IV. SECRET SOCIETIES.

Your committee on Secret Societies beg leave to report that they see no reason for changing the testimony which we, as a Church, have borne from the beginning in reference to the character and work of the multiplied secret orders in our midst especially of the foster father of them all—Free Masonry. Its open rejection of that dear name, which is above every other name, its horrid oaths and death penalty obligations, its adaptation to shield its members before the courts from the infliction of penalties due to their crimes, and its profession to save all its members without respect to their Christian or moral character in heaven, or the grand lodge above, stamps it as an open and consummate enemy of the Gospel of Christ, and to be opposed, and its work and character exposed, by any and all Christian methods within our reach.

We see some fruit of our labors; occasionally one is plucked from its members, but our strongest hope of success is in enlightning the minds of the people, and especially the rising generation. We recommend continued co-operation with the N. C. A. and any other legitimate organization opposed to secretism.

V.—ON EDUCATION.

Your committee beg leave to report as follows:

Why have we an existence as a church, but for the propagation, maintenance, and perpetuation of certain moral principles which are vital to the present and eternal welfare of mankind?

If we are in earnest, then, in this work, and really mean, not to betray our trust, should we not avail ourselves of the most potent agencies for the successful accomplishment of our mission?

We turn to the young more hopefully, than to any other source, as a repository of our principles. It is not enough however that we educate them—that education must be baptized from on high. Neither does conversion without education secure the full measure of power and influence, that might be attained. Intelligent piety is always the most reliable and permanent. The mental and moral training of our children should go together. But if this is done, it will be the result of our own labor—others will not do it for us.

What have we accomplished in this direction, during the sixteen years of our ecclesiastical existence? I hank God something has been done—perhaps more than many have accomplished, and yet not all we could desire.

Those who have done most in the establishment of the school

at Chili, feel largely rewarded in its first fruits.

No more earnest and self-sacrificing devotion, to the distinctive principles which we mantain, can be found than among those youth who have shared most largely the benefits of that institution. It is not wisdom to cavil, because everything connected therewith, has not been perfect, while the general results are more favorable than could have been reasonably expected under the circumstances.

The success of the past gives encouragement for the future. Profiting by whatever failures there may have been, as well as stimulated by the measure of success attained, we may confidently expect with renewed and increased effort to reap an ample harvest in the future.

There exists at the present time a pressing need of funds to

finish, and make available the new portion of the building erected and enclosed, nearly a year since. In what direction can our means be expended and produce more fruitful returns, than by such an application of them. Your committee therefore recommend that as a conference, we give to this institution, not only our best wishes and prayers, but make it the object of our earnest efforts; first, by endeavoring to secure the means required to complete the new edifice; and secondly, by commending it to our people, for their patronage and support.

We regret that we have no statistical report to give at this time, and request that the trustees furnish such report, to present

to the conference next year.

VI.—ON TEMPERANCE.

Intemperance is a gigantic evil, and is the cause of more misery and suffering than human language can possibly express. From this terrible fountain of misery flows every description of This blighting curse is on our land and is filling the poorhouses, asylums, prisons and cemeteries with its victims. Much has been said on this subject and it is agitating the minds of the people all through the land. We as a people are diametrically opposed to this dreadful evil and also its twin brother tobacco. Therefore,

Resolved. That we earnestly urge all our members and everyone to use all their influence against this evil, and also against the raising and selling of grain to brewers and distillers, or anything that has the least tendency to help on this nefarious cause.

VII.—ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Feeling that the Sunday-school work requires our earnest and

systematic efforts for its promotion among us; therefore,

Resolved, First, that we hold a Conference Sunday school Convention during the Conference year, to be held at Albion, on the first Tuesday in May next.

Second, That we advise the several Sunday-schools sending delegates to said convention to defray their expenses, also, that a collection be taken in the circuit to meet the expenses of the

preacher attending the same.

Third. That the Sunday-School Board be composed of the following named brethren W. Manning, S. K. J. Chesbro, A. B. Mathewson, A. A. Burgess, W. T. Hogg, T. Sully, M. N. Velzey, A. K. Bacon, Thos. Hogg and J. Barnhart, and that S. K. J. Chesbro be the recording Secretary.

Fourth, That we not only recommend, but urge our people to

mantain Sunday schools Summer and Winter.

Fifth. That the preacher and Sunday-school superintendent, furnish the recording secretary with such statistical matter as may be called for by him.

Sixth, That the recording secretary and preacher in charge at Albion, be a committee to prepare a programme for the conven-

tion.

Seventh, That we will, as a people and conference, liberally pat-

ronize, and earnestly support The Pearl and Lily, published by Bros. Baker and Arnold.

Eighth, That we advise the holding, of district Sunday school conventions within the bounds of our conference during the coming year, and that the chairman of each district call the same.

VIII.—ON PUBLICATIONS.

Believing as we do, that the aggressive power of Christianity is in ratio with the intelligence of its possessor, and that while mere intellect tends to skepticism, piety trammeled by ignorance. equally tends to bigotry, we therefore feel the desirability of a thorough union of the two, thereby investing the church with ability to investigate any theory without fear of her becoming skeptical, and inflaming her piety to the highest pitch of zeal, without the danger of fanaticism or bigotry as an attendant re-To day the press, and particularly the newspaper press of the country, is doing more to mould the opinions of the masses than any other agency. As Dr. Holland says of the newspaper, "It has come among us, and it has come to stay." In our times of speed it is, and it will be, the educator of the masses who have passed beyond their school-days. Our duty is imperative to do what we can to make and sustain a periodical literature that measures up to the full measure of the wants of the age. whose influence will be felt beyond the pale of our own denomination: and as the religion of Jesus Christ is intended to be brought into contact with all that pertains to this state of existence, and to leaven all things to the will the Father, we would have our church organ discuss all things transpiring in our nation, and that from the only true standpoint of such a discussion, viz.: "Holiness unto the Lord." We have published among us as a people, The Earnest Christian, The Christian Pilgrim, The Pearl, Lily, and The Free Methodist. The Earnest Christian, devoted as it is, solely to the advancement of practical and experimental piety, is probably filling the ideal of its publisher and the wants of our people in this especial path of literature; the same may probably be said of The Pilgrim, The Pearl, and The Lily. We gladly welcome and rejoice in the success that has attended these publications, and cordially recommend them to all evangelical Sunday school workers.

