Green Dot Bystander Intervention Program launched by MSU

A program designed to train students, faculty, and staff to engage in proactive behaviors to prevent sexual assault, stalking, and dating violence was launched this semester at Morehead State.

The Green Dot Program is an evidence-based violence prevention program that focuses on bystander intervention. In January of 2021, Alissa Rookard, MSU alumna, and Megan Cox, both from Pathways Inc. Victim Services approached MSU about implementing the Green Dot Program on campus.

Five MSU faculty and staff members completed Green Dot facilitator training in January. Training sessions and back-to-school events have been offered and more than 50 faculty and staff attended overview sessions this summer. Plans are underway to provide training to students in the fall.

"Many of us know when something does not look right, but we are unsure of how to intervene. Green Dot provides practical options for people in that space: direct action, delegation, or distraction," said Davison. "This means that everyone can do something to make our campus a safer place, even if it is just asking someone if they are okay. The idea is that if everyone does something small, it will add up to a big change across our campus. This approach feels empowering and inclusive."

The original Green Dot program was developed in the college setting to prevent dating violence, sexual violence, and stalking. It relies on the idea that accepting individual responsibility and taking action when one sees violent acts being committed results in a safe campus culture that is intolerant of violence.

MSU mourns the death of Professor of Marketing Dr. Michelle Kunz

The Morehead State community mourns the loss of Dr. Michelle Kunz, professor of marketing, who died Tuesday, Sept. 7, 2021, at her residence in Mt. Sterling.

Born Sept. 6, 1955, in Hosington, Kansas, she was the wife of Dale Kunz and the daughter of Vernon and the late Verna Pejsha Riemann.

Kunz started teaching at MSU in 1988 and taught classes in introductory marketing, consumer behavior, retail management, sustainable marketing and marketing administration. During her time at MSU, she presented at numerous academic conferences and reviewed academic journals. In 2007, she was named Volunteer of the Year in Marketing by Multimedia Educational Resource for Learning and Online Teaching (MERLOT). The following year, MERLOT named Kunz the recipient of its Editorial Board House Cup Award.

Kunz held degrees from Kansas Wesleyan University, Kansas State University and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. She was a member of the American Association of University Women, the Costume Society of America, the Kentucky Association of Family and Consumer Sciences, and the Kappa Omicron Nu and Phi Kappa Phi honors societies.

Kunz was a passionate animal advocate, adopting several cats and supporting animal rescue projects.

MSU anthropology professor Dr. Tim Hare publishes research on Mayan ruins and Yucatan Peninsula

Dr. Timothy Hare, associate professor of anthropology at Morehead State University, published a new book centered around his extensive work in Mayan ruins and the Yucatan Peninsula. The book is titled "Settlement, Economy, and Society at Mayapán, Yucatan, Mexico," and was published by the University of Pittsburgh Center for Comparative Archeology. The authors (Hare, Marilyn Masson, Carlos Peraza Lope and Bradley Russell) were participants in the Proyecto Económico de Mayapán (PEMY) from 2001 to 2009.

Hare's extensive research resulted in detailed studies of settlement and comparisons of household wealth, health and activities that characterized daily urban life at the Postclassic Maya capital city of Mayapán (A.D. 1150-1450) in Yucatan, Mexico.

"My colleagues and I have been working at Mayapán for 20 years and this is the biggest collection of our accomplishments yet," Hare said. "The ancient city of Mayapán is a unique example of preindustrial urbanism and we are proud to be contributing to the understanding of how human societies shifted to urban communities."

Hare also said this extensive research has been extremely beneficial to his students in the classroom and in the field.

"I have involved many students in my research over the last 20 years," he said. "I've taken five Craft Academy students to Mexico in recent (pre-pandemic) years. Many students indirectly benefit from my skills, knowledge and data developed and accumulated through all this work."

