Introduction

This volume is published under the traditional title of the St. Norbert College yearbook, THE DES PERES. In reality it is not a college yearbook because it does not picture all phases of college activity, even for the members of the armed forces now studying on the campus. It is rather an attempt to picture the lives of these men in their more important phases during the short and crowded period that they are on the campus.

College yearbooks usually represent months of planning and weeks of composition and careful work. This has not been possible during the short period of three months that now comprise a semester for these men. Men who spend sixty hours of week on a scholastic, military and physical program are considerably more busy than the average college man.

With these facts in mind, the book is presented with its faults and shortcomings. It is intended to give the men who have studied at St. Norbert under the AST program a pictorial reminder of the men with whom and under whom they have worked as well as where they have worked.

The Premonstratensian Order



ST. NORBERT

Founded in 1120 at Premontre, France, by St. Norbert, the Order of Canons Regular of Premontre is commonly known as the Norbertine or White Fathers. From the date of its founding the Order grew rapidly. In less than thirty years after its foundation, it counted more than one hundred abbeyes, and a century later seven hundred monasteries.

The Reformation and government interference caused a serious decline in the number of followers of St. Norbert. Since 1900, however, the Order has again shown a remarkable growth.

The Order adds to the contemplative life whatever active work is necessary in the particular locality where the abbeyes are located. This may be socio-economic leadership and organization in Belgium and Holland, parish work in Hungary, educational work in the United States. In this latter country the Norbertines number one hundred and sixty members.

The Norbertine Order directs St. Norbert College and St. Norbert High School at West De Pere, Wisconsin. It maintains a novitiate at Madison, Wisconsin, where its members spend their first year of training. In 1932 it opened Archmere Academy, a prep school for boys, at Claymont, Delaware. In 1934 the Norbertines were assigned to Southeast Catholic Boys High School in Philadelphia. At the present time, this school is staffed by some forty Norbertines. Central Catholic High School was opened at Green Bay, Wisconsin, in 1941. Men from the abbey at West De Pere are in charge of parishes in Wisconsin, Michigan, Illinois, Montana, Washington, and Vancouver, B. C. The Order owns and operates Camp Tivoli, the oldest Catholic Boys' Camp in Wisconsin, located on Shawano Lake. Radio Station WTAQ of Green Bay, Wis., and WHBY of Appleton, Wis., are property of the Norbertine Fathers and are under their personal direction.

As a Premonstratensian abbey school, St. Norbert College is the direct successor of a long line of European seats of learning that stretches back into the twelfth century. As such it has inherited those traditions that sponsored the medieval reputation of the Norbertine Abbey as the "Seminary of Bishops." This tradition, in spite of its origin in the Middle Ages,

has not hampered Premonstratensian development. In every age when the Order flourished it has been completely adapted to the needs of the times. In the days of St. Norbert, it was the monastic life of study and prayer which he sought to combine with the duties of the parish priest. That this combination was successfully achieved is the testimony of history.

This is not to be wondered at. Premonstratensians are canons, priests living a canonical life. This is based on a

thoroughly monastic preliminary training in which the love of prayer and study becomes almost second nature. Then comes college and university life with its stress on intellectual values. Later comes contact with the outside world through the functions in the ministry either as pastor or professor. Dedicated to the divine service and to his fellowman, the Premonstratensian canon does not weaken the value of his community service by demanding financial compensation adequate to his training and experience.

In 1893 the Norbertine Fathers of Berne Abbey in Heeswijk, Holland, responded to the call of the late Most Rev. S. G. Messmer, Bishop of Green Bay, when a large immigrant settlement in his diocese was being led astray. In the fall of 1898, when the growing colony of missionary Premonstratensians was given the additional assignment of St. Joseph Church at West De Pere, Wisconsin, the Fathers stationed there immediately began to offer classes to some of the local young men. Six years later the Bishop

called a meeting of the diocesan clergy to decide the future policy of the growing school. It was then determined that St. Norbert College should no longer be a preparatory seminary, but should develop into an American Catholic College with the usual collegiate courses. To the continued development of such a college the assistance of the diocese of Green Bay was pledged by Bishop and priests alike.