Our denominational organ, The Free Methodist, has our warmest sympathies, and to its sheets we look particularly for the defence of our denominational peculiarities, and that it take in a wider range of thought and subject than the above named and undenominational issues. We desire that it be not only a faithful mentor in all departments of Christian duty, a record of denominational effort, and chronicle of Christian experience, but also a sturdy champion of all truth, and a fearless, honest, healthful critic of all pertinent subjects. To this end, while thanking God for the past success of the paper, and extending our cordial sympathy to its editor, we herein resolve that by donatione, subscriptions and contributions we will do what we can to make the paper all we desire it to be.

IV.—ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Your Committee reports that, whereas Sabbath Schools are of such vital importance, we should put forth a vigorous effort to establish and maintain them on all our charges. Both preachers and members should unite and feel their personal obligation in pushing them forward. While the country is flooded with worldly amusements, and the Sabbath Schools are largely carried on by worldly policy, and, whereas we protest against pic-nics, excursions, festivals, concerts, etc., to interest and support the Sabbath School we should substitute something better, and it can be done only by making them spiritual, stirring, and soul saving, therefore no pains, means or time, should be spared in a cause where the souls of our children and the interests of our Church are at stake. We resolve, therefore, to unite and put forth a more vigorous effort in the Sunday School enter-

prise than ever before, and exhort all our people to come up to the help of the Lord against the mighty influences that are calculated to destroy the rising generation in our land.

V -ON PUBLICATIONS

The periodical press of the present day is conducted almost exclusively in the interest of worldliness

Many papers and magazines are published simply as a means of making money, or building up some selfish interest, while many of the higher order of quarterlies and similar prints are designed to disseminate the most dangerous infidelity—often under the names of science or philosophy.

The religious press has become deplorably secularized. The religion represented by many of the church papers is little better than the higher forms of heathen philosophy. Their Christ is not the Christ of the Bible; but we rejoice in all the exceptions that may be found.

If the press in general may be taken as a fair exponent of the state of society, it is alarming and almost hopelessly corrupt, and

the saints should diligently avoid these pernicious influences. The biographies of saintly men and women and other good books should be often read and generally circulated. lieve The Earnest Christian to be the best religious magazine published in this country. It is worthy of a hearty support and wider circulation. The Free Methodist, published at Sycamore, Ill., is accomplishing increasing good. We rejoice in its many Ill., is accomplishing increasing good qualities, and hope that its circulation may be so extended as that it may be greatly improved. The children's papers published by Rev. Baker & Arnold, are commended to our families and Sabbath schools.

Our people are cautioned against an indiscriminate use of books in our public libraries, as many of them are unworthy of a place in a religious home.

We will do well to place our own publications, and such others as are on sale among us in the hands of our members and children and others, as their influence is never against the truth, but for it. On all the publications of the church should be written "Holiness to the Lord."

VI .- ON SANCTITY OF THE SABBATH.

Your Committee beg leave respectively to report that in the original command of God as given to his ancient people, every

seventh day should be set apart for holy purposes.

Recognizing this fact as we do, in our observance of the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and devotion to God, we are pained to see the wide spread and utter disregard of the command of God on the part of thousands employed on Rail Roads, Steamboats, Ferries, Street-cars, Milk-wagons, Farms, and in many other ways. Therefore,

Resolved, That we enjoin it upon all of our membership that they strictly observe the Sabbath as a day of rest from all secular employment, and that it be observed as an holy day unto the Lord; and riding or visiting for pleasure, of permiting our children to indulge in sports and plays that may be lawful upon other days, but are nevertheless an infraction of the Divine command when indulged in upon the Sabbath.

VII-ON SECRET SOCIETIES.

So extensive and so thorough have been the investigations of this subject and so general have been the divulgences by members of the various secret orders, that no reasonable doubt can now remain that organized secretism is evil and only evil, both in its origin and tendencies.

Free Masonry in its various forms, is an invention of Satan designed for the overthrow of all that is good. To an alarming extent, the leading forces of society are under its control.

It is the duty of God's people:—1. To abstain from connection with obligated secret associations. 2. To do all we consistently can to prevent others from becoming entangled therein. 3. To prosecute an uncompromising opposition to them in the name of the Lord.

As ministers and members of the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ, we shall hold ourselves free to co operate with all who in a scrptural manner actively seek the extirpation of this monstrous evil. Our people are earnestly exhorted in all their anti-Masonic movoments to rely upon God for success, and to do all things according to the Gospel of Christ. We believe that the Gospel alone is the power of God unto salvation, and the church is the only necessary organization through which to operate in seeking the establishment of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

VIII.—ON EDUCATION.

Education comprises, 1st, The acquisition of useful knowledge; and 2ndly, but chi-fly the healthy development of the faculties of the whole man. To be profitable, this expansion and training of our powers must be in accordance with the laws of reason and morality. Education begins with infancy. Without education, men are likely to be barbarous and superstitious, while a Godless education makes conceited infidels or accomplished villains. Multitudes of children and men are being trained in all the subtle arts of deception and crime, and the church of God ought to be diligent in the work of moulding the sentiments and habits of the people. Many children take their first lessons in vice on the play-grounds of our primary schools, and are confirmed in a to'al disregard of God and eternity by the worldly influence of the higher institutions of learning.

Iniquity abounds; we are in the midst of a general apostacy from God. The churches depend largely on carnal agencies—from the Senate to the family, equity is forgotten. Spiritually these are days of peril, especially to the young. The church should undertake, with greatly increased vigor, in the name of the Lord, to check this desolating tide. In the blessed work of

teaching the rising generation the way of true wisdom, every means that God will honor should be faithfully used. In this connection we especially commend our seminaries at North Chili, N. Y., and Spring Arbor, Mich. These schools are doing a noble work, and they ought, with their present burdens, and limited facilities to be supported with multiplied liberality.

