Maine's Fall Foliage Display Is Beginning

The official start of Maine's fall foliage season was September 15. The 2021 Fall Foliage Report from the Maine Department of Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry shows very little color change throughout most of the state. Forest rangers in northern Maine are reporting a 10% color change, with low leaf drop.

Typically, northern Maine zones six and seven reach peak conditions the last week of September into the first week of October. The rest of the state's progression of color will start occurring from north to south in mid-October. Coastal Maine typically reaches peak conditions in mid- to late October.

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Turning Inward Again?

I wrote my doctoral dissertation long ago on the effects the Vietnam War was having on U.S. foreign policy. It was turning us inward, preoccupied with domestic affairs and deeply cautious about overseas military intervention. This paradigm was likely to last for some time but end in a new bout of interventionism, I suggested.

Scholars have long detected cyclical or alternating patterns in history, including the history of U.S. politics. I explored how our foreign policy of a given period becomes rigid and wrecks itself by application ad absurdum, as it was then doing in Vietnam. As the established paradigm departs from reality, bitter domestic criticism grows until the opposite paradigm replaces it. This lasts until it too grows rigid and wrecks itself.

For example, World War I did not make the world safe for democracy and quarrelsome European allies wouldn't repay their war debts. Public opinion, the media and Congress slouched into isolationism, swearing to never get involved in overseas messes again.

Of course, we could not withdraw from the world and were drawn back into overseas conflicts. Japan's 1931 conquest of Manchuria brought Secretary of State Stimson's "non-recognition" of this aggression — words without deeds — that left Tokyo unimpressed. In 1937, Japan began the conquest of all of China. Embargo of California oil to Japan clinched their militarists' argument that the U.S. must be knocked out of the Pacific: Pearl Harbor.

The 1940 German Blitzkrieg through France started splitting U.S. opinion. Some saw that we would eventually have to engage, but the majority stayed isolationist, producing the short-lived America First Committee of 1940–41, which folded with Pearl Harbor.

American elites then plunged into almost unlimited intervention. We had been foolish in not responding sooner to aggression; that will never happen again. Stalin and the Soviet Union were the new aggressors, and the Cold War led to a series of showdowns. By early 1968, the Vietnam bog made Congress and the media question what we were doing there.

The paradigm then snapped back the other way. Only small interventions (Grenada, Panama) were tolerated. Expelling Iraq from Kuwait in 1991 was the first act of a new round of intervention. At first, Americans were enthusiastic. "Neo-conservatives" (actually, Cold War liberals) preached expansion of democracy by wars that would pay for themselves. After years of inconclusive fighting in Afghanistan and Iraq, Americans wanted out.

An ideal foreign policy would find a sweet spot between too much and too little intervention. But it's awfully hard to define and stick to this middle ground. Involvement, egged on by demagogues and the media, tends to grow. Being "a little involved" is like being a little bit pregnant. U.S. shipments to Britain twice brought us into war with Germany.

In 1952, political scientist Frank L. Klingberg quantified historical shifts and found average "moods" of 27 years of extroversion followed by 21 year of introversion. Not mentioning Indochina, Klingberg anticipated the current extrovert mood would end in the late 1960s, precisely what happened. Nixon pulled us (too slowly) out of Vietnam and ended the draft.

Adding Klingberg's 21 years of introversion to 1968 gets us to 1989, the year of our Panama invasion. Two years later, we pushed Iraq out of Kuwait, initiating some 27 years of extroversion that put us into public rejection of the Afghanistan and Iraq wars.

God does not play numbers games with U.S. foreign policy, but this-worldly factors may explain the alternation. Prominently, a younger generation, enraged at the folly of the previous, enshrines and practices its paradigm. In 1940, the U.S. ambassador to London, Joseph Kennedy, wrote off Britain as finished; his son saw Britain as belatedly aroused. JFK then went on to overapply intervention.

Many trends arise from an emotionally charged younger generation rejecting the wisdom of the older generation. Those who fought World War II rejected isolationism so thoroughly that they made virtually the whole world our national interest. (It wasn't.) Other factors may contribute to the cycle, such as war exhaustion, domestic politics and economic downturns.

We seem to be entering another noninterventionist phase that tries to avoid overseas conflicts. Today's "restrainers" reject new wars in favor of domestic reform and reconstruction. If the above pattern holds, we could minimize overseas threats for some years and set up another catastrophe, leading to renewed interventionism.

