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## EXPRESS YOUR OPINION ON THE PROPOSED SCHOOL DISTRICT BY VOTING NEXT WEEK IN EITHER CITY ELECTION OR TOWN MEETINGS

### Future Of Education In Four Communities Rests With Voters Monday Through Wednesday

On Monday voters of the city of Rockland will go to the polls to decide whether or not they wish to join in a school district with Owls Head, Rockport and South Thomaston.

On the same evening voters of Owls Head will decide the same question at a special town meeting at the Owls Head Central School at 8 o'clock.

On Tuesday, a special town meeting will be held in South Thomaston to consider the same issue and the fourth town of the proposed district, Rockport, will hold its town meeting Wednesday evening.

Voting on the district plan of organization means voting on three separate items. In order for the district to be formed a majority of Yes votes is needed on each of the three questions in each of the towns. This last in a series of articles to explain the district organization will deal with the three questions as they will appear on ballots and in the warrants for special town meetings.

An important point in connection with the voting in Rockland is the fact that citizens who are registered voters, but not registered as a party member for primary voting, may still vote on

the school district question.

Town and school officials in all of the towns have expressed the feeling that the question is one of major importance and the hope that the turnout at the polls and for the town meetings will be large.

The first question on the ballot asks "Shall the City of Rockland join with the municipalities of Owls Head, Rockport and South Thomaston to form a school administrative district?"

In each of the towns the wording of the question will be changed to fit that particular town but will have the same meaning. A "Yes" vote on this item means, of course, that it is a vote in favor of these four towns joining together in operating their schools and in planning to meet their educational needs of the future. The various details of operation of such a district or unit have been explained through the newspapers, radio and public meetings during the past two months.

The second question to be voted upon deals with the board of directors and is: "Shall the City of Rockland approve the allocation of representation among the municipalities on the board of directors as recommended by the superintending school committee and municipal officers as follows: The total number of directors shall be 14. The Town of Owls Head shall be entitled to 2 directors. The City of Rockland shall be entitled to 7 directors. The Town of Rockport shall be entitled to 3 directors and the Town of South Thomaston shall be entitled to 2 directors?"

The board of directors becomes the managing body of the school district with the same powers which are now exercised by the

local school committees of each town. The members from each town will be elected just as school committee members are at the present time.

The number and allocation of directors was determined at a meeting of the municipal officers and school committee members of the City of Rockland and the three towns. Several plans were considered and this one was picked by a 26-1 vote as the best.

Concern has been expressed by both town and Rockland residents that one group or the other might carry too much weight in the voting on the board. The number selected provides for a balance between the two and helps to guarantee that policies will be considered on their merit and needs rather than the mere fact that they may be suggested by representatives of the city or of the towns.

The final ballot question deals with finances and is worded "Shall the City of Rockland authorize the district to assume full responsibility for amortizing the following listed school indebtedness now outstanding in the municipalities and school districts comprising the school administrative district under consideration?" Following the question is a detailed list of the indebtedness of each of the towns showing the type of notes the rates of interest and the planned rates of payment.

The question actually means that these debts will be pooled and as the district pays off the debts each town will pay its share according to its state valuation.

Following this plan, which is required by law when districts are formed, makes for some changes in the school debts in each of the towns. Operation costs and state subsidy enter the picture also so that these are not the net changes that can be expected. These changes have been explained in many of the articles and discussions which have been available to the public.

In debt picture alone a Yes vote means that for the City of Rockland the total debt owed, including interest, will be about \$1,000 less than it is now. Year-

The three, Assistant Scoutmaster Ernest Guimond, and Explorer Scouts Kurt Hoffses and David Harper, were chosen out of a field of 16 candidates in the troop who had completed the basic requirement of the Order by camping out 15 days and nights.
