Facts & Stats about VCU and RVA

- Public Urban Research University
- Established in 1838
- Total Student Enrollment: **31,288**
- Total Full-time Faculty: 2,170
- Total Staff: 20,241
- 3 primary campuses: the **Monroe Park Campus** and the **Medical College of Virginia Campus** are located in Richmond and the **Doha Campus in Qatar**
- Population of the City of Richmond (RVA): 211,000
- Greater Richmond Area Population: 1.2 Million

Case Study 1

Conversational Spanish for First Responders; Firefighters and Police



Since 2009, VCU has served 335 First Responders with Richmond Fire and VCU Police

VCU Police



- Joint Force of Richmond City Police Department and VCU
- On-campus Dispatch Center and Accredited Training Academy
- Over 200 security Personnel
- 55 Police Officers on regular patrol



Activity

- Gather in groups of 4-6 participants
- Elect someone to be a 'Citizen in Need of Help' who speaks Spanish or is comfortable reading in Spanish
- The remaining group members will be 'First Responders', i.e. Firefighters and Police, on the job
- Once the 'Citizen in Need of Help' receives a card, he or she will read to the group, then the group, listening as First Responders, should respond accordingly

Case Study 2

Conversational Spanish for Nonprofits

- Est. 1995: Especially for Nonprofits
- Mission: To provide affordable, high quality professional and leadership development to the nonprofit sector of greater Richmond
- · Levels offered: Spanish I and Spanish II
- Over 275 participants since Fall 2008
- Organizations represented include Central Virginia
 FeedMore, United Methodist Family Services, Richmond
 Public Schools, ChildSavers, Community Idea Stations,
 HomeAgain Shelter...
- Each course: 10 weeks, 1 hour per week
- Sliding scale pricing











"I [enrolled in NLP's Spanish] classes because my [job] has taken me into Hispanic communities in South Richmond."

"The class has helped me with the kinds of 'real world phrasing' necessary when speaking in a real world context."


"I have learned that many in the Hispanic community feel that they are without a voice when it comes to government processes."

Case Study 3 Spanish for Healthcare Professionals

In 2011, conjoined twins, Maria and Teresa Tapia of the Dominican Republic, helped VCU further understand the need for cultural engagement and language development.

Since 2008, over 200 nurses, doctors, and other healthcare professionals have been served.

Additional Community Spanish Programs and Partnerships

Since Fall 2007

- -Just under 1,000 VCU and VCUHS Faculty and Staff taught using Tuition Waiver or departmental funds in open enrollment Conversational Spanish classes
- -Almost 200 open enrollment Spanish classes offered

-Other Partnerships have included

Local Businesses, Banks, Public School Systems, Law Firms, and other Non-profits at the organizational level, e.g. ACLU of Virginia





American Sign Language