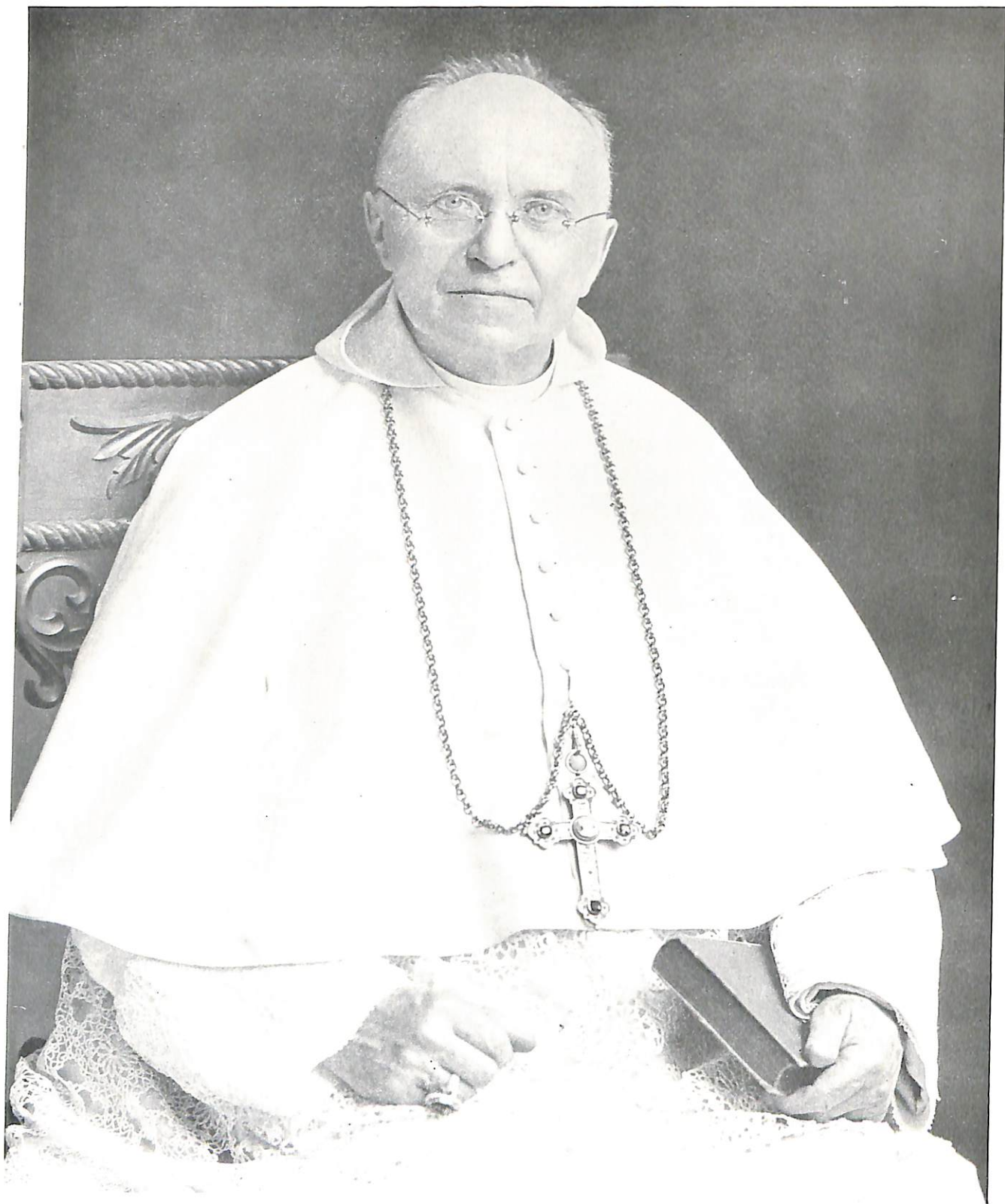

RT. REV. ABBOT B. H. PENNING, O. PRAEM., LL. D.

"No man liveth unto himself alone." The Rt. Rev. Abbot B. H. Pennings, O. Praem., certainly has lived for others, for it is mainly through his work, perseverance, and splendid guidance that St. Norbert College stands today.

Abbot Penning's dream, the dream for which he gave so much of his life, was the establishment of an institution in which native born boys could be educated to the priesthood. It was amid humble beginnings that the small, earnest class of four boys started their training in the fall of 1898. The next year found a two hundred per cent increase in the student enrollment in "The College" which then consisted of one special room in the priory. According to contemporary accounts the main sport in the spring of 1899 "was tearing down a lot of old barbed wire fences that enclosed the various lots, burning up the giant burdocks, and helping to prepare the ground of what is now the abbey garden".

The dream grew rapidly to larger proportions and in March, 1902, the cornerstone of Main Hall was laid. Because it had steam heat and electricity, it was thought to be one of the finest buildings north of Milwaukee at that time.

In July 1911, Father Pennings celebrated his twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. The first twenty five years had been fruitful, but the next twenty five yielded an even more abundant harvest.

By 1915 the dream had outgrown Main Hall, and the need for a new building was met in 1917 when construction was finished on Boyle Hall. This building was the gift of the Francis Boyle family of Fond du Lac, Wisconsin. In 1925 the first radio station of the college came into being

with its transmitter located on the top floor of Boyle Hall. Five years later the gymnasium was constructed, and in 1943 Residence Hall was dedicated. And so under the guiding hand of Abbot Pennings, his undying dream has materialized into the college we know today.

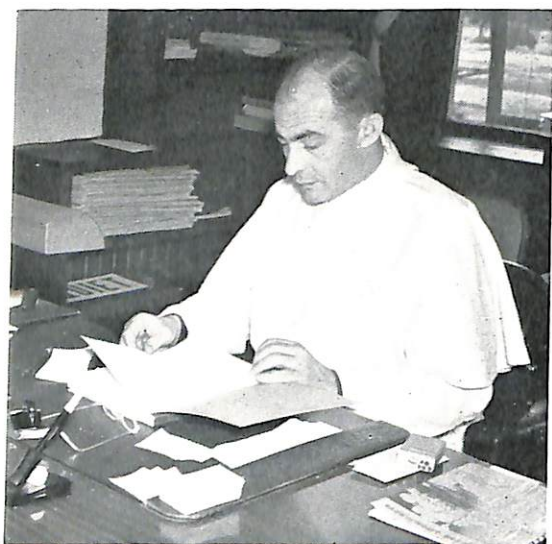
The average student, whether soldier or civilian, never sees much of Father Abbot. But in spite of the fact that he directs the college from his office in the abbey, he still knows very much of what is being said and done on the campus. Yes, at eighty two years of age, he is still watching his dream of half a century.



The Dean

Those who have spent any time at all on the St. Norbert campus have encountered the smiling, sun-tanned face of the Very Rev. P. N. Butler, the Dean of St. Norbert College. There is a story behind this appearance, the story of over twenty years devoted to boys and boys' work both in winter and in summer. For the nine months of the school year Father Butler serves as Dean of the College performing the multitude of large and small tasks that this position embraces.

A native of Wisconsin, Father Butler came to St. Norbert High School in 1915 and progressed through it and the college until he emerged as a graduate in 1922 with a B. A. degree. After teaching high school for four years, he attended the University of Wisconsin in order to further



his education in his chosen major, English Literature. He completed work for his Master's Degree in 1928 and for his doctorate in 1930. Forearmed with this complete education, Father Butler returned to his first Alma Mater to serve as Head of the Department of English, which position he still retains. In 1941 he was appointed Dean of the College.

Under the guidance of Father Butler, the College is a well organized, cooperative unit. His recent experiences as a student, coupled with his present experiences as a teacher, help him understand the problems of both the students and the faculty. In his attempt to further the school's progress nothing of value has been too insignificant to merit his consideration.

