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New Girls' Dormitory Completed At Gardner-Webb; Cost \$240,000 News Clipping

New Dorm Finished

BOILING SPRINGS — Exactly one year elapsed between moving of the first and last spades of earth in construction of the new dormitory at Gardner-Webb College.

The new structure, capable of housing 100 girls and costing \$240,000, was completed Tuesday. Portions of the building were occupied Sept. 25, but the ground floor and outside details were finished later. A skeleton crew of "clean-up"

workmen Tuesday removed construction debris from the grounds and the architects inspected and accepted the building for the college. The workmen's shovels were reminiscent of the scene a year ago when other shovels were used to break ground for the structure.

It was one year ago that Senator Sam J. Ervin, Jr. spoke at groundbreaking ceremonies for the new dormitory. Spades of earth were turned by Dr. Zeno Wall, the Rev. John R. Cantrell, the Rev. J. L. Jenkins, and Horace Easom, former presidents of the college.

The dormitory is now occupied by 80 girls on the second and third floors. Four women teachers are on the ground floor, and several guest rooms are also available there. By next year the building is expected to be fully occupied.

The dormitory, which doubles Gardner - Webb's facilities for boarding girls, is completely modern in every detail. Reading rooms, storage and laundry space, and tiled baths with showers and tubs are provided on each floor. On the first floor is a spacious parlor, office for the dean of women, kitchenette, guest rooms, and the dean's apartment.

Other features about the structure include an incinerator, individual room communications system, locally controlled steam heat, and fireproof construction. The building faces the central campus, with two 45 degree angles in its
