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April Fools' articles a "no-go" this year



As April Fools Day looms near, a Prospectus News tradition has come to a grinding halt. Under the leadership of former Publications Manager, Aaron Archibald Geiger, the student run paper has been responsible for over 500 fictional April Fools articles, with ambitions to run many more in the future. However, after a meeting between John Eby of Student Life and current Prospectus Publications Manager, Sean Hermann, that will likely not happen.

Citing "growing concerns" and "gaseous buildups and possible outbursts," Parkland College has asked Prospectus News staff to no longer compose fictional news pieces, photos, or graphics for special April Fools' editions of the paper.

"I'm not really at liberty to discuss what was said behind closed doors," said Eby when questioned about the meeting with Hermann. "But what I can say is that people are tired of getting duped. How would you feel if you opened the paper to read Chuck Shepard's "News of the Weird" and were instead greeted with an article on the growing threat of groundhogs burrowing beneath a wing of the college?"


records, last year alone there were over 700 phone calls, letters, faxes, wires, emails, and Pony Express rides sent to the college in reaction to an April Fools article depicting the eventual installation of parking meters in lots closest to buildings. The year before that, a mock article with a photo of President Ramage being led away in handcuffs for "allegedly selling student Senate seats," had the President's office scrambling to answer inquisitive phone calls for months after.

Morgan Bernier offered a unique view as she is both an assistant editor for the Prospectus and office worker in Student Life, as well as a freestyle beat-boxer in a local troupe.

"I can understand how people might get upset about fake news articles. I mean, when the paper intentionally messed up the Sudoku puzzles, people were extremely irate. We got three death threats over that," said Bernier

Although she sympathizes with people who fall for the fake stories, Bernier maintains that it's all in good fun and that the complete removal of April Fools from the paper would be a mistake.

"If these writers, photographers, editors, and designers don't get at least one day to throw a goofy piece of work

Whether or not these special April Fools editions of the paper will return in the future remains to be seen. At this point though, one thing is certain. People still have no idea what The Event is about, or why it was included in this particular article.

Parkland offers new "hip" course



A new and obscure class will be introduced to Parkland students this upcoming Fall semester. The course is titled Intro To Hipster Culture and can be used to complete six hours of required humanities credit. It offers an extensive view of the hipster subculture in hopes to create a better understanding of an underrated group in our community. It was created and will be instructed by Richard Stalke, a humanities professor at Parkland.

The reception of implementing this new course from students around Parkland is a mixture of confusion and anger. Many people on campus were unsure about the term, only having a vague understanding of what type of people it categorized. "I don't even know what a hipster is," said Parkland student Steph Green. Some students that knew of hipsters had an extremely negative association with the term.

A hipster is someone who is well versed in independent media and fashion, while rejecting and scoffing at mainstream artists and trends. In doing this, they feel as though they achieve "credibility," or "coolness." They strive on the concept of irony, such as wearing excessively large glasses while having 20/20 vision or drinking Pabst Blue Ribbon with better alternatives available. "The class will not only offer knowledge of some of the common traits of hipster irony, but sort of an analysis of how they choose their forms of irony," said Stalke. "Sure, we know they ironically listen to Lady Gaga, but what we try to teach is 'why?""

To properly examine the life of the hipster, this class attempts to indulge students deep into their culture. While most classes require books, Intro To Hipster Culture has required listening. Students must purchase a select list of music to listen to. "Since this is an intro course, we only require the basics for hipster music knowledge. Such as the Replacements' Let It Be, Neutral Milk Hotel's In the Aeroplane Over the Sea, Radiohead's Kid A, and Violent Femmes' self-titled album." Stalke explained. Stalke then explained that students are also required to read music website Pitchfork daily and will take an online quiz at the end of each week on the reading.

"Taking this class would be cool, I guess," said self-proclaimed hipster and Parkland student Anthony Flame. "It can teach people about obscure things they've probably never heard of, but I guess I'm just apathetic about it." When asking other apparent hipsters around Parkland, they became defensive and denied that they were one. Stalke explained that this is an example of their aforementioned irony.

