Campus life coming back?

Chinese students may come to 10th Street Campus next year; mayor on the way to Beijing and Shanghai

It could be prosperous times for Nelson, just like the old days when Japanese students boosted the local economy.

New Asia Capital Consultants Inc. has signed a letter of understanding (L.O.U.) with Nelson to explore the possibilities of an English as a Second Language (ESL) program in conjunction with Selkirk College and School District #8 international programs. New Asia would bring Chinese students to the Tenth St. campus, says Mayor Gary Exner, who has been involved in negotiations for this possibility and who showed the campus to the company's representatives.

Luscombe, Marilyn Selkirk College president, and Dr. Bill Reid for SD #8, have met with New Asia executive director Paul Pang.

Pang said an education fair in China from October 20 to 28 will be the key time for the Mayor to make progress in planning for Chinese students to come. Nelson Council voted September 17 to grant \$5,000 for Exner's travel costs to Beijing and Shanghai.

Next July, about 45 Chinese aged 15 to 20 may be able to study English for three weeks and use homestay in Nelson for accommodations, said Pang. "They want to learn Canadian English because it is a North American standard English, and because study in England and the USA is much more expensive. In England it costs twice as much."

In September 2002, a program could begin for students 18 years and older living in dormitories on the Nelson campus.

Pang said students will enroll in Selkirk College's two-year university transfer program and then go on to Simon Fraser University for a degree.

"These students are often from well-off families. They will return to China because there are many opportunities for them there," said Pang.

The Canadian Consulate in Beijing has agreed to relax previous rigorous standards for student visa applications, said Pang, because Canada is convinced the students pose a very low risk of refusing to return to China after their schooling.

Waterfront property for sale

VSA lands listed on BCBC Web site

It's official. Nelson's central waterfront land, where the VSA road maintenance yard is located, is for sale. British Columbia Buildings Corporation (BCBC), owner of the land at 110 Cedar St., has listed the property on its Web site at bebe.bc.ca.

The process for purchasing includes an initial deposit of \$50,000 with submission of offer, purchase to be in cash, and says under the OCP (official community plan) this area is a "special development zone," calling it a "strategic commercial and semi-waterfront location, ...one of the most desirable development sites in Nelson."

The piece is described as "commercial development" and three different zoning bylaws apply — C-1, M-1 and P-2 (commercial, light industrial and park) on a "net useable area of 119,479 square feet."

More documents on the Web site state the land is a "public offering," and that "the highest or any offer will not necessarily be accepted."

Dyne Torgeson, BCBC real estate analyst responsible for this property listing, said the website is being accessed now by prospective buyers but the identity of bidders is confidential. Although it has been reported that Great West Life Realty (GWL), owner of the Chahko-Mika Mall,

has met beginning July 12, 2000 with BCBC and Nelson's Mayor and Council about acquiring the land for a new stand-alone Wal-Mart, Torgeson would not say if GWL is in the bidding because the sale start date is not until October 15.



Red ink on the blackboard

Nelson area students, teachers and parents will feel the impact of some bad news soon.

School District 8 is running a budget deficit, enrollments are falling across the district, and teacher contract negotiations are stalled on the issue of pay for teachers.

At the Board of Trustees meeting September 25, the news of the deficit and fallen enrollments came as a one-two punch.

An auditor's financial statement for 2000-2001 Gadicke Minichiello reported a deficit of \$439,484 in the SD # 8 operating budget last year, and Trustee Dina Bambrick pointed out

that there is also a \$216.546 appreciated deficit from a previous budget, bringing the district's total debt load to \$656,030.59.

Then Assistant Superintendent Dave MacKinlay offered the grim news that all over the district, schools have experienced fallen enrollments amounting to a 3.55 per cent decline.

Since school districts are budgeted by the province on a formula of \$6,000 per student enrolled, the drop in numbers has an immediate impact on the budget picture.

Bambrick said the fallen enrollment means "\$300,000 worth of students. This is tragic."

Residents win substation battle

A West Kootenay Power (WKP) substation that was planned for South Slocan will go somewhere else, says Errol Hicks, chair of the South Slocan citizens' committee.

"I was told verbally on September 21 that [the village site] is not their preferred site," said Hicks. "[This site] is no longer of interest; they ran into technical problems."

Miles Godfrey, project manager for the substation contractor Acres Inter-national, confirmed that the South Slocan land "does not appear to be the preferred site at the moment."

A citizens' group had been opposing the plan due to environmental and health concerns.

A sturdy building

Non-profit groups have to wean themselves from government coffers.

Government funded ministries can expect to have significantly less money to operate with this year. While education and health are allegedly going to receive their funds without cuts, all other sectors can expect much less support from the government.

The tightening of the belt is also going to affect grants and other subsidies to non-profit groups.

The decision is made in Victoria. It will be felt

There is an existing ongoing government debt. Any new government always inherits the debt from the previous government and interest payments must be made. There has also been some tax reduction for the tax payer and this means fewer dollars for the government to run

Our small rural non-profit organizations face big problem. Less financial support will mean that many groups will have to cut back on services. It is likely that many of us will reach into our pockets to pick up some of the slack created by fewer government dollars.

We need long-term solutions.

