putt us on board the Wonderbill which was all Harresson's landing and from that place wereere Conveyed to Bellevice Heospital, the officers of that institution wished us to hand in our description lists which we had so that they could make out a payroll. we did so, the payroll was made outh, and the mustering officer come and our names were called and then they made the wished excuse that all was wrong and we gott no pay soon after this we were sente to Horte Hamilton. butha demand of our description lists, and some got them and some did not, and since we have been here the paroled presoners are require to perform guard duly sick or well, we seem to have no sympathy

from any quarter dear sor imagine yourself a soldier in the army Lighting for liberty and worn oute by fatigue so that your are not fill for duty and a family to support which you are bound by the laws of God and man to do and that family in want of the necessaries of life what would be your feelings in such sircumstances, imagine this and you will have some adequate idea of our sircumstancel, I was paid up to the first of last Marok and I have received not no pay since and ill has veen Longer than that Line Some have been paid off we feel that fustice has not been lowards as we have grounded all the means in our power we feel thate

This is our laste chance for redress our prayers are that you will rectify this gross negligence in regard to pay and try to procure we furlought home untill are are fell for duty or a discharge one thing more we wish to know if we are obliged to assist or aid as sinst the confederate government when we have sworn note to assiste against them intill we are properly gehanged Some have to do duty on guard day by the aid of cares your answer and assistance will greatly oflige the suppliants. respectfully yours J.