There are hopes for many similar classes for Parkland in the near future. If Intro To Hipster Culture is well received, Stalke has hopes for creating additional educational options focusing on hipsters. Students may be able to expand their knowledge with courses such as Hipster Music Theory and Intro To Hipster Psychology. New rules in effect on campus



Parkland College has plans of implementing several new rules that are aimed at the bettering the student body. Since being chosen by the federal government as a college leader, the administration determined that to establish the function of a 21st century community college, the changes were a must.

The first change is the banning of all cell phones on college grounds. Due to the increased interruptions from phones ringing in classes, in addition to the amplified cheating capabilities, the college has decided that the only way to handle the situation is to ban them entirely from the property. Beginning over the summer semester, the new order will establish that anyone caught with a phone will be expelled from the college and will be presented with a ticket to appear in the newly established Phone Court, where a fine of \$7,300.00 will be imposed. The student body will be expected to appear in class each day wearing red and white checked coveralls. Knowing that this can be a large expense, Parkland is opening its own clothing store where appropriate apparel will be sold. It will be an extension of the college bookstore in what is now a study area across from the art gallery and the Eastern Uni-



versity offices.

Newly elected Parkland President, Angus Young, stated, "These changes are necessary to maintain the dignity of the school now that we are in the national spotlight. Community Colleges were designed to help the average person be prepared for the work world, but today's students think that showing up whenever they want and in whatever they want is acceptable." He concluded by saying, "In order to prepare our students, they need to get accustomed to paying attention, being present and being prepared for the position."

Many students feel that the changes are a positive aspect and will help Parkland look good as a school of conformity. "I think this will be a good thing in the long run," said student David Roth. "This will only help everyone to fit into a workplace

When President Young was asked about this situation, he said, "Perhaps we need to get rid of the business department, since in the 21st century we will all be working from home and won't even need to get dressed."

At Clive's, of Victoria, British Columbia, Glenfiddich Scotch whisky is only one ingredient in the signature cocktail "Cold Night In," which, according to a January New York Times review, combines "molecular mixology" and comfort food. An especially buttery grilledcheese sandwich is soaked overnight in the Scotch, along with Mt. Gay rum and Lillet Blanc wine. Following a brief freeze to congeal any remaining fat, and double-straining, it is ready to serve -- with a celery stick and other garnishments. [New York Times, 1-25-

"Vulva Original," from a German company, VivaEros, is the "scent of a beautiful woman," reported in Harper's magazine in August 2010, and selling as a fragrance concentrate for the equivalent of about \$35 for a small roll-on container. (Its promotional video is of a lavishly photographed gym scene, with a handsome male, observing a beautiful female working out on a stationary bike, followed afterward by the male's gently sniffing the seat.) "The female smell of intimacy," promised VivaEros, "triggers sexual attraction and desire,"

Science on the Cutting Edge

"You're not going to like this," warned NPR's Robert Krulwich, about to deliver a February story about visionary robotics developers James Auger and Jimmy Loizeau, who created a carnivorous clock, supposedly able to power itself for 12 days merely on the carcasses of 12 dead houseflies (which the clock traps with fly paper and then mechanically razors in two). The pair also showed a prototype of a coffee table that catches mice by luring them up the table legs with cheese into a hole in the center, where they are guillotined. Auger and Loizeau said their creations are just extensions of TV nature programs showing animals hunting in the wild, but Krulwich fretted about the dangers inherent in "giving robots a taste for (meat)." [NPR, 2-7-2011]

Scientistshavelongobserved male capuchin monkeys urinating on their hands and then rubbing down their bodies, but researchers were unclear about the purpose (whether for identification, or threatprevention, or mating) -- until a recent issue of the American Journal of Primatology. Dr. Kimberly Phillips and colleagues found that the practice helps clarify mating priorities, in that, first, males rub down promptly after being solicited by females in heat, and second, based on MRI scans of capuchins' brains, female mating activity is triggered only by adults' urine. [BBC News, 2-24-2011]

The Continuing Crisis

In May 2008, classroom disrupter Alex Barton, 5, was finally made by his teacher at Morningside Elementary kindergarten in St. Lucie County, Fla., to sit down and listen to the accumulated complaints of his classmates, who then were asked to vote on asking Alex to leave the class. (He lost, 14-2.) Shortly afterward, Alex was diagnosed with a form of autism, and his mother filed a federal disability discrimination lawsuit, citing Alex's "humiliation" by the voting incident. A settlement was reached in February 2011 when the school district agreed to pay Alex \$350,000 (which included legal expenses). Said Ms. Barton, "Money can't take care of what (the school district) did to my family."



