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

In this Bi-Centenial year of 1976, it is our desire to tell the story of the First Parish Unitarian Church of Bridgewater as found in our church records, supplimented by other sources.



#### November 1715

Records of the Massachusetts General Court-Volume 10, pages 60, 61, 62.

"The Report of the Committee appointed the fourth of December last to repair to Bridgewater and view the town and consider of the most convenient Place for erecting a New Meeting House; viz.

Province of the Massachusetts Bay: ---Bridgewater, April 18, 1716

Whereas the General Court of the said Province on the fourth day of December last upon the position of sundry of the Inhabitants of said Bridgewater did order and appoint to the Subscribers a Committee to repair to the said town of Bridgewater and view the Town and consider of the map Convenient Place for the erecting of a new Meeting House. Having a regard to a suggestion of the Town that there will soon be need of a third Meeting House. Pursuant to the aforesaid Order, we the aforesaid Committee have repaired to the aforesaid Town and viewed the same and heard the Allegations of the Inhabitants, and the said Town being most together and Reconsidering their former Vote and the circumstances of their Town referring to the Affairs aforesaid Manifested and Declared by their Vote their Desire to be Divided into two Precincts and no more, for the Maintenance of the Worship of God; and Submitted the Filing of the Places for the erecting or standing of the two Meeting Houses and the Dividing Line unto the Determination of the aforesaid Committee; Are humbly of the Opinion that it will well accommodate the Inhabitants of the said Town to be divided into two Precincts for the Maintenance of Worship of God amongst them and that the Dividing Line between the said two Precincts be as follows:

Viz: Beginning at the Brook called the Mile Brook; Where the Road leading from Boston to Taunton crosses the said Brook; and from thence by a line running

West by South to the uttermost Extent of said Township, And from the Station first mentioned by a Line running Easterly in the Mid-Way between the Dwelling House of William Hudson and the Dwelling House of David Perkins, and from thence the said line to be continued in the Midst betwixt the Dwelling House of Edward Mitchel & the Dwelling House of Nathaniel Hayward; And from thence the said Line to be continued Easterly in the Midst betwixt the Dwelling House of James Latham, & the Dwelling House of Joseph Washburn, & from thence by a due East Line to the extent of the said Bridgewater Township.

And that all the Lands & inhabitants within the said Township on the Southerly Side of the said Line be & belong to the Southerly Precinct, and that all the Land & Inhabitants within the said Township on the Northerly Side of the aforesaid Line be & belong to the Northerly Precinct.

And further We are of Opinion that the High Way or Rising Ground on the Southerly Side of the High Way going by John Washburn House being the Easterly Part of his Field is a very proper & convenient Place for the Erecting a Meeting House for the Southerly Precinct, And that the old Meeting House now standing in the Northerly Precinct be continued in the Place where it now standeth for the Space of five Years next ensuing, & then that it be removed Easterly or a new one erected for the said Northerly Precinct upon the High or Rising Ground in the Southerly Part of said Johnson Field, where diverse Roads or High Ways do most convenient for that Purpose.

Provided that the whole Town stand obliged to an Honorable Maintenance of the Rev. Mr. Keith their present aged Minister, if he shall outlive his Power & Capacity of Discharging the office & Duty of their Minister."

On April 6, 1717, John Washburn deeded two acres of his land to the inhabitants of the "Southern part of Bridgewater to build them a Meeting House." Little time was wasted as the Meeting House was dedicated on June 14, 1717. The Rev. James Keith delivered the dedication sermon. The building was forty-three feet by thirty-eight feet with eighteen-foot posts and was located near the present church.

Part of the two acres was set aside for a burial ground. The first graves were on the high ground near the Meeting House. It is of interest to note that Rebecca Washburn, wife of John Washburn, was the first to be buried in the year.

The first minister of the South Precinct was the Rev. Benjamin Allen who served from 1717 to 1730. He was ordained July 9, 1718. A list of the original members, dated July 7, 1718, follows:

In the beginning, the Committee for the South Precinct ordered the clerk to call the meetings. Later, the Parish Committee notified the Constable to post a notice a specified number of days before a called meeting. The warrant of March 1, 1828, is typical of many found in the records:

"To Mitchell Keith, Esq., one of the constables of the town of Bridgewater.

Greeting ---

You are hereby required in the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to notify and warn the male inhabitants of the First Congregational Society in said Bridgewater, being twenty-one years of age and upwards, qualified, as the law directs to vote in Parish affairs to meet at the meeting house of said Society, on Saturday, the fifteenth day of March instant at one of the clock P.M. to act upon the following articles viz.,"....etc.

The Constables always signed a statement that he had indeed "Notified and warned the members" of the Society the required number of days before the meeting and usually stated where he had posted the Notice. The following is an example: "Bridgewater, April 12, 1845 - I have this day posted up in the stores of Hale and Hobart, Perkins and Barrett and George W. Pratt, and in the Barroom of Edward Mitchell Hotel, being public places in Bridgewater, ......"

These meeting warrants listed articles to be acted upon and the clerk, elected the previous year, called the meeting to order. Always the first article was to elect a Moderator. This procedure continued until 1957 when the Parish Chairman conducted the meetings.

As was the custom, the Parish Minister and the Meeting House were supported by a tax. Assessors, usually three, were chosen and, in "His Majesty's name," ordered to assess real and personal property and to keep records. Small booklets were kept listing parish members, their real and personal property, and polls (for votes). The collectors or constables, sometimes two, turned the money and reports over to the Parish Treasurer for disbursement.