RESOLUTIONS.

Resolved, That collections be taken up in the following order during the coming year, viz.: For Superannuated Fund, first quarter; Superintendents' Claim, second quarter; Bible Cause, third Quarter; and Missions, fourth quarter.

Resolved, That all our preachers in charge of circuits be requested to present and read the statistics of their circuits in connection with the passage of their characters at the next Annual

Session of this Conference.

Resolved, To require all Examiners on the Course of Study, and all candidates for examination thereon, to be present at the seat of Conference next year, one day in advance of the time fixed for its assembling.

ON PARTAKING OTHER MEN S SINF.

A copy of a paper adopted by the New York annual Conference of the F. M. Church, but originating in the Q. C. of the Northern District of said annual conference.

We, the Quarterly Conference of the Northern District of the New York Annual Conference of the Free Methodist church, assembled at Abington camp ground, Aug 30th, 1876: For the glory of God, and designing the promotion of the spiritual interests of the church of God, do hereby unite in setting forth as follows:

Whereas, The Bible and our Discipline have plainly forbidden us to be partakers of other men's sins as to commit sin personally.

Whereas, Obedience to this requirement will prevent us from aiding and abetting others in doing what we cannot do ourselves with a clear conscience, or what ought not to be done at all.

Whereas, This principle is violated by the practices of many professed Christians, and to some considerable extent by the

members of our own societies.

Whereas, Much difficulty is experienced in administering our discipline against the said practices in consequence of diffarences of opinion existing among ourselves respecting the application of the said principle.

Whereas, We believe the said differences can be at least in part remedied by the specific official utterances and teachings of our law making, [law interpreting and law applying assemblies.

Therefore,

Resolved-1st, 'That we unite in declaring our firm belief of the truth of the following maxims:-First. All Christians are bound to employ all their time and talents in co-operating with Christ in the purpose of his manifestation, viz: The destruction of the works of the devil, and to avoid the doing of anything which would in any way tend to help Satan's kingdom. Second. That all business which cannot be done to the glory of God and the good of men, ought not to be done at all. Third. No Christian can voluntarily help another in doing what is wrong in itself. Fourth. All persons are responsible for the direct and indirect consequences of all their acts so far as they can control them. Fifth. No person can avoid responsibility for the consequences of carrying on a wrong business which his labor promotes, by reason of his being an agent or employe, and not the principal or owner of said business. Therefore,

Resolved—2d, We will avoid, discountenance and disallow all participation in the sins of others. First. By not growing, furnishing, or manufacturing or selling material for carrying on any sinful business, or sinful parts of business. Second. By not aidin in carrying on such business. either by employing capital, laboring or otherwise. Third. We will especially oppose all participation in the traffic in alcoholic beverages, opium, with all preparations thereof, and tobacco, when employed in sinful self-indulgence. Fourth. The manufacture or sale of such articles of dress as are forbidden by the word of God and our Discipline, and Fith, The engaging in, or patronage of all Sabbath-breaking business, or the transaction of any business on the Lord's day, which, while legitimate on on other days, cannot be lawfully all lowed on the Sabbath, such as Sunday cheese and butter manu-

facture, iron making, raft-running, railroading, street-car running and such like.

Resolved—3d, We will call the attention of our people generally, and of our annual and general conferences to the subject in question, and earnestly urge that such action be taken as will more fully declare our principles thereon, and define the course

to be taken in enforcing them.

Resolved—4th, That a copy of this paper be fowarded to The Free Methodist for publication; that another copy be presented to the next session of the New York Annual Conference, and that we petition the next General Conference in relation to the question.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

I .- ON MEMOIRS.

Our beloved Brother Frederick Hendrickson has fallen asleep in Jesus; and the New York Conference suffers the loss of the first minister admitted to it by the ordinary probationary course.

Bro. Hendrickson was born at Midlum of Tohr in Germany, July 8th, 1840. When about 12 years old he became a sailor. About the age of 24 or 25 he married a countrywoman of his native place; but his married life was of short duration; in about one year after, his wife died leaving a daughter who still remains in the home of his father-in-law in the land of Bro. Hendrickson's birth. In persuit of his seafaring calling he came to this country for the first time in 1859, but did not make his residence here until 1867, when he came to New York City and abode there.

From his earliest years the Spirit of God strove powerfully with him; and for two years previous to his making New York his home, he was seeking the Lord. Through his early acquaintance with Bro. O. V. Ketels he was led to visit our Grand street, pilgrims, among whom he was soon gloriously converted. Having taken the narrow way from hearty choice he walked in it perseveringly to the end of his life. He quickly felt leadings of soul to engage in seeking the salvation of others; and at a Q. M. held in Grand street, N. V., having remained for prayer at a hall where the sevices were held between the afternoon and evening meetings, he received a revelation of the will of God concerning him, and felt a clear call to become a preacher of the Gospel.

Bro. Hendrickson was emphaticily a pious man. Prayer was his vital breath, his native air; private devotion was his greatest luxury. He was remarkably conscientious. His conscience was quick as the as the apple of ao eye. Small omissions pained his soul and he sought to live far away and on the right side of the border line between worldliness and spirituality. Frivolity was abominable to him; lightness and jesting were exceedingly annoying. He was a man of few words in ordinary converse and those were right ones. His last end was that of the righteous man. He had entered the field of his labor for a second year with unusually strong desires and hopes, and had begun to work for God

with renewed courage and zeal, when the Master called him to come up higher. He knew the voice, and though he had a desire to stay and work on earth, he said, "It is all right." At the beginning of his last sickness he had a clear intimation that the nervous fever, and general breaking down of his system partly brought on by his excessive labors of the preceding year would end in death, and he spent the moments previous to and in the Intervals of the delirious spells which he suffered before death, in arranging unsettled matters, exhorting his attendants, especially the doctor, and expressing triumphantly his sure hope of everlasting life. Even his utterances in the moments when reason was temporarily dethroned were such as indicated a sanctified soul. His last understood words were, "All right," and he passed away to the eternal Sabbath on Sunday, Oct 1st, 1876, at 5 a. m. His name and memory remain to us as ointment poured forth.