Many foresee this coming in Asia, where China aims to hold sway. Neither China nor the U.S. want war over Taiwan or North Korea, but neither will abandon their respective small allies. Many urge preparation for collision. The Iran-Israel conflict could spill over until it involves the U.S.

The underlying problem is that the U.S. can neither control the outside world nor fully withdraw from it. Attempts to do either are bound to end in frustration.

The newsmen agreed, "This is not about sexual harassment, it's really about abortion."

Most likely they went on to speak of the vote balance on the Supreme Court with regard to fighting legalized abortion in this country, yet ever since I heard this language, I've found it true and useful to see abortion rights through a sexual-harassment lens.

Next is the Mormon mom of six and her posting from 2018. I refer readers to Gabrielle Blair's piece "My Twitter Thread on Abortion." An easy way to read her complete writing in article form is at designmom.com. Gabrielle teaches that unwanted pregnancies are what require legal abortion access and that females cannot impregnate themselves and create an unwanted pregnancy. She speaks with authority, and goes pretty far with examples and suggestions in her analysis. While this might cause some discomfort, when you keep in mind all the efforts afoot to require females to carry unwanted pregnancies, like me, you may find the Mormon mom to be measured and thoughtful.

Access to legal and safe abortion is vitally important. Preventing unwanted pregnancies is what will stop the need for safe and legal abortion procedures. Let's get more informed and honest about human reproduction and focus on education about birth control and safe, consensual sex rather than give power to the misguided and often mean-spirited attempts to criminalize unwanted pregnancy.

Is Religion Bad?—

I'd like to reply to some of the points in Carl Scheiman's latest religion-is-bad letter in the September 7 issue of The Free Press.

As regards the claim of moral superiority of one's religion, a Christian might well say that his religion has a superior teaching or ideal. As it says in the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer: "Hear what our Lord Jesus Christ saith: Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment and the second is like unto it: Thou shalt love they neighbor as thyself." This is what a Christian is called to strive toward.

A Christian would not claim that he is morally superior to anyone else. He knows that he is a fallen creature, a sinner, susceptible to wrongdoing, often falling far short of the above ideal. As St. Paul says, "I find that the good I want to do, I do not do, but the evil that I don't want to do, that I do." I would hesitate to claim that Christians are in general morally superior to non-Christians.

As regards the flood described in Genesis and the genocide described in the book of Joshua, I can't recall any passage in the Gospels where Jesus says anything about these subjects. Do bear in mind that the Old Testament refers to a time when the Jews were still learning what sort of a god their god was and what he expected of them. For example, King Solomon is described as having 300 wives and 700 concubines. Christian teaching does not encourage polygamy or concubinage. The lesson to be learnt from Joshua is not to practice genocide but that trust in God and obeying his law caused the Jewish nation to prosper.

As regards the "eventual horrific destruction of humankind," be careful how you read the book of Revelation. A lot of it is allegorical or mystical. I admit I am no biblical scholar so I can't give an accurate account as to exactly how it should be interpreted. In short, don't take it all literally.

On the abortion question, the Catholic Church does not forbid a termination of pregnancy to save a mother's life. Note that I say "termination of pregnancy," not "abortion": the intent of the operation has to be that all is to be done to save both lives. As regards painful terminal illness, the Catholic Church does not prohibit pain-killing drugs to alleviate suffering, even though such drugs may shorten the patient's life. It does forbid deliberate killing of the patient, however.

Entirely extirpating the influence of religion from society has resulted in some pretty horrific activity in some places: to wit, Mao Tse-tung's long march resulted in 40 million deaths; Stalin's Russia, 9 million; Hitler's Germany, 6 million; Pol Pot's Cambodia, 2 million (?), Mao Tse-tung's Cultural Revolution, no known close estimate — 150,000 to 20 million.

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Legislators Write Letter to President Biden Over New NOAA Regulations

At the end of August, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) announced new regulations that will pose a serious threat to Maine's lobster industry. The new regulations will close at least 950 square miles of the Gulf of Maine to lobstering from October to January, which is the most lucrative season. The regulations are supposed to protect the endangered right whale species. Scientists estimate that there are 360 right whales left. However, these new rules come at a time when there is no evidence or data to suggest that Maine lobstering is responsible for the deaths of right whales. That's why I, along with over 150 legislators, wrote a letter to President Biden urging him to roll back NOAA's new rules.

