DIRECTOR'S SUMMARY OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Year 2002-2003

The major goals of the Women's Studies Center for 2002-2003 included: (a) enhancing the excellence of the undergraduate program and expanding graduate course offerings, (b) providing leadership on women's issues in the region through education and social and cultural programs, and (c) generating and promoting scholarship and creative work in Women's Studies. The goals and highlights of the accomplishments in each area are presented below.

A complete report of the activities of the Women's Studies Center for the period June 2002 to May 2003 is contained in the following pages, including: (1) a summary of the undergraduate programs, including enrollments for the undergraduate B.A. and Certificate programs and other undergraduate student activities and accomplishments, (2) advancement activities of the WSC, and (3) the achievements of the Women's Studies faculty.

GOAL 1: To enhance the excellence of the undergraduate program and to expand graduate course offerings.

Accomplishments:

- Course offerings included 74 undergraduate and 15 graduate courses
- Student enrollment increased from 2,495 (2001-02) to 2,578 (2002-2003)
- Students majoring in Women's Studies increased from 58 to 68
- Students earning a Certificate increased from 62 to 82
- Graduated 18 students with a B.A. in Women's Studies (up from 9 in 2001-2002)
- Graduated 17 students with a Women's Studies Certificate (up from 14 in 2001-2002)
- Awarded the Gordon Scholarship, four Achievement Awards, and two Outstanding Alumna awards
- Sponsored two study abroad programs in Women's Studies (Spain and Eastern Europe)
- Developed a teaching laboratory and film library for student use
- Began offering an internship experience to undergraduates; four students participated
- Sponsored the newly founded Women's Studies Student Association (40 members)
- Sponsored the second Women's Studies Student Conference (80 attended)
- Published <u>Making Waves</u>, Vol. 1, based on contributions to the first WS Student Conference (80 pages)
- Sponsored travel to professional conferences for six students with donations from the Friends of Women's Studies
- Tracked the accomplishments of more than 30 alumni

GOAL 2: To provide leadership on women's issues in the region through education and social and cultural programs.

Accomplishments:

- Continued the Women of Distinction Series for the second year. Renowned scholars were featured at three events held at Books and Books, The Wolfsonian-FIU, and the Kovens Conference Center; over 300 people attended
- Received \$3,500 in donations from Year 2 of the Friends of Women's Studies fundraising campaign
- Solicited donors for the Elaine Gordon Scholarship Endowment in Women's Studies (Total to date = \$37,000)
- Published a FIU Women Faculty Book Club bookmark listing 100 Excellent Books by Women that was distributed to local book stores; set up a corresponding website with monthly book recommendations at www.books.fiu.edu
- Participated in activities of the Miami-Dade Women's Chamber of Commerce, the City of Miami Commission on the Status of Women, and the Women's Fund

GOAL 3: To generate and promote scholarship and creative work in Women's Studies.

Accomplishments:

- Hired a Postdoctoral Fellow of Women's Studies and History (Freeman) for 2002-03
- Hosted or cosponsored 39 events for the Women's Studies Speakers' Series
- Developed ties with Women's Studies programs in Colombia, Japan, Lithuania, Spain, • and South Africa
- Faculty accomplishments of 26 faculty who reported publications, performances, and grants related to women's and gender issues included the following: 2 edited books; 8 book chapters published or in press; 13 journal articles published or in press; 5 published stories; 2 performances; 15 published book reviews; 8 grants; 26 conference presentations; and representation on 7 editorial boards and 2 grant review panels.
- The WSC nominated to faculty members for awards (FIU Research and Service)
- Eight faculty were invited speakers at 38 events on topics concerning women and gender
- Eight faculty were recognized by local or national groups for their contribution to women's issues
- The WSC Director (Rose) was interviewed by and quoted in the New York Times, the . Miami Herald, and some local and national radio and television stations

The Women's Studies Center made significant gains during 2002-2003 in terms of enriching the undergraduate program, building the number of graduate courses available, promoting Women's Studies' reputation in the region, and facilitating academic research on women that is nationally and internationally recognized. Our success reflects the sustained commitment of the faculty, students, staff, and friends of Women's Studies.





Elaine Gordon Scholarship Endowment

The Elaine Gordon Scholarship Endowment was established in 1999 to honor the life and work of Elaine Gordon (1931-2000). Ms. Gordon was a pioneering feminist elected to the Florida House in 1972 who was a leading advocate on issues involving health care, mental health, children and women's reproductive rights. In 1982, she was one of the first six women inducted into the Florida Women's Hall of Fame in Tallahasee. After retiring from the legislature in 1994, Ms. Gordon worked for FIU as an Assistant Vice President until 1999.

More than \$37,000 has been donated to the endowment by 125 donors. Their generous contribution makes it possible for one Women's Studies student to receive a scholarship each year. Recent donors are listed below.