1O ASSESSORS

Three assessors were chosen to assess real and personal property to be taxed for the support of the minister and the meeting house. Often they were sworn in before starting the duty they were to perform. Some years there appears to have been more than three assessors. The names and dates shown all appear on papers found. The records are far from complete.

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Many of the early available records of the Parish have to do with the support 12 of the minister and the meeting house. Assessors were chosen to assess the real and personal property. Collectors, usually constables, were elected to collect the assessed taxes and they in turn were ordered to turn the pounds, shillings and pence over to the treasurer. Designated as collectors were Timothy Perkins in 1759, Mitchell Keith in 1816; Capt. Sears Washburn, 1817; William Mitchell, 1818; Mitchell Keith, 1819, 1820, 1821, 1823, 1824, 1825, 1826; Calvin B Pratt, 1846, 1848, 1849, 1850; Baalis Sanford, 1851; Artemas Hale, Jr., 1852; Calvin B. Pratt, 1853, 1854; Caleb Hobart, 1855; Calvin B. Pratt, 1856, 1857.

The Constables, whose names appear as collectors, and later as officers of the law, posted the warrants.

#### PRECINCY OR PARISH COMMITTEE

The South Precinct Committee, later the Parish Committee or Standing Committee, carried on the Parish business. The Committee consisted of three members until 1845 when the Parish voted to increase the Parish Committee to five members. The Committee membership changed from time to time from three to five or seven or nine. In 1877 three men and two women were chosen to serve and in 1890 the Parish Committee was made up of four men and three women, and, in 1900, the Parish voted to increase the Committee to nine - six men and three women.

DEACONS 81

It was the responsibility of the Deacons to conduct the church business.

They always sat beneath the pulpit, facing the congregation during the church services.

Eleazer Carver and Joseph Alden were the first two "standard bearers" of Rev. Benjamin Allen's pastorate from 1717 to 1730, and have been credited with the organization and growth of the South Parish.

It was decided, in 1734, that the deacons be ordained. Names, some dates and comments follow:

Cyprus Copeland, Sr. - elected 1822 - resigned 1827 and was dismissed from the church at his request.

George Chipman - chosen 1828 - resigned 1842 on "account of the infirmaties of age. July 7, 1850, requested dismissal from this church and recommendation to that in Scotland.

Nicholas Tillinghast - unanimously elected. (He was principal of the Normal School). - resigned 1856 - died 1856

Lewis Bryant - elected second deacon 1845 - died 1880

Mitchell Hooper - elected to fill vacancy caused by death of Deacon Bryant 1880. Mitchell Hooper died 1886.

No further records of Deacons after the death of Mitchell Hooper.

### EXCERPTS FROM THE COVENANT OF THE BRETHREN

#### OF THE SOUTH PARISH IN BRIDGEWATER

#### JULY 7, 1718

We, the subscribers, who in times past were full communicants in the Church of Christ in Bridgewater, being now under a Divine Call into a coalition in Church fellowship in the Order of the Gospel, do renew our Covenant with God and with one another under a soul humbling sense of all our violations of former Covenant engagements .....

that we take the Lord to be our God by a free choice of Him and a firm dependence on Him .... as our chief good ....

that in all the administrations in the house of God we will have due regard to the power of office belonging to the ministry and to the privileges belonging to the brethren as to judgment and consent ......

We will walk in love one towards another, endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace, that there may be no schism or rent in the Body of Christ .....

As we have opportunity, we will seek the good one of another and so also of all men both with respect to the spiritual and temporal state .....

It shall be our endeavor to stand complete in all the will of God to cleave to the Lord and one to another through all adversity . . .

We do sincerely and solemnly engage in the sight of God and of men in a humble dependence of faith upon the mercy (of the Lord) .... and for the power of his Spirit to work all our works in us to perfect all that doth concern us to the praise of His Glory.

I do solemnly declare that I believe Jesus Christ to be the Son of God, and the Saviour of the world, that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the word of God, and perfect rule of faith and obedience, that I desire thankfully to accept salvation thro' Jesus Christ, in the way prescribed in the Gospel, resolving by the help of divine Grace to live in obedience to his holy commandments, and looking for the mercy of God unto Eternal life.

## THE COVENANT OF THE FIRST CHURCH OF BRIDGEWATER Adopted November 3, 1895

Believing it our duty, as disciples of Jesus, in filial obedience to the will of God, to do all we can for the welfare of others and help one another in every good work, and recognizing the great importance of frequently meeting together in religious assemblies to foster and strengthen our Christian faith and to deepen our personal consecration, we hereby unite ourselves as a Christian Church. We promise to give our hearty support to the public worship of this church, to encourage others in a reverent and regular attendance, to co-operate earnestly in all its religious work, and to endeavor to live in all ways obedient to our Heavenly Father and faithful in our relations to our fellow men.

#### TRUSTEES

Mention has been made of an Act by the State Legislature in 1803 incorporating certain persons as "Trustees of a Fund for the Support of a Congregational Gospel Minister in the South Parish in Bridgewater in the County of Plymouth." The five men named in that act to serve as Trustees were Eliphalet Cary, Samuel Shaw, Joshua Alden, Thomas Washburn and Jason Dyer. Article seven stated that "the number of Trustees may be augmented to seven provided that said Parish shall choose that number but shall never be less than five," etc. Until the turn of the century, the following men served as trustees:

Early records show that the Trustees loaned money to local businesses and people and the interest collected was used "to support a Congregational Minister in the South Parish." Later the funds were invested in stocks and bonds. The Trustees bought and sold real estate. In 1845, for example, they purchased from the Rev. S. S. Tappan property which was used for a parsonage. \$2,700 was the purchase price. Later, the same year, part of the land was sold to the Society for \$300 and the present church was built on it. In 1852 the rest of

the Tappan property was sold to Nahum Stetson for \$2,575.

