### Five Years—-How Time Flies!

It is time again for the Drama Department to complete an intensive self-study, host a visitor's review, and respond to an accreditation report-all in the next twelve months. Our drama department received associate membership with the prestigious National Association of Schools of theatre in 1994. This agency has less than ninety colleges in the United States as accredited members. The 1994 recommendations encouraged us to define our program objectives into specific measurable goals based on: level enrollment projections; level or reduced University funding; and the reality of our entire department having not only to teach and produce plays but also to personally recruit students and raise funds through the JSU Foundation.

The previous self-study consisted of almost three hundred pages of information such as; administration, student and alumni surveys, fiscal and program planning, faculty credentials, library strengths, facility and equipment strengths, and community support. The study also required us to identify how we assessed our program strengths and weaknesses, and how we reacted to problems of any type.

In a nutshell, professional accreditation shows that every facet of our drama program is accountable and professionally recognized by the major theatre programs in the United States. As a testament to our continued program strengths, all of our graduates who have seriously pursued graduate training have been accepted at their desired graduate schools or professional academies. Upon graduation, they are all working in professional theatre extending from New York and Canada to Los Angeles, Santa Fe, and Florida.

The faculty and staff of our drama program are thankful of the support from the University and community. This support helped us achieve associate accreditation on our first attempt which was quite an accomplishment for such a small department. Some of our member institutions are Ohio State, Texas, Alabama, Indiana, Penn State, and Michigan. We have a lot to be proud of and thankful for. But, the next twelve months are going to be hectic as we address the more than twenty-five points of inquiry for re-accreditation. We ask for your continued support and patience.
