Research in South Africa

* Cervical Cancer Prevention, Cape Town (R25, R03)

 Community Engaged Research, Kenneth Gardens, Durban (Global Education Office, International Partnership Award)

Approach

- Local stakeholders assisted in shaping the research questions
- * Established a Community Advisory Board
- * Partnership with CANSA
- * Partnership with the Department of Education
- * Hired local management staff
- Trained community members as community researchers
- * Conducted formative research
- Conducted focus groups

Research Question

 Explore the the mother-daughter relationship and the feasibility of using the adolescent daughter to provide her mother with cancer screening information

Research

- * Trained 7 community researchers
- * 2 academic researchers from South Africa
- * 2 academic researchers from the US
- * Project Coordinator (CG)
- * Project Supervisor (DVS)
- Mother-daughter semi-structured interviews (N=314)
- Transcription and Qualitative data analysis in South Africa

Building Global Bridges Community-engaged research

- * Partnership with University of KwaZulu Natal, Durban
- * Addressed local need
- Local partners part of the planning/grant process
- * VCU-UKZN student teams
- * VCU-UKZN academic partnership



Research Questions

* How do residents of Kenneth Gardens perceive the health of their community?

* What are the benefits and barriers to utilizing services through a local health clinic?



Core Research Components Completed

- * Youth Photo voice (N=14)
- Semi-structured interviews of elders and clinic users (N=28)
- * 6 VCU students + photographer and 5 UKZN students







Community-engaged Outcomes

- * Data dissemination in Kenneth Gardens and to key stakeholders
- Building capacity (learners and students)
- * Co-learning
- * Student-led publication
- * VCU-UKZN peer-reviewed publication
- Published photo book of research
- * Conference presentations
- * Video documentary won awards
- * Secured resources for the Kenneth Gardens Clinic

How does Building Global Bridges create stronger student researchers?

- * Active learning
 - * Real-world experience
 - * Apply and cultivate skills learned in the classroom
 - * Learn skills on the ground that cannot be taught in class
 - * Gain experience in new research methodologies (Photo Voice)
- * Introduces the field of research as a career option
 - Facilitates transition from student to researcher
- * Orientation into the international research and public health community
 - * Opportunities to meet experts in the field
 - * Establish new contacts for potential future collaborations

How does Building Global Bridges develop culturally competent researchers?

- * Knowledge-building across many contexts
 - * cross-cultural learning
 - * interdisciplinary learning
 - inter-institutional learning
- * Builds cross-cultural relationships and networks

 Enhanced insights to differences in health care service delivery

How does Building Global Bridges build commitment to scholarship?


- * Exposure to different types of research and methodologies
 - * Community-engaged research as a framework

- Seeing research translated to tangible results can be a rewarding experience
 - * Collaboration with community partners
- * Develops student leaders in the research context

 - * Solidifies research interests
 - * Invaluable cross-cultural, international collaborations and co-learning