II.—ON TENT.

The committee to whose care the conference tent was entrusted respectfully report

1st. They assumed the care of said tent and also of the lamps and camp meeting equipage belonging to the conference, and have preserved and repaired the same as circumstances have required, and that said conference property is in as good condition

for future use as at the beginning of the conference year.

2nd. That the expenses of travel, and the cost of repairs and such new articles as have been puchased, amount to \$50 04; and that the receipts for such purposes, and the several collections taken at the said meetings for the support of the members of your committee are \$61 33, leaving a balance of \$11 29, actual expenses for said support. Your Committee can report with truth that much evident good has been accomplished by the use of said tent.

III.—ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are thankful for the blessing of God which has rested on our efforts to lead the rising generation to God, and rejoice that that many of the children committed to our care have given clear evidence of scriptural conversion, and that our people here and there are exhibiting a good degree of interest in Sunday-school work, but we are quite sure that as a conference and people we are very much behind hand in this department of our work. On several of our circuits there are no Nunday schools, and where schools are mantained they are frequently allowed to languish for want of interest and properly organised effort. These things ought not so to be. As a church we should take the front rank among those who labor for the instruction of the rising generation in principles of Christian tauth. The devil and formal churches should not be allowed as they often are to bend the twigs which we hope to see growing on trees in the garden of the Lord. We call on all our preachers and people to awake to righteousness in this respect, and set themselves diligently to take hold of this department of our work and do it efficiently.

Let our preachers especially, diligently attend to the children in their ministrations. Let our people co operate heartly, supplying money and labor in helping on the work to the full extent of their ability, and above all let our people who have children lay the foundation for successful Sunday-school labor, by training up their little ones in the home circle in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

We believe the Sabbath-school cause to be of sufficient importance to demand more of our time and attention as a people, and that renewed and persevering efforts should be put forth to gather within our schools as many as possible. The object of the Sabbath-school being the diffusion of Divine knowledge and the conversion of the young, we should jealously guard their moral education, by prohibiting the introduction of all sensational and fictitious literature in our schools, and sanction nothing but sound religious literature and the Word of God. We recommend that a Conference Sunday-school Convention be held during this year.

V .-- ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Whereas, The American Bible Society is doing a noble work in printing and circulating the Word of God throughout the world, and is worthy the patronage of all who love the Lord Jesus Christ: and

Whereas, Special and persistent efforts are being made to exclude the Word of God from our public schools of our beloved country, by the Papal power and infidelity combined; therefore,

Resolved, 1st, That we, as a conference, take a collection during the coming year, at every appointment on our various charges, for the above society.

2d, That the money now in the hands of any of the members of this Conference be paid to J. B. Freeland and sent to said Society.

VI.—On Publications.

Your committee on publications being deeply impressed with the necessity of greater earnestness in our efforts as a conference to circulate *The Earnest Christian*, and of laboring to promote a freer circulation of *The Free Methodist*, as well as *The Pearl*, and *The Lily* for the Sabbath-school, do hereby recommend the re-adoption—and more practical adoption—of our last years' report on publications.

VII.—ON EDUCATION.

The prosperity and usefulness of our children depend largely upon the degree and kind of education they receive in youth. Our common school system does not make sufficient provisions for their complete education, hence the need of other institutions of learning to carry forward and complete what has been commenced there.

While attending the common schools, our children are under our control, and restrained by home influences and associations from falling into many evil habits and practices which they otherwise would naturally be led into. But when we send them from our homes to attend schools of higher grade, they are released, to a great extent, from home restraint, and frequently the corrupting influences are so great at these schools, that it is extremely hazardous to place our children there. Would it not be well for us to pause at the very threshold and seriously inquire whether, considering all their interests, they would not be injured instead of benefited by being sent to them? Oftimes habits are formed at these schools that are debilitating to their bodies, degrading to their morals, and ruinous to their souls.

In view of the above facts; we are glad to know that, by the blessing of God upon the efforts of our general superintendents and others, the Chili and Spring Arbor Seminaries have been started, and are being carried forward successfully; and that to these institutions of learning we may send our children and feel assured that they will be comparatively free from the contami-

nating influences found in many of like grade, and also receive

thorough instruction.

As the Chili Seminary is located almost on the borders of our conference, we think it is our duty to take it under our especial patronage and care; and do all we can individually and collectively towards its more permanent establishment and full prosperity. It is a child of our church, given in answer to prayer, and our future prosperity and usefulness depend, under God, very largely upon the success of our schools. At present we understand that Bro. Roberts, our senior superintendent, is responsible for the payment this fall of a thousand dollars or more, which was expended on the new wing recently inclosed. Measures should be taken in order to his immediate relief from this financial burden. Let us pray, pay, and labor for the success of our schools.

Your committee beg leave to report that, in our judgment, this is no time to slacken our efforts against this one of the prominent evils of the day, as it retains the same wicked virus that has always existed in it, accompanied with the same amount of strategy as ever. This is seen in the frequent introduction of new devices to advance secret institutions, as in the case of the Grange, which pretends to benefit the farmers, when the real intent is to strengthen Freemasonry. As we believe that the press is a wonderful power in counteracting evil as well as promoting it, we therefore recommend the publication in tract form for circulation of an article in Brother Robert's hands, entitled, "Masonic Benevolence," by Rev. W. A. Sellew. We also recommend the circulation of the Christian Cynosure, published at Chicago, and of the Cynosure tracts, especially one entitled, "I Know Nothing about Masonry," by B. T. Roberts and General Phelps.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

I .- ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are of the opinion that the Sunday-school is the child of the church, and should abide under its maternal and fostering care. That the church should, by all legitimate means, seek to reproduce in the Sunday-school her own character, to make it an exponent of her principles and doctrines. Therefore, the church and Sunday-school should never be separated.