Album Review: Justin Bieber's My World 2.0

The year 2011 not only marks a new decade, but the one-year anniversary of one of the most groundbreaking releases in the music industry. Pop sensation Justin Bieber released his first full length studio release, My World 2.0, slightly over a year ago on March 19, 2010. Normally albums that have been out this long wouldn't be reviewed, but due to the extreme attention to detail and subtle effects spanning its entirety, this work takes at least year to fully digest.

My World 2.0, has been met with much commercial success. According to Billboard. com, "Bieber became the first artist since the Beatles to debut at No. 1 and then sell more the following week." The album has also reached number 1 on the Australian, Brazilian, Canadian, Irish, New Zealand, and Spanish charts. Also, it has reached a 2x Platinum

ranking in the United States, Australia, and Canada.

The 15-year-old artist took music lovers by storm when releasing the album's lead single "Baby," featuring hiphop artist Ludacris. The song begins with melancholy echoed notes, followed by Bieber's soulful "ohohwahahahaha" tugging at the listener's heartstrings. As the first line of the song is sung, the sweet, sugary, addictive beat drops. Bieber's sweet melodies carry the song throughout lyrics of heartbreak and the bittersweet love that once was. He stresses "my first love broke my heart for the first time," submerging the older, more experienced listeners into the sweet nostalgia of puppy love, while the target demographic wonders with beady eyes about what such a momentous part of life entails. Then, as a perfect catharsis, Bieber confesses that he "was like: 'Baby, baby, baby oh!' Like: 'Baby, baby, baby no!'"

The rest of the album fol-

lows with the same passion and smooth sound as the first track "Baby." Contrary to popular belief, Bieber's music isn't only accessible to children and preteens. Across the album the listener will be encompassed in catchy soundscapes full of creative pop sensibilities and complex story weaving. Similar to Pink Floyd's Dark Side Of The Moon, My World 2.0 is a concept album, focusing on Bieber's new world. He has made that frightening leap from childhood into the teenage years, and documented it for the masses to enjoy.

The only thing wrong with this album is that it ends far too soon. Bieber Fever requires a prescription dosage much higher than 37 minutes and 37 seconds of content. 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Parkland President to Resign



When Dr. Tom Ramage became President of Parkland College in 2008, he had big dreams, although most people didn't know just how big those dreams were. Unfortunately, Ramage has announced his resignation today, amid a flurry of rumors and speculation. Most of the rumors claim the reason for the resignation was that he was offered a new position with an organization that he just couldn't turn down. Ramage appears to have been offered the position of guitar player for the 60s pop band, the Monkees, replacing Michael Nesmith on their current world tour.

The Monkees, comprised of vocalist, Davy Jones, drummer and vocalist, Mickey Dolenz, bassist, Peter Tork and guitarist, Michael Nesmith, began as a TV program in the 1960's focusing on four young musicians living in a beach hut, struggling to pay rent and often landing themselves into trouble along the way. The series ran from 1966-1968 and has been in syndication most of the time since.

With the success of the show, which won two Emmy's in 1967, the four also began doing concert tours as the characters, learning to better play their instruments and singing happy songs from the program at a time when the United States seemed to be falling apart. Their hits included, "Day Dream Believer," "Last Train to Clarksville," "Pleasant Valley Sunday," and "Stepping Stone."

Eventually, as it seems all good bands do, they split, citing the ambiguous, personality differences. However, time seems to heal all wounds, because now they occasionally go on tour together, although Nesmith has had little to do with the reunions since his

A spokesperson for vocalist, Davy Jones, the groups most well known member, said, "We are thrilled to have Tom on board. We really think he can do this and be an asset to the band. He already knows all the songs and he is ready to take the stage, playing just like a Monkee."

Ramage, in preparation for the position, has already filed with the courts to officially change his name to 'Nez,' the

nickname Nesmith usually used, saying that he felt that it would help the fans to better accept him.

