is made and seconded and stated by the chair, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or an agency report is made or is published in the Pre-Conference report(s), it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference and may not be altered except by action of the Conference.
12. The main question may be opened to debate under the following motions: to adopt, to commit, to substitute, to postpone, and to reconsider.
13. If any one or more of the following motions shall be made when one or more other motions are pending, the order of their precedence in relation to one another shall be the same as the order of their listing below:
 1. To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (This motion is subject to amendment, or it may be laid on the table.)
 2. To adjourn.
 3. To take a recess.
 4. To raise a question of privilege.
 5. To call for the orders of the day.
 6. To lay on the table.
 7. To order the previous question.
 8. To limit or extend the limits of debate.
 9. To postpone to a given time.
 10. To refer.
 11. To amend or substitute (one amendment being allowed to an amendment).
14. Motions that are to be acted upon without debate:
 1. To adjourn, when unqualified, except to adjourn the Conference finally.
 2. To suspend a rule or rules or any provision of the Standing Rules.
 3. To lay on the table.
 4. To take from the table.
 5. To call for the previous question.
 6. To reconsider a non-debatable motion.

7. To limit or extend the limits of debate.
 8. To call for the orders of the day.
15. When a member moves the previous question, it shall be regarded as applying only to the immediate pending question. This motion shall be taken without debate, and a two-thirds vote of those present and voting shall be required for its adoption. If adopted, the vote shall be taken on the motion to which it applies without further debate.
 16. After discussing a pending question and before relinquishing the floor, a member may make a motion, but not one whose adoption would limit or stop debate.
 17. A motion to reconsider an action of the Conference shall be in order at any time if offered by a member who voted with the prevailing side. If the motion proposed for reconsideration is non-debatable, the motion to reconsider may not be debated.
 18. The report of the Committee on Standing Rules shall be made as a part of the organization of the Conference and as often during the session as necessary.
 - a. All proposed changes in the Standing Rules shall be submitted in writing for referral to the Committee on Standing Rules and then reported out with recommendations after twelve (12) hours.
 - b. It shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote to suspend the rules.
 - c. When the rules are to be suspended, only that specific portion of the rules under consideration shall be suspended.
 - d. The Annual Conference by a majority vote can amend or alter the Standing Rules with or without the concurrence of the Committee on Standing Rules, provided that any change or alteration not originating in the Committee on Standing Rules may be voted on after the lapse of twelve (12) hours from the time of its submission to the Conference. (100)
 19. It shall be an Order of the Day at the morning session of the first full day of Annual Conference that the floor shall be opened for additional nominations to all boards, councils, commissions, and committees to which the Committee on Nominations and parent boards are prepared to make nominations. (101)
 20. It shall be an Order of the Day on the third full day of Annual Conference to have the election of boards, councils, commissions, and committees. If additional nominations have been made per rule 19, and if requested by the Annual Conference, ballots shall be prepared by the Conference Secretary for use in the election. (102)
 21. The report of the Council on Finance and Administration shall be placed on the Conference Program for information on the first full day of the Conference and for action on the last day of the Conference. When a motion for an increase in World Service and Conference Benevolences arises from anyone other than the Council on Finance and Administration and is approved by the Annual Conference, that motion shall be held a minimum of twelve (12) hours and shall require an affirmative vote at a second reading for final approval. If such a motion arises from the Conference floor on the last day of Annual Conference, a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote shall be required for approval. (103)

Voting Procedure

22. At any session of the Annual Conference there shall be a Board of Tellers which shall conduct elections as the Annual Conference may direct. The Board of Tellers shall be nominated and organized by the Conference Secretary and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that this include at least one (1) minister and at least one (1) lay person from each district. (93)

23. Voting shall be by voice or by show of hands or otherwise as ordered by the chair or the Conference. A standing or written count vote may be ordered on call of any member supported by one third of the members present and voting.
24. The Conference shall fix the voting area, also known as the bar of the Conference, at the opening business session and voting on all Conference matters must take place within the prescribed area. The voting area of the Conference shall be distinguished from other areas of the meeting site. Voting shall be by official badge only. When a vote is taken on any question, only those members within the voting bar of the Conference shall be entitled to vote. No member may enter the voting bar after the question is put.
25. Chairs of Annual Conference program boards, councils, commissions and committees and their subcommittees may authorize mail ballots on administrative matters arising between regular meetings of these bodies. (145)
26. Election of Lay Delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences System of Nomination: The following system of nomination and selection shall be followed in the election of lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences:
 1. District Nominations:
 - a. Each local Church may submit nominations to the district superintendent. The district superintendent and the District Board of the Laity will be responsible for requesting a list of nominees from each local church. These nominees shall be selected by the Administrative Board, certified by the Board chairperson and pastor. Only nominations from local churches, prepared on proper forms and received on scheduled time (on or before January 10th), shall be considered for election by the district's lay members of the succeeding Annual Conference.
 - b. A meeting of the persons from the District elected to serve as Lay Members of the succeeding Annual Conference shall be held no later than January 30 of the year in which the election occurs. The district superintendent shall convene the meeting and preside. The Lay Members shall vote by ballot until a maximum of ten persons receive a majority of the votes cast. Ten persons shall be the limit for each District and not the prescribed number for each District. These persons shall be certified to the Conference Secretary as District nominees by the district superintendent no later than February 10. A biographical sketch on prescribed form (prepared by the Board of Laity) is to be presented on each local Church nominee to the District meeting.
 2. Conference Procedure
 - a. A maximum of 120 names selected by the Districts shall be listed and presented to the Conference United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and the Conference Board of the Laity, and the Conference Council on Youth Ministry. Each of these may select up to five (5) additional names.
 - b. The biographical format shall be consistent for all nominees and shall be submitted on a form prepared by the Board of Laity. It shall be submitted to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent no later than March 1st. It shall include prior years elected to General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference; sex; race; and age level and a summary of qualifications up to twenty (20) words in length submitted by the nominee. If a biographical sketch does not adhere to specifications of this resolution, the name and sketch shall be omitted from publication in the Pre-Conference Journal.
 - c. Provision shall be made for write-in ballots.
 - d. The Conference Secretary in preparing the balloting for General and Jurisdictional Conference delegates is authorized to utilize computerization for both lay and clerical ballots. (200)