Inasmuch as we believe the doctrines and principles upon which the Free Methodist Church is based is divine and eternal. Therefore, we recommend that our people, as far as possible, institute and maintain as many Sunday schools as practicable.

We would hereby enter our protest against Sunday-school picnics, concerts, and other festivities which tend to alienate the

mind and heart from the principles of our holy religion.

II.—SECRET SOCIETIES.

We, your committee, advise the adoption of an article by J. W. Sharp, entitled "Secret Societies," published in the Free Methodist of April 5, 1876, except the last eight lines, as an expression

of our view on this subject:

"Truth and right grow up in the light. The right to investigate belongs to every American citizen. Inventors, machinists, artisans, salesmen, all attempt to bring the character and merits of their wares to the public notice and competition. But secret societies demand that we pay the price, sign a receipt, and take the article, good or bad, without investigation. They also seal the lips of the person from telling whether he has been cheated or not. According to the showing of the Grand Lodge Treasurer's report, the boasted benevolence of Free Masonry is a barefaced swindle. The figures in their reports show that only 13 to 17 cents on the dollar goes to benevolent purposes. What becomes of the rest, we must take their word for.

Benevolent societies, as the American Bible Society, pays out from 85 to 90 per cent. for benevolent purposes, and account for the rest with open books. Right needs no covering but its own infocence. Good institutions by the cloak of secretism destroy their right to the confidence of honest men. Secret societies belong to the dark ages, and should die with the times that begot

them.

Masonry—the great head center of all secret organizations—claims to be religious but denies Christ, and the blood of atonement, claiming by the common gavel, square and compas, and other symbolic tools, to fit its notaries for the Grand Lodge above. Thus doing away with repentance and faith in Christ, the new birth, and in fact striking at every doctrine of the New Testament salvation. The mysterious ceremonies and blasphemous titles are used to dazzle the mind, darken the understanding, pamper selfishness, and quiet the conscience. The lesser ghosts of secretism are following the Christless head. It is our duty to warn and instruct the people against these dark shadows of the pit and oppose them to the last."

II.-On Missions.

Your committee find that several appointments within the bounds of the Conference are too weak to support a preacher. He and his family must suffer from inadequate support, or the circuit must suffer for the want of pastoral care. To refuse to assist them is to lose more than we save. We lose in our souls—for giving enlarges the heart, and God fills such with much of his goodness. We lose in financial strength—for the church that cares for the work abroad will care for the work at home. Therefore all our societies—and each member of our societies, should be taught to give—and to give as God prospers them.

We need for the coming year, \$232: \$50 for Lena; \$50 for Savanna; \$50 for Whitehall; \$25 [for Athens, and \$25 for Alma and Dutch Hollow Circuits; and the remainder to apply on unpaid appropriations. 'I his is a small amount for our conference to raise, being only about 15 cents per member. If more than this should be raised it will be on hand at the next conference.

VI-ON JUDAH MEAD'S LETTER.

In the judgment of your committee the time has come when the demands of the work on the Pacific coast are such as to make it highly important that some person having the proper qualifications be sent to that portion of the [field. The proposition to send one of our General Superintendents to look after and organize the work in that section, meets with our hearty approval, and we present for your consideration the following plan for raising the requisite maans to accomplish this end:

I. That a committee be appointed to estimate the amount neccessary to defray the traveling expenses to and from the field in question, and report the same with an appropriate appeal through

the Free Methodist.

2. That a Secretary and Treasurer be elected, whose business it shall be to solicit and receive subscriptions, and when the requested amount is subscribed, to collect the same and pay to the party who may be sent to that field.

3. We would nominate brother J. C. Terrill, to act as the committee mentioned above, and T. B. Arnold to act as treasurer.

VIII.—EXTRACT OF REPORT OF TREASURER OF CHICAGO

The church stands on the corner of May and Fulton Streets, three blocks from where the society worshiped on Morgan Street. The building is 85x45 feet, on a lot 100x 50 feet. It has a basement wholly above ground, with a 10 feet ceiling, giving a lecture room 70x45 feet, and two class rooms each 16x12 feet. The audience room is 72x45, with a gallery capable of seating 100 persons. The building is of waod, with heavy frame, and only eight years old. Its original cost was \$12.500, without the furnaces and furniture. The valuation of the lot is \$5000, making the tatal cost \$17,500

The property is held by Mr. Shirra, on a fore-closed mortgage, who will convey it to our people next May for \$6000, (what the property cost him), with one year's interest at 6 per cent. There is added to the above \$448 for paving the street in front making out an abstract, attorney's fees, and necessary repairs on the church, making the total cost of the property \$6,788. On this amount there has been paid \$800, leaving a balance to be paid

next May of \$5,988. Of this there is provided \$2,700, leaving

unprovided for \$3.288.

Reasons for Parchasing the Property.—The society has completely outgrown its old quarters. The church is in the locality where we need it, and among a class of population to which our work is adapted—the laboring class. For us to go elsewhere, would be to start anew without a congregation or a Sunday School. We have the opportunity of purchasing for less than one-half what it would cost us to build. These things clearly indicate the will of God, and our duty.

The society has done about all it can do towards paying for the property. It was after deliberate counsel with leading ministers and laymen of our church, that we entered upon the undertaking. The property will be deeded for the use of the Free Methodists of the United States. All who are interested in the undertaking are invited to assist. Subscriptions and money may be sent to J. C. Lawton, 16 Newberry Avenue, Chicago, Ill. Persons wishing to correspond in respect to the enterprise should direct to Rev. J. C, Terrill, 117 West Huron Street, Chicago, Ill.

The society took possession of the property July 23d, and is successfully pushing the work of the Lord.

