Goal: The goal of this course is to introduce the student to the profession of pharmacy.

Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Differentiate among primary, secondary, and tertiary literature sources;
- List three characteristics of a quality medical website;
- Develop a professional resume for seeking a pharmacy internship position;
- Define professionalism and describe how pharmacy students become health care professionals;
- Describe the information contained in a prescription;
- Perform calculations associated with the compounding, dispensing and administration of pharmaceutical agents;
- Describe the US health care delivery system and the roles of various health professionals on the healthcare team;
- Define pharmaceutical care;
- Name three forms of complementary or alternative health care;
- Describe the current and potential roles of pharmacists in the healthcare system;
- Interview an older adult about his or her life story.
