CAN'T FAIL CURRICULUM... FOR ALL GRADE LEVELS

Name an instructional resource that has high student appeal, is always current, develops higher level thinking skills, is written on a wide range of reading levels, encourages further reading, and can be used in all areas of the curriculum. There is probably such a resource only a few feet from where you are right now. It's the newspaper. If you haven't used the newspaper in your classroom, prepare yourself for a learning experience that will make you wonder why you haven't tried it earlier.

Newspapers can be used to teach reading, social studies, science, mathematics and art from early elementary grades through the college level. There are those who would agree that there isn't an area of the school curriculum where the newspaper would not have value as a tool for instruction. In many classrooms it is the major resource for teaching "critical thinking and problem-solving skills."

Each month, Newspaper in Education publishes a newsletter, "Update NIE," describing a variety of educational programs that have been proven successful. Most of the topics are written by those who were responsible for their implementation and subscribers to the newsletter are always

provided with a source for obtaining additional information on programs of special interest to them. Topics in past issues have included: Tuscon's "Extended Day," a high school program using newspapers in alternative educational programs in Tuscon, Arizona; an inservice for teachers on how law-related issues can be taught through the newspaper to students in grades 5-12; and how the NIE program at the New Castle (Pa.) News recently published a magazine aimed at preventing child abuse.