Hare has been with MSU since 2003. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology in 1991 and a Master of Arts in Economic Anthropology in 1993, both from the University of Iowa, and a Ph.D. in Anthropology in 2001 from the University of Albany. Hare's prior work has also appeared in Latin American Antiquity and Anthropos.

MSU alumnus Willie Carver named Kentucky Teacher of the Year

Willie Edward Taylor Carver Jr. (Class of 2006, 2009), French and English teacher at Montgomery County High School and a dual-credit French and English instructor through MSU's Eagle Scholars program, was recently awarded one of the state's highest honors in his field after being named the 2022 Kentucky Teacher of the Year.

"It is hard to describe receiving this honor but mostly, it doesn't feel real," Carver said. "I see behind the scenes just how hard so many teachers work, how brilliant they are, and how much they care, so I am above all humbled."

The Kentucky Department of Education (KDE) and Valvoline co-sponsored the award. Carver's selection was announced in a virtual ceremony on Sept. 9 in Lexington.

The 2022 Teacher of the Year will receive a \$10,000 cash award. Middle and Elementary School Teachers of the Year were each awarded \$3,000 while the remaining 21 Valvoline Teacher Achievement Award recipients each received \$500. Carver will also receive the opportunity to serve a semester-long sabbatical with KDE and represent the state in the National Teacher of the Year competition.

Carver came to MSU from Printer in Floyd County, earned a Bachelor of Arts in English in 2006, and completed the Master of Arts in Teaching in English and French in 2009. Carver also earned a Rank 1 in French Linguistics from the University of Georgia in 2008 and completed post-graduate work in English at MSU in 2010. He previously served as an instructor of French at the University of Georgia from 2007 to 2009 and taught for two years at Raceland-Worthington Independent High School and Montgomery County High School and worked as a teacher and behavior interventionist in Burlington, Vermont.

Carver said he encountered many professors at MSU that made him feel worthwhile, seen, prepared and capable of achieving his dreams.

"I feel like I am being lifted up by every teacher I ever had; I am thankful on a soul level to them for believing in me," he said.

Carver said he used to pretend that he was a teacher as a kid. Now, after being named one of the Bluegrass State's best educators, he wants to put his all into helping students live up to their potential.

"I don't know why I was considered. All that I know is that my work is not work; it is my passion and my fun. I love thinking about school, being at school, and above all, helping students believe in themselves," he said. "The most fulfilling part of this job is seeing what these kids grow up to become; seeing them reach for more than they thought they could get, seeing them fail at it, seeing them dust themselves off and seeing them try again."

In addition to Carver being named Teacher of the Year, Miranda Newland (Class of 2015, 2019), an interdisciplinary early childhood educator at Campbell Preschool in the Raceland-Worthington Independent School District, was a 2022 Teacher of the Year semifinalist and a nominee for Elementary Teacher of the Year. She earned both a Bachelor of Arts in General Education (K-5) and Special Education Moderate and Severe Disabilities (K-12) and a Master of Arts in Interdisciplinary Early Childhood Education (Birth-5) from MSU.

MSU anthropology professor Dr. Tim Hare publishes research on Mayan ruins and Yucatan Peninsula

Dr. Timothy Hare, associate professor of anthropology at Morehead State University, published a new book centered around his extensive work in Mayan ruins and the Yucatan Peninsula. The book is titled "Settlement, Economy, and Society at Mayapán, Yucatan, Mexico," and was published by the University of Pittsburgh Center for Comparative Archeology. The authors (Hare, Marilyn Masson, Carlos Peraza Lope and Bradley Russell) were participants in the Proyecto Económico de Mayapán (PEMY) from 2001 to 2009.

Hare's extensive research resulted in detailed studies of settlement and comparisons of household wealth, health and activities that characterized daily urban life at the Postclassic Maya capital city of Mayapán (A.D. 1150-1450) in Yucatan, Mexico.

