I sure you realize that the results of this study will be valuable, not oniy for new businesses and businesses that plan expansion, but to all existing businesses. This information wili be especially valuable in developing new markets locally and in encouraging the establishment of new sources of supply locally.

We need your cooperation. I hope that you wll complete the questionnaire and return it to us at your earliest convenience. As I mentioned in my earlier letter, it is not necessary to compile exact dollar figures. Estimates of the division of your purchases between groups of products and between those purchased eram suppliers within the Providence Metropolitan Area and those from outside will be satisfactory.

If you find it difficult to classify your purchases according to the categories listed in Section III, use the blank lines at the end of the section to list and describe your purchases using categories which you find easier. If I need to, I will phone you to find out what you have included in such categories.

## Notes on the Input-Output Questionnalre

The questionnaire asks you to report on both construction piti ir-place, and materials, pmponents and services which you purchased. In Section $I$ the construction put-in-place is classified into new construction and repair and maintenance work, and then cross-classified whether it was situated within the Providence SMSA (officially called the Providence-Pawtucket-Warwick, R. 1. - Mass. Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area) or elsewhere in se U. S. or outside of the U. S.

You may have to estimate the geographical breakdown (especialiy in Sections III \& IV), Pt this breakdown: within and outside the Providence SMSA is the crucial information - bught by the Department of Defense. Were it not for the need for this information, the \&udy could have been made directly from Census Bureau materials and we need not have thered you with this questionnaire. A Sheet attached to these notes shows the area covered by the Providence SMSA. As you will see, the area includes Attleboro and North tleboro and eight Massachusetts towns, but excludes Westerly and Newport.

In Section II information is sought both on the percentage of your new construction t-in-place in 1965 that was residential, industrial and commercial, or governmental, and on the percentages of maintenance and repair construction in $\epsilon a c h$ of these categories.

In Section III please classify your purchases of materials, components and supplies atcording to the suggested product classifications and according to the geographical locamon of your source of supply If you purchasc items which do rot fall into one of the Bgested groups, list them in the blank spaces. Please show items received from whole-

## MANUFACTURING QUESTIONNAIRES

The cover; Part I, General Information; Part II, Distribution of Sales; and Part IV, Purchase of Fuels and Services, Other Costs, and Capital Expenditures are identical for all of the manufacturing questionnaires.
