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



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

However, we realize the amount of work and hardships which have gone into making our present graduation one which has equipped us with an education which will surely help make us better leaders in the Textile Industry. Therefore, we should like to dedicate the 1959 Analysis to the many people who were influential in molding the Philadelphia Textile Institute into its high position today and expecially to Mr. Theodore Corson Search.


Mr. Search became impressed with an urgent need for procuring technical education in connection with the textile industry. Therefore, through his initiative he established the Philadelphia Textile Association in 1882. Unfortunately, this association failed to raise enough capital to make textile education a reality, but Mr. Search believing in the need for trained personnel continued his work and through his untiring efforts, the first classes were held on a fall evening in 1884.


In essence Mr. Search was the pioneer and founder of Textile education in America. Later textile schools initiated his ideas, and he was always ready to help these New England and Southern schools through their initial years.

1889 found Mr. Search as President of the Pennsylvania Museum and School of Industrial Art, and he remained in this capacity until his death in 1920. He never stopped working for the improvement of this field of education in which he was so influential in starting, and today the entire Textile Industry in America is benefiting from his strong belief and hard work.


It is difficult as I write this to know what to say to the Class of 1959. What will world conditions be by the day of your graduation?


The tenseness of our times, the complexities of our domestic and international problems make the old cliches of greetings and advice seem worse than time worn. They seem useless.








Student Products




Colorimetry—Laboratory experiments are designed to encompass many of the problems encountered in practical color measurement.

A laboratory lecture on the principles of the Warner and Swasey Sulzer Weaving Machine.






Physical Testing laboratory is equipped with instruments to measure strength, abrasive resistance, water and air permeability and other essential tests.



Bertrand W. Hayward, President of Philadelphia Textile Institute since 1954, was born in Bridgewater, Mass. He received a B.S., from Colby College; an M.A., from Columbia University; and an LL.D., from Colby College and Philadelphia College of Osteopathy. (honorary) Before coming to PTI as Director in 1947, Dr. Hayward served as principal of various high schools and j Lecturer at Harvard Graduate School and the University of Connecticut. As a writer in industrial and educational journals, his articles have been published in the Harvard Educational Review, English Journal, Textile Engineer, America's Textile Reporter and many others. He is a member of Alpha Tau Omega, Kappa Phi Kappa, Phi Delta Kappa and Phi Psi (honorary). #### CROWFOOT SOCIETY









T. F. set their ideals high, stressing three basic aims.


(1) To promote social and racial understanding with the institute and the Textile industry.




With the entire team back for next years court action, and the opening of P.T.I.'s new gym, the 1959-60 season looks bright indeed.