"My colleagues and I have been working at Mayapán for 20 years and this is the biggest collection of our accomplishments yet," Hare said. "The ancient city of Mayapán is a unique example of preindustrial urbanism and we are proud to be contributing to the understanding of how human societies shifted to urban communities."

Hare also said this extensive research has been extremely beneficial to his students in the classroom and in the field.

"I have involved many students in my research over the last 20 years," he said. "I've taken five Craft Academy students to Mexico in recent (pre-pandemic) years. Many students indirectly benefit from my skills, knowledge and data developed and accumulated through all this work."

Hare has been with MSU since 2003. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology in 1991 and a Master of Arts in Economic Anthropology in 1993, both from the University of Iowa, and a Ph.D. in Anthropology in 2001 from the University of Albany. Hare's prior work has also appeared in Latin American Antiquity and Anthropos.

Mindy Highley (Class of 1991, 1993), assistant vice president for alumni relations and development, was awarded the Distinguished Staff Service Award. Jeffrey Hill, professor of mass communications, received the Distinguished Creative Productions Award. Dr. Nilesh Joshi, professor of engineering and technology management, was given the Distinguished Teacher Award. Dr. Ronald Morrison, professor of English, received the Distinguished Researcher Award. Gregory H. Wing (Class of 1976), professor of music, was honored with the Distinguished Faculty Service Award.

Highley earned a Bachelor of Arts in Communication, Public Relations and Advertising Option, in 1991 and a Master of Arts in Communication, Speech Option, in 1993. Within a year of earning her master's degree, she began her now more than 27-year career with MSU. She started as the telegiving coordinator in 1994 before serving as the director of annual giving from 1995 to 1999. Beginning in January 2000, she spent nearly 14 years as director of development before taking on her current role as assistant vice president for alumni relations and development in 2015. Highley also served as an instructor, teaching orientation classes and First Year Seminar since 2016. In addition to serving on multiple committees during her time at MSU, she is a member of the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education, the Association of Fundraising Professionals, the Association of Advancement Services Professionals and the Morehead Rowan County Chamber of Commerce. Highley plays an important role in successful scholarship and fundraising campaigns like "Much More Opportunity: The Campaign for Morehead State" and the current "Soar to New Heights Campaign," which raised tens of millions of dollars for campus facilities, scholarships, research and other University priorities. Her proudest accomplishment is her role in creating and

implementing the Herron Leadership Program, a student leadership, enrollment and retention initiative launched in 2016 through a partnership with the Office of Enrollment Services, the Office of Student Success and the MSU Foundation.

A previous recipient of the Distinguished Creative Productions Award in 2009, Hill graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in English from Oakland University in 1993. He went on to earn two master's degrees: A Master of Arts in Communication from Wayne State University in 1995 and a Master of Fine Arts (MFA) in Filmmaking in Southern Illinois University (SIU) in 2002. He taught film classes at SIU while earning his MFA. Hill teaches media production classes for undergraduate students at introductory through advanced levels. He believes students must engage in practical applications of production theory and concepts while encouraging students in advanced courses to take their work to the next level, frequently assisting in getting their projects broadcast on public television. Hill has had his film work frequently showcased. His short documentaries have been featured in film festivals globally and on Kentucky Educational Television (KET). He later moved toward creating episodic television shows, starting with a series of nine two-hour programs called "The Video Vault" in 2011 that led to "Video Vault Kentucky Edition," which ran from 2014 to 2020. His most recent project, a collaboration with MSU Associate Professor of Music Ryan McGillicuddy called "The Ryan McGillicuddy Big Band," aired on KET in December 2020.