Students who would like to see the former president in action will get their chance on June 27, when the band is playing at the Assembly Hall in Urbana. In this rare, summer concert at The Hall, the band will play all of their popular songs along with a few covers and some of their individual accomplishments.

"I think it was a great decision on his part," commented student, Brian Johnson. "He has been a great president and I think he will make a great Monkee, too." We all wish him the very best.

Parkland announces new dress code policy

In an effort to create a more efficient learning environment, the Parkland College Board of Trustees has announced plans to instate a mandatory dress code for all students. Any students that are found in violation of this dress code will be immediately removed from the grounds. The first violation will only result in a oneday removal, but the second violation will result in a oneweek suspension. The third violation will result in a yearlong suspension from school grounds. If, after the one year suspension, a student decides to return and fails to follow the dress code a lifetime removal from the Parkland campus.

According to Mrs. Prudence Uptight, a member of the Board of Trustees, the decision to instate a dress code came about after seeing several students dressed inappropriately. "When I look around, I am disturbed that college students find it appropriate to wear their under garments to classes," said Uptight. "There is never an appropriate time to expose the straps of a brassiere or the waistline of a man's pantaloons." Uptight is well known throughout the Board of Trustees for her somewhat archaic views, but she is not the only member who has seen the need for a dress code.

Another member of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Eustice G. Lamoos, said that he saw the need for a dress code after witnessing "boys walkin' around with their gym shorts and sweat pants." Lamoos felt that this caused men to treat the classroom as their bed room, and feel more comfortable with falling asleep or behaving in, "uncivilized behavior." The rest of the Trustees believe that Uptight and Lamoos have the right idea with this into effect during the summer

The reason for beginning this in the summer semester, according to Uptight, is that "women will walk around with their shoulders exposed, wearing shorts and skirts that do not allow for modesty." Uptight has found herself particularly offended during the summer semesters, and she is excited to see an appropriately covered student body this summer. Lamoos, on the other hand, will be glad not to see men wearing "those trashy sleeveless t-shirts that show seams and armpit hair." Once again, the Board of Trustees backed up Lamoos and Uptight. All members have admitted their excitement in seeing the new regulations put into place.

As to what the new regulations are, some people may find it difficult to believe.

Students may not wear jeans, gym pants, or stretch pants of any kind.

Students must wear khaki or navy slacks. Women may wear skirts, khaki or navy, which hit no less than six inches below the knee.

Shorts are not permitted in any time of year.

Sandals of any kind are not allowed. Closed toed shoes must be worn, and these shoes must be clean. Sneakers are acceptable as long as they are neat and properly tied. Heels may exceed no more than 1.5".

Tank tops and T-shirts are not allowed. Students must wear collared shirts. Polo shirts are acceptable as are button-up shirts.

Sweat shirts are not allowed. Instead, students may wear button up sweaters (i.e. cardigans) or long sleeved under shirts.

When asked for their opinions, students seemed to have very strong feelings about this issue. One student, Frances Marie Antoinette, said that "[the new dress code] is not only reasonable, but it has been needed for a while. I don't believe that clothing that does not adhere to these standards should even be sold in stores. To be dressed less modestly or less properly than this and be seen in public is nothing short of a travesty." Another student, Wendell Greene, had views that were similar to Antoinette's. "I can't stand looking around and seeing men dressed in sweats and baggy shirts. I feel that it really lessens the prestige of our campus," he said.

However, some other students felt quite contrarily to Antoinette and Greene. Tayler Hart, a Parkland student, said "this is an infringement on my rights! I can't believe this! > Although Uptight Lamoos refused to comment on the student's responses, it was stated that they would look into these valid concerns. As things currently stand, however, come summer semester the new dress code will be enforced. The Board of Trustees wants to urge students to familiarize themselves with the new clothing policies. Students will need to adhere to these policies for the summer semester and any subsequent semesters. Fine dining to arrive at Parkland

Parkland College has heard student's complaints about the food service facilities and is doing something to improve the situation: both of the food service areas will be removed and a new restaurant will be opened instead. The new facility, Parkland Palisades, will be an actual restaurant, with a grand menu, silverware, cloth napkins and candles on the tables.