The Trustees' report for April 7, 1849, included as part of the fund, house and land occupied by Rev. C. Bradford, valued at \$2,300. From the report of 1852, the Singing Fund included the Mary M. Allen legacy of \$1,000, the legacy of William Mitchell - \$100 - and rent of the parsonage - \$130.

March 8, 1851, the resignation of Artemas Hale as treasurer of the Fund was included in his report. "In making this my last report of the condition of the fund which for the twenty-four years past, I have had the management of, and which I now propose to resign to more able hands, it may not be inappropriate to state that during this time there has not been the loss of a single dollar of the principal of the fund and I believe it is now all securely invested. Since I first received the funds I have collected and paid over to the Treasurer of the Society of interest, the sum of \$8,277.46. Invested as the capital was, in numerous notes of individuals, which were liable to be paid at any time without previous notice, it has been sometimes difficult to reinvest them without loss of interest. Upon examining my accounts I find that, during the whole time, the total loss from this cause has been only \$5.50. It is not on account of any diminuation of interest in the welfare of the Society that I am induced to resign the trust I have so long held by the indulgence of the Trustees -

Believing that the proper observance of the Sabbath and a regular attendance upon public worship are essential to the peace and well being of the community as well as the happiness, both spiritual and temporal, of every individual composing it, I shall ever feel it a duty and pleasure to do all in my power to perpetuate these sacred instructions — and to preserve the integrity, harmony and perpetuality of the Society with which I have so many years associated.

The trustees of the Parish funds were instructed to purchase pews in 1885 as they were offered for sale by auction and otherwise look after the interests of the Society in the matter.

April 5, 1893, a continuation of the report of the Trustees states "during the past year the five shares of the Maverick National Bank, which
constitute a part of our funds, have not only yielded no income but have
become utterly worthless, - and besides because of an assessment on account of
those shares, five hundred dollars was withdrawn from the Bridgewater Savings
Bank and paid to the Receiver of said Maverick Bank. Thus our trust funds have
been reduced one thousand dollars and the income from said fund is on that
account less for this year than last. Thus are the innocent punished for the
evil deeds of certain persons entrusted with the management of the funds and
property of the Maverick National Bank, while the guilty have as yet escaped
punishment.

Hosea Kingman, Treas."

#### TAXES AND SUBSCRIPTIONS

- March 4, 1839 was the last time that an article appeared in the warrant "To vote such sum or sums of money as the parish may raise into a tax to be assessed upon the polls and estates according to law."
- March 18, 1848, there was an article "To see if the parish will raise money by tax to pay the debts and current expenses of the Parish."
- March 16, 1861, Article 5 was "To adopt any measures by tax or otherwise for raising money to defray the expense of the Society and to pay the debts of the Society."
- March 18, 1863, the wording was changed, "To see if the parish will raise the money necessary for their Minister's salary by tax on polls and estates for the year ensuing."
- March 4, 1868, a report of a committee to raise funds, proposed a tax on polls and property to produce \$1,500.00

Throughout the years, subscriptions (pledges) were made to raise funds for various specific purposes. There are many such lists in the church records for ministers' salaries, organists, buildings, pews and so forth. The following is a portion of a Subscription to purchase pews in 1757.

"We the Subscribers Purchasers of Pews in the New Meeting House do hereby severaly promise to pay the several sums affixed to our names respectively being the price of the Pews we bid off unto the Committee that shall be chosen by the Prec't to carry on the building of said house - One third part in cash the other two thirds in Speices of Labour or both as we can agree with said Committee - or to pay the whole sum in Specie and Labour if we can do it to the Committee's acceptance. And to pay the Cash and Specie and perform the labour when the said Committee shall see it necessary to call for them - The price of the Species to be sett as the sd Committee Witnesses our hand this 2nd Nov. 1759 - - "

#### FIRST MEETING HOUSE

The first meeting house was built in 1717, and dedicated June 14 of the same year.

Williams Latham wrote that the premises conveyed to the Inhabitants of the South Precinct from John Washburn in 1716, were twenty rods north and south and 16 rods east and west. The building was 43' by 38' and 18' high and fronted south with a large door in the middle and small doors on east and west side in the middle, stairs on east side, men's stairs on the west side.

From Joshua Crane's writings - - -

1759, Nov. 19, South Parish voted to build a new meeting house 64 x 50 ft. Nov. 30, the Parish voted to use the old meeting house in building the new one and to "take it down when they shall think proper."

In 1741, the meeting house was enlarged by adding 16 feet in the center. It had no tower or steeple.

#### SECOND MEETING HOUSE

In 1760, the first meeting house was taken down and a second one,  $64' \times 50'$ , was built. Joshua Crane wrote that on March 3, 1760, it was voted not to build a belfry.

And from the same source we learn that in 1773, it was voted to paint the outside of the meeting house "as much as has been painted heretofore and the inside, the canopy, pulpit, the front work of the galleries, the posts and braces." The following bills relate to renovating the Meeting House in 1810 and 1811, which give some idea of how the building must have looked.