II. ANNUAL CONFERENCE RULES OF ORGANIZATION

27. All Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees shall submit their informational reports and recommendations in triplicate to the Conference Secretary at least twelve weeks prior to Annual Conference. Excluded from this requirement are the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on Nominations, the Board of Diaconal Ministry and the Statistical Report.
28. The officers of the Annual Conference, to be elected quadrennially, shall be elected at the Annual Conference preceding the beginning of the quadrennium and shall be as follows:
- The auditor, whom the Council on Finance and Administration shall nominate.
 - The chancellor, upon nomination by the bishop.
 - The parliamentarian upon nomination by the bishop.
 - The secretary, upon nominations which arise from the floor.
 - Assistant secretaries as required, upon nomination by the secretary of the Annual Conference.
 - The Conference recorder, who shall be employed by the Conference Secretary.
 - The treasurer-statistician, who shall be elected on nomination of the Council on Finance and Administration.
 - The Conference Lay Leader shall be nominated by a nominating committee consisting of the two (2) Board of Laity representatives from the United Methodist Women, two Board of Laity representatives from the United Methodist Men, two (2) Board of Laity representatives from the Council on Youth Ministry and three (3) District Lay Leaders to be elected to this nominating committee by the Board of Laity. This nominating committee shall make its report to the Annual Conference as Report No. 2 of the Report of the Board of Laity without endorsement. The Conference Lay Leader shall be elected each quadrennium and the tenure shall not exceed eight consecutive years. (95)
29. Compensation for the officers of the Annual Conference shall be determined by the Council on Finance and Administration subject to the approval of the Annual Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall pay those persons from the appropriate fund(s). (96)
30. The number of additional lay members required to equalize lay and clergy representation in the Annual Conference shall be implemented on the basis of the membership reported to the last Annual Conference as follows:

The secretary of the Annual Conference shall be authorized to adjust this base up or down so as to provide the needed number of additional lay members. The secretary shall notify the pastors of each charge qualifying for additional lay members by August 15th of each year. Local charges shall be responsible for the expenses of such members. (92)

31. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds collected unless otherwise specifically designated. He/she shall be custodian of the funds held by the Annual Conference Trustees. (The Trustees shall administer these funds.) He/she shall be the custodian of the Board of Pension funds. He/she shall be the custodian of the Group Insurance Funds. (The Commission on Group Insurance shall administer these funds.) These and all funds allocated to the various boards, councils, commissions and

committees by the Council on Finance and Administration shall be credited by the Conference Treasurer in separate accounts to the boards, councils, commissions, and committees. Disbursement of funds to Conference agencies shall be made by the Conference Treasurer upon order by voucher drawn by the secretary and a co-signer designated by the board, council, commission or committee requesting funds. All boards, councils, commissions, or committees drawing money in block amounts shall make itemized statements of these expenditures to the Conference Treasurer as supporting evidence for his/her records. The expenses of ex-officio members on conference boards and agencies shall be charged to the boards, councils, commissions or committees on which they serve as ex-officio members.

32. Membership resulting from election by the Annual Conference on all boards, councils, commissions and committees which are considered quadrennial shall not exceed eight (8) consecutive years. After this period of service that member shall be ineligible for reelection to that same agency until a lapse of two (2) years. (120)
33. Membership resulting from election by the Annual Conference, shall be limited to one quadrennial agency and one non-quadrennial agency, except ex-officio members as provided. The Joint Review Committee, the Committee on Investigation, and the Committee on Petitions to the General Conference shall be considered neither quadrennial nor non-quadrennial. (121)
34. All Annual Conference boards, councils, commissions and committees are considered quadrennial except the following: The Board of Pensions; The Committee on Investigation; Joint Review Committee; the Conference Commission on Communications; Belin Property; Claflin College; Columbia College; Epworth Children's Home; Greenwood Methodist Home; The Methodist Home, Orangeburg; Spartanburg Methodist College; Trustees of the Annual Conference; Wofford College; the United Methodist Center; the United Methodist Manor of the Pee Dee.
35. The Chairperson of the Conference Committee on Nominations shall notify the Annual Conference Secretary and the director of the Conference Council on Ministries within ten days following Annual Conference of the names, addresses, local churches, and districts of those elected. Within ten days of notification, the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries will notify the elected individuals of their election. The secretaries of the Board, Commission, Committee or Agency will also be notified of those elected by the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, except at the beginning of a quadrennium.
- The term of office of all quadrennial boards, councils, commissions, and committees shall begin with the organization of that board, council, commission, or committee and continue until their successors are elected and organized. Board, council, commission and committee members may continue to serve on program implementing task groups through the program year in which their term of office ends.
 - At the beginning of a quadrennium all quadrennial boards, councils, commissions, and committees shall be convened within sixty (60) days upon the close of the Annual Conference session for organization of the boards, councils, commissions and committees, excepting the Conference Nominating Committee which shall meet prior to December 1. The out-going chairpersons, except where the Annual Conference has elected a chairperson, shall convene and preside over the organizational meeting. Thirty (30) days prior to the organizational meetings, the out-going chairpersons, or the newly elected chairpersons, shall send the following to the members:
 - Notice of meeting date and place.
 - Copies of General and Annual Conference mandates for the boards, councils, commissions and committees.
 - Outline of present organizational structures of the boards, councils, commissions

and committees.

4. Roster of present and newly elected members showing names, addresses, telephone numbers.
36. Members of general church agencies, who serve as ex-officio members of the related Conference agencies, shall be ineligible to hold office. (125)
37. Members of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries staff, when appointed as representatives to various Conference agencies, shall be ex-officio members without vote. (126)
38. Ex-officio members (excluding Conference Staff) of all Conference boards, councils, commissions and committees shall have vote (unless prohibited by the *Discipline* or the Standing Rules), but shall be ineligible to hold office. (127)
39. No trustee, member of the faculty, manager of any interest, or staff person shall at the same time be a member of the parent or supervising board, council, commission or committee, unless otherwise required by the *Discipline* or Standing Rules. (128)
40. Parent boards may not nominate their own members to any board of trust until said member has been off that parent board for at least one (1) year. (129)
41. Any member of a quadrennial board, council, commission or committee who is absent from two (2) consecutive meetings of the same, without rendering an acceptable excuse to the chairperson, shall forfeit membership on such board, council, commission or committee and the chairperson shall notify the person of this action. The chairperson shall notify the Committee on Nominations of such forfeiture. The Committee on Nominations shall nominate for election replacements at the next session of the Annual Conference. (131)
42. When a minister is appointed as District Superintendent, membership on any quadrennial board, council, commission or committee shall automatically cease: provided, that this shall not apply to ex-officio membership on any board, council, commission or committee as required by the *Discipline* or the Standing Rules. (132)

Conference Boards

43. In making nominations for Boards of Trustees, it is recommended that parent boards or agencies (CCOM, BHECM, BHW, MISSIONS) within the framework of the institution's charter (if applicable) maintain at least 25% ethnic minority representation; and when vacancies are filled, at least 25% ethnic minority representation be maintained in the total number of members. It is further recommended that until this representation is achieved, if from one to four members are to be elected, at least one be an ethnic minority; if five to eight members are to be elected, at least two be ethnic minority persons. Nominations from the floor of the session shall comply with the recommended representation. (143)
44. The following Annual Conference Boards shall be composed of twenty-four (24) members. It is recommended that sixteen (16) be lay persons with at least one (1) lay person from each district and eight (8) be clergy persons with no more than one (1) clergy from a district at the time of election, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations for election by the Annual Conference for a quadrennial term:
 - a. Board of Church and Society shall relate to the General Board of Church and Society. (See functions in Para. 728.)
 - b. Board of Education shall relate to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Education. The ex-officio members shall be the chair of The Christian Educators' Fellowship and a representative of the Board of Camps and Retreats.

