FROM THE PROVOST AND ACADEMIC DEAN'S DESK:



Dear Colleagues,

I use the phrases "modular degrees" and "stackable certificates" often and thought it might be helpful to explain what I mean and why they represent an important direction for NPS. Modular degrees can help NPS better capture our educational efforts.

One of the ways that NPS is unique is that we take in warfighters with non-technical degrees who are 6–8 years out from college and graduate leaders with STEM masters degrees. In addition, rather than only providing degrees comparable to civilian schools, our curricula include classes requested by sponsors to provide the defense-related education they need in their Officers (and required for P-Codes).

The result is that a student might come to NPS and take 1-3 quarters of preparatory, graduate coursework for a year and a half to cover the essentials of their degree, followed by half a year of additional courses. That is how we turn a social sciences major into a P-Code rated officer with technical skills and a STEM degree in ~27 months: an accomplishment that shows how our students shine and our educational system works. When our statistics are compared with those of civilian schools, at first blush, NPS looks slow and the civilian programs (which only admit students with B.S. degrees equivalent to the M.S. degree sought) seemingly graduate students faster.

Modular degrees can help NPS more directly convey our students' accomplishments. NPS creates a preparatory module or core, separate from the degree. Additional course work is packaged into a post-graduate degree certificate. A student would then obtain the STEM degree, a preparatory certificate, and a post-degree certificate. The degree time would be shorter than the civilian school equivalent because our offerings always fully include summer and (for many programs) multiple intakes per year. In addition, while the NPS and civilian degrees would then be comparable in terms of credits, our classes would still be more Naval-focused. In addition, our capstones/theses pair the student with a faculty member keen on applying ideas to defense-related problems.

The modular curricular structure more clearly showcase our students' efforts and our educational offerings in comparison to other universities. As an added bonus, it would also be possible for students who obtain graduate degrees at other universities to take the post-degree certificate at NPS (or via DL) and obtain a P-Code. This is one direction for curriculum and degree reforms— there are others. The details will be more complicated of course, and LoE 1.1 is working on how this vision can be applied across NPS.

Work on the Transformation LOEs is picking up speed. For those looking to become involved, the Leads, Objectives, and Tasks for each LOE are listed on the Wiki pages, so feel free to look and contact the person who is leading the effort in the area of your greatest interest. The LOE Leads coordinate effort between LOEs at the twice monthly In-Progress Reviews (IPRs).



LOE Status

LOE 1.1 - Curricula. The Team has drafted a curriculum structure, or ontology, that they are now having selected departments review for fit. They are also looking at the best way to group programs for the most effective integrative effect.

LOE 1.2 - NWSI/Research. This LOE has divided into two working groups: 1.2.1 – NWSI and 1.2.2 – Research. 1.2.1 has completed has developed estimates of our current state and is outlining the desired future end state. They are now working to derive tasks, constraints, restraints, and assumptions from the current NWSI mission statement.

LOE 1.3 - Organizational Structure. The 1.3 LOE Team has proposed a few alternative organizational designs and is circulating them among the LOE groups for feedback. They are giving particular focus to supervisory roles.

LOE 1.5 - Business Operations. This team is conducting a survey that asks for faculty input. The survey will be used for three things:

- · To ensure the LOE team has identified all the business processes that serve faculty
- · To identify sticking points that should be examined and fixed
- · To collect any recommendations on how to make it better

Please consider responding to this survey, and if you can, choose at least one process off the beaten path (we will get more useful inputs if not everyone fills out comments on travel, purchasing, and conferences!). <u>The survey can be found here</u>.

SHARING NPS EXPERTISE IN INNOVATIVE HYBRID EDUCATION IN SUPPORT OF MODERNIZING NAVY TRAINING

On October 4 8, Dr. Ralucca Gera, Professor of Applied Mathematics, shared her expertise in hybrid education with the commanding officer, training managers, curriculum developers and instructors at the Center for Seabees and Facilities Engineering (CSFE) and the Naval Civil Engineer Corps Officers School (CECOS) in Port Hueneme.



Dr. Gera provided a week-long training to instructors on notetaking and interaction with digitized course content. The effort is part of a NRP study lead by Dr. Simona Tick (GSDM) and supported by a cross-disciplinary NPS team of faculty and students, including Dr. Kathryn Aten (GSDM), Dr. Amela Sadagic (GSOIS), LCDR. Aguilar and LT. Wickham (GSDM), working on reconfigurations of existing classroom-based curriculum to support the development of personalized and adaptive hybrid Navy training.