Several include "To an allowance for services as one of the Building Committee."

AGREEMENT TO PAINT THE MEETING HOUSE\*-BENJAMIN CLARK-NOV. 15, 1817

their capacity, that he will, within the space of two months next after the date hereof in a good and workmanlike manner, according to the best of his skill will put on a good coat of paint on the putside of the Rev. Zedekiah Sanger Meeting House in said Parish - including the Tower, front porch and piazza floors and steps and window sashes and putty on the outside, as followeth viz to go over the whole that is heretofore been painted once and the window frames weather and corner boards and all that was heretofore painted white, except the Coving (molding); twice - and the door once, with boiled oil - and the said Benjamin Clark is to grind and mix the paint and prepare the oil by moderate boiling, and complete the whole by the time aforesaid in the best manner he is capable. -

In consideration of the painting to be performed as aforesaid we the said Nathan Lazell, N. and D. Mitchell for and in behalf of the said South Parish in their capacity aforesaid promise to pay the said Benjamin Clark the sum of Fifty Dollars, in Money or good securities in favor of the parish in the hands of their Treasurer — and also to find and deliver the said Benj. Clark a sufficient quantity of paint and oil, at the expense of said parish, to complete the work aforesaid —

A committee report for repairs on the meeting house follows 
The committee appointed to take into consideration the subject of repairing the meeting house of the First Congregational Society in Bridgewater, ask leave to submit the following report.

The house is in much need of repair. The coat of paint which was last put on is nearly all off. The tower leaks badly, and some of its important timbers have already decayed so much as to have sunk out of their proper places. The plastering likewise is so much cracked as to let in much of the cold of winter.

A thorough repair of the House, including the plastering of the whole, an alteration of the piazzas, the painting of both outside and inside, not excepting the pews and the carpeting of the alleys, your committee think would cost about one thousand dollars.

Should the plan of the House be altered, by removing the east and north galleries, placing a new pulpit at the north end, making the entrance at the south end, putting in large windows, etc., according to a plan presented with this report, your committee think the expense

would not be far from three thousand dollars, without including the appraisement of the present pews.

Should repairs be made according to the latter plan, the committee think that the expenses might be met by a sale of the pews but that the expenses of any thing short of this ought to be defrayed by a parish tax.

We do not feel authorized to propose a subscription in aid of a parish tax, but it is probable that a considerable part of the charge might be defrayed by the liberality of individuals, should the parish be well united in making repairs to the amount of only ten or twelve hundred dollars, all which is respectfully submitted.

LETTER FROM WILLIAMS LATHAM TO HON JOHN A SHAW March 24, 1839

At the Parish Meeting yesterday, yourself, Mr. Sol. Hayward and myself were chosen a committee to procure a drawing of the Meeting House, according to a plan proposed, and to present the same together with an estimate of the expense of altering the House accordingly.

The plan of altering the House is to put the pulpit at the north end, turn the pews around, take away the north and East gallery.

Singers to occupy the South gallery. One door at the South end for, outside entrance, three doors for inside entrance, aisles upon the

outside next to the walls and one in the middle - to remove the present windows and put in large ones, and to arch the top new pews aisles and pulpit has already been drawn, moving 56 pews in the body of the house and 12 in the two wings, being 6 on each side of the pulpit. The object is to get some architect or other person skilled in this matter, to cut and carve this old House up, so as to put it in as good shape as possible under the circumstances. Can this be done by a stranger without coming here to examine the House? Mr. Hayward and myself will on Tuesday take the dimentions of the House and measure all its parts. It seems necessary to have some plan or drawing of the House in the new form and shape before the expense of altering it can be well ascertained and the Parish want all this done if practicable before the next meeting, which is Wednesday afternoon, April 3, at 3 P.M. My own action as Committeeman is, that you and Mr. Hayward each make a drawing according to your respective views based upon the proposed alterations, and if you think we had better get an architect to do this business, I would suggest whether it would not be well for you to see some such person in Boston ascertain whether it is necessary for him to come out here, and what would be the probable expense of getting such person to do such business - all of which perhaps you can do and write me by Tuesday eve.

#### THIRD MEETING HOUSE

Report of Committee to provide plans for Meeting House 1845

"To the First Congregational Society in Bridgewater

The Committee chosen at the meeting of the Society on the 11th inst to procure plans and estimates for a meeting house for said Society have attended to that duty and respectfully submit the following report.

The attention of the Committee was first directed to the size or dimentions of a house which the Society would require and the number and arrangement of the pews in the house. After examining a number of modern built Meeting Houses and ascertaining the dimentions they have come to the unanimous conclusion that a House containing 72 or 74 pews on the floor with a gallery for singers will be of sufficient size for said Society. They find that the proper dimentions of a house for that number of pews with three aisles and a proper and sufficient space for the pulpit and a vestry or entry of convenient size will be 50 ft by 66 ft or 68 ft and with two aisles 4.4 ft by 66 or 68 ft. They are however of the opinion that the arrangement with three aisles as represented on the plan accompanying this report is the preferable mode of seating the house they therefore recommend that the arrangements be for three aisles one on each side of the house and a centre aisle. Should the Society think it best to make their pews shorter than 9 ft in length a corresponding diminuation in width of the house might be made. The size of the pews contemplated in the foregoing dimentions are 9 ft in length by 2 ft 10" wide. The committee have also given considerable attention to the style of the building to be observed in the Meeting House. They have examined a number of specimens of Grecian and Gothic architecture and present a number of

deviations of both, that the Society may judge for themselves they are however of the opinion that taking into consideration the location of the house, the amount which the Society intend (or probably intends) to appropriate for the building, that a Grecian edifice would be preferable. From the best information which they have been able to obtain they are of the opinion that a Grecian Church 50 ft in width by 66 or 68 ft in length with one tier of windows a proper height say 28 ft from the bottom of the sill to the top of the cornice with a proper proportioned tower say 120 ft in height corresponding in style to a house in Cambridgeport and in many respects to a house in Dorchester may be built for \$6,000.00 exclusive of the foundation. The Committee would also recommend that the house be warmed with hot air furnaces as they are satisfied that it is more pleasant and economical.

