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The Role of Occupational Therapy in the Adaptive Scuba Diving Industry

BACKGROUND & PROBLEM

Adaptive scuba diving is an activity that provides many therapeutic benefits to individuals living with physical, visual, cognitive disabilities. and/or Occupational therapists (OTs) specialize in using valued activities as therapeutic interventions, however, the literature supporting the profession's value in the adaptive scuba diving industry is limited. There are no clearly defined job descriptions for OTs contributing to the adaptive scuba diving industry although evidence shows the therapeutic potential that OTs can bring to it.

PURPOSE

To demonstrate OT's value in the adaptive diving industry by creating an adaptive diving reference book for dive professionals to increase readiness for assisting divers living with cognitive, physical, and/or visual disabilities; and 2 job descriptions for OTs in adaptive diving settings.

Outcome objectives:

- (a) To create a detailed reference book for common conditions found in adaptive divers.
- (b) To ensure accuracy and relevancy of the reference book through thorough review and feedback from dive and healthcare professionals.
- (c) To create a job description for OT positions within the adaptive scuba diving industry.
- (d) To explore a licensing deal for the reference book.