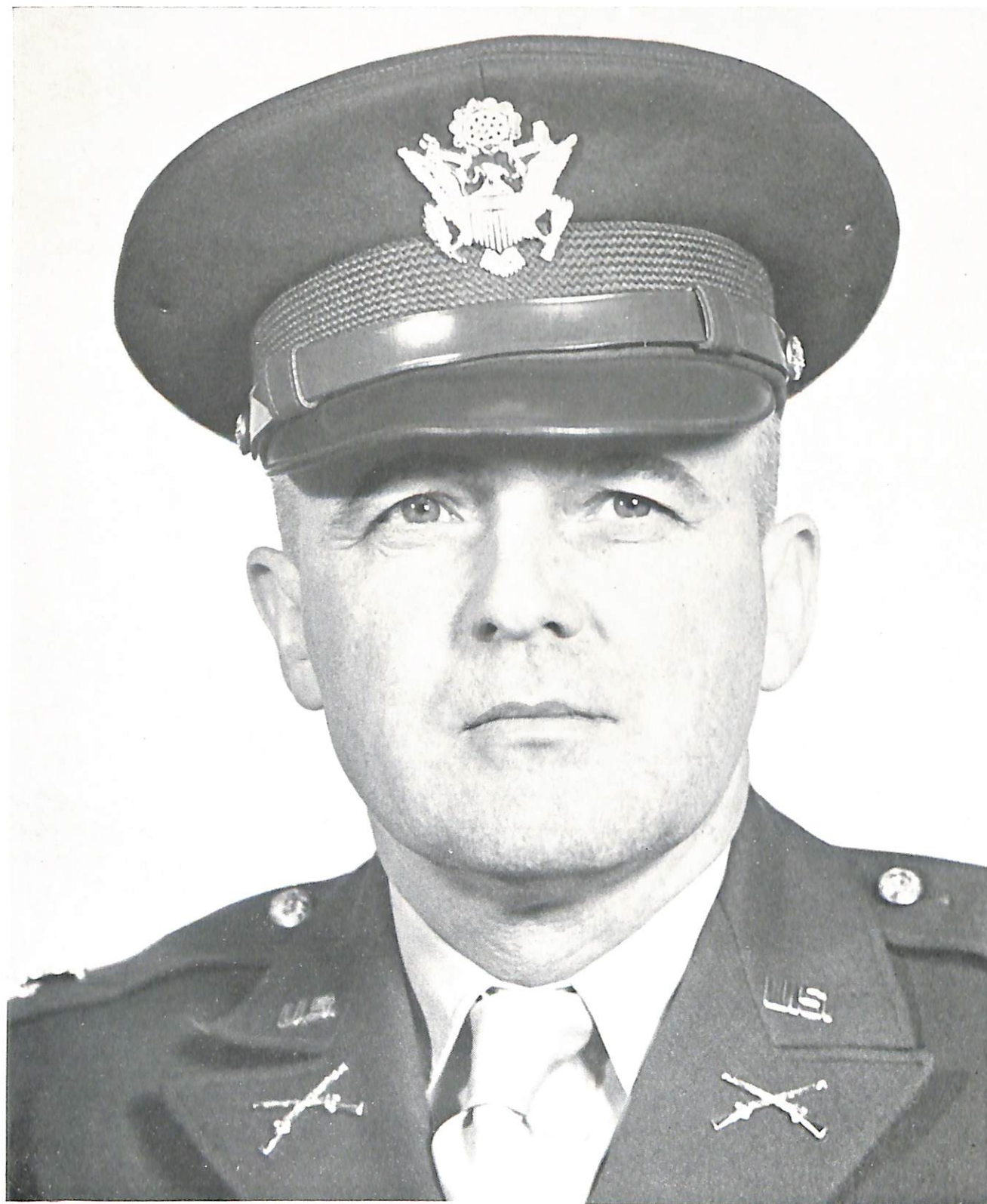
The first time you drop into his office you are impressed by his cordiality and his willingness to help. The Dean has a big job, but no matter how busy he is, he can always find time to help the perplexed or bewildered student.

During the summer months our Dean also spends his time with boys, but of a younger age. His special hobby and care is Camp Tivoli, the Norbertine Camp for boys, located on Shawano Lake, forty miles north of Green Bay. He has served on the Tivoli Staff since 1927 and was made Director of the camp in 1929.

The Commandant



JOHN B. CRONE, MAJOR, INFANTRY

A native of West Lebanon , Indiana, Major John B. Crone first entered the armed forces in May 1917. After a short training period in the United States he was sent to France and arrived there with the 5th Division, 60th Infantry. From then on until the Armistice was signed, he remained abroad, experiencing actual combat duty most of the time. Following the cessation of hostilities, came a period of nine months during which he served with the Army of Occupation in France.

Major Crone was awarded both the coveted Distinguished Service Cross and the French Croix De Guerre with star, for action during the Meuse Argonne offensive.

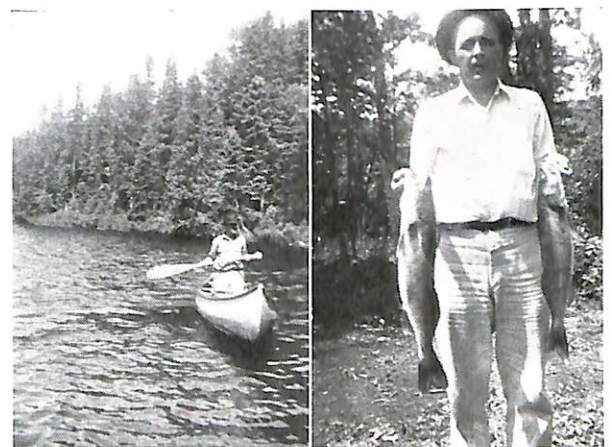
After returning to the United States in August 1919, Major Crone later accepted a commission in the Officers Reserve Corps which he held for fifteen years. A few months after the entry of the United States into the present war, he again returned to active duty and was sent to Fort Custer, Michigan, a Military Police Training Center. From there he was transferred to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin and a short time later to Camp Des Plaines.

In June 1942 the Commandant received his majorship and was assigned as Executive Officer to the 3667 Service Unit, an AST Unit at Bradley Polytechnic Institute at Chicago.

Major Crone arrived on the campus as Commandant of the St. Norbert AST Unit on October 9, for the opening of the second term.

Major and Mrs. Crone reside in De Pere. They have three children, the eldest of whom, J. Hall, enlisted in the United States Army Air Force the day war was declared.

Men in service have little time for the hobbies they once enjoyed. Major Crone, however, still loves the great outdoors although he finds little time to enjoy it now. He is fond of fishing and loves to paddle a canoe in some quiet stream.

MAURUS J. SCHUMACHER, Captain, Infantry

Captain Maurus J. Schumacher, Battalion Adjutant, is truly a St. Norbert man for he has been on the campus almost continuously for the past eleven years. He left his home town, Stockbridge, Wisconsin, in 1932 to enter St. Norbert High School and for eight successive years he matriculated through the various courses in high school and college. During this long period he distinguished himself in academic subjects and athletics. He was a member of the first R. O. T. C. class to graduate from St. Norbert.

On July 5, 1940, Captain Schumacher was called to active duty. For short periods he was stationed at Fort Wayne, Michigan, Camp McCoy, Wisconsin, and Fort Benning, Georgia. After graduating from the school for Infantry Officers at this latter camp, he was assigned to Fort Custer, Michigan, until 1941 when he returned to St. Norbert campus where he has been stationed ever since. Prior to the arrival of the AST Unit, he served as an ROTC instructor and with the advent of the 3658th Service Unit, he was appointed Adjutant.

