He will also discuss internship opportunities. He will be discussing the role mediation plays at the federal level. For any student interested in mediation as a career or mediation with federal goverment, this is a must-see presentation.

Mr. Delgado is currently the Director, Mediation Services for the East Region of the Federal Mediation & Conciliation Service. As such, he supervises mediators in nine states and parts of two others in the southeastern part of the country. He has been with the Federal Mediation & Conciliation Service (FMCS) since October of 1984. Between October 1984 and May 1993, he was stationed in the Chicago District Office. He transferred to the Orlando field office in March of 1993. In 1994 he was asked to become the training coordinator for the Southern Region, wherein he worked with mediators in developing and presenting various training program to the labor-management community. He was appointed Director of Mediation Services for the Southern Region of FMCS in January of 1996. Mr. Delgado served as Acting Regional Director of the Southern Region from January 1998 to December 1998 overseeing the regional activities while at the same time, maintaining the Director of Mediation Services responsibilities.