Eaton, which plans and apecifications, as amended by said Committee have been signed by the said parties, and are to be considered as forming a part of this contract, the same as if they were herein, fully expressed and drawn, and to complete the said House in every particular, on or before the fifteenth day of October next —

Said party of the first part, hereby agrees in behalf of said

Society to pay said party of the second part, for completing in every

particular, the aforesaid works, to their entire satisfaction, the sum

of fifty-eight hundred dollars, in the following manner - viz - One

From the Minister's Book - "The church was this day (Aug. 27, 1871) reopened for public worship, having been closed since the first of July for refurnishing and frescoeing. The pastor also returned after an absence

of three months. Interesting exercises were held upon the occasion.

Beautiful flowers adorned the pulpit and a large crop of lovely flowers stood upon the table in front. The singing was excellent and the Pastor preached from the text Psalms 90-17 'let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us and establish thou the work of our hands upon us - yea the work of our hands establish thou it'."

1888 - Introduction of water into the church left in the hands of the Parish Committee.

1892, April - Ladies Sewing Circle held note for \$76.00 for funds for shingling north side of church. In September a proposal was submitted by J. H. Fairbanks for heating the Unitarian Church. The cost would be about \$330. To repair the wood furnace would cost \$30.00 to \$40.00. Evidently neither proposal was accepted as the furnaces were purchased for \$186.00 and with other expenses listed in the treasurers report it cost the Society \$304.47.

### CHAPEL

1880, April 17 - Voted that a nominating committee of three be appointed to nominate a committee of nine to get up plans of a chapel with estimate of cost. Also report on location.

1880, May 4 - Rev. A. E. Goodnough reported for the committee, verbally, estimated cost to be \$2,001.50. The location to occupy the land now covered by 4 sheds near the northerly corner of the church building.

1880, May 25 - Voted that a nominating committee of 7 be appointed by the chair to nominate the building committee, the committee to consist of 4 ladies and 3 gentlemen. Mrs. Lloyd Parsons, Mrs. John Hayward, Mrs. John P. Townsend, Mrs. C. M. Bryant, Mr. Lloyd Parsons, Mr. George Harden and Mr. Nathan Willis were chosen nominating committee. They reported as building committee - Edward Sawyer, Isaac Damon, George P. Harden, Mrs. Williams Latham, Mrs. Lloyd Parsons. On motion of Mr. Hobart it was voted that the committee chosen to build a chapel be instructed before beginning the work to procure all working plans and estimate necessary in making contract for the whole work to be done by contract and that the cost not to exceed \$2,000.00.

A list of the purchasers of pews in the new meeting house on November 24, 1759, shows the number of the pew and the amount in pounds each person bid. The highest appears to be 177 pounds for pew #16 and the lowest bid was for 80 pounds for pew #22 made by Joseph Bassett.

Joshua Crane wrote that in 1760, 47 pews were sold upon completion of the second meeting house for 3775 pounds, old tenor, and 12 pews were sold in the front gallery for 1020 pounds old tenor. Six pews on the men's side of the meeting house and six pews on the women's side, sold for 474 pounds, old tenor.

1810, Nov. 10 - after the alterations, an agreement was signed between Daniel Copeland and the South Parish, "on account of hearing, wishes to retain the use and improvement of his pew which is situated in front of the pulpit."

1810, Dec. 1 - Asa Pratt was paid \$40.00 in full for old pew #6. The receipt was signed by Nathan Mitchell who was chosen by the South Parish Committee to settle with the pew holders in the South Parish.

1810, Dec. 1 - Cyrus Benson was paid \$12.38 for 1/7 of old pew #51.

1810, Dec. 1 - Receipt for \$9.44 was signed by John Harden for 1/9 of old pew #21 belonging to his mother, and the same amount for 1/9 of the same pew belonging to his aunt, Lois Washburn.

1811, Jan. 21 - Note signed by Solomon Hayward, "Please pay to Capt.

Simeon Pratt \$25 and charge to my pew account." Another note of the same

Putnam is the Minister, said pew being numbered sixty (60) and is situated on the north aisle in said House, and was formerly owned and occupied by one William Thompson, and owned by said Belcher at the time of the first publication of the Notice of the issueing of a warrant against the estate of said Insolvent Debter, not intending hereby to warrant and defend title to said pew, but intending to sell and convey the same to said Leland, provided the same was a part of his assets and liable to be taken for the payment of his debts, and not exempt. 1861, April 3 - Charles W. Belcher of Natchez, Mississippi, sold pew #60 to Nathan H. Dunphe for \$35.00.

1878 (?) - Nahum Stetson, administrator of the estate of Eli Washburn, sold pew #9 to Dr. Edward Sawyer for \$8.00.