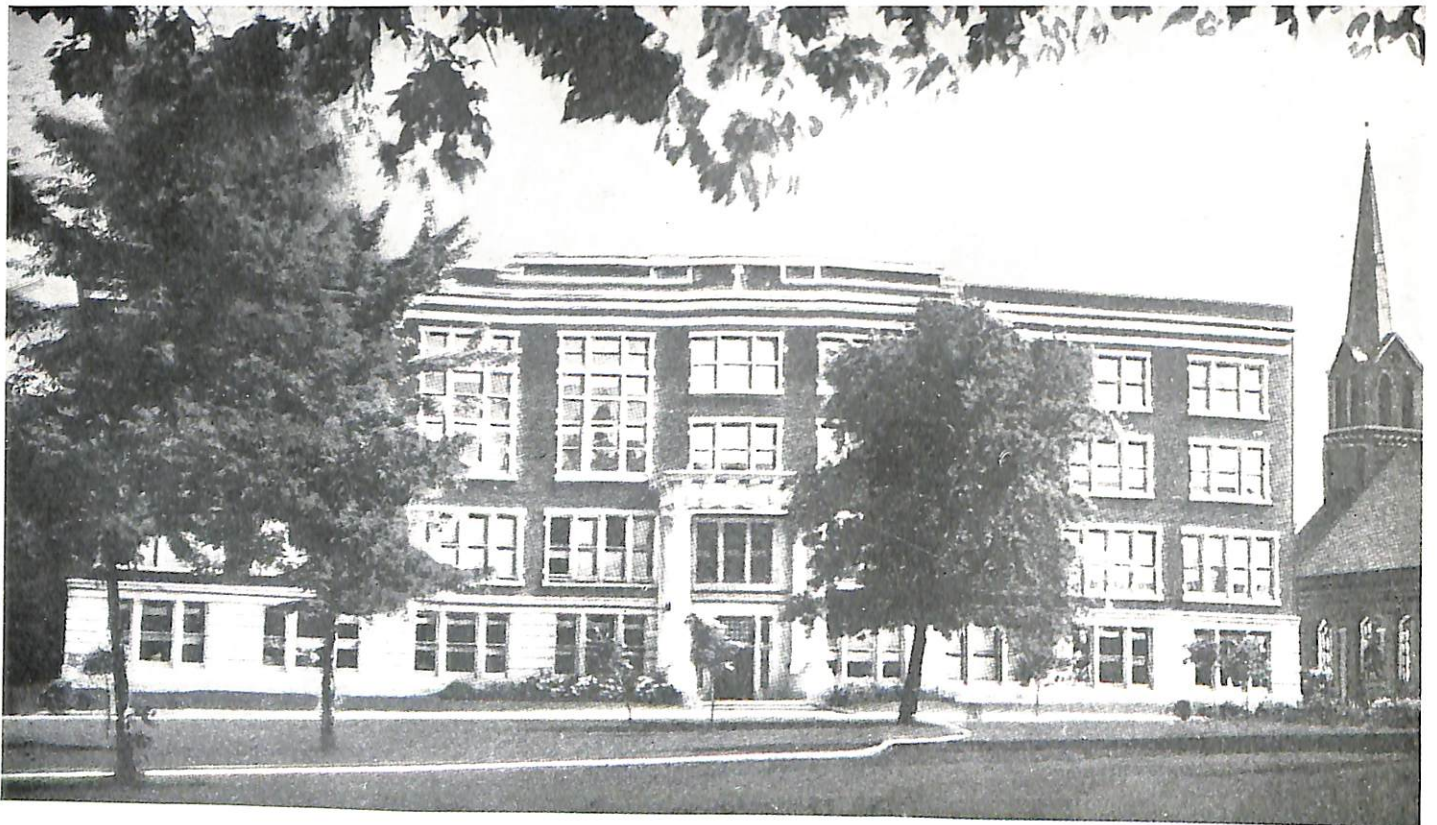
DR. MINAHAN and ABBOT PENNINGS

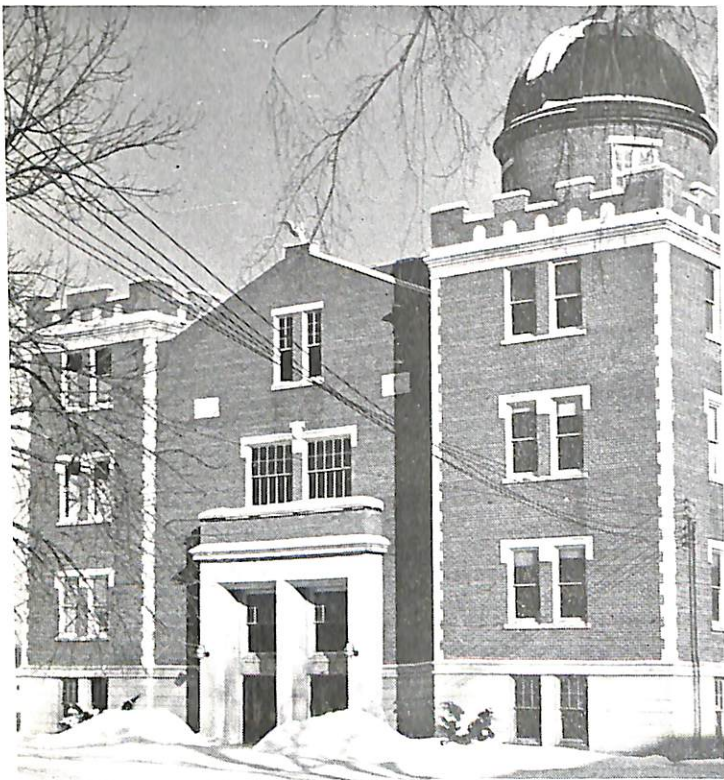


MAIN HALL

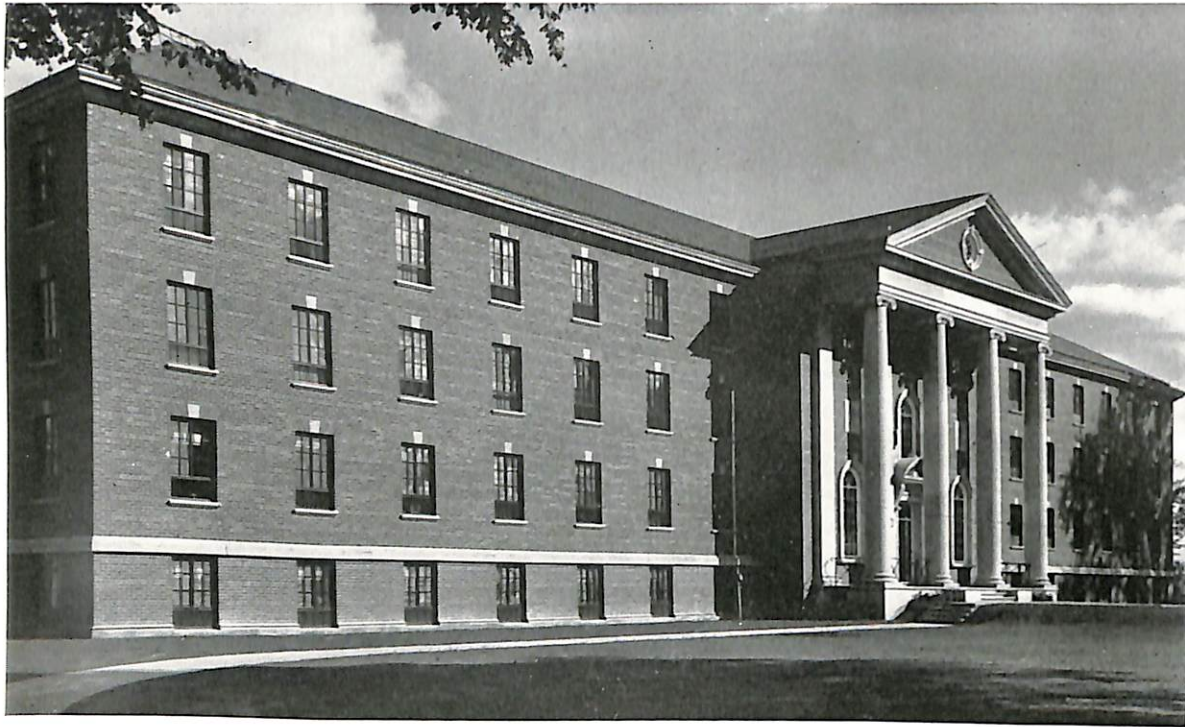
Main Hall is given over mainly to the St. Norbert High School. On the first floor are the Dean's Office and