- c. Board of Evangelism shall relate to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Evangelism, Worship, and Stewardship. (See functions in Paras. 729.1 and 729.3 through 729.7)
 - d. Board of Health and Welfare Ministries shall relate to the General Board of Global Ministries. (See functions in Paras. 731.4(26) through 731.4(36).)
 - e. Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministries shall relate to the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Division of Higher Education. (See functions in Paras. 732.2 through 732.4)
 - f. Board of Missions shall relate to the General Board of Global Ministries. (See functions in Paras. 731.2 through 731.4 (25); 731.5) (1)
45. There shall be a Board of Camps and Retreats consisting of eighteen (18) members. It is recommended that nine (9) be lay persons of whom at least four (4) be women; and nine (9) be clergy of whom at least two (2) be women. Board members shall be nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries, and elected by the Annual Conference for a four (4) year term. No elected member shall serve for more than two consecutive terms.
 - a. Ex-Officio members, without vote, shall be the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, the Superintendent of Asbury Hills, the Superintendent of the Sewee Coastal Retreat Center, and a Representative of the Conference Board of Education.
 - b. The responsibilities of the Board shall be as follows:
 1. Property. To provide for care of facilities and secure adequate insurance coverage. All legal matters relative to the property shall be referred to holder of the title.
 2. Activities. To implement program through the Conference Council on Ministries program process for adoption by the Annual Conference. Each camp or retreat center shall have a subcommittee for program planning.
 3. Finances. To provide for funding of Camps and Retreats through the Conference Council on Ministries in accordance with the policies of the Annual Conference. Responsibilities shall include drawing up a budget, including personnel salaries and expense schedules, setting rates for fees, authorizing and receiving an annual audit.
 4. Promotion. To promote the nature, purpose and service of camps and retreats.
 - c. The Board of Camps and Retreats shall relate to the Annual Conference by way of the Board of Education reporting through the Conference Council on Ministries. (2)
 46. There shall be a Board of Laity composed of the Conference Lay Leader and eight (8) lay persons to be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference for each quadrennium. It is recommended that the eight members be composed of two males (2), two (2) females and two (2) young adults, and two (2) youth. These nominations shall be racially inclusive. The Conference Board of Laity also shall include the following ex-officio members: twelve (12) District Lay Leaders, the President of the United Methodist Men, two (2) representatives of the United Methodist Men elected by that organization, the President of the United Methodist Women, two (2) representatives of the United Methodist Women elected by that organization, the President of the Council on Youth Ministries, two (2) representatives of the Council on Youth Ministries elected by that organization, one (1) District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop, the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, all past Conference Lay Leaders and the Bishop. After it is organized, the Board of Laity shall have authority to elect no more than three (3) at large members who may serve as Directors of Program to relate to the section on lay ministry and the section on stewardship of the General Board of Discipleship. (See functions in Para. 730 BOD.) (3)
 47. The Board of Ordained Ministry shall be composed of thirty-six (36) ordained ministers in full connection and six lay members nominated by the presiding Bishop in accordance with Para. 733.1a BOD and elected by the Annual Conference. (5)

48. The Board of Diaconal Ministry shall be composed of fifteen (15) members nominated by the presiding bishop in accordance with Para. 734 BOD after consultation with the executive committee of the board of the previous quadrennium and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that at least five (5) of these persons shall be in Diaconal Ministry careers, preferably, Diaconal Ministers. In accordance with *The Discipline*, the bishop shall designate a member of the cabinet and may designate a staff person from the CCOM to be ex-officio members of the board (cf. 734.1b BOD) (6)
49. The Board of Pensions shall be composed of eighteen (18) members nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that six (6) be lay men, six (6) be lay women, and six be (6) clergy persons. (See functions in Para. 737) (7)
50. There shall be a Board of Trustees of the James L. Belin Property composed of twelve (12) elected members. It is recommended that six (6) be lay persons and six (6) be clergy persons. The Marion District Superintendent shall serve as an ex-officio member of the Board.
- Persons serving on this Board shall be nominated by the Board of Missions.
 - The Board shall be organized into four (4) classes of three (3) persons.
 - One class shall be elected annually to serve for four years.
 - The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years and this tenure shall apply to the consecutive years of present Trustees. After such period of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for reelection until a lapse of four (4) years.
 - The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions. (8)
51. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Claflin College composed of not less than seven (7) nor more than twenty-seven (27) members divided into three classes serving three (3) years respectively, elected at the annual meeting of the Board. Successors for each class, as their term expires, shall be nominated by a college related agency and/or the Nominating Committee of the Board of Trustees and elected by the Board of Trustees for a term of three (3) years. After twenty-four (24) years of continuous service, trustees may be placed in a class of trustee emeritus.
- The trustees shall elect their successors from a list of nominees submitted by the various supporting Conferences of the United Methodist Church and the Claflin College General Alumni Association. The composition of the Board shall at all times include three (3) members from the South Carolina Annual Conference and with one representative of the Conference to be placed in each class and shall be replaced or renominated by the South Carolina Annual Conference upon the expiration of each succeeding class. The remaining membership of the Claflin Board of Trustees shall be elected by the Board from nominations made to and approved by the Nominating Committee of the Board from recommendations received from the general Alumni Association and other college related Conferences and agencies.
 - This institution shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Higher Education. (9)
52. There shall be Boards of Trustees for Columbia College and for Wofford College, each of which shall be composed of twenty-seven (27) members, elected by the Annual Conference in conformity with the respective charters. The term of office for trustees shall be four (4) years. Each board shall be organized into three (3) classes of seven (7) members each and of one (1) class of six (6) members.
- The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry annually shall nominate suitable persons to fill vacancies in each class after prior consultation with the respective Boards of Trustees. Those elected shall be eligible for re-election to a maximum tenure of twelve (12) consecutive years except where thirteen (13) consecutive years

will allow the completion of tenure with one of the classes. This exception to the tenure of twelve (12) consecutive years shall not apply to trustees elected in 1990 and thereafter. After a full tenure of service a former trustee shall be ineligible for re-election until a lapse of two (2) years.