1880, April 17 - Voted that the clerk be a Committee of one to furnish a plan of the pews in the Church, with the number and the name of owner upon each pew. This plan to be framed and kept in the vestibule. That he see each owner of pew and ascertain from them if they will let seats and how many, also how many seats may be occupied by visitors and a record kept of the

same. Also to ascertain if rent of seat in whole or in part shall be applied for parish purposes.

1880, May 4 - Voted that a committee be appointed to take up the matter of taxing pews owned by non-residents to be used for Society expenses.

1888, April 28 - Circular sent to all pew owners asking, "Will you convey to the Society all your right, title and interest" in your pew or pews at a price to be determined by fair appraisal, the pews to be rented annually to help maintain the church. The Answers on file varied - "Will release at any reasonable figure" - - - "I shall not give my pew up" - - - "Whatever the other pew owners do I will agree to" - - - "Will sell pew to Church at a reasonable price" - - - "Will give it up if the Society will TAX the pews and on no other condition" - - - "Will sell our 3 pews reasonable, cannot afford to give outright."

1889 - Probable date on a paper signed by pew owners transfering the right and title of their pews to the Society - the pews to be the property of the Society and all expenses incurred at any time for repairs and alterations to be paid for by the Society, and not the individuals. The pews were not to be sold as long as the present church building shall be used, for public worship, by the Society. The paper contains 45 signatures.

1897 - Paid John Ball \$11.19 for removing pews and work in the Church.

1898, Oct. 12 - Caroline Keith deeded pew #52 to Lemuel and Hassadiah Keith for \$100.00.

1767 - Voted: that Jacob Washburn and Co. purchase a bell and that Lieutenant Washburn hang the bell. It was also voted that the bell be rung on all public days in the year according to the custom of other parishes, and to be rung at nine o'clock if free of charge to the Parish, and at funerals, if desired free of charge. Abram Washburn rant the bell at the rate of 3 pounds, 15 shillings per year.

The bell was recast in 1771 (from the program for the 200th anniversary, 1916).

The warrant for 1791 called for a report of the Committee relative to procuring a bell.

The Paul Revere bell which first hung in the second Meeting House and later in the Christopher Wrenn Steeple of the present building was of great interest to all who courageously climbed the narrow stairs to read the inscription, "Paul Revere & Son 1811."

The steeple was destroyed during hurricane "Carol" on August 31, 1954. Later, although the decision to sell the bell was not a unanimous one, the bell was sold and shipped to Englewood, Colorado.

Until recently, the whereabouts of "our" bell was a mystery. The story was uncovered when the June, 1976 issue of Yankee Magazine printed a letter, "Lost - One Paul Revere Bell" from E. and E. Stickney.

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Stickney, who for many years have been researching the bells cast by Paul Revere and his sons, were contacted and through them, Yankee Magazine and the Los Angeles County Museum, the travels of "our bell" became known.

In 1965, after the death of its owner, the bell was shipped from Colorado to Connecticut, and in December of the same year, the bell was trucked to the Los Angeles County Museum of Natural History where it now hangs in its wooden cradle.

  62 names with amounts pledged are signed. Amounts range from \$200.00 to \$1.00.

The Committee appointed August 16, 1851 to dispose of the old organ, and to procure a new one, provided not less than \$1,200.00 be obtained by subscription or otherwise, submit the following report -

"Previous to our appointment, a subscription paper had been started to raise funds for a new organ. We received and circulated the paper and having obtained more than \$1,200.00 - We then examined several organs, consulted with organists and organ builders, and after making many inquiries as to the cost of organs, and receiving propositions of organ builders, we unanimously agreed with Messrs E & G G Hook of Boston to build an organ of the following specifications to wit - 877 pipes. They were to get up the same in our Church in complete order for use, and were to receive therefor the sum of \$1,500.00 as follows - They were to take the old organ for \$100.00 and were to receive \$700.00 in cash on delivery of the new organ, and \$700.00 in 6 months after. The organ contracted for was set up in church by said E & G G Hook during the last days of February now last past, and we have delivered to them the old organ, and have paid to them the sum of \$1,378.65 in cash in full for the new organ according to contract - We have collected from 54 subscribers the sum of \$1,353.00 received of Lazell Perkins the sum of \$15.79 for interest on the money since it was collected.

If 2 subscribers would pay their subscriptions omit \$8.00

This organ measures feet wide, feet deep and feet high - we have procured a seat for the organist, and altered the seats in the gallery to correspond with the new organ at a cost of \$ - - - - to the Society.

We have had but a short time since the organ was set up to ascertain and prove its character, but so far as we know and are able to judge, it is a good organ and faithfully made according to the above specifications.

We have not accepted the organ in discharge of the obligations of the said E & G G Hook under their contract and if it should not prove to be a good one, we consider them still liable on their contract. The subscription paper and contract approved accompany this report.

Five papers concern the specifications, only one is dated - Sept. 1, 1851. To the uninformed, they seem to be much the same. They are marked (1) No Br organ, (2) Organ by Muenscher, (3) Copy of specifications for \$1,300., Sept. 1, 1851, (4) Specifications complete for \$1,300., (5) Copy of Spec. for \$1,500. Three of the specifications contain a stop for Bellows signal and one lists a bellows alarm. We were told that this stop was for the organist to (startingly) arouse the blower or pumper of the organ to get busy.