I believe that we must protect our marine wildlife and have an eye toward conservation. I think all lobster fishers would agree with me that the industry has been conscious of conservation for years. The Maine Department of Marine Resources, legislators and representatives of the lobster fishery began working on the issue of right whales over two years ago and have made productive suggestions.

Earlier this month, the Portland Press Herald reported, "Since 2017, 34 right whales have been killed, according to NOAA. An earlier estimate of 33 deaths attributed 21 to Canada and 12 to the U.S. Eleven incidents were attributed to ship strikes, including at least two in U.S. waters, but none can be linked to the Maine lobster industry." No right whale has been entangled in Maine lobster gear in over 17 years of reporting. The Maine lobster industry is being punished for something they are not responsible for. Mainers have relied on our working waterfronts to provide for their families for generations. Last year, NOAA reached an agreement with the state about gear marking for easy identification and our lobster fishery has been making changes to the lines to prevent any potential harm to right whales. Now, NOAA has broken that agreement and fractured our trust. Lobster fishers have adapted to rules and regulations in the past to protect our marine life, but this time they're being stretched too thin.

The new regulations are part of a three-phase plan that NOAA claims will reduce right whale deaths by 98% by 2030. The three-phase plan progressively shuts down regions to fishing and further stretches Maine's lobster industry. NOAA estimates that the first phase of the plan will cost Maine's lobster fishers between 5% and 10% in revenue per year. This does not account for what the long-term effects will be on the lobster industry holistically such as gear suppliers, restauraners, trap builders and rope manufacturers. The only way to implement the new plan and maintain the lobster industry requires Maine to completely rethink our lobstering practices. It would mandate the conversion from traditional rope fishing to expensive and developmental ropeless fishing technology. Some estimates indicate that to fully transform Maine's lobster fleet to ropeless technology would cost upwards of \$500 million. The technology is still in the developmental phase and may not even work properly.

The NOAA regulations have put hardworking Maine families in a hard spot. I oppose this proposal that puts our coastal communities in jeopardy, risks hardworking Maine families' livelihoods and hurts our economy without ensuring safety for right whales. Environmental groups have opposed the regulations for not addressing the actual problem as well. I identify as an environmentalist and can recognize when a policy doesn't solve the problem.

As we said in our letter to President Biden, many of us here in the State House believe that "the new regulations threaten to irreparably harm Maine's iconic, sustainable lobster fishery." Mainers remain committed to supporting both the vitality of the lobstering industry and protecting the right whale. We asked President Biden to immediately reverse the new regulations and to re-engage with the state of Maine, our agencies, and our stakeholders to fund a better solution. We're asking for regulations that are based on documented risk, incorporate the needs of the people of Maine, take into account all the available resources, and are based in science.

Extend Comment Period on Dredging Rockland Harbor—

About two weeks ago the Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands sent a notice dated September 1 to Rockland city officials about a proposal by the new owners of the property/pier by Archer's to dredge a large area of ocean and install a number of new floats for boat docking. The notice, posted by the city on September 14, calls for public comment about impacts of this development — before or on October 1.

This is a call on the city council, the town manager's office, the city harbor and waterfront department, Representative Geiger and Senator Miramant — and on the public — to contact the Maine state authorities and urge an extension of the public comment period for at least a month.

More steps can be taken to inform the public, publicize the details of the plan, set a public meeting and increase the transparency surrounding this large project.

The notice can be found at rocklandmaine.gov/news (Submerged Lands Notice), and it includes the plan proposed for dredging and the new docks. The application was made by SHM Rockland, LLC (Safe Harbor Marinas).

Here are a few details: the area to be dredged is 138,000 square feet; additional docks include four, long 150-foot fingers, one 90-foot dock, one 115-foot string of docks and one 172-foot string. No information is given about the type of boats expected to use the new docks.

The Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands is the trustee for submerged lands (those extending from mean low tide to three miles out). It may approve such a lease for the plan if it *does not*: "unreasonably interfere with customary or traditional public access

ways to or public trust rights (fishing, fowling, recreation, and navigation) in, on or over the submerged lands" or "unreasonably interfere with fishing or other existing marine uses."

