We the People

insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article I

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.
Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature of the State for which they are appointed, who shall, when assembled, constitute a Body, which shall be styled the Senate of the United States.

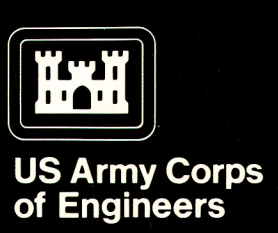
United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article II

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and until he shall have been elected for a second Term; and he shall be ineligible for a third Term.
Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, of the Militia of the several States, and of such Militia as may be organized pursuant to the Laws of the United States; he may grant Reprieves and Pardons for all Offences against the United States, except Treason, Felony, and Breach of the Peace; he shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint and dismiss Ambassadors, Ministers, Consuls, Judges, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are in his Power; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers.
Section 3. The President shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to grant Reprieves and Pardons for all Offences against the United States, except Treason, Felony, and Breach of the Peace; he shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur; he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint and dismiss Ambassadors, Ministers, Consuls, Judges, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are in his Power; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers.
