Course Description: Introduction to basic drawing skills and concept integration. Studio practice with research in historical and contemporary approaches.

Course Objectives:

Through a variety of in class drawing exercises, short lectures, assignments, group critiques, readings, and field trips the general goals of this course are to:

- Impart the fundamental skills of drawing and increase your observation drawing skills. In other words, learn to render three-dimensional form into a two-dimensional surface.
- Assist you in developing a vocabulary with which to analyze artwork including drawings and constructively criticize/analyze your own work as well as that of your peers.
- Begin to direct and develop personal expression and meaning in your work.

Class Format:

Lectures, handouts, and critiques will take place at the beginning of class. Studio practicum takes up the larger portion of the class time. Students should be prepared to listen carefully, take notes, be present the entire two hours and apply classroom instruction independently. To succeed in this course, you must invest adequate time in your work.

- Studio Practicum: Collaborative and independent drawing activity and instruction are a large part of this course and will be our routine.
- Critique: Critiques are valuable to artists and thinkers at all stages of their careers providing time for discussion and evaluate their works. Bring something to write with and something to write on to all critiques and be prepared to reflect in writing and verbally to the artwork.
- Outside Research: Readings and periodic in-class lectures explain, illustrate and highlight important concepts and ideas. Attending Art events/openings and written responses of them are a mandatory component of this course. Become familiar with the list of museums and galleries from the Art Events handout. 5 event responses will be collected at midterm and 5 more are collected the last day of class.
- Practice, practice, practice: Homework assignments, Mid-Term, and Final projects are your opportunity to expand on, push, risk, and explore the ideas and techniques introduced during studio work time. It is expected you spend 5 hours minimum a week on homework assignments. Homework

assignments will usually be given the last class session of the week and should be ready for critique the first session of the following week. It is therefore important to turn your assignments in on time.

- KEEP ALL OF YOUR WORK in your portfolio with other significant work you have created. Midterm and Final projects will take the place of some homework assignments and will be given an appropriate timeline to complete.
- A sketchbook of some kind is usually necessary to record thoughts and ideas related to class work. Try to keep only what is relevant to this class in this sketchbook.

*Please note, this is to get us started...more materials or tools may be needed as class progresses.

Class policies:

Grading and Assessment: Your final grade will be calculated according to points accumulated by the completion of assignments, in class participation, attendance of art events, and mid-term and final assignments. In order to qualify for your letter grade, you must complete the P/NP requirements which are as follows:

- 1) The quality of the learning process, including risks taken, range of ideas explored, contributions to class, attendance, effective use of class time, enthusiasm and the amount of work done.
- 2) The quality of the learning process, including risks taken, range of ideas explored, contributions to class, attendance, effective use of class time, enthusiasm and the amount of work done.
- 3) Professional demeanor in the sculpture studio as evidenced by clean work habits, the proper treatment of equipment, attention to the studio space, and participation in the final studio clean up.

A = Excellence in all assignments, highly motivated, extremely innovative solutions to projects

B = Above average in all work, demonstrated technical growth and visual maturity

C = Completion of all projects, satisfactory class participation

- D = Below average quality in work and/or Incompletes on some projects, inadequate class participation
- F = Poor quality of work and/or Incompletes on many projects, poor class participation, several absences.

Preparedness: Be ready for class! Bring all drawing materials to class every day and be ready to draw by 15 minutes past the starting hour; giving both you and me time for setting up. If assignments are due have your drawings finished ready to hang and view *before* all scheduled due dates.

Class participation in practicum, discussion, and critique: Your engagement is critical to your success in this class. As a studio class we will be drawing most of the time, come prepared to do so. Class critiques are open discussion for all students and your participation is expected. Bring something to write with and something to write on to all critiques and be prepared to reflect in writing and verbally to the artwork.

Assignments: Assignments including Mid-term and Final should reflect a quality product which includes inventiveness, sensitivity to materials, technical comprehension, compositional effectiveness, and idea development in relation to the assignment.

Art Events: It is required to attend art openings and events outside of this class. Become familiar with the list of museums and galleries from the Art Events handout. Event responses are collected at midterm and the last day of classes. Also follow the UM SVMA on Instagram @um_svma for the latest updates and happenings!

Late Work: Late work will be accepted; however, full credit may not be given.

Absences and tardiness: Absence will affect your overall grade. 3 unexcused absences will drop a letter from your final grade. If you must be absent for any reason, you are responsible for completing class exercises on your own time and turning in to me the following class meeting. If you are late to class or leave early 3 times = 1 Absence.

Recommended Course Text: No text is required for this course. Readings will be made available to you via handouts.

Course workload: "In addition to regularly scheduled meeting times (about 4 hours a week), expect five (5) hours of work outside of scheduled class per week for completion of projects and assignments. Studio technicians and work-study students may be available to provide some assistance."

Online Access: This course is supplemented/backed online through Moodle. I will post our daily assignments and routine, as well as other helpful resources. It will be a good place to find information if you miss class. Also follow the UM SVMA on Instagram @um_svma for the latest updates and happenings!

Phones and other electronic devices: Cell phone/device use in this class is not allowed. *Except in emergency situations (please let me know, so I may be aware of your need).

Extra Credit: There may be opportunities for extra credit.

Credit / No Credit Policy: Major, minor and general education requirements *must be* taken for a letter grade. Student may drop or withdraw this course by drop/withdraw deadline with no academic penalty.

Conclusion of Course: For this studio course, all work is due the last week of scheduled classes (before finals week) Mandatory studio cleanup is part of this course and will be accomplished during finals week. Artwork

(portfolios) will be returned to students at the last day of the term. Retrieve your work promptly as we do not have storage over summer or winter break. Anything left behind will eventually be discarded or recycled.

Health and Safety:

- *Safety issues involving equipment and facilities:* Keep the drawing studio area neat and dust free. Put away finished work in portfolio and your flat file cabinet, pick up materials from floors, sweep and dust all surfaces. Fixative may only be used in the ventilated space in FA401 or outdoors.
- *Specific clothing or safety gear* is not necessary. However, if you use fixative, an appropriate vapor respirator may be recommended.
- *Special COVID accommodations for our facility:* Masks, physical distancing, and daily seating assignments are mandatory until further notice. (see COVID protocol below)
- *Drawing Studio Hours:* 7:00am-11:00pm
- No animals or children who are not enrolled in a class in FA allowed in the studios
- *Studio clean-up:* Studio clean-up is mandatory every day at the end of class session. Time will be allotted for clean up.
- Picking up work at the end of the semester
- *Ventilation:* FA401 has a ventilated room which must be used for aerosols and vaporous materials.
- *In consideration of eye strain* taking quick breaks between drawing sessions will be allowed and are recommended.
- *Familiarize yourself with the studio exits*

Exam and assignment religious accommodations: For students whose religious holidays preclude taking tests or turning in assignments at the specified times must arrange ahead of time to turn in work or take exams.

Work created across different courses is not permitted in this class. Works must be created specifically for this course unless otherwise permitted by professors. If there is a special circumstance or a question, contact me about it. Penalty may include up to no credit given for the related assignment.