- These institutions shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. (10)
53. There shall be Boards of Trustees of Epworth Children's Home, Greenwood Methodist Home, The Methodist Home, Orangeburg and the United Methodist Manor of the Pee Dee. Each board shall be composed of twenty-one (21) members elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that eleven (11) be lay persons and ten (10) be clergy persons and at least three (3) be women.
- Persons serving on these boards of trust shall be nominated to the Annual Conference every even-numbered year by the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries.
 - The tenure of trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which period a person shall be ineligible for re-election until two (2) years have elapsed.
 - The boards shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries. (11)
54. The Board of Trustees of *The South Carolina United Methodist Advocate* shall be the Conference Commission on Communications as prescribed in SR 63.
55. There shall be a Board of Trustees for The United Methodist Center composed of nine (9) persons and one ex-officio member. It is recommended that of the elected members four (4) be clergy and five (5) laity. They shall be elected by the South Carolina Annual Conference upon nomination by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations. The tenure of trustees shall be limited to eight (8) consecutive years, after which a person shall be ineligible for re-election until a period of two (2) years has elapsed. The Board shall be organized into four (4) classes with at least one lay and one clergy in each class. In addition, one ex-officio member, without vote, from the employees shall be chosen annually by the employees of the United Methodist Center to meet with the Board. (13)
56. There shall be a Board of Trustees of Spartanburg Methodist College composed of twenty-four (24) elected or named members and one (1) Student Advisory Trustee who shall be a recent graduate of the college.
- Persons serving on this Board of Trustees shall be nominated to the Annual Conference by the Board of Missions. Those elected and named Trustees shall be divided into three (3) classes of eight (8) each. One class shall be elected each year to serve for three (3) years.
 - The tenure of the Trustees shall be limited to twelve (12) consecutive years. The tenure of the Student Advisory Trustees shall be one (1) year.
 - The Board of Trustees shall report to the Annual Conference through the Board of Missions. (14)

Annual Conference Councils

57. The Council on Finance and Administration shall be composed of fifteen (15) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee On Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that seven (7) be clergy persons and eight (8) lay persons and such ex-officio members as *The Book of Discipline* may prescribe (Para. 709.2b). (30)
58. The Council on Ministries shall be composed of the following: the presiding bishop; the district superintendents; the Conference Secretary; two (2) representatives of the Conference youth organizations; two (2) representatives of the Conference United Methodist Men; two (2) representatives of the Conference United Methodist Women; the

chairpersons of the District Councils on Ministries; one (1) lay person from each district. It is recommended that one of the two representatives from the following be a lay person: Church and Society; Education; Evangelism; Health and Welfare Ministries; Higher Education and Campus Ministry; Laity (one (1) of whom shall be the Conference Lay Leader); Ordained Ministry (both shall be clergy persons and one (1) shall be chairperson); Missions and the Board of Diaconal Ministry. There shall be one (1) representative from each of the following commissions: Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns; Religion and Race; Status and Role of Women; Worship. There shall be one (1) representative from each of the following Committees: Career Planning and Counseling Committee, Ethnic Local Church Concerns Committee, and Pastoral Care and Counseling Committee. The following shall be ex-officio members without vote: The chairperson of Pastoral Care and Counseling; the Conference Staff (salaried and volunteer); the Conference Treasurer; one (1) representative from the Council on Finance and Administration; the Administrator of the Conference Commission on Communications; and the administrator of the Office of Ministerial Affairs.

59. The Council on Youth Ministry shall be organized by and amenable to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. The Council shall function as per paragraph 745 of the *Book of Discipline*.

Annual Conference Commissions

60. The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of eight persons nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that four (4) be lay persons and four (4) clergy persons. Ex-officio members shall be: the President of the Annual Conference Historical Society, the Annual Conference Historian, the Conference Secretary, the archivist of Claflin College and the archivist of Wofford College. The libraries at Claflin College and Wofford College shall be designated as depositories of all Annual Conference minutes and records. Where possible duplicate copies of all material shall be furnished; in case of materials which cannot be furnished in duplicate, the secretary of the Annual Conference shall make the determination as to which depository shall be used.
61. The following Annual Conference Commissions shall be composed of eighteen (18) members. It is recommended that twelve (12) be lay persons with one (1) lay person from each district and six (6) be clergy persons with no more than one (1) clergy from a district at the time of election, nominated by the Conference Committee on Nominations for election by the Annual Conference for a quadrennial term:
- Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns relates to the General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns. (See functions in Para. 739.)
 - Commission on Group Insurance shall supervise the Annual Conference group insurance program.
 - Commission on Religion and Race relates to the General Commission on Religion and Race. (See functions in Para. 740.) It is recommended that of the twelve lay persons, there be nine (9) from ethnic minorities and three (3) from the majority membership; and of the six (6) clergy persons, there be three (3) from the ethnic minorities and three (3) from the majority membership.
 - Commission on the Status and Role of Women relates to the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women. (See functions in Para. 741.) It is recommended that of the eighteen elected, six (6) be lay women, six (6) laymen with one lay person from each district; and six (6) clergy of whom at least four (4) be women. In addition, one member at large shall be named from the Conference United Methodist Women.
 - Commission on Worship shall relate to the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Evangelism, Worship and Stewardship. (See Para. 729.4.) The ex-officio members shall be the president, or a designated representative, of the South Carolina Chapter

of the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music and Other Arts. (41)

62. The Commission on Equitable Compensation shall be composed of twelve (12) elected members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that six (6) be lay persons and six (6) clergy. One ex-officio member shall be designated from each of the following Boards: Missions, Ordained Ministry and Laity. (Note: In accordance with Para. 722, one District Superintendent is named by the cabinet as a member. At least one of the elected lay persons and at least one of the elected clergy shall be from a church of fewer than two hundred (200) members.)

Annual Conference Committees

63. There shall be a Conference Commission on Communications composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference, and six (6) ex-officio members with voice but no vote. It is recommended that the nine (9) elected members include five (5) lay members and four (4) clergy members. The seven (7) ex-officio members shall be the bishop, a cabinet representative, the director of the Conference Council on Ministries, the president of the Council on Finance and Administration, the conference lay leader, the conference secretary, and the secretary for Publicity and Public Relations for the United Methodist Women.
- The nine (9) members of the CCOC with vote shall be divided into three (3) classes of three (3) members each. The class of 1996 shall serve 1 year. The class of 1997 shall serve 2 years. The class of 1998 shall serve 3 years. Beginning in 1996 a new class shall be elected each successive year to serve for three years.
 - The members of the CCOC shall serve as the Board of Trustees of the *South Carolina United Methodist Advocate*. Their election as members of the CCOC shall constitute their election as the Advocate Trustees.
64. There shall be a Committee on the Annual Conference. In accordance with the 1992 *Book of Discipline*, membership includes the Bishop, the District Superintendents and Conference Lay Leader. There shall be twelve (12) elected members nominated by the Committee on Nominations for election by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that these twelve (12) elected members be lay persons; up to four (4) additional clergy may also be nominated. The ex-officio members shall be: the director of the Conference Council on Ministries, the Annual Conference Secretary, Treasurer and Parliamentarian; and one (1) representative of the Commission on Worship, the United Methodist Women, the United Methodist Men, the United Methodist Youth Fellowship (who is elected by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries). The pastor(s) of the host church(es) of the next Annual Conference session shall meet with the Committee in the Pre-Conference meetings.
- The bishop shall serve as the chairperson of the Committee.
 - The Committee shall prepare a proposed agenda for adoption by the Annual Conference, giving due regard to any special orders required by the *Discipline* or as ordered by the Annual Conference. The Committee shall determine the compensation and expenses to be paid speakers invited by this Committee, and the Treasurer shall make such payments from the Conference expense funds.
 - The Committee shall receive all invitations to host the Annual Conference. It shall recommend to the Annual Conference the place for the entertainment of the Annual Conference at least two years in advance.
 - The Committee shall conduct all matters of courtesy and make such introductions as are necessary during the sessions of Annual Conference.
 - The Committee shall arrange for an appropriate Memorial Service to be held annually and shall select the speaker.