This agreement, this first day of October A.D. 1851. By and between Nahum Stetson, Williams Latham and Caleb S. Hunt, Committee of the First Congregational Society in Bridgewater on the first and E & G G Hook of Boston on the other part, Witnesseth, that the said E & G G Hook agree to build an organ in accordance with the annexed specifications, and deliver it set up in said Church in complete order for use.

In consideration whereof the said committee agrees to pay to E & G G Hook upon delivery of the organ as above, the old organ now in said Church and Fourteen Hundred Dollars, in the following manner viz - Seven Hundred Dollars in cash, and a satisfactory note for Seven Hundred Dollars payable in six months, and they further agree to get the said note discounted for E & G G Hook at the legal rate of interest without further cash.

The following is an excerpt from a letter to the Rev. Karl A. Bach in 1961, from Alan M. Laufman, member of the Executive Council of The Organ Historical Society. "In 1852, they (E & G G Hook) built their 132nd instrument for the Congregational Church at Bridgewater. It has two manuals and twenty-five stops as well as two combination pedals. The nineteen ranks, or rows of pipes, are divided between the great organ, the enclosed swell organ, and the pedal organ. The entire instrument is housed in a handsome three-sectional case, and stands completely free in the rear gallery. The church was then known, and is now known, as the First Parish Congregational Church.

Another Hook organ, their 162nd, exists in the First Unitarian Church at East Bridgewater, and their 375th organ, built originally for the Baptist Church at Chelsea, Massachusetts, is now in the Swedenborgian Church at Bridgewater. The Methodist Church at Bridgewater has a small Hook and Hastings organ built about 1905. All of these instruments have a long-

lasting and reliable tracker action that is easy to repair and pleasing to play. If given proper care they will last hundreds of years."

## GALLERY CLOCK

A letter from the Rev. Richard M. Hodges, dated July 22, 1846, to: "My Christian Friends,

I am happy in knowing that with all the means of religious culture you are so well and fully supplied, and that in your new and beautiful house of public worship you have a home for your Christian affections, a place where your heavenly aspirations may find most grateful  $\epsilon$  d and encouragement.

I take great pleasure in presenting to you, for your church, a clock. As it silently but surely indicates the progress of time, may it be a momento to you of that higher and upward progress to which your souls were ordained. And may the hours of your sacred sessions as they glide irretrievably away bear with them only the memories of fervent prayers, of affections alive to all interests of humanity, of aspirations heavenly and eternal."

July 21, 1846, Williams Latham, Jonathan Cushing, Calvin Pract, with Rev. Claudius Bradford as chairman, were chosen to serve as the committee to "express the sentiments of the Society."

The same year, the Parish paid Maximillian Hall for aking care of the clock on the Neeting House, and for winding up and regulating the clock in front of the gallery (no extra charge) \$7.00 for seven meths.

An article in the warrant for March 20, 1847, included "to see if the Parish will accept the clock presented by Rev. R. M. Hodges."

From 1853 to 1901 bills for repairing and cleaning the gallery clock ranged from \$ .50 to \$1.75. Work (labor) on the clock was done by Thomas Cushman, E. A. Hewett and H. O. Clark.

Willard Fobes was paid \$1.92 for taking care of the clock and \$45.00 for taking care of the Meeting House for one year.

## BURYING GROUND

This Grave Yard, the first burying place in the South Precinct, is part of the two acres given by John Washburn in 1716 to the Inhabitants of the South Precinct. One acre was used for the burying ground.

1736 the South Precinct voted to build a board fence around the burying ground, the next year rescinded the vote, voted and did build a post and rail fence.

From Williams Latham's "Epitaphs," 1882, "Lt. John Washburn, born 1711 and died 1797, was the sexton and dug the graves from 1739 to the time of his death. He kept a record, now in the possession of the writer."

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

A letter from the Rev. Richard M. Hodges was read on the 50th anniversary of the organization of the Sunday School, July 6, 1873. Quotations from Mr. Hodges's letter provide the story of the beginning of the Sunday School.

"It is allotted to but comparatively few persons to recognize themselves as belonging to a past age of two generations; and to fewer still to be associated with enterprises of a beneficient tendency. I take to myself, I hope, with Christian humility, some degree of satisfaction in having instituted the Sunday School, at so early a period in my pastorate, on a permanent basis, and the Society may well take pleasure in the historical record consequent on such an event. —

In 1823, there were in all New England but two or three parishes that had made provision for the systematic instruction of children in the principles and precepts of Christianity. In former days, the custom was for pastors to meet the youth of their flocks—occasionally or at stated times,—to teach them, by catechism or appropriate discourse, the relative and secred duties of life, and such occasions were often made delightful to the children by memorial presents from the gentle and kind hearted minister. I have it on record, and were it not for the record, I have it in distinct remembrance, that I had a separate service, periodically, for the special benefit of those of my charge who were in the forming period of life."

"In regard to the institution of the Sunday School, I recollect the meeting that was held at my request, to adopt preliminary measures thereto, and now that the organization, in age, has reached to a half century of time, I have special reason to be grateful for the ready and earnest interest that was manifest at its inauguration. ---- The means of instruction fifty years ago, considered in connection with those of the passing period, were meagre indeed. The modes, too, of instruction have undergone a great change. The means of education, which

formerly were very limited are now almost without number. The activity of mind with mind is kept up almost continually, and it would seem as if there would be no interruption of this activity because of the untiring and emphatic operation of the electric wire. Fifty years ago, the giving and receiving news, in all departments of society, was almost wholly confined to stated times and set occasions. Now newspapers, periodicals and books almost interminable, give ready and immediate utterance to public, and, -- and I had almost said, -- private thought. ---- The advance of mind in its true course, -- or its course after the truth, will never interfere with the advance of religion in its upward aspiration. --- --- I have no fears for the future because of the energy and elasticity of the powers of the mind. Sunday Schools, and the worship of 'one Father of all', on the Lord's day, will, I trust, in the providence of God, receive continual accessions of strength and influence by the activities of science, etc."