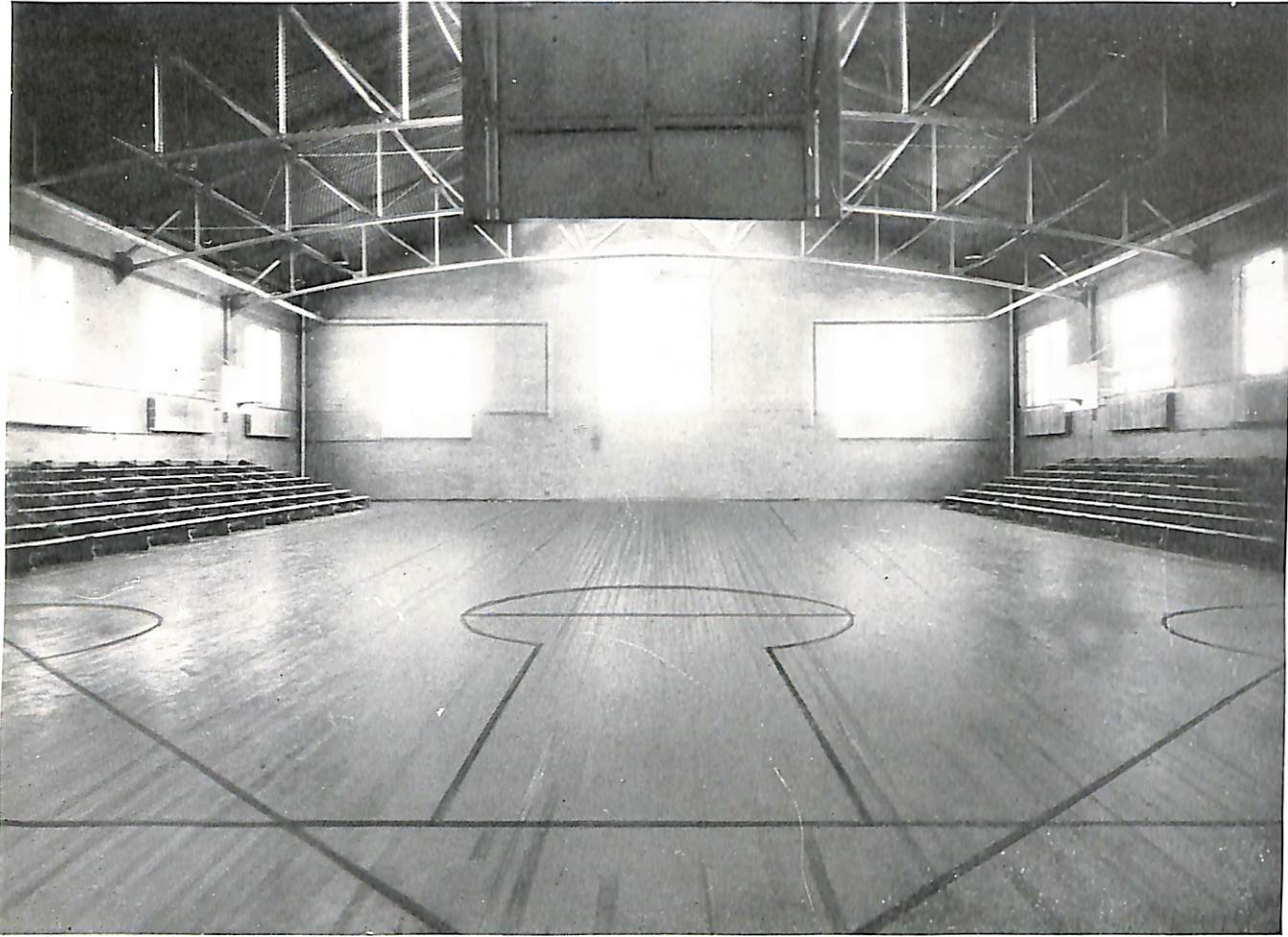
Sick Call

Chaplains In Service



Rev. A. M. Keefe

Father Keefe was Dean of St. Norbert College from 1927 until 1941 when he was called to active duty with 135th Medical Regiment. Ordained to the priesthood in 1920, he left the campus shortly after to do graduate work in the field of Botany. He was graduated from the Catholic University of America with a Master's Degree and then continued his work in the graduate school at the University of Wisconsin where he obtained his Doctor's Degree. He is the head of the Biology Department.

Lt. Colonel A. M. Keefe was a Reserve Officer since 1921 and after training with his regiment at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, he was transferred to the South Pacific where he now serves as a chaplain.

Rev. C. H. Miron

The second head of a department to leave the campus for the duration was Father Miron. After receiving his Doctor's Degree in Philosophy, he returned to the campus for two years to head the Department of Philosophy. With more and more students leaving the school to enter the armed forces, he applied for a commission which he received in April 1942. He attended the Chaplain Training School at Harvard, served at Port Jackson, South Carolina, and then moved to Alaska, where he is now stationed. The Rev. C. H. Miron is a Captain in the Infantry.

The increased demands of the Armed Forces of the country upon the available manpower meant the end of intercollegiate athletics for many small colleges throughout the U. S. St. Norbert was no exception. As a result, Father Fox, the Director of Athletics, donned the uniform of the navy in the summer of 1943. He was commissioned a Lieutenant in July, attended the Navy Training School for Chaplains at Williamsburg, Virginia. Upon completion of this course Father Fox was assigned to a Sea Bee Unit and in early fall was moved to the Pacific Theater.

Rev. A. J. Righino

The arrival of four hundred trainees on the campus in early July who were to be educated for engineering meant that the Department of Modern Languages was to be shelved for the duration. Consequently the head of this department, Father Righino applied for and received a commission in the Army. He, too, attended the Chaplain school at Harvard during the months of August and September. Lieutenant A. J. Righino is a chaplain in the Cavalry and has been stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas since he left the training school.