As long as non-profit groups rely upon government funds, the groups' finances will always be at that whims of the governments in power.

Government money is hard money to get anyway. Grant applications take up a considerable amount of time, are usually not very large and are demeaning because of the justifications that must be made.

A new way to look at the funding of our communities' idealism must be looked at. Non-profit groups must look at ways to become self-sufficient and free of the need for government funding.

There are several possible ways and many groups do rely upon other non-governmental funding.

Some groups will have to become businesses. The Nelson Leafs Bottle depot is one example of how it can be done. The profit they make on the bottle depot goes to supporting the team. They just supply a service and they get paid for it.

Running a business is risky and cannot be done over night. Non-profit groups are experts at what they do. Some will also have to become experts at entrepenaurship. Government funding should be looked at as help to build a foundation.

Upon that foundation can be built a sturdy self-standing building.

It is gratifying to note that the Director of the Canadian Action Network to End Sanctions in Iraq recognizes Saddam Hussein as a dictator.


However, he should have noted that he is a particularly cruel and brutal dictator.

I do not believe there is any way to justify what occured. It is unforgivable. However, I do not believe that going out, hunting down and killing the people behind it is an answer.





For almost half a year, scaffolding and Brian McLachlan have been moving down Hall Street from Baker towards Vernon. They have nearly reached the far edge of a large storeside mural and its scheduled completion date on October 31. The mural features Nelson's diverse and colourful history, which McLachlan captures in the geography of our region and in his renderings of individuals who are recognizable representatives of our community.

McLachlan's own history is as textured and diverse as the history he paints. His brochure, which outlines details of the Mural, also offers highlights of some of his previous and current passions: he was a downhill ski racer, bicycle racer, practical nurse, carpenter, vintage truck restorer, and sign carver. (Check out most of the signs along Baker Street.)

He also has a huge passion for adventure, travel, and pressing human limits. He tells me, "The night before the Giant Slalom Canadian Championships I was hit head-on by a taxi cab. I spent three days in a coma, two months in recovery, and then, with my knee

swollen like a grapefruit, I cycled from Calgary to Mexico.

He also relates an incident of rock climbing in Johnson's Canyon when he almost lost his life: "I had just finished climbing an ice face when the tree I was roped to was knocked out and fell part way down the face I fell and landed on the tree, and not 200 feet

Brian's life experiences come through as a collage of stories. He drove a rickshaw on his birthday in Indonesia, hitch hiked through Malaysia, which he says "was so unbelievably easy that you don't even have to stick out your thumb because drivers stop and fight to pick you up,' and landed a job building condos on Australia's Boudi Beach even though he'd never been a carpenter

He "ironed shirts with Filipino women in the basement of the Heathrow Airport Hilton, and worked in Northhampton as a farm hand, which I wasn't."

After a month hiking in

Nepal, he says his perception of the wilderness changed because "there, people live up to the snowline but here nobody does. Canada is the most wild place, there is a sense of space here. When I returned to Montreal in rush hour, I wondered, "Where is everyone?"

Fast Internet service comes on a beam of radio energy

NELSON — To paraphrase Jim Morrison, 'What a long, slow trip it's been." But to the relief of perhaps more than a few Internet users, high-speed is here at last.

The Net Idea, Nelson's oldest Internet service provider, has introduced high-speed 'net service by radio. It's fast, it's big, it'll swallow your image files hole and spit them back out faster than you can say "What's your URL?"

It's called VFi, the Net Idea's name for "Very Fast internet," and it does indeed promise to be very fast. The Net Idea offers several packages that vary in speed, from 300 kbps to 11,000 kbps. That's six or seven times faster than today's fast modems at the low end and, well, a whole lot faster at the high end.

Also called "Fixed Wireless," the system simplifies the infrastructure process of setting up high speed Internet. "By using radio, we avoid the cost of laying cable, copper, or fibre," says Keith Dunphy, Net Idea president.



"Speed is life," fighter pilots say. Net Idea president Keith Dunphy would agree with that — and he proves it by bringing high speed radio Internet service to Nelson. 10-4, Keith.

"This allows us to offer a competitively priced product." It also means, says Dunphy, the company can be flexible about where and how fast the VFi system is expanded.

The Net Idea has been supplying high speed Internet service to Nelson City Hall and a few local businesses for the past year and a half, "with great success," the company says.

Presently, the service is only available to customers in a limited coverage area, but the company plans to serve all of Nelson and some outlying areas, they

They also have plans to set it up in Castlegar and

So what's the point? By using radio waves to transmit Internet data, the service provider can offer a

connection to customers in some outlying areas that aren't connected to phone lines. It also frees up a telephone for use the way telephones were meant to be used.

High speed means large files can be uploaded or downloaded without actually watching your fingernails grow longer. And because radio is synchronous, meaning it works equally well for sending data from your computer as for bringing stuff into your computer, both uploads and downloads occur with the same high speed — not a point that other systems can boast of.

"There will be a dramatic change in the way people use the Internet," says Dunphy.

On another note, the Net Idea has set up a program that allows employees to take one paid day per month and use it working for a charity.

"It's our way of saying thank you to the community for supporting us over the years," says Janice MacPherson, CEO.


