




















## findings

- CONTRIBUTES TO RESEARCH ON POWER RELATIONS
  BETWEEN COMMUNITY-BASED AND DOMINANT ARCHIVES
- CAN ILLUMINATE HOW COMMUNITY ARCHIVES NAVIGATE INSTITUTIONAL CO-OPTATION, PATRONIZATION, AND INEQUITABLE ACCESS TO RESOURCES
- TOWARDS A "A POLITICS OF REDISTRIBUTION" (SHEFFIELD)