This Company consists of six platoons of men, all of whom began their ASTP training at St. Norbert. The sixth platoon men had had some engineering training in college before entering the service. In July they, therefore, began with the Basic Two Training Course, and completed the Basic Three Course at the end of De-

ember 1943. The other platoons are made up of men with no previous engineering training and so they began with the Basic One Course in July. They will begin their Basic Three Training in the January 1944 term.

We are soon to leave St. Norbert; to where, not even the army knows. But of one thing we are certain, the army will be hard put to find a more popular post.

Now in the twilight of our sojourn at St. Norbert College, we wish to extend our sincerest thanks and utmost appreciation to Father De Cleene, Father Sromovsky, Father Le Mieux, Father Nolan, Father Pritzl, Father Reuss, Father Spellman, Mr. Nystrand, and the military personnel of this post. Without their helping hands, few of us would have made the grade.

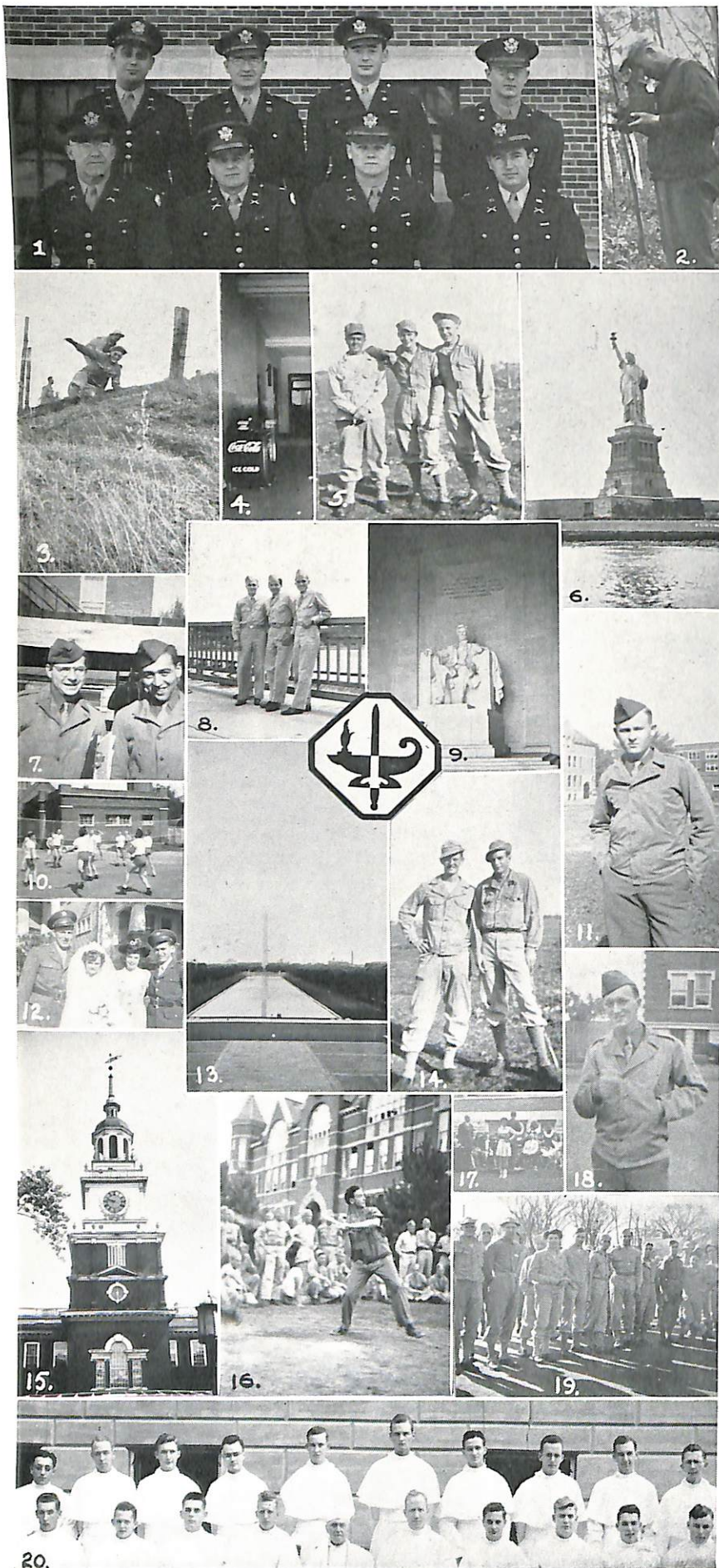

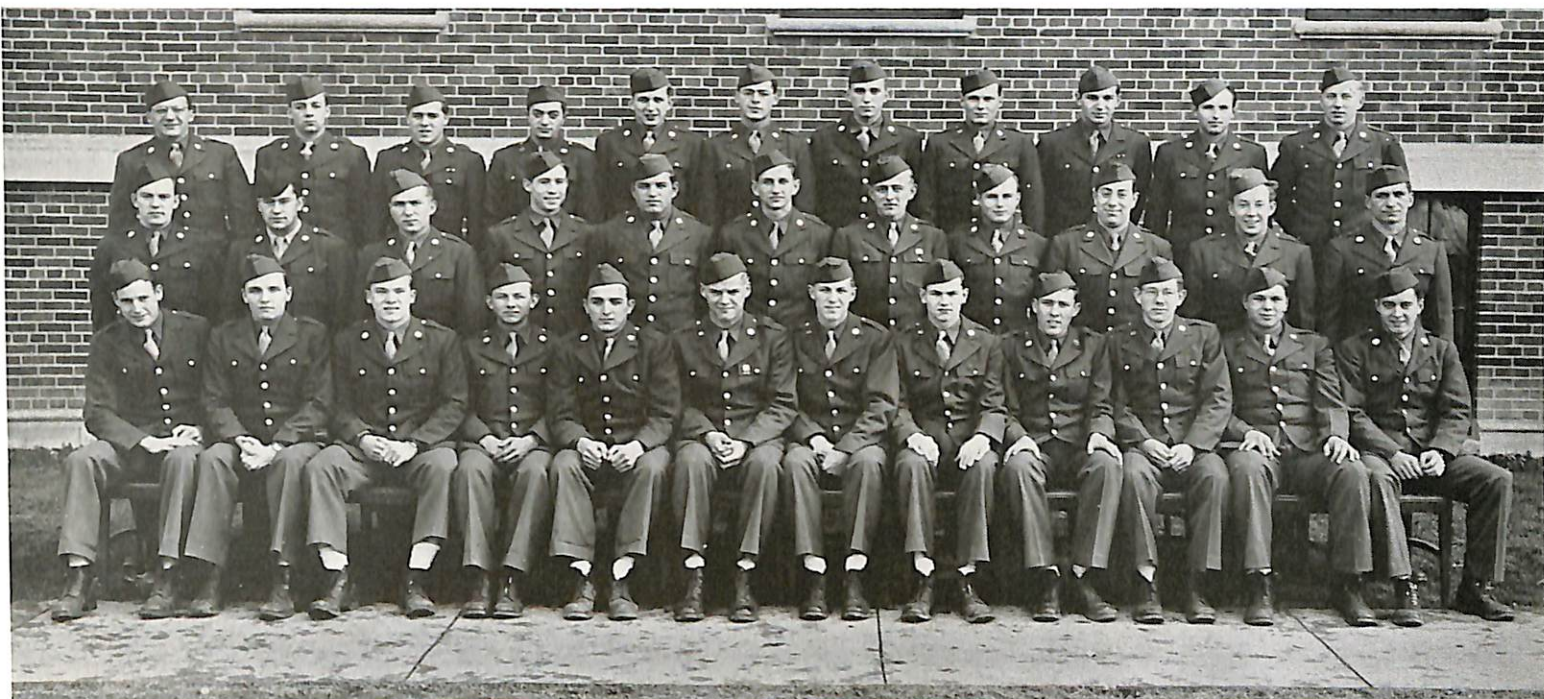

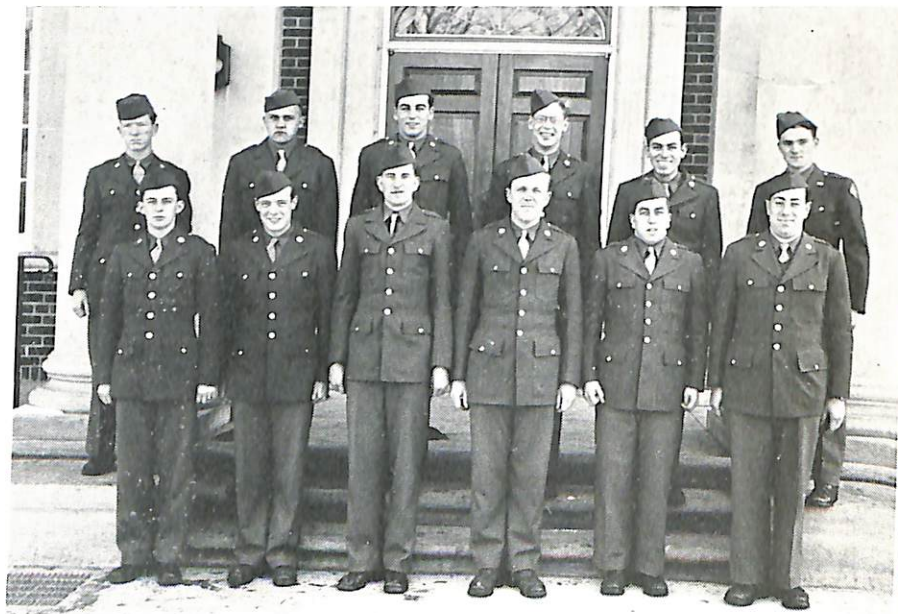
The department of music is under the direction of the Rev. Robert A. Sromovsky. During the first two terms he has been fortunate in having

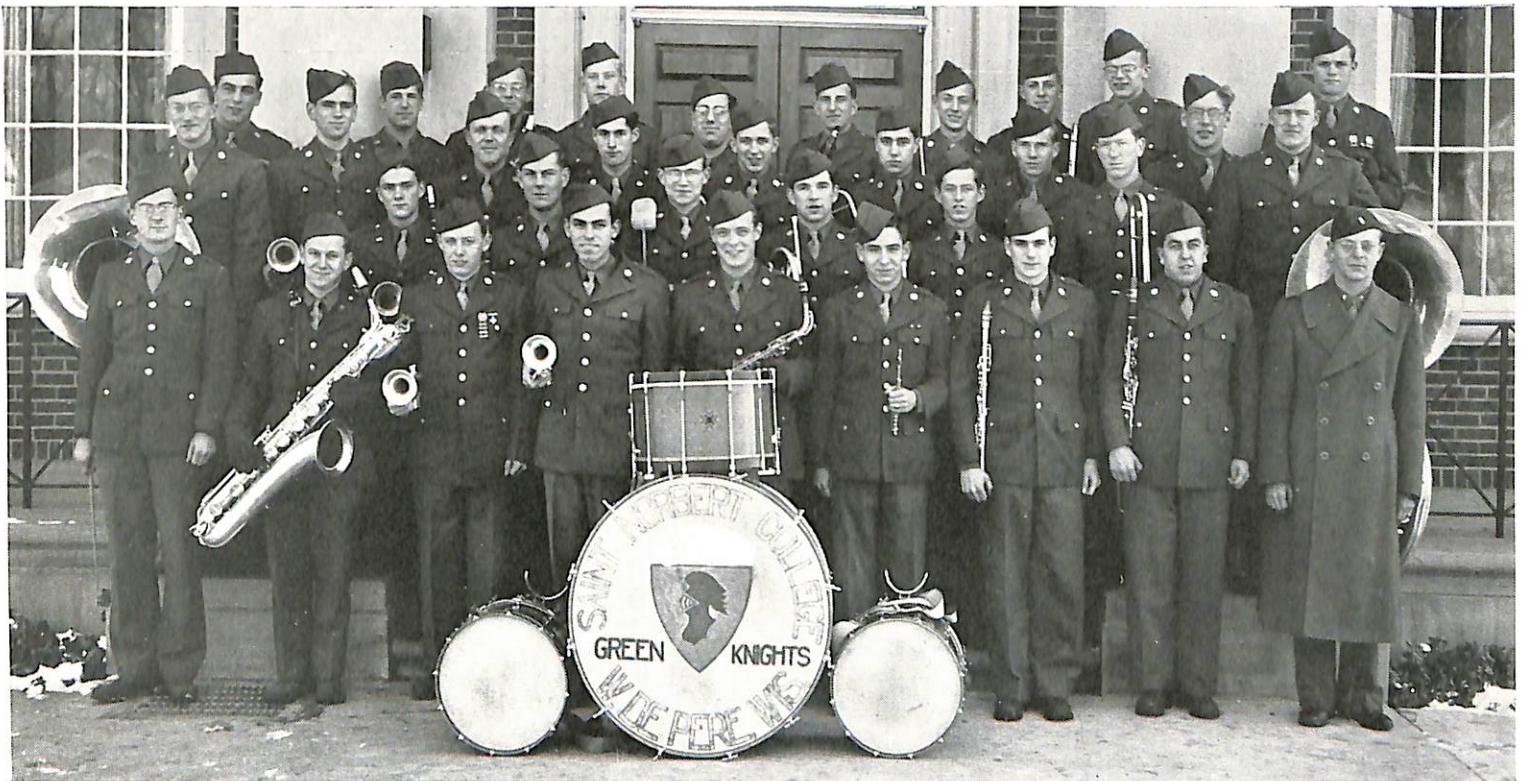

The men in this Company began their ASTP courses at the opening of the second term, October, 1943.

