THEMATIC ANALYSIS

"... a systematic approach to the analysis of qualitative data that involves identifying themes or patterns of cultural meaning; coding and classifying data, usually textual, according to themes; and interpreting the resulting thematic structures by seeking commonalities, relationships, overarching patterns, theoretical constructs, or explanatory principles" (Lapadat 2010, p. 926).

Braun & Clarke (2006) – visualisation + direct quotes

RQs:

- what are the main trends in scholarship on women and networking?
- what research gap can be identified in the literature on women and networking?





ONE IMPORTANT FINDING: WOMEN'S BOOK CLUBS



CONCLUSION AND ACTION

- Women face barriers and that networking can be seen as one of the barriers women face
- Networking in itself presents a barrier for women due to also social expectation of women in regards to looking after families and exclusions they face due to persistent character of old boys clubs.
- Consistently present across all analysed decades
- Women prefer horizontal networking (bonding, forming relationships) and not vertical/hierarchical (networking with people in power masculinity!)