65. There shall be a Committee on the Conference Journal composed of nine (9) persons nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that three (3) be clerical members and six (6) lay members. The following shall be ex-officio members: the Conference Secretary; the first assistant Conference secretary; the editor of the South Carolina United Methodist **Advocate**; the statistician.
- a. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the Pre-Conference report(s)
 1. The Committee shall inform the Boards, Councils, Commissions and Committees when reports shall be due in order to maintain the schedule for the Pre-Conference Journal.
 2. No report by any Board, Council, Commission or Committee shall be considered by the Annual Conference that has not been distributed at least four weeks prior to the Conference session.
 - a. Excluded from this requirement are the reports of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Committee on Nominations, the Board of Diaconal Ministry, and the Statistical Reports.
 - b. The Committee shall cooperate with the Conference Secretary in determining the accuracy of the daily minutes. The Committee shall report concerning the accuracy of these minutes to the next Annual Conference session and shall note any discrepancies and/or exceptions and shall cause these to be noted in the Conference **Journal** next published.
 - c. The Committee shall publish the South Carolina Conference **Journal** in one volume and shall have the **Journal** ready for distribution at least by October 1 following the close of Annual Conference. The **Journal** shall include the informational reports included in the Pre-Conference report(s), the deliberations of the Annual Conference, and the Statistical Report.
 1. The chairperson of the Committee, the secretary of the Committee and the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall edit the Conference **Journal**.
 2. The Committee shall let the contract for the printing of the Conference **Journal**, and shall provide for the printing at least one year in advance.
 - d. The Committee shall be responsible for the publication of the volume entitled **United Methodist Ministers in South Carolina**, which shall be printed every ten (10) years, and which shall feature biographical sketches and pictures of all the ministers of the South Carolina Conference.
 - e. The Committee shall be responsible for the selection of persons to write the memoirs of the ministers and ministers' spouses who have died during the year. These memorials shall be printed in the Conference **Journal**; those of the minister shall not exceed 600 words and those of spouses shall not exceed 250 words. (61)
66. The Joint Committee on Disability shall be composed of two (2) members of the Board of the Ordained Ministry (to be named by the chairperson of the Board), the chairperson and secretary of the Board of Pensions and a district superintendent appointed by the Bishop. (62)
67. There shall be a Committee on Career Planning and Counseling composed of twelve (12) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that eight (8) be lay persons and four (4) be clergy persons. There shall be no more than one (1) clergy or lay person from a district at the time of election. The Committee shall be related to the Office of Personnel of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry. (63)
68. There shall be a Committee on Ethnic Local Church Concerns composed of twelve (12) members. It is recommended that four (4) be clergy, four (4) lay women, and four (4) lay men nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that all ethnic groups be included in this membership.
- a. Ex-officio members shall include one representative from each of the following groups: The Commission on Status and Role of Women, the Commission on Religion and Race, the Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling, the chairperson of all recognized ethnic program committees, and two (2) representatives from the Cabinet.
 - b. The Committee shall implement the South Carolina Annual Conference Comprehensive Plan for Continuing Emphasis on the Ethnic Minority Local Church while at the same time carrying out mandates from the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. (64)
69. There shall be a Committee on Native American Ministry composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries and elected by the Annual Conference.
70. There shall be an Executive Committee of the Office of Ministerial Affairs to be composed of the chairperson and one (1) other representative of the Board of Pensions, the Commission on Group Insurance, the Board of the South Carolina Methodist Conference Credit Union, and elected annually by these parent boards. The administrator of the Office of Ministerial Affairs shall be nominated by the Executive Committee of the Office of Ministerial Affairs. (65)
71. There shall be a Conference Committee on Nominations of twenty-four (24) members composed of two representatives nominated and elected by each district. It is recommended that these be one clergy and one lay representative from each district. The additional members shall include: the resident Bishop, a youth and young adult, nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries; up to six (6) at large members, who may be nominated by the bishop to ensure adequate representation; and the following members: the Conference Lay Leader, an elected representative of United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, the Conference Council on Youth Ministry, a retired member of the Annual Conference selected by the retired ministers, and a District Superintendent named by the bishop. The Conference Committee on Nominations shall elect its officers. The following shall be ex-officio members without vote: the chairperson of the Conference Standing Rules Committee, the chairperson of the Conference Council on Ministries, the director of the Conference Council on Ministries, the chairperson of the Commission on the Status and Role of Women, the chairperson of the Commission on Religion and Race, and the chairperson of the Conference Missional Priority Coordinating Committee.
- a. It is recommended that there be one (1) lay person nominated and elected by each District Board of the Laity of each of the twelve (12) districts. Where there is no District Board of the Laity, the one (1) lay person shall be nominated and elected by the church lay leaders of that District.
 - b. It is recommended that there be one (1) clerical person nominated and elected from each District by the ministers of each of the twelve (12) Districts.
 - c. These nominees, both lay and clerical, shall be elected by secret ballot in each district after at least three (3) persons shall have been nominated from the floor of each of the electing bodies. Election shall be by simple majority.
 - d. If a member of the Committee on Nominations, who has been nominated by the District moves beyond the boundaries of the District in which he/she was nominated, his/her membership on the Committee shall be terminated, except for the chairperson, vice-chairperson, and secretary, who should continue to serve as members-at-large on the Conference Committee on Nominations until the end of the quadrennium.
 - e. When district vacancies occur on the Committee, replacements shall be nominated as per rule 71.c to serve the remainder of the quadrennium. In the event that the elected chairperson of the Nominating Committee is one of the two elected representatives of a district, that chairperson shall become an additional member-at-large and the respective district shall elect another representative for that district, both of whom shall serve until the end of the quadrennium.

