



Hannah Copley is a writer, editor and lecturer. Her work has recently appeared in *Poetry Birmingham Literary Journal, Into the Void, POETRY, Under the Radar, Bath Magg, Strix* and *Stand*. She was the winner of the 2019 Newcastle Poetry Prize and the 2018 YorkMix/York Literature Festival Poetry. In 2018 she was named as one of the '50 Best New British and Irish Poets' by the American poet Maggie Smith, and her poetry has been featured on BBC Radio 3 and has been used in music compositions and art installations and translated into Arabic. She works as a lecturer in Creative Writing at the University of Westminster and is an editor of *Stand* magazine. She has a pamphlet and a full collection of poems out next year and is also working on a non-fiction book.

Drew Thornton is a PhD pre-candidate at Curtin University (Perth, Western Australia), attached to the research project "Experiments in Animal Knowledge: Transformative Concepts and Methods in the Posthumanities, Animalities, and Environmental Humanities". Drew has previously presented papers on the changing representations of monsters and hybrids in contemporary science fiction and fantasy—elements of these will appear in a chapter contributed to the edited book *Fantasy and Myth in the Anthropocene*, which is due for publication by Bloomsbury Academic in 2021.



Peggy Riley is a playwright, author, and lecturer in creative writing. She has written essays for Elle and the Wall Street Journal; her short fiction has been shortlisted for the Bridport Prize and the Costa Short Story Award. Her first novel is *Amity & Sorrow*. She was a writer-on-attachment at Soho Theatre, and her work for theatre has been commissioned and produced off-West End, on tour, and for radio. Recently, her essay was commissioned for an anthology on motherhood, *The Best Most Awful Job*, published by Elliott & Thompson. She is currently working on a morning pages workbook and a novel set in East Kent, where she lives.

A prize-winning author, Helena Halme writes contemporary Nordic fiction and is a former BBC journalist, bookseller and magazine editor. Originally from Finland where she gained an MSc in Marketing, she also holds an MA in Creative Writing from Bath Spa University and writes in English. She has published 12 fiction titles and three non-fiction books, including *Write Your Story: Turn Your Life Into Fiction in 10 Easy Steps*. Helena acts as Nordic Ambassador for the Alliance of Independent Authors and as self-publishing coach helps other writers publish and market their books.

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Adrian Radu is a writer with mixed interests in literature and philosophy. After publishing The Seduction of the Power (Novel, 2012) and The Mystery of the Collapse (Novel, 2015), he focused more on philosophical research, publishing articles about freedom and democracy, where he analysed the relationship between freedom and politics, or freedom and religion. His favourite philosophers are Plato, Aristotle, and Friedrich Nietzsche. Among the British writers, he admires George Orwell, C.S Lewis, and J.R.R. Tolkien. At present, as a MA Creative Writing student, he is writing a movie script about an outstanding religious and political moment in our history.