Current users of the harbor area — including people who use the boardwalk/park area, moor boats, including lobster boats and people who enjoy the current views! — are urged to look at the plan, call city officials, and call the Maine Bureau of Parks and Lands at 287-6128 to ensure proper public evaluation.

Readers can also reference information provided by Dun & Bradstreet regarding the parent company, SHM, LLC, based in Dallas, with 555 companies, 2,584 employees and about \$405 million in annual sales, and its overall parent company, Sun Communities, Inc. of Southfield, Mich., a real estate investment trust with annual revenue of \$1.39 billion.

The Blessing of a Nice Café

Back in mid-August I had traveled off the island early, a day or two ahead of whatever my mainland business might have been, on account of Hurricane Henri. Said hurricane did not actually cause Maine any real trouble, but that is the way of islanders and mariners: watch the weather and strain to think ahead. We talk about the "weather report" but it is not a report, it is a forecast — and a forecast by definition involves a certain prognostication, an attempt at clairvoyance, wonky augury, thus is rarely spot-on. Those comma-shaped images on the hurricane maps are the "cones of uncertainty," where there is only the arithmetic of statistical likelihood of messy weather, nothing like a promise. My husband likes to heckle the TV weatherman, especially if said expert is caught map-casting in a three-piece suit. As goes the old line, "Lies, damned lies, and statistics."

A hurricane still some distance away will thwart anybody's best effort to plan, and so it was, about a month ago, "welcome to Rockland" with time to spare. This island correspondent was (as any regular reader will understand by now) unable to go home at that point. It does not take a storm to raise hell with Visual Flight Rules, or reasonable seas for a smallish passenger boat on a non-emergent trip, not to mention the expense. Here I was on the Big Continent and over the moon to discover one of my old hang-outs was once again an available refuge. My regular coffee shop was inviting customers to sit inside! Oh, happy day!

That day I recalled the last time I had nestled in and enjoyed breakfast in that particular establishment. It would have been early March of 2020. My husband sat across the table from me, which doesn't happen often, as his work does not bring him to the mainland as mine does. Quite the opposite; for every day he is away from the island he is apt to be hectored by somebody who "needed" something done, and just where in blazes was he? In any case, sharing a hot breakfast with the Phone Man in a restaurant in the middle of winter was my idea of a good time. I was supposed to be heading out of state immediately afterward, a multimodal trek to the bedside of a family member recently discharged from the hospital and now in a rehab facility. I had charge of the paperwork, and the paperwork was growing onerous. There was need for signatures and decisions. My cell phone rang, and before I was done with my bacon-egg-and-cheddar wrap, I had word from the rehab receptionist: "Don't come. We're not allowed to have any visitors at all as of today. If you make the trip, we're not going to be allowed to let you in." Thus began the reality of COVID for me.

At that moment I was grateful for the invention of the cell phone, but also for this place of comfort — my usual, familiar café — in which to think and sit still a moment and reconfigure a complicated situation.

We took our time finishing breakfast. Of course I didn't know that would be my last time in that seat for 17 months, but with that telephone call it did begin to dawn on me that things were changing.

I have studied for exams in this coffee shop. I have slammed up against deadlines here, I have taught algebra, memorized chemical placarding, drafted municipal boilerplate and made plans over paper maps on these tables. I have taken shelter from rain and wind and the harangues of idiots. I am not, however, so loyal as to shun other businesses. To the few places we gratefully find open in the forgotten and neglected late-afternoon hours, when so many eateries are closed, I offer a nod of sincere thanks. You have no idea; after a potentially cold, wet five hours aboard a ferry in the cab of a U-Haul, a real mug of coffee or soup is what you'd call "restorative." A bright, welcoming brick-and-mortar coffee shop is without doubt one of the finer things in life. Hard to say what shall come next, this year, so let us enjoy this luxury while we have it.

It's not necessarily about the coffee, but sometimes it is. During the closed-up days of 2020, if one wanted coffee on the road, the only option was drive-though. Those are not always built with room for even what my friend Rolf calls "puny" trucks, nor do they readily accommodate pedestrians (including coffee-craving truck drivers who must park off to the side because they cannot fit even a U-Haul under the overhead contraption). If we have to go back to drive-through service only, society is going to have to remedy that particular shortcoming.