Joshi earned a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from the Visvesvaraya National Institute of Technology in Nagpur, India, in 2000. He later earned Master of Engineering and Master in Business Administration degrees from the University of New Mexico in 2004. Joshi earned a Ph.D. in Systems Engineering from the University of Virginia in 2007. He worked as an associate advisor at KPMG International in their information risk advisory group in Richmond, Virginia, and as a manufacturing engineer in Bajaj Auto Ltd. in India. Joshi began teaching at MSU in January 2009 and has been a professor since 2020. Over the years, he developed several new program/course proposals, including the new Bachelor of Science in Systems Integration Engineering program launched in Fall 2020 after seeking approval from the Council on Postsecondary Education. Dr. Joshi's research activities enhance his teaching for student success. To provide MSU students hands-on learning opportunities in cuttingedge technologies, he established MSU's 21st Century Center for Manufacturing Systems with the help of a significant grant from the James Graham Brown Foundation of Louisville. In the past, Joshi conducted technical training workshops for various companies in MSU's service region, including Mitsubishi Electric, Kyosan Denso Manufacturing Kentucky (KDMK), Boyd Fabrication, the 3M Company, Summit Polymers, Morehead Utility Plant Board and SRG Global, among others.

Morrison earned a Bachelor of Arts in English from Marymount College of Kansas in 1981. He went on to earn a Master of Arts in English in 1984, a Master of Philosophy in English in 1986 and a Ph.D. in English in 1988, all from the University of Kansas. He has been with MSU since 1988. He has served as an assistant professor, associate professor and as a professor of English since 1998. Both Morrison's courses and research specialize in Victorian Literature, the British novel and literary theory. He has published widely on various 19th- and 20th-century writers, including Charles Dickens,

Richard Jefferies, and William Wordsworth, among others. Since last receiving the MSU Distinguished Researcher Award in 2004, Morrison has published three co-edited collections of scholarly essays from major international academic presses and six peer-reviewed essays in national and international journals or scholarly books. In 2021, he published a new book "Thomas Hardy: A Companion to the Novels." The volume appears in the McFarland Companions to 19th Century Literature series, published by McFarland & Company.

Wing, professor of music, trumpet, earned a Bachelor of Music Education from MSU in 1976 and a Master of Music in Trumpet Performance from the Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University (Bloomington) in 1981. He performs with the Horizon Brass Quintet and is in high demand as a clinician/guest artist. Wing has performed with symphony orchestras across the country, has served as lead trumpet for orchestras at multiple Las Vegas casinos/venues and has shared the stage with legendary performers ranging from Frank Sinatra and Johnny Mathis to Natalie Cole and Luciano Pavarotti. In addition, Wing has served as an assistant instructor of trumpet at Indiana University and an instructor of trumpet for the Nevada School of the Arts in Las Vegas, Nevada. Wing was the recipient of the 2010-11 Morehead State University Distinguished Teacher of the Year award. In 2013, Professor Wing was inducted into the Morehead State University Alumni Hall of Fame. Since coming to MSU in August 2002, he has served the University by being involved in numerous committees and service initiatives for the Caudill College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences, and the Department of Music, Theatre and Dance. As a member of the University Gala Planning Committee, Wing has helped produce and directed the show for the MSU Spring Gala, the University's largest fundraising event, since 2010. He has also served as the director of the Summer Arts Academy for the past 12 years.

Craft Academy students conduct research in conjunction with International Space Station

Students and recent graduates of the Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics recently presented the findings of research they did in conjunction with the International Space Station (ISS).

The ExoLab-8 research project aims to study the effects of microgravity on the nitrogenfixation process and the symbiotic relationship between Rhizobia bacteria and red clover. While Magnitude, the project's parent company, sent red clover in experiment modules to the International Space Station, the students from the Craft Academy maintained a control group in MSU's Space Science Center.

Four recent graduates, Allie Lewis of Morehead, Jai Joshi of Frankfort, Maiqi Qin of Salt Lick, and Grace Stubblefield of Ashland, also participated in the research project.