IX.-SUNDAY DAIRYING.

Whereas, the custom of carrying milk to the cars and factories on the Sabbath day for the manufacture of cheese and various other purposes, is becoming more and more common in this state; And, Whereas, we deem said practice contrary to the teaching of the Bible and the Free Methodist discipline, and Whereas, There is great danger that many well-meaning persons in our connection may be led through the example of professed Christians and the love of money, either to engage in, or continue in said practice, and thus pave the way for Sabbath-breaking in other forms. Therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, as a conference, believe the practice of carrying or sending milk to factories, or to the market, on the Sabbath, is wholly anti-scriptural and unchristian, and we hereby pledge ourselves to discountenance it in every proper Christian

manner.

X-ON SABBATH SCHOOLS.

Inasmuch as we believe the old adage, "As the twig is bent, so the tree nclines, we regard the Sunday School as an indispensable auxiliary to the prosperity of Church and State. Too much importance cannot be attached to this branch of the work of the church and of personal Christian effort. While there are thousands of children whose characters are to some extent being noulded by the church, and religious influences growing out of the Sunday School, there are other thousands outside of this and every other means of moral improvement, that must find the help they need in the Sunday School, or fail to find it at all.

We are sorry to say that we have reason to fear the modern

modes of creating and continuing an interest in the Sunday School, viz: Picnics, christmas tree, class banners, &c., have a tendency to defeat the great object of the Sunday School, inas much as they are productive of a spirit of envy, emulation and worldly love. The Saviour said, "Every plant that my Father hath not planted shall be rooted up." Every seed that has not in it the germ of Godliness, should not be sown. We are highly pleased with the visible improvement in the Sunday School work in our conference during the past year. Also, for the good results of our Sunday School conventions.

We believe the use of Sunday School papers preferable to that of libaraies, and would recommend the Lily and Pearl to our

people.

We pledge ourselves to a continuance of our efforts in this work, and to pray more earnestly for the conversion of the children.

XI.-ON PUBLICATIONS.

Intelligent readers are constantly increasing, and consequently the demand for reading matter. This presents to the Christiau worker a wide field of usefulness which if neglected, will be sown thick with tares by the enemy. The danger is not so much from a lack of good books and periodicals, as from the abundance of the bad, and the activity of their venders. While there is an abundance of good and cheap literature, we do not make sufficient effort to put it into the hands of those who need it.

Among a great many good, cheap books, we would recommend the following, as well calculated to lead persons into a closer union with God, and a greater degree of usefulness among men: the Memoirs of Bramwell, Abbott, Carvosso, Hester Ann Rogers,

Watson's Wesley, and Wesley's Christian Perfection.

Our work demands a weekly paper that gathers the news of our own and other denominations, the general intelligence and thought of the age, and which will present it condensed and clearly defined to our people. We ar poor and cannot afford the various publications in special lines of thought. The periodical that gleans from all will secure our patronage. So far as the Free Methodist meets this want we are thankful, and express the hope that its efforts in this direction will be continued, and heartily recommend it to the patronage of our people.

In the special field of practical piety, sound experience, and advocacy of Christian perfection, The Eurnest Christian meets our wants and wishes, and we recommend it to the patronage of

our people.

We would recommend the Pearl and the Lily as excellent Sunday School papers, and worthy our patronage.

III.—ON SECRET SOCIETIES.

As a church, we are bound to take a decided stand for the right on all moral questions, and to avow our opposition to every thing which we consider wrong in itself, or evil in its tendencies; and as secretism must of necessity be either good or evil in its own nature, and tend to promote either the cause of vice or virtue; and Whereas we believe that the natural tendency of all the secret Orders of the land are evil, and evil only, Therefore,

Resolved—1st. That it becomes us to speak out clearly and positively in their condemnation, and seek by every honorable means to resist their progress and expose the enormity of their

sins.

2d.—That we will aid, so far as we have ability, the circulation of the Christian Cynosure, and all other literature which tend to enlighten the people in respect to the unchristian character and evil tendencies of Free Masonry and other Secret Societies.

IV .- ON TEMPERANCE.

We find the sin of intemperance spreading over the land, reaching all grades of society and cursing every calling with its blighting influence. Though screened by some, it prevails from the attic to the pulpit more or less, and so conscious of their power and wealth have the liquor ring become, that they defy all efforts to restrain their cold-hearted and cold-blooded traffic.

A vast amount of mind and capital has been drawn in to support their wicked traffic, and so conscious are the abettors of this vast system of wrong that their whole business is wicked and injurious to individuals and society, that they dare not trust the honest sentiments of the day on temperance, but seek by secret, wicked organizations to corrupt legislation, buy mean politicians, intoxicate voters and corrupt the ballot box. Cunning, sly, wealthy, and desperate, all efforts to control, legalize or modify this hell-born system that murders men, and defies God, have failed to abate the nuisance.

The traffic in malt and spirituous liquors now require about \$625.000,000 annually in this country; and reliable tables show that about 78 000 persons are killed by liquor annually, while we have over 800.000 habitual drunkards cursing the land. We find the use of tobacco closely allied to that of liquor, and wicked men feel they are of one family, and usually go together; and the public sentiment is not fully awake. Yet there can be no

doubt that the use of the weed tends to filthiness of habit. Its nicotive destroys the health, undermines the constitution, injures the brain, and benumbs the moral sense. A traffic so totally wrong and wicked, and productive of such wide-spread misery, has no rights under a Christian government. Total abstinence from, and opposition to, the growing, manufacture, sale, and use of tobacco and intoxicating liquors must be our position. Therefore.

Resolved-1st. That we urge every preacher to preach at each

appointment, on temperance.

2d. That we urge a close adherence to the general rules on in-

toxicating liquors and tobacco.

3d. That we consider the growing, manufacture, sale, or use, of tobacco, an evasion of the letter, and violation of the spirit of our general rules.

4th. And as God-fearing men, we will labor to eradicate and

keep this evil from our Zion.