Becca: Thanks for baiting me, Nate!* Having a uterus (which is, you know, just mildly phenomenal), I'm glad I don't live in Texas with the U.S. Supreme Court supporting a \$10,000 anti-abortion bounty. But we in Maine hold responsibility for two-faced Senator Susan Collins, who consistently endorses anti-choice judges. But I'm nonetheless glad the city council is pursuing ideas to try to intervene in the housing crisis.

Nate: I think we disagree on a lot! Examples: The nature and efficacy of markets and competition (I'm avoiding the word "capitalism" here because I think we mean somewhat different things by it); space exploration; onions.

Becca: How the hell can anyone oppose onions? Also yep, space exploration aka colonization — the amount of money and time spent on that when there are close to a billion hungry people on earth each day is a sad statement on priorities.

Nate: I remember how inspired I was as a child to study technical subjects (in my case, primarily mathematics) because of space exploration, and I wonder how many scientists and engineers wouldn't have pursued their dreams had they not been so inspired as well. I don't love space tourism by billionaires, but I am deeply moved by the images and discoveries of the cosmos and physical universe that the broader enterprise of space exploration has brought to us. Well, despite my enthusiasm, I don't think we have the money for a Rockland Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Becca: There are plenty of dreams to be had and dreaming to be done — like feeding and housing and nurturing everyone on the planet and still marveling at the stars without exploiting them. So I do not buy your argument. Earth itself is not amazing enough for you?!?

Nate: I admit that Earth is pretty amazing. Unfortunately, we're not doing a great job caring for it. Though Rockland is advertising for a new half-time sustainability coordinator to help us do at least a little better. Becca, maybe we should do a column where I tell you all my regrets and mistakes?

Becca: OK ... but how honest are you going to be able to be? What about a basic human needs coordinator (which is a sustainability issue)?

Nate: Pretty honest, I think, as long as it's about my own failures rather than other people's! I'd be open to something like a basic human needs coordinator, if we could find an appropriate way to assign responsibilities to such a person.

Becca: I've seen it work amazingly. Do it! ... but without making property taxes go up.

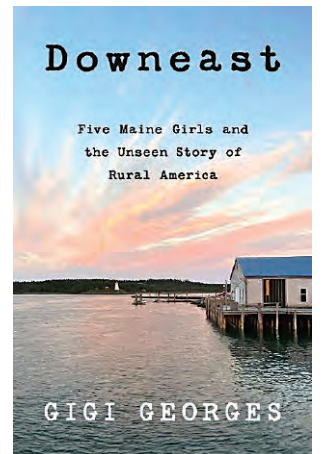


Vose to Host Book Talk by Author Gigi Georges

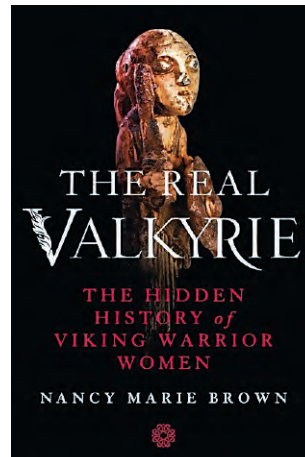

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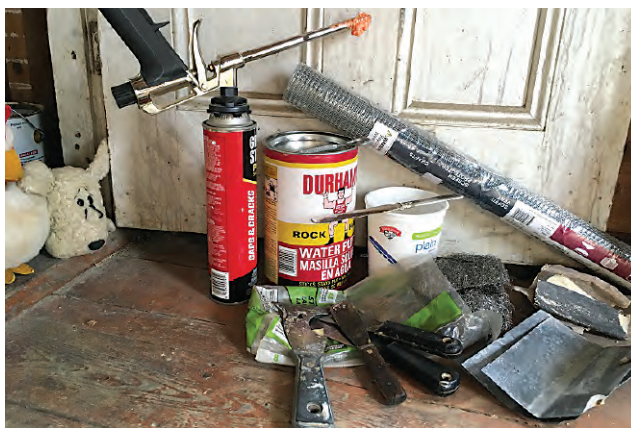


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The Sketchbook. A builder's journal Of Mice and Moulding

There was a time when I lived in the houses I was restoring. The oldest of these was a 1787 center-chimney Cape. I was sitting in our temporary kitchen/living room, reading a book and having a cup of tea when a rat the size of a brown bear strolled into the room. Two throwable items were close to hand. A grapefruit and Amelia, our cat. I woke Amelia. She wearily opened one eye, took a casual look, and went back to sleep. I threw the grapefruit and the rat sauntered off. Amelia was a scrap of a cat but tough as can be. She finished off the rat the following day. Not every cat is a great mouser, or rather, like Amelia, but most houses are an appealing residence for mice. Mice, on the other hand, are fairly inconsiderate houseguests. Keeping them out can be challenging.