The Craft Academy senior team presented virtually at the International Space Station Research and Development Conference on Aug. 17, 2021. Over the summer, Craft students collaborated on a twenty-minute presentation detailing the experiment and how it impacted their STEM education experiences (the topic presented for the conference). Student researchers also produced a five-minute executive brief summarizing the work and presented it virtually to an audience of scientific professionals.

"As this research project and presentation took place while I was working virtually due to the COVID pandemic, the students demonstrated the ability to critically think and work with more independence compared to most students I have mentored. Therefore, their communication skills also had to develop very quickly. They also developed teamwork and collaborative skills as they had to set up and conduct their experiment with me being remote," said Dr. Michael Fultz, professor of biology, who mentored the students throughout the project. "The most rewarding aspect of mentoring student research is observing a student's scientific curiosity and excitement for a project. In addition, it is rewarding as a mentor when you get to see your students finish a project and present their results at a scientific conference. We share in our students' accomplishments and hopefully inspire them in their future pursuits."

In addition to Fultz, the students were also mentored by Craft Academy QEP Director Rachel Rogers and Jennifer Carter, assistant director of academic services. By the end of the experiment, students gained scientific knowledge and lifelong skills for future STEM careers, such as practical problem-solving, communication, and collaboration skills.

"I truly learned that research is not a field that should be gatekept by age," said Lockard. "We presented amongst professionals, adults with degrees and years of experience. Yet, our research was every bit as good, our answers every inch as insightful as theirs. It was so thrilling to be held to the same high standards as them and not have our age dock our credibility. I think we were even asked the most questions overall by the panelists."

"Our research is far from over. We are working on recruiting new students already to carry our torches, test tubes, and Excel spreadsheets of growth data. Our goal from this research is a continuous one, and we are so excited to pass this knowledge on."

Moore said she's excited to see the end results of the experiment, which will wrap up this semester.

"I enjoyed data observation. Our group of ten divided into five groups of two to daily check on the growth of the plant and the environment it was growing in. We measured qualities like the amount of light in the ExoLab module, the carbon dioxide levels, the temperature, and the humidity to make sure that the environment was relatively constant to maintain a strong control group," she said. "Additionally, we measured the height of the clover to compare their growth throughout the semester. While I enjoyed seeing the plants grow, the most enjoyable part of this process has yet to happencomparing our data to the data from the experiment group on the ISS."

The Craft Academy for Excellence in Science and Mathematics is a dual-credit academy for academically exceptional Kentucky students. Craft Academy provides students with a postsecondary residential experience to complete their junior and senior years of high school by enrolling in college courses. The Craft Academy's purpose is to meet the unique educational needs of academically gifted and talented high school juniors and seniors in the Commonwealth. The academic rigor of the Craft Academy challenges students to excel at their highest level through project-based STEM+X courses and hands-on learning experiences, with emphasis on innovation, design and creativity, and civic and regional engagement.

Morehead State University's School of Creative Arts will kick off the 2021-22 theatrical season with a virtual production of Csaba Szekely's "Mine Flowers." The recording, filmed at the Lucille Caudill Little Theatre, is available for viewing at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 23, through Saturday, Sept. 25, and Thursday, Sept. 30, through Sunday, Oct. 2. Performances will also be available for view on Sundays at 2 p.m. on Sept. 26 and Oct. 3. The recording of this production runs without intermission.

Inspired by Checkhov's "Uncle Vanya," "Mine Flowers" visits a modern-day Appalachian village whose residents have seen better days and must decide if they will languish at the bottom of a moonshine bottle or climb out of the mine and into the light.

Szekely's play was adapted by Michael Turner and Mary Linehan (Class of 2011), who also serves as the play's director.

After reading Szekely's play set in a Romanian mining town, Linehan said that she and Turner thought adapting the play to an Appalachian mining town setting seemed like a natural fit. As she, the cast and crew figured out creative solutions to the challenges of a virtual production, she feels like the audience is in for a treat as they figured out ways to make a theatrical production resonant and engaging.