V .- ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Being fully convinced, that as a church, we are not fully aroused to the interests of the Sabbath School cause, and whereas the care of young and immortal souls has been neglected by those of mature years and experience, and of necessity committed to the care of those lacking experience; and whereas, the literature of the present age is working spiritual death to the young, and rising generation; and whereas, the department of song is very deficient, and we believe the Sabbath School cause is suffering among us for want of financial aid; and as a church, we are dependant largely upon the young and rising generation to fill our places in the work of soul-saving and maintaining a pure church, and that it is essentially necessary that the young may be instructed in the fear of God, and that they may be fully aroused to the snares and dangers that surround them on every hand. Be it

Resolved—1st. That the members of our church who are of riper years and experience, encourage this branch of our Master's vineyard, by their presence, their labor of love, and according to their financial ability.

2d. That there be a greater diffusion of that class of literature and song books, that shall be most conducive to the salvation of

the young.

3d. That we recommend our brethren and sisters everywhere, to meet and unite in a service of song, as often as practicable, that the worship of song may be more edifying and improve thereby.

4th. That our preachers be required to observe the discipline

pertaining to Sabbath Schools.

At the close of the services, Saturday evening, Bro. Roberts called for subscriptions to complete the payment for the church and furnishings, and received about \$1,000, in consequence of which he dedicated it Sabbath morning, free of incumbrance.

On Sabbath, a collection of about \$45.00 was raised, to meet our conference proportion of the allowance for the general superintendents, for the past year, and was paid to Bro. Roberts.

A small deficiency remaining in the collection ordered last year, to raise the balance of the amount required in the case of Bros. Cusick and Coffee, it was ordered that the circuits which are deficient, be required to bring up the amount of this deficiency.

Bro. Wm. Cusick, of the North Michigan conference, was transferred to this conference by the president, at the request of the conference,

T. S. LaDue was transferred from this to the New York conference, and J. P. Shattuck to the Wisconsin conference.

J. Ball, was first elected to secretary, but declining to serve. C. M. Damon was elected.

I .- ON TEMPERANCE.

Whereas, Intemperance is a growing evil in our midst, and calculated to work ruin wherever it exists; therefore, Resolved, that we, as a Conference, labor assiduously and perseveringly for its overthrow; withholding at the polls our votes from those that are in any way implicated in the cause of intemperance; utterly discountnancing the raising of barley to put upon the market; of hops and tobacco for unlawful uses; and that we earnestly pray for its extirpation from our midst.

II.—SECRET SOCIETIES.

Whereas, Masonic secretism is formidable and poisonous in its influences; "sporting itself with its own deceivings," while it claims to prepare its subjects in the "lodge below," for the "celestial lodge above," without the name of Christ or his atoning blood; educating men by general protection to common dishonesty and crine; deceiving the world in claiming to have secrets ennobling and elevating to society, while its aim is strictly mercenary; and Whereas, they hold the lives of their fellowmen in their hands, under terrible oths and fearful penalties: as to cut their throats from ear to ear, tear their breasts upon, take their vitals from them, etc: and Whereas, other secret organizations are but stepping stones to Masonry, and justly deserve our utter discountenance; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Conference should act perseveringly and untiringly in its efforts to place it in its true light before the world.

III .- ON PUBLICATIONS

Highly esteeming The Free Methodist and Earnest Christian, we can conscientiously recommend them, and pledge our hearty support, and will pray for their publishers that they may have stamina to fearlessly denounce all sin.

We consider the *Uhristian Pilgrim* a sterling sheet, and would recommend it for general circulation; also, with the *Pearl and*

Lily, to Sabbath Schools.

We recommend the energetic circulation of real Methodist literature, as the Life of Hester Ann Rogers, Carvosso, Bramwell, and Benjamin Abbott.

We call attention to the Cynosure and Iowa Freeman.

IV .- ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Whereas, it behooves every Christian who feels the worth of immortal souls, that every means be used to spread the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, and especially among the young, while their minds are young and susceptible of the truth, and the "evil days come not when they shall say I have no pleasure in them."

We therefore resolve, that this Conference recommend to the several societies of this body, to use every proper means to organize Sunday Schools on their work, as it is, and should be, the

nursery of the Church.

And that the officers and teachers, so far as possible, should be

persons of a clear Christian experience.

That we protest against holding Sunday School pic-nics, as they foster a taste for worldly pleasure, and lead the mind away from Christ, thereby preventing the great usefulness of the cause.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Conference was held in the Free Methodist Church, in the city of Portage. It was to have commenced October 4th, but Bro. Hart not arriving, the day was spent in examination of classes. On the 5th, the Superintendent not yet having arrived, the house was called to order by the Secretary of the former conference. The roll was called, and D. M. Sinclair was elected chairman, pro tem, and conference was opened in due form. October 6th, Bro. Hart, having arrived, took the chair. A good spirit prevailed all through the session. From first to last, a deep sense of the need of the Spirit's help seemed to pervade the entire conference.

Services were held every afternoon and evening, and God was signally present to endorse his truth. Several were at the altar, seeking pardon and purity.

At the close of the Saturday evening service, \$113 were raised to liquidate the indebtedness on the church in Portage, nearly one-half being in cash, the rest in pledges to be paid within six months. By reference to the report on the state of the work, it will be seen that the work is progressing in this State, and we augur a further success in the Wisconsin Conference.

I.—On Publications.

We recognize the press as one of the most powerful of human agencies for the promulgation of knowledge, whether good or evil. We also recognize the fact that the matter issued from the press is largely invested with the power to reprint its moral character upon the moral perceptibility of the public.