My current project is a large old house in need of complete restoration. As I move forward with repairs, I do so with the goal of making the house rodent-proof. Mice are looking for one of two things: food, or shelter. If you don't want mice, you need to not allow access to food, and you need to block their access to the interior. An adult mouse can fit through a hole the size of a dime. A rat can gnaw in through a 1/2" gap. Mice and rats have very flexible rib cages. If they can get their heads through a hole they can flatten their bodies to get by. It's quite amazing.

Let's use what we know of their behavior to help keep them out. Rodents are impressive gnawers. Their teeth work very well on wood and other organic matter. Metal in many forms will create an effective barrier. Any entry points of over 1/4" can be stuffed with steel wool, then caulked over to hold it in place. Holes drilled for plumbing and electric lines are good candidates for treating this way. Larger holes can be backed, prior to patching, with 1/4" hardware cloth.

Squirrels are responsible for the larger exterior holes on my project. Today I was faced with repairing holes about 4" x 6" on a section of soffit and fascia. The boards were fairly easy to get to and in poor shape beyond the gnawed bits, so replacing them made sense. Last week I was dealing with 3" round holes chewed through exterior moulding. The moulding profile is no longer available so repairing it was the way to go. First, slide a scrap of backing wood in through the hole and attach it to the moulding. Next, partially fill the hole with expanding foam. While the foam is wet, pack in steel wool. Once the foam has cured I like to complete the patch with Durham's water putty. If you prefer, Bondo or epoxy can be used.

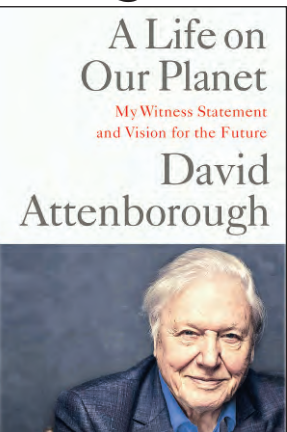

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Planning to purge relentlessly on a recent fall cleaning spree, I dragged a bloated folder from the recesses of a desk cubbyhole. Spotted and stained, it was chock full of recipes I'd collected over decades, until the internet made recipe-keeping paperless. Sad but true, these days I refer much more often to laptop files than my recipe or cookbook collection, and it was past time for this file to go — but not, of course, without peeking inside. An hour later I was still paging through recipes clipped from newspapers and magazines, old file cards, hand-scribbled notes, including a recipe for Christmas bread written in my mother's hand, and ones from cookbooks whose pages had been pressed onto a copier and printed out. In the end, I managed to reduce the file by only a half and had spent several more hours happily remembering the people and places connected with some of the recipes, especially ones that originated on the St. George peninsula, my first Maine home. They brought back good memories, and some have withstood the test of time well enough that I would still use them today.

Several pages were printouts from "Sylvia's Cakes & Breads: Famous Recipes from a Small Maine Kitchen," a cookbook written by the late Sylvia Hocking, the world-famous baker from South Thomaston whose cakes, pies, and breads were enjoyed by locals, Maine coast vacationers, and celebrities for over 30 years and who wrote and published two cookbooks during her retirement years. I must have copied the recipes to use when I interviewed her for The Free Press over 25 years ago, and what struck me when I looked them over was the detailed information Sylvia included that you won't find anywhere else, as in her pie recipe below. It's as if she were standing beside you in the kitchen, sharing secrets of her baking expertise. My only reservation is the use of margarine or Crisco, which can probably be swapped out for butter.

Sylvia's Three-Berry Pie

Dough for a double-crust 9-inch deep-dish shell

Filling:

Combine 1½ cups each blueberries, raspberries and strawberries. Mix with 2 Tbsp. flour, 1 cup sugar, 2 Tbsp. lemon juice or orange juice, and ½ tsp. cinnamon.

