12. Project overview and projection for 2009-10

i. **Royal Literary Fund** The contract was renewed and the post taken up by Heather Dyer, who is a successful children's author. Heather was funded for two days a week by the RLF. The RLF academic Writer in residence continues to provide a valuable service to students and staff at UW. It will be continued throughout 2009-10 with Helena Attlee as the new Fellow.

ii Worcester Children's Storytelling Festival, June 25th and 26th 2009:

- The programme successfully continued in the extended form introduced last year. Furthermore an additional day was added to the event at the Worcester City Children's Library, plus a performance open to the public.
- There were no extra drama performances beyond the two days of the Festival this year.
- Circa 240 children attended on campus, plus teachers and helpers. Student involvement was strong from Drama Education and IT (in the creation of the website). It was a most successful event, with the planning and organisation running very smoothly. Thanks to

Steve Boffy who variously provided funding support and also to Widening Participation and IH&CA for their support.

It is hoped to continue with the Festival next year, but this is subject to funding support.

iii. Olympic Stories Project

Work for the project has now been completed. The team will now develop a website for the dissemination of the work which has already produced one publication and the basis of a book proposal. Funding for the production of the website will be provided from the Museums and Libraries Association. (£1,000 achieved for this Sept. 09 from MLA).

iv. The Centre was visited in August 2009 by Dr Sabah Asawi, a British Council sponsored post-doctoral researcher from Saudi Arabia. Dr Asawi will also return in November 2009. In total her visit to the centre will comprise circa 2 months.

v. Leverhulme Research Fellow: Dr Benjamin Lefebvre.

The Centre team was very pleased to have been successful in their bid for a Leverhulme Research Fellowship. The Fellowship is linked with Prof Mavis Reimer, Director from the University of Winnipeg and the Centre for Research in Youth, Texts and Culture. Prof Reimer will be visiting the Centre in spring 2010. A programme of research and events is planned for the year engaging with colleagues in the Centre, IH&CA and more widely in the University and externally. Dr. Lefebvre's research is on nationalisms, culture, media and texts for children.

vi. Obesity project.

We were very pleased to have been successful with a bid for a UW research studentship. Kate Flynne has been appointed and will work on obesity, children's literature and the media. Dr Barbar Mitra and Penney Upton comprise the supervisory team with JAW as DoS. Although we were not successful for the research network bid, we will continue collaboration with Dr Derek Peters, Prof Al-Nakeeb and other colleagues to further this work.

vii. Project planning with the International Youth Library, Munich (IYL).

JAW met with Dr Christiane Raabe, Director of the International Youth Library in Munich during the IRSCL conference in Frankfurt, August 2009. JAW was asked to act as a consultant to bring together a core group of key academics in Europe to develop research projects in association with the IYL. Those invited have agreed to participate in this collaborative development. In addition to Dr Raabe and JAW the core group comprise:

- Prof Hans-Heino Ewers, Director of the Instituts fuer Jugendbuchforschung Johann Wolfgang Goethe-Universitaet, Frankfurt, Germany.
- Dr Nina Christensen, Director of the Danish Centre for Research in Children's literature, Copenhagen, Denmark.
- Prof Maria Nikolajeva, Faculty of Education, University of Cambridge
- Prof Kimberley Reynolds, University of Newcastle.

The group will meet in spring 2010 either in Munich or Worcester to plan:

- a summer school for research students and postdoctoral researchers in children's literature to be held at the IYL
- a research training programme for research students and postdoctoral researchers in children's literature to be held initially at the IYL and then to circulate round the collaborating institutions
- an international research project which will use the resources of the IYL and the expertise of the core group plus other relevant parties

Dr Raabe will seek funding to support these activities.

viii. The Children's Literature Research Centre, University of Nicosia, Cyprus.

JAW met with Dr Petros Panaou, Director of the Children's Literature Research Centre, University of Nicosia, at ChLA and IRSCL.

A research visit to the Centre in Cyprus is planned for Centre team members to discuss potential research development and collaboration. This would be to develop European funded projects.

The Centre was also invited to join the second phase of the European funded research project on picture books. If the bid to be made in Sept. 2009 by Dr Panaou is successful, then there would be funding to employ a researcher at UW to carry out the work.

ix. Masters Classes in Children's Literature: Australian collaboration.

Prof Kerry Mallan, Queensland University of Technology, Brisbane, invited JAW and the Centre team to collaborate in the delivery of Masters classes in children's literature and research development. In the autumn of 2009, Prof Mallan is applying to the Australian Academy of the Humanities (AAH) for funding support. The AAH are keen for young researchers to travel and gain experience outside Australia. The project would bring a group of young Australian researchers, under Prof Mallan's guidance, to engage in a programme of Master classes at UW and to meet with other researchers and experts in the UK.

x. Faculty of Education Research Group; University of Cambridge.

In November 2009 JAW will meet with the interdisciplinary research group based in the Faculty of Education University of Cambridge which is headed by Prof Maria Nikolajeva, to discuss potential collaborative research developments. There are already cognate areas of interest for example in the environment.

xi. JAW has been invited to be a keynote speaker at the Australasian Children's Literature Association for Research congress, Wollongong in June 2010, the subject of the conference is 'Politics and Children's Literature'.

xii. JAW has been invited as a visiting speaker to the University of Auckland, New Zealand, summer 2010 to give seminars and lectures on postgraduate research training.

JAW was an invited speaker at the Beyond Borders International Symposium on Picture books, University of Glasgow, Sept 2009. She was also asked to join the advisory group to set up an international research network in this area. There are already researchers from S. and N. America, Australia, Canada, across Europe, and the UK involved.

The Centre team is planning to run a public seminar series during 2009-10 as there is now some funding in the Centre budget which would support a modest series of seminars.