Therefore, we deem it to be our duty to put forth an earnest effort to circulate such publications as are of a pure type, and them only, being governed by the one God given principle, a strong desire to promote his glory. We recognize The Earnest Christian as worthy of our highest esteem, and as a forerunner in the promotion of this work of reformation, we believe it to be a mighty engine of power, under God in battering down the walls of error wherever it goes. This is due to its bold, fearless position, as an exponent of Bible doctrine, not being ladened with the poison of controversy, or the discussion of moral principle, it is not encumbered with antidotes to counteract their influence, but goes out in its moral purity, scattering the seeds of truth that bring forth after their kind, in righteousness. We feel in duty bound to manifest our appreciation of the manly character of its belowed editor, in the exercise of his prerogative, in excluding from its columns all extraneous matter, by increasing its circulation wherever we can, holding up his hands that he may prevail.

We recognize The Free Methodist, as a channel through which our distinctive reformatory principles are set forth and defended, and we believe that it is exerting a wide spread influence for good, and in accepting the support of the church whose name it bears, it assumes the position of servant, therefore, an exponent of our doctrine as found in our discipline, therefore open to the pre exposition of our distinctive doctrines, and the open discussion of the best modes of promulgating them. But we enter our most solemn protest against its columns being occupied with such poisonous articles as to demand from the editor the administration of an antidote in the same columns. It ought to be as sacredly guarded against false doctrine as our pulpits are, for the following reasons. First, Antidotes seldom if ever counteract the effect of the poison; of which moral poison is the most virulent. fore, the most active and wide spread, and the most difficult to counteract, because the moral disease engendered causes the mind to eject the antidote before it can perform its work. ond, Because by rejecting the poisonous article, there is no necessity for the antidote, thereby saving the space for the promulgation of wholesome, Bible truth.

Resolved, That the articles published in The Free Methodist dureing the last year, condemning the article in our discipline on the Lord's Supper, for declaring who shall not be admitted to it among us, did in those articles denounce our discipline as unchristian, and without warrant from the word of God, thus thrusting a public insult in the face of the church. We reccommend the Christian Pilgrim, Pearl and Lily as worthy of the patron-

age of all good people.

III .- ON REFORMS.

For the different vices that prevail in the land your committee can see but one cause from which they spring, and but one source by which they may be remedied. Although they are presented in a variety of forms, and some more prominent and glaring than others, yet they can all be traced to depravity of the heart, in accordance with the scriptural account, "That the imaginations

of the heart is only evil, and that continually."

Therefore, according to the law of cause and effect, we see no way of reform from the evils of society, but by a removal of the cause. Not that we would assume, that depravity must be removed before any change in any particular could take place, but before anything can be done, there must be a conviction awaken. ed in the heart, and men must be made to feel in some degree the evils of any practice to which they may be addicted before there will be a move to forsake them. There are many who oppose the effects of sin rather than seek to remove the cause. are glad to see efforts made to remove evil of any kind, and are in sympathy with all of the reformation movements of the day, yet we cannot endorse the way in which many of these movements are conducted, but shall be obliged to take the means put into our hands by the Gospel, for we know it to be the power of God in the reformation of men and principles. Therefore, we can only stick to the principles of our holy religion to accomplish what men of the world are trying to do by merely human instrumentality. Taking this view we cannot see it right for men called of God to preach the Gospel to leave that calling and go out to lecture on some prominent evil, in which they have become especially interested.

By the blessing of God in the baptism of the Holy Ghost, we expect to cry aloud and spare not, and offer to the people the remedy that removes the cause of all their evils, whether it be in principle or practice, salvation from sin by a thorough change of

heart.

VI.-ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

In looking back over the past year we can see more clearly than ever before the guiding hand of God. We have not been without our trials and conflicts. At times the storm cloud has risen dark and fearful, but our God has stilled the tempest and brought us through beyond our most sanguine expectations.

We can say truly, "Thus far the Lord has led us on." We are becoming more convinced that this work is of God. We see that there is a pressing demand for the work in the land; the issue that God thrust us out on was, "Holiness to the Lord; that is our issue to day. Our work is not simply a service, but a reformation, and it embraces not one or more of the reforms of the day, but all of them: Temperance, secrecy, dress, simplicity in worship, cleanliness, honesty, &c., in fact everything that does

not have the stamp of Bible holiness on it, we can have no fellowship with, or sympathy for. The work is increasing on our hands, and God is crowning our efforts with success. In order to accomplish the work God has given us to perform, we need: 1st. To deeply feel the importance of the work God has laid upon us. 2d We must keep our distinctive issues squarely and constantly before the people. 3d. We must have the inner soul experience ourselves-holiness of heart, of life, and all manner of conversation. 4th. We must have the anointing of the Holy Ghost for the work. Without the Holy Ghost to help us we will be almost certain to compromise our principles, lower the standard, and become weak and powerless, losing our peculiar locks, and thus becoming like the nation, around us; then God will be done with us, and we shall have no apology for an existence. ing our sufficiency is of God, and in him is our trust, believing a final victory is for the faithful, we will drive this battle on in the name of the God of Israel.

V .-- ON MEMOIRS.

During the first year of our existence as a conference, death has been in our midst and taken from us our brother, W. A. Nobles. He died in the city of Portage on the 26th of August, 1876, in the 59th year of his age. At the time of his death he held a superannuated relation to our conference. We mourn his loss as a co-loborer in the field of conflict. During his itinerant life in the Free Methodist connection, he has been an earnest and successful laborer, but he has left us to battle on against sin and Satan a little longer, while he has gone on before us to join (we trust) the blood-washed company and to walk the golden streets of the New Jerusalem. We ask the prayers of the church for his lonely widow and orr han boy.

VI.-ON MISSIONS.

We recommend: 1st. The appointment of a Conference Missionary Treasurer. 2d. That each of the preachers follow the direction of the Discipline for raising missionary money. 3d. That the missionary collection be taken up the first quarter and sent to the Missionary Treasurer of this conference. 4th. That Ellis Peachy, of Beaver Dam, be elected Conference Missionary for the coming year. 5th. That the missionary money be held in the hands of the Treasurer subject to the call of the Chairman of the district, to be appropriated as the Treasurer and Chairman may deem best. 6th, That \$21 of the money on hand be given to Brother Emerton. 7th. That \$5 be given to Brother Arndt.