Roll out the bottom crust generously enough to have a good overhang. Sprinkle with about 2 Tbsp. sugar; add the berry mixture and dot all over with about 2 Tbsp. butter or margarine. Roll out top crust, fold in half and fit over the fruit. Be sure to wet the rim of the bottom crust with water to seal the two crusts. Make a nice, thick rim so as not to lose any of the juice while the pie is baking. Using your fingers, spread 2 Tbsp. butter-flavored Crisco over just the crust (not the rim). Sift a little flour over the Crisco, then brush crust with heavy cream. Last, sprinkle with sugar. Cut steam slits (I use about eight), and bake in a preheated 425-degree oven for 20 minutes. Lower temperature to 375 degrees for about 20 more minutes or until you see juice bubbling in the slits you cut for steam. The crust should be nicely browned. There's nothing worse than an underbaked pie crust!

Note: Baking time is for fresh fruit. If you are using frozen berries, do not thaw. You will need to increase baking time to about an hour, and you may need to cover the top of pie with foil or parchment paper the last 15 minutes of baking time if the rim is getting too brown. Pies need to be watched closely — you don't just put them in the oven and forget about them. I always say, "You have to watch a pie as closely as you do your children; with tender, loving care."

Another peninsula institution no longer with us is Great Eastern Mussel Farm, once one of Maine's largest mussel producers and a pioneer in the state's mussel farming industry, which was in operation from 1978 to 2008, when it was reborn as Pemaquid Mussels Farm. I have a collection of small notecards with some of the recipes that were featured

in "The Great Eastern Mussel Cookbook," authored by then-peninsula residents Cindy McIntyre and Terry Callery — a book much appreciated at a time when mussels were not the mainstream shellfish offering they've become today.

Belgian-Style Mussels

2 lbs. Great Eastern mussels, rinsed and debearded
1 Tbsp. olive oil
1 Tbsp. shallots, chopped fine
¾ cup leek whites, cut in ¼-inch rings
1 cup mushrooms, chopped medium
2 Tbsp. white wine or tarragon vinegar
½ cup heavy cream
Dry white wine

In a large pot saute vegetables in oil until limp; be careful not to burn. Add mussels, vinegar and cream. Cover and steam on high heat for four minutes until mussel shells open. Thin sauce with white wine if desired. Serves two.

Port Clyde Fresh Catch, the country's first community-supported fishery, or CSF, is still operating out of the tiny town at the tip of the St. George peninsula, although its methods of fish distribution have become much more sophisticated than when it first started. In about 2007 when I was a member, the weekly fish allotment was handed to you in a plastic bag, gutted, but otherwise pretty much intact. Their motto was: "If it were any fresher, it would still be swimming," and one inhalation of the briny goodness contained within the bag backed up their claim. It was up to you to figure out how to make it pretty, fish that resembled something you'd find in a fish market, and thus I became a self-taught fish filleter — and used the leftover frames as stock base. Or, if the fish was thick enough, I used a cleaver to cut it into steaks and the head and tail went into the stock pot. Along with the fish, the CSF handed out printed sheets of recipes. Here's one for a simple fish chowder.

Oven Fish Chowder

1 lb. haddock, flounder or cod
2 potatoes, cubed
1 tsp. salt
2 whole cloves
½ tsp. garlic powder
¼ cup butter
½ tsp. white pepper
¼ cup white wine (optional)
1 medium onion, sliced
1 cup hot water (increase by ¼ cup if not using wine)
2 cups half-and-half

Put everything except cream in a casserole. Cover and bake at 375 degrees for one hour. Heat half-and-half to scalding (bubbles of cream form around edge of saucepan) and add to chowder. Stir to break up fish.

Forest therapy guide and artist Susan Bickford will guide participants in several practices to awaken the senses and slow down. The pace will allow people to notice what is in motion along the trail, and time may be spent sitting with a particular tree. Attendees will walk perhaps a mile in total, and the morning will end with a cup of foraged tea.