The same Sunday, July 6, 1873, Isaac Damon, the Superintendent of the Sunday School for the last four years, gave his report, parts of which are included to show the growth and some of the lessons that were taught.

"Since my connection with the School we have met here regularly every Sabbath with the exception of Communion Sundays when we have had no session and a short vacation during the summer months of 1871 when our church was being refurnished — The number belonging to the School has steadily increased from 50 scholars, four years ago, to 108, our present number. We have instituted a penny contribution. Each class having a little box in which they deposit their penny each Sunday, and when we commenced this plan, the Superintendent thinking it might inspire the scholars to bring their penny each Sunday, borrowed an idea which he saw at a neighboring Sabbath School, which was to put 50¢ into each box as often as that amount was contributed by the scholars in their respective boxes, and I assure you

the plan met my most sanguine expectations, and we were enabled to make frequent donations to charitable institutions. Out of this contribution by the children we have given nearly \$200.00 to charitable institutions and speaks well for these scholars, and I think will instill into their young minds that giving is living as our friend Rev. Hosmer told us last Sabbath. We have had Sunday School concerts regularly every two or three months and I think these concerts do as much to cement us together as any other part of our exercises for at the concerts we have the parents with us and without their co-operation our labors are almost in vain-. have made additions to our Library every year which now contains about 700 volumes and we have been more than fortunate in securing good Librarians so that our Library which is an important means of carrying on a Sunday School successfully is as it should be well sustained and although our Society has contributed liberally every year to enable us to replenish it, I must not overlook the very generous donation of \$50.00 made by the Ladies of this Society which was as cheerfully given as it was gratefully received. We have taken from 25 to 40 copies of the Sunday School paper each year and we cannot afford to be without this aid as they contain many beautiful thoughts and help the children to live pure lives. We formerly used textbooks for the several classes, no two classes using the same Text Book. This arrangement did not seem to meet the wants of the school as it was an impossibility to find books which were adapted to all the scholars and often times they would lose their interest and stay away many Sundays which crippled the work we were engaged in and after long and earnest thought we adopted the one lesson system which I have previously explained to you at our concert and it is now working admirably. The younger classes still retain their Text Books as we think they are better adapted to their young minds. We have been addressed during the past four years by about 50 different ministers and besides this our Pastor who has always been an earnest faithful worker in the Sunday

School has always when here spoken to the children giving them thoughts to take away with them which has been as good seed sown on good ground and for which he will reap a rich reward-and I must not forget our friend, Mr. Kingman, one of our most earnest workers always ready to say a good word to us and encourage us as well by example as by deeds to persevere for the attainment of the highest good of these children. We have had Christmas Festivals and summer excursions for the children and have endeavored to use all the means in our power to keep up the interest of the School, knowing that on its success depends the vitality of the Church and we must not forget these our teachers many of them having met their classes regularly each Sunday for the past 4 years and even longer I am informed, ever faithful to the trusts committed to their charge and aiding me in numberless ways. They have my heartfelt thanks and must feel an inward satisfaction which will brighten their pathway through life. I think we have lost but 3 scholars by death and God has specially blessed us in this particular allowing us to meet here for 4 years and removing but 3 of our scholars. Still there is a lesson for us all in these dispensations of Providence. We should improve every opportunity here presented to us to fit us for the great change which will inevitably overtake us.

## RESIGNATIONS

(and reduction and discontinuance of subscriptions)

Reasons for the many resignations from the Society were not always given and perhaps the real reason was not stated either.

From 1816 to 1832, 57 notices were received from the individuals. The wording varies - "This is to certify I have become a member of the Episcopal Society of Trinity Church in Bridgewater by which I am exempted from taxation for the support of Public worship in your Society" - - "I hereby inform you that I consider myself a member of the Society of Trinity Church in said town." - - "I hereby inform you that I have united myself with the Society of Trinity Church in said town, therefore consider myself as withdrawn from yours." - - "I hereby certify to you that I have united myself with the Protestant Episcopal Society in this town, therefore my membership with your Society is dissolved." Six notices contain several signatures on each paper.

In 1825 one notice of membership in the Third Congregational Society in Middleborough is signed by the Precinct clerk-pro tem.

Between 1825 and 1831 there were ten notices of membership in the Halifax Universalist Society, all signed by the clerk of that Society.

In 1826 a notice of membership in the Congregational Society in Hanson is signed by the Clerk of the said Society.

From 1824 to 1833 there were 34 notices of membership in the New Jerusalem Society in Bridgewater. Several of these are on printed slips. The clerks who signed these notices were Nathaniel Washburn, Calvin Washburn, Horace Ames and Simeon Leonard.

Two of the four notices from the first Baptist Society in Middleborough are signed by two members of the Committee of the Society and the other two by the Clerk.

In 1830 a notice of membership in the First Congregational Society in West Bridgewater is signed by Jarvis D. Burrell, IId, clerk.

From 1834 to 1856 there were 11 notices of discontinuance of support of either the Society or the minister. Some gave the reason, and two gave notice of reduction in their subscription.