- f. Current members of the Committee on Nominations shall not be nominated for membership on any Board, Council, Commission or Committee whose membership arises from nominations from this committee.
 - g. Ex-officio members of the Nominating Committee shall be excluded from rule 71.f.
 - h. The Committee shall make all nominations needed by the Annual Conference except as provided elsewhere by the *Discipline* or Standing Rules of the Annual Conference. When the *Discipline* or Standing Rules require nominations be made by other agencies of the Annual Conference, those nominations shall be reported to the Committee no later than March 15 of each year for information only. These nominations will not be submitted to the Annual Conference through the Committee on Nominations.
 - i. Nominations of chairpersons of all quadrennial boards, councils, commissions, and committees, whose election is not prescribed by the *Discipline* or other sections of these Standing Rules shall be a nominated member of that board, council, commission, or committee and shall be submitted by the Committee on Nominations to the Annual Conference for election.
 - j. When nominations are made, the persons nominated shall be consulted and their consent to serve received; whether nominated by parent boards, the Committee on Nominations or from the floor of the Annual Conference.
 - k. The Annual Conference Committee on Nominations shall make nominations so that approximately one half (1/2) of the membership of all boards, councils, commissions and committee shall be rotated each quadrennium.
 - l. The report of the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations shall include the full name, current address and phone number(s) of each nominee.
 - m. It is recommended that the Nominating Committee nominate at least 25% ethnic minority representation to all Conference Boards and Agencies where such nominees originate with the Conference Committee on Nominations. When vacancies are filled and nominations from the floor are offered it is recommended that at least 25% ethnic minority membership be maintained. It is also recommended that until this representation is achieved, if from one to four members are to be elected, at least one be an ethnic minority; if five to eight are to be elected, at least two be ethnic minority persons.
 - n. Unless otherwise provided in the *Book of Discipline*, a vacancy in the membership of a board, council, commission, or committee may be filled, an interim, by the board, council, commission, or committee for the remainder of the Conference year in which the vacancy occurs. At its next session the Annual Conference shall fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term. The respective board, council, commission, or committee shall inform the Committee on Nominations of the vacancy and its action.
72. There shall be a Committee on Pastoral Care and Counseling composed of twelve (12) persons nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that eight (8) be clergy persons and four (4) be lay persons. (67)
73. There shall be a Committee on Petitions to the General Conference composed of six (6) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that four (4) be lay persons and two (2) clergy persons. This committee shall be considered a task force and neither a quadrennial board nor a non-quadrennial board. (68)
74. There shall be a Committee on Resolutions and Appeals composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that six (6) be lay persons and three (3) clergy persons.
- a. Resolutions not initiated by a constituted board, commission or committee may be

referred to those agencies. Any resolution not referred to a constituted board, council, commission or committee shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals, and shall be reported by this Committee to the Annual Conference with a recommendation of concurrence or nonconcurrence with rationale.

- b. Resolutions shall be presented to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals no later than March 15 of each Conference Year in order that they may be included in the Pre-Conference Journal.
 - c. Additional resolutions should be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals by the end of the afternoon session on the first full business day of the Annual Conference. The group, individual or Cluster presenting a Resolution must be responsible for printing and distributing their resolution to all members of the Annual Conference on the first full business day of the Conference. The Report of the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals will be an 'Order of the Day' the morning of the third full business day of Annual Conference.
 - d. The Committee on Resolutions and Appeals shall on the first full business day of Annual Conference provide time for persons offering amendments to come before the Committee on Resolutions and Appeals to define and talk about their resolutions.
75. There shall be a Committee on Standing Rules composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that six (6) be lay persons and three (3) clergy persons. The following shall be ex-officio members with vote: The president of the Conference United Methodist Women, the president of the Conference United Methodist Men, the president of the Conference Council on Youth Ministry, the Conference secretary, the Conference lay leader, the chairperson of the Conference Council on Ministries, at least one District Superintendent and the Conference Parliamentarian.
76. There shall be a Committee on Deaconess and Home Missionary Service composed of nine (9) members nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that this include three (3) lay persons and three (3) clergy. There shall be three (3) ex-officio members, one (1) from the United Methodist Women, one (1) from the Conference Board of Missions and one (1) from the Board of Diaconal Ministry.
77. There shall be a Conference Committee on Episcopacy composed of fifteen members. In accordance with the *Discipline* (Para. 735), membership shall consist of the following: one-fifth appointed by the bishop, and the balance nominated by the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference. It is recommended that one-third be clergy persons, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, provided that one layperson shall be the Conference lay leader. Ex-officio members with vote shall be the lay and clergy members of the jurisdictional Committee on Episcopacy.

III. DISTRICT RULES AND ORGANIZATION

78. There shall be twelve (12) districts in the South Carolina Annual Conference.
79. Where there is a District Conference it shall be composed of all ministers, deaconesses, the church lay leader, the lay members of Annual Conference, the president of the United Methodist Women, the president of the United Methodist Youth Ministries, and the president of the United Methodist Men from each local church in the district, the district lay leader, and associate lay leaders, the district president of the United Methodist Women, the district president of the United Methodist Men, the president of the District Council on Youth Ministry, the chairperson of the District Council on Ministries, the chairperson of the District Trustees, the chairperson of the District Committee on Church Location and Building, the chairperson of the District Committee on Superintendency, and the district superintendent who shall preside over the Conference.

80. There shall be in each district a District Council on Ministries. The district superintendent shall consult with the District Committee on Nominations in the selection of persons to serve on the District Council on Ministries. The District Council on Ministries shall be composed of the following: the district superintendent, the district director of the following program areas: Health and Welfare, Church and Society, Education, Evangelism, Worship, Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, Religion and Race, Communications, Town and Country and/or Urban Ministries, Disaster Response and Congregational Development; persons representing constituency groups including the District Lay Leader, the District Associate Lay Leaders, the District Director of Lay Speaking, the President of the United Methodist Men and United Methodist Women, and President of the District Youth Council; coordinators of age-level and family ministries. Representatives from cluster groups may be included in districts where cluster groups exist. Additional resource persons may be added. As noted in paragraph 752.3 BOD, the chairperson shall be elected from the membership. A vice-chairperson and secretary may also be elected from the membership. The selection process shall be in keeping with the spirit of inclusivity as outlined in paragraph 752.2 BOD.
81. Where the *Discipline* allows for a district director, representative, or secretary for a Conference agency, the person or persons named shall be from among the elected members of that agency. (130)
82. There shall be a Committee on Nominations in each district. This committee shall make nominations to be forwarded by the two district representatives to the Annual Conference Committee on Nominations for election by the Annual Conference.
- a. The District Committee on Nominations shall be composed of: The district superintendent as chairperson; the District Lay Leader or his/her designated Associate Lay Leader; the District Director of Lay Speaking; the presidents of the District United Methodist Women, the District United Methodist Men, the District Youth Council and one other representative of each selected by the respective organization's executive committee. Where there is no District Youth Council, the district superintendent shall appoint the two (2) youth members. It is recommended that gender and racial balance be considered in selection. The two (2) Conference Nominating Committee members from the district shall also serve.
- b. The District Committee on Nominations shall request of each local pastor, lay leader, Council on Ministries chairperson, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Men, and United Methodist Youth Fellowship president possible nominees to serve. Forms designed by the Conference Nominating Committee will be provided each District Committee, which in turn, shall make them available to each local church. These forms shall include biographical data, local church experience, etc., and shall include a space for the possible nominee's signature indicating willingness to serve.
- c. The District Committee on Nominations shall review all forms submitted and will forward these recommendations through the two (2) district representatives to the Annual Conference Nominating Committee after signatures indicating willingness to serve have been secured. District Nominating Committees shall be encouraged to be inclusive of the constituency of the district in their nominations.
83. The District lay leader and two associate lay leader(s) shall be nominated by the laity on the district nominating committee and elected by the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated and elected quadrennially and may serve no more than two (2) consecutive quadrennia. Election to membership during a quadrennium shall be considered service for a full quadrennium. (112)
84. In accordance with the *Discipline* (Para. 759.2) the eight (8) elected members of the Committee on the District Superintendency shall be nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and elected by the Annual Conference or by the District Conference where it exists. (114)