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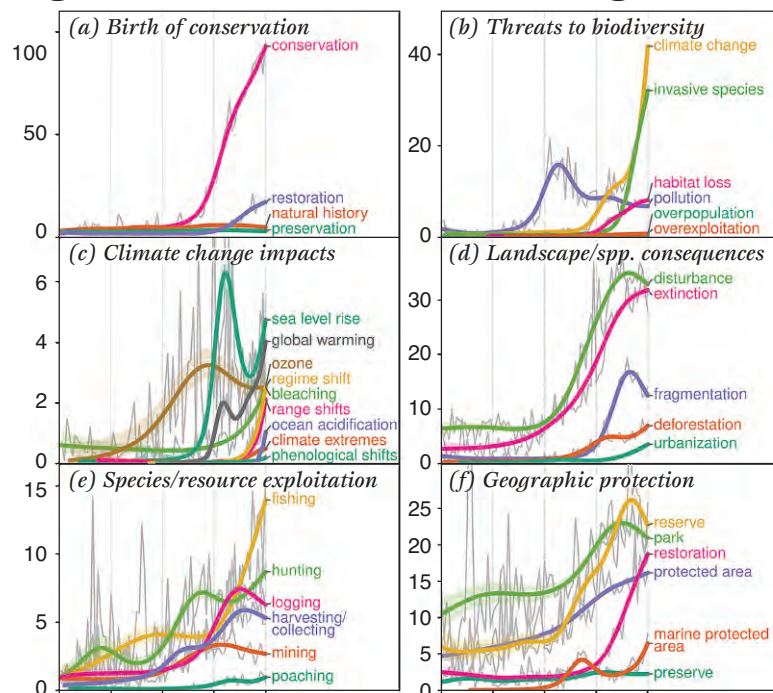
A series of charts from the presentation shows the trends in usage of various terms in journals of ecology and conservation.

Merryspring Nature Center in Camden will host a presentation by scientist Caitlin McDonough MacKenzie about how the field of ecology has changed in the last 80 years on Tuesday, September 28, at noon.

MacKenzie's team of researchers analyzed the full text — over half a billion words — of papers published in 52 ecology and conservation journals to uncover broad trends in the field, watching as buzzwords like climate change, phylogenetics and biodiversity became popular among researchers. She will talk about the rise of terms and concepts like “invasive species” and “ecosystem services,” the fall of “competition” and “predation,” and how online publishing has replaced “unpublished data” with “supplementary materials.”

A visiting assistant professor in environmental studies at Colby College, MacKenzie bases her research in Acadia National Park. She holds a bachelor's degree in environmental science and public policy from Harvard University, a master's degree in ecological planning from the University of Vermont, and a doctorate in biology from Boston University. She was a David H. Smith Conservation Research postdoc fellow at the University of Maine's Climate Change Institute.

Midcoast Conservancy recently purchased a 57-acre addition to its Reverend Joseph Barth Memorial Demonstration and Experimental Forest from Nick and Sandra Barth. Joseph Barth, with his son Nick, founded the Sheepscot Valley Conservation Association in 1966; SVCA subsequently became a founding member of Midcoast Conservancy.

The property in Newcastle, which is close to Midcoast Conservancy's Bass Falls Preserve in Alna and Newcastle, adds to protected land that was donated by Roland Barth in 2020. It expands conserved lands along the Sheepscot River, protecting water quality in a river that federally endan-

gered Atlantic salmon call home. The preserve will be accessible to the public for hiking and hunting.

"Conservation work is what I've done most of my life, even before SVCA was formed," Nick Barth said in a news release. "This is an extension of my life's work protecting and preserving forestland. My father purchased this land in the 1960s, and I'm glad to see the pieces coming together for this land to be an ecologically managed forest, well into the future."

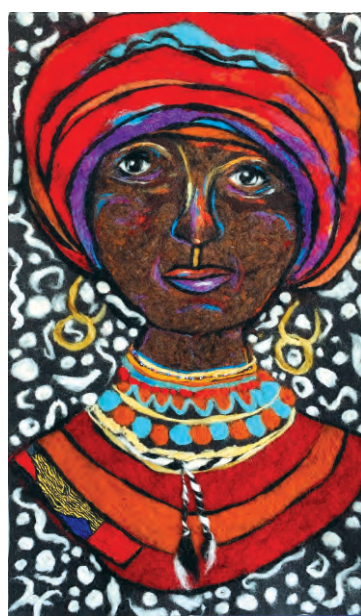
