FOREWORD

The original impetus for this special issue of SLS derives from the course Linguistics 303 ("The Structure of Lithuanian") first offered by the U of I Linguistics Department during the 1968 Linguistic Institute, when it was taught by Mr. Jonas Kavaliunas, and taught again during the 1970-1971 academic year by Hans Henrich Hock.

As a result of the fact that Kenstowicz's contribution to this volume, a revision of his 1971 U of I Ph.D. dissertation, was still in progress while the other papers contained in this volume were being written, it was generally impossible to refer to such specific details of the revised version as the precise format of particular rules. Instead, it was necessary to refer to the original 1971 version of his dissertation. However, this does not appear to have crucially affected any of the particular arguments in these other papers.
