FFA Work Of Past Year Is Reviewed

Work Accomplished And Plans For Future Are Discussed At Meet

At the beginning of this school year 31 farm boys or boys interested in agriculture in the Morehead High School. At the close of the year we have 26 National Defense Training done or had a part in many jobs and events connected with program of Future Farmers. At the beginning of the year the judging team was being trained and the fair was on. The judging team placed eight best in the state and the chapter won 21 dollars in prizes at the fair.

Our club had regular monthly night meetings in the school until cold weather set in and our meetings were held in daytime. We took advantage of the National Defense Training program and enlarged our shop to meet the need until we now have over 1500 square feet of floor space for our shop. Our club was adequately equipped with hand tools of all kinds and a sufficient amount of power tools such as a lathe, drill press, power rip saw, plane and tool posts and it has enabled many of us to learn the use of these tools that we would have not otherwise done.