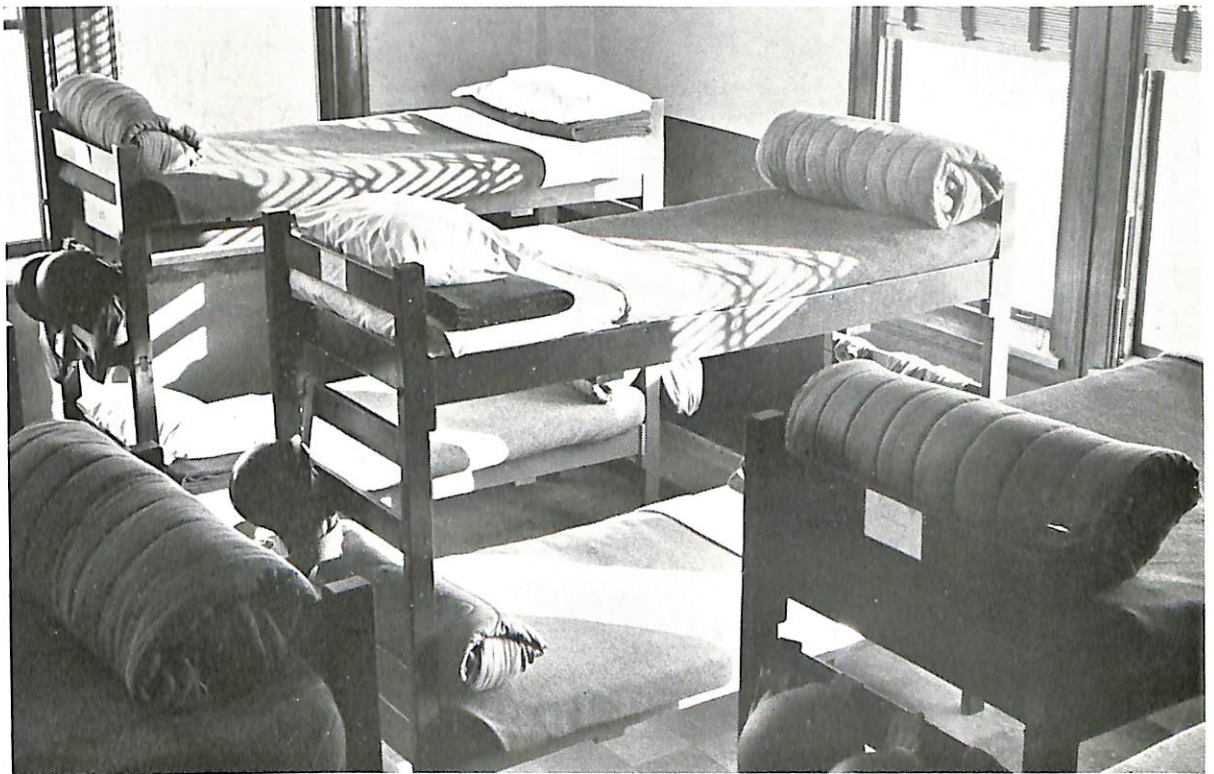

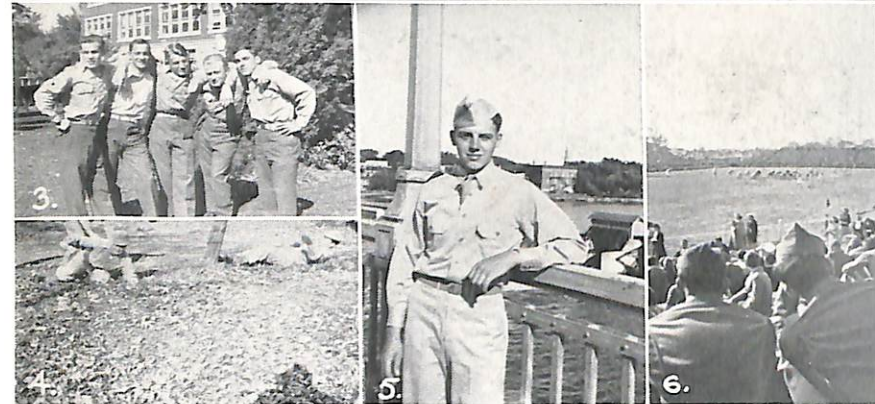
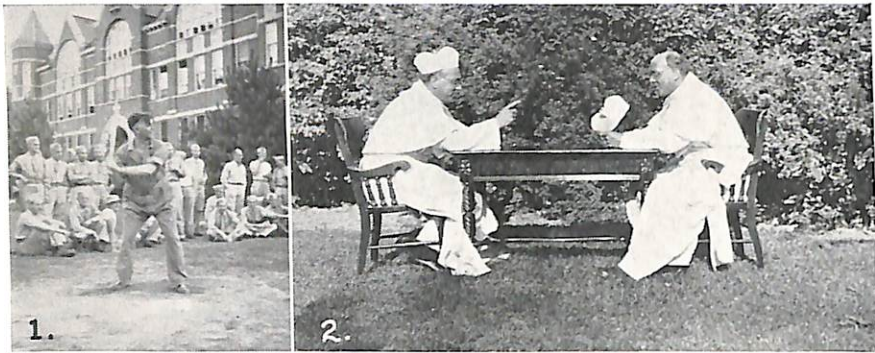

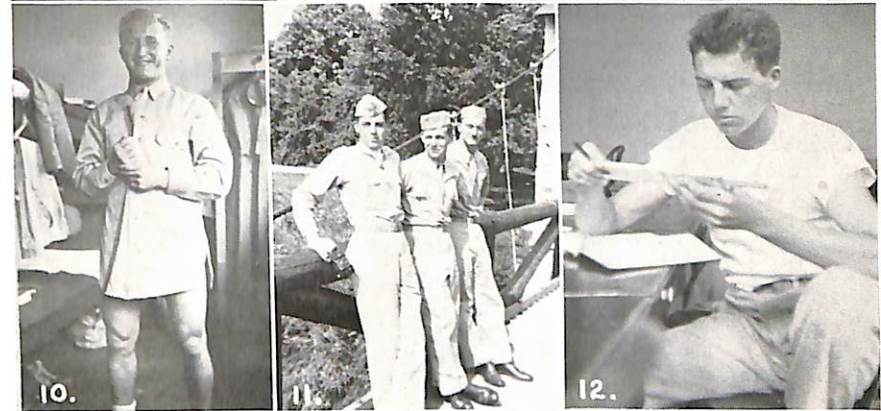