85. There shall be in each district a District Board for Congregational Development (DBCD). The DBCD shall be elected quadrennially by the Annual Conference, upon nomination by the District Committee on Nominations. Vacancies shall be filled annually by election by the Annual Conference. The DBCD shall be composed of not fewer than five (5) or more than nine (9) elected members, plus the district representatives appointed by the district superintendent to the Conference Coordinating Committee for Congregational Development. The district superintendent shall preside over the work of the Board.
- a. The purpose of the DBCD shall be to promote long term planning and provide a coordinating framework for all the efforts of the district related to new church development, church redevelopment, and congregational revitalization.
- b. The responsibilities shall be:
1. Update population statistics and informational data of the district.
 2. Review facility conditions and congregational vitality.
 3. Develop district strategies and priorities for new church development, church redevelopment, and congregational revitalization.
 4. Administer all funds raised at the district level, and received from all Conference sources for congregational development.
 5. Submit proposals to Annual Conference boards and agencies (Equitable Salaries, New Church Development Congregational Redevelopment, funds administered by the Trustees of the Annual Conference, Council on Finance and Administration, etc.) for funding of congregational development within the district.
 6. Locally held accounts held by the DBCD shall be audited annually, with copy filed to the Council on Finance and Administration. Funds received and disbursed through the office of the Conference Treasurer do not require audits but are managed by voucher only.
86. Each district superintendent shall transmit the complete list of lay members to the Annual Conference from the district in triplicate to the secretary of the Annual Conference at least five (5) months prior to the opening date of the Annual Conference.
87. Youth and young adult members of the Annual Conference, and their reserves, shall be elected by the District Council on Ministries from nominations which arise from the District Council on Youth Ministry, District Coordinators of Adult Ministry and from the local churches within the districts. Their expense shall be borne by the districts electing them.
88. Guidelines for Quadrennial Training of Lay Members of Annual Conference
- a. That a training session be held in each district no later than January 30 of the year in which delegates are elected to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. The purpose of this session is to prepare local church members of the Annual Conference for this highly important quadrennial process of the United Methodist Church. The training session, which would precede the district nominations for the pool of possible delegates, would include the following:
1. The important role of Annual Conference lay members.
 2. Connectionalism/Representative system.
 3. Functions of General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference.
 4. Commitment and involvement of delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
 5. Process for selection of Bishops.
- b. That this training session be planned by the District Superintendent, the district lay leader, and a committee of no less than five (5) persons; and include all persons in the district who have served as delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences.
- c. That a follow-up session be held in each local church for education of local church members.

IV. MISCELLANEOUS RULES

89. All lay persons employed by the agencies of the Conference shall conform to the compulsory retirement age set for the ministers of the church. Such retired lay persons may be employed on a part-time basis without executive administrative responsibility.
90. All monies to be credited to the accounts of local churches for the fiscal year shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer not later than fifteen (15) days after the end of the fiscal year.
91. "Moving Day" for the ministers shall be the second Wednesday following the close of Annual Conference.
 - a. Where special circumstances dictate any alteration of this moving date, the affected persons and the district superintendent involved shall be permitted to make the necessary adjustments.
 - b. Ministers shall be paid during the month of June proportionately by the charge from which they are moved and the charge to which they are moved on the basis of the percentage of Sundays actually served in each charge.
 - c. The moving expenses of the pastor shall be paid by the charge to which he/she is moved, not to include more than \$150.00 packing expenses.
92. Pastors reports to Annual Conference shall cover the calendar year (January 1-December 31) and shall be sent to the Conference treasurer-statistician so as to reach that office not later than January 15 of the year immediately following.
93. All support ministries or agencies which receive funds from the South Carolina Annual Conference, but which are not directly responsible to the Conference shall submit an annual program and an audit including a management letter to the sponsoring Conference agency.
94. No requests shall be made for services of the Conference chancellor except by the Episcopal Office.
95. Persons applying for Sabbatical Leave who are requesting funding for pension and insurance benefits shall apply to the Board of the Ordained Ministry for funding consideration prior to February 1st preceding the Annual Conference session. Funding will be granted for no more than two (2) persons on Sabbatical Leave in any Conference appointment year.
96. When a leave of absence is granted, and upon the recommendation of the Bishop and the Cabinet, the Council on Finance and Administration shall make a sustentation grant from the Conference contingency funds not to exceed forty percent of the denominational average compensation paid on a monthly basis. All interim sustentation grants shall be reported to the Annual Conference at its next session. If the sustentation grant is approved, CPP shall be provided for eligible persons. Upon the recommendation of the Bishop and Cabinet and the approval of the Annual Conference, the Commission on Equitable Compensation shall continue to fund the sustentation grants in the same monthly percentage for a period not to exceed one additional Conference year. No claim may be made on the sustentation fund when disability benefits are granted from the Board of Pensions.
97. All persons at the Annual Conference level who are officially involved in the trial process, including the members of the trial court, the witnesses at the trial, the counsel for the church, the counsel for the despondent, and the respondent shall receive only reimbursement for vouchered travel, meals, and lodging expenses from the Annual Conference Contingency Fund according to the schedule of payments adopted by the Annual Conference for those involved in the official business of the Annual Conference.

SECTION XI

HISTORICAL RECORD OF SESSIONS OF THE SOUTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE

A detailed history of the South Carolina Conference has been published in *The History of South Carolina Methodism* by Albert D. Betts (Columbia: The Advocate Press, 1982), and the following chronology is based on the information contained in Dr. Betts' history. When John Wesley called his lay preachers together in London on June 25, 1744, to "confer" on the work of the growing Methodist Societies, the die for the annual Conference was cast. The practice was brought to the American shore as the Methodist Societies grew in the Colonies.