In a unique move, the restaurant will be run by the students of the hospitality club and will serve five star menu offerings. It will be opened in the area that is now Gullivers but will be enlarged to also include the study area behind it in the X wing. Mama Leones will be closed and a new health facility will be installed there, complete with bandages and ice bags.

The new restaurant will be overseen by hospitality club advisor Allison Cooper. All of the amenities necessary for a top notch restaurant will be included in the new design. The students who are in the food service branch of the hospitality program will each take a six week turn acting as manager, as well as performing other necessary functions, so that every student gets a chance to experience the necessary importance needed to be an effective restaurateur.

"This is a magnificent opportunity for these students to actually operate a five star restaurant," said Cooper. "We will finally be able to train them in the proper necessary techniques, creating an advantage

over students at other, lesser colleges. As at other comparable restaurants, the enticing cuisine will be experienced in a sequence of diminutive courses with each laying the foundation for the one follow-

Many students agree with Cooper, saying that it is a wonderful opportunity to receive the training that they would really like to obtain "Most positions in a five star kitchen require years of training before any real money is made," comments food service student, James Hendricks. "This will be something that will place us at the front of the line when we are looking for employment."

Not all students think a five star restaurant is appropriate at a community college, though. "Students are broke as it is and can't hardly afford to buy lunch at the school anyways," says nursing student, Latasha Kennedy. "I can't afford to eat at a five star restaurant with those chandeliers and candles and cloth napkins. I need to eat someplace cheap."

Menu offerings at the new restaurant will be less than what is normally charged at a place of such high standards, but it will be more than what was normally spent on lunch at the former facility.

"With a grand menu consisting of rich lobster enhanced with red curry and pomelo, sea scallop kissed with saffron, bison tenderloin with candied espresso and other better quality items, we can't be charging pennies. We are not talking dull steak and cold potatoes, here. We must be able to make a trace of a profit, even though, since it is student facilitated, we won't have to concern ourselves about menial things, such as wages. But the utilities need to be paid and therefore a profit is a must," stressed Coo-

Although the price for the grand menu will only run \$150 instead of \$195, we still need to charge prices that will enable us to pay for those things," continued Cooper. The new restaurant will

be enclosed rather than open and will seat close to 100 people at 35 tables. Computers, cell phones and book bags will not be allowed. Patrons will be expected to sign a waiver acknowledging that students are preparing the meals and that any illness is not the responsibility of the restaurant. Other new considerations will be the attire requirements for the restaurant which will include a mandated tie and jacket for the gentlemen and an appropriate dress demand for the ladies. Flip flops and pajamas will not be tolerated. In addition, as at most higher quality restaurants, wine will be served with dinner. In order to prevent drunkenness in class, the drink will be limited to 1 or 2 glasses served with the

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

It is a familiar image: the notorious "Baby Cha-Cha" from 1996, one of the earliest Internet memes. It was Baby Cha-Cha's extreme popularity that called to a young Daw in the mid-1990s. Without Baby Cha-Cha, Daw might not be here today, preparing to teach a new generation about his favorite pop-culture phenomenon.

Internet memes everywhere in this day and age. Within the last ten years or so they have become a massive part of contemporary pop-culture. And now, they'll be the subject of a new course, otherwise known as LOL 101, here at Parkland College beginning in 2012. "Internet memes are basically concepts that are spread via the World Wide Web," Daw explains. "That is the simplest definition, of course; in class we will devote much more time to describing this online phenomenon in more accurate detail."

Students will examine many now-classic Internet memes (including "Baby Cha-Cha," "Peanut Butter Jelly Time," "Pirates VS. Parkland College adopted a new mascot after a number of students have been seriously injured while attempting to handle the live Cobra mascot located in the library. Student Government President, John Williams said, "The practice of keeping a live mascot on campus is a tradition that just isn't practical anymore." On March 17th, the Student Government voted 7 - 3 in favor of changing the mascot all together, as well as removing the traditional practice of keeping a live mascot of any type on campus.

The Cobra has been a Parkland College icon since the founding of the school in 1967. 74% of students surveyed during the Fall 2010 semester agreed that the Cobra Mascot has been a great and powerful idol to represent Parkland's

Marcus managed to safely return him to his aquarium." With safety being the biggest