'Black Art Matters' exhibit opens Sept. 29 at the Golding-Yang Gallery

An art exhibit featuring the works of black artists from across the country will open Wednesday, Sept. 29, at Morehead State's Golding-Yang Gallery in the Claypool-Young Art Building.

"Black Art Matters" will feature sculpture, painting, drawing, and photography from black artists and creators. The exhibit is inspired by nationwide unrest in recent years in response to systemic racism and violence against people of color. Melissa Yungbluth, instructor of art and design and director of the Golding-Yang Gallery, said the exhibit is a powerful artistic response to the injustices faced by the black community.

"People should attend the exhibition to see what artists outside of the area are creating in general, but also in response to being a black artist in today's society. It's important to see this perspective," she said. "I have been part of Eagle Diversity since I began working at MSU and wanted to be able to work start working exhibitions into the gallery that talks about the different things that we as a group stand for."

The juror for the exhibit is Toya Northington, executive director, artThrust and Community Engagement Strategist at the Speed Art Museum in Louisville. She is the recipient of Art Meets Activism, Artist Enrichment, and The Special grants from the Kentucky Foundation for Women. In 2012, Northington founded an art-based, mental health and social justice organization that was the first non-profit organization that employed art-based, trauma-informed programming to address the psychosocial needs of Black girls and LGBTQ+ youth in Louisville.

An opening reception for the exhibit will be held Wednesday, Sept. 29, from 5 to 7 p.m. at the gallery. The exhibition will be on display through Oct. 20. Masks are required indoors.

The Golding-Yang Art Gallery, located within the Claypool-Young Art Building, is a pivotal educational and cultural component of the Department of Art & Design, the Caudill College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, the MSU campus and the community at large. Know that we have been where you are and we are excited to meet you and learn about you."

Morehead State Public Radio (MSPR), 90.3 FM, WMKY, is currently undergoing upgrades to replace outdated equipment that will allow it to continue preparing students for broadcasting careers.

The station, located in Breckinridge Hall on the MSU campus, is replacing two audio boards in its master control and production studios. The units are nearly twenty years old, about five years passed due to be replaced, according to MSPR General Manager Paul Hitchcock. The current units are missing parts and not all the buttons are operational. The main components to be purchased are Wheatstone Audio consoles and associated hardware and software. The total cost to replace the audio boards is just under \$90,000. Hitchcock said the upgrades give students practical experience with the latest in broadcast technology.

"Currently, more than 15 students are directly involved at MSPR. Students operate equipment as announcers, producers, engineers and editors. They serve on-air as local hosts for NPR's Morning Edition and All Things Considered, PRI's The World and more. The equipment to be purchased will be the latest and most advanced available for our needs at this time," Hitchcock said.

The upgrades will take place over the next six months, and Hitchcock said there are no expected broadcast interruptions. He added listeners will benefit from the upgrade through improved sound quality.

"The equipment and associated hardware/software are specified to work together for seamless transitions, improved amplification, sound and broadcast," Hitchcock said.

The equipment was paid for through listener contributions during the Spring 2020 Fundraiser and Membership Drive. Additional funds came from American Rescue Plan Stabilization (ARPS) Grant monies the station received through the Corporation for Public Broadcasting (CPB).

The upgrade was supposed to be completed last year but was delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

While the pandemic may have delayed MSPR's equipment upgrades, it did not stop the station from serving the community. MSPR offered a unique resource to local businesses during the pandemic's peak, providing free gift-in-kind advertising, called underwriting, to area businesses. The station received a \$112,136.00 grant from the CPB through the 2020 Coronavirus Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act and \$197,602.00 from the CPB through the American Rescue Plan Stabilization (ARPS) Grant. MSPR also received a Community Service Grant (CSG) from the CPB in October 2020.

"The decision was made not to actively fundraise in the fall of 2020. Seeking underwriting sponsorships was also postponed due to the pandemic and economy.