In colonial times Conferences were not neatly divided by the geographic divisions we find today, and, correspondingly, it is difficult to trace precisely a lineage that would make it possible to identify "the first Conference." Dr. Betts refers to the "first American 'Annual Conference'" (p. 34) as the one held in George's Church, Philadelphia, July 14, 1773, on the call of John Rankin who had been sent to America by John Wesley. The South Carolina Conference was organized in 1785, when a "section" of the Annual Conference was called at Louisburg, North Carolina, on April 20, 1785, the first Annual Conference at which Francis Asbury presided. About two years later, on March 22, 1787, the first session of the South Carolina Conference was held in Charleston, with both Bishops Francis Asbury and Thomas Coke sharing responsibilities as presiding officers. Sessions of the 1785 Conference are delineated as shown in the tables below.

The 1866 South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church was organized on April 2, 1866, in Charleston, South Carolina, following disagreement between blacks and whites about simultaneous but segregated worship of the two races.* (Detailed history of the 1866 Conference may be found in *Passionate Journey*, by John W. Curry, St. Matthews: Bill Wise Printers, 1980.) Pursuant to the 1964 General Conference action which dissolved the Central Jurisdiction to achieve "racial inclusiveness at all levels of the church," the 181st Session of the South Carolina Conference (1785) passed a resolution requesting bishops of the two South Carolina conferences to appoint a committee to work out a plan of merger.** The two conferences became one again in 1972. Sessions of the 1866 Conference are shown in tables below.

In 1914, General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, voted to divide the South Carolina Annual Conference (1785) and instructed the conference to fix a line of division. At its 129th Session the South Carolina Conference (1785) created the Upper South Carolina Conference.*** The two were combined again in 1948. Sessions of the Upper South Carolina Conference are shown in tables below.

1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies:Nature of Activities:

- 1.1 The South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church governs the various boards, commissions, committees and agencies whose purpose is to carry out the programs of the United Methodist Church. The South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church is a nonprofit religious organization and is exempt from paying income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. These financial statements report only those transactions maintained by the Treasurer of the South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Significant Accounting Policies:1.2 Fund Accounting:

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Conference, its accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. Resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund. Although transactions and balances of each board, commission, committee and agency are maintained separately, accounts which have similar characteristics are combined in the accompanying financial statements.

1.3 Cash and Cash Equivalents:

For purposes of reporting the statement of cash flows, the Conference considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

1.4 Investments:

Investments are recorded at cost which approximates market value. Earned income received on investments by the Conference Treasurer is allocated on the last business day of the year to the Conference Boards and Agencies and to certain district funds on the basis of month-end average balances held by the Treasurer.

Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued):

1.5 Property and Equipment:

Property and Equipment are recorded as expenditures at the time of purchase. These purchases are not reflected in a property and equipment fund.

2. Fidelity Bond:

The General Council on Finance and Administration provides \$ 1,000,000 fidelity bond protection for all Annual Conference Treasurers at no charge. Fidelity bonding for trustees and related staff is provided by the Annual Conference.

3. Ministerial Pension Plan and Comprehensive Protection Plan (MPP/CPP)
and Cumulative Pension and Benefit Fund (CPBF):

The South Carolina Conference of the United Methodist Church participates in a defined benefit multi-employer pension plan administered by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The plan provides pension benefits to retiring members in addition to providing disability income benefits and guaranteed minimum benefits for widows and dependent children of deceased members.

The Conference contributes to the fund an amount equivalent to twelve percent (12%) of each minister's annual plan compensation (cash salary, tax-deferred contributions made, and housing allowance). For lay employees, the Conference contributes nine percent (9%) and the lay employee contributes three percent (3%). CPP contributions for eligible full-time ministers are the equivalent of 4.4% of the minister's plan compensation. MPP and CPP contributions are limited by the current denominational average compensation. Past service defined benefit funding is an annual actuarially determined amount approved by the Annual Conference. Each participant's contributions are fully vested. The Conference Treasurer remitted \$ 3,280,000 in 1994 and \$ 3,099,487 in 1993 to the General Board of Pensions. The Conference is not liable for any unfunded liabilities.

Past service expenses charged to the Annual Conference are \$ 787,046 and \$ 887,633 in 1994 and 1993, respectively. The Individual Annuity Mortality Table adjusted with a six percent (6%) interest assumption was used in the determination of these amounts.

Ministers' pension payments received by the Conference Treasurer are remitted to the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.

4. Accounting for Post-Retirement Benefits Other Than Pensions:

The Annual Conference requires no payment from retirees for retiree or dependents and does not plan to change this policy.

The Annual Conference sponsors a defined benefit post-retirement medical plan that covers substantially all of its statutory and common-law employees. The Plan is non-contributory and no change is anticipated in the future. The Plan is unfunded.

The Annual Conference also sponsors a defined benefit post-retirement death benefit plan that covers substantially all of its retired clergy members. This plan is non-contributory, is fully funded, and no change from this policy is anticipated in the future.

Other than the plans identified above, the Annual Conference sponsors no other post-retirement benefit plans.

As of January 1, 1993, the provisions of Statement of Financial Accounting Standard (SFAS) No. 106, "Employer's Accounting for Post-Retirement Benefits Other Than Pensions", were adopted. Legal opinion has been obtained that the plans described above are multi-employer plans as that term is defined in Paragraph 79 of SFAS No. 106. Accordingly, the post-retirement benefit costs are recognized on a current period basis and were as follows for the period January 1, 1994 to December 31, 1994:

Post-Retirement Medical Benefit	\$ 360,577
Post-Retirement Death Benefit	\$ 11,296

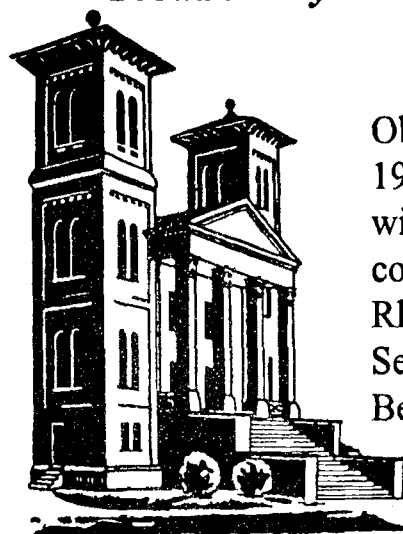

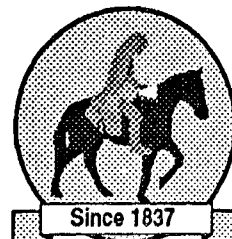

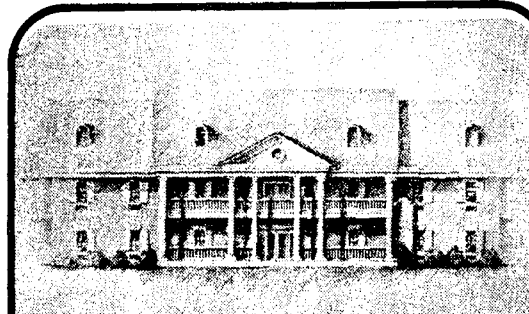
