
Stories as Knowledge

Loriene Roy's talk was such a wonderful way to bring our learning events for this class to a close. One thing that really amazed me was the range of purposes for which Roy (seemingly) effortlessly used her stories across her talk. I noticed that some would speak to her own development as she navigated different spaces and relationships, others spoke about where she'd come from, still others spoke about work to be done. She brought to

life networks of people and works through her stories and she gave faces to almost everyone she spoke about. Her stories allowed her to make personal connections, to demonstrate her motivations, to show her expertise and depth of experience, and to challenge the field of LIS as it changes and develops.
