UNDERSTANDING--MAIN INGREDIENT FOR EDUCATION



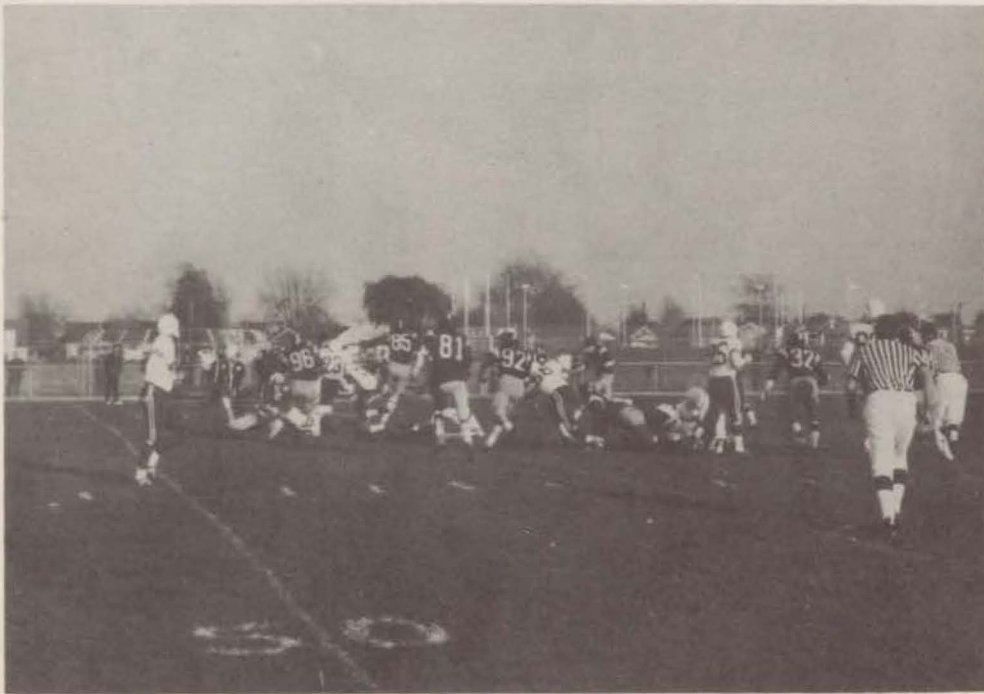

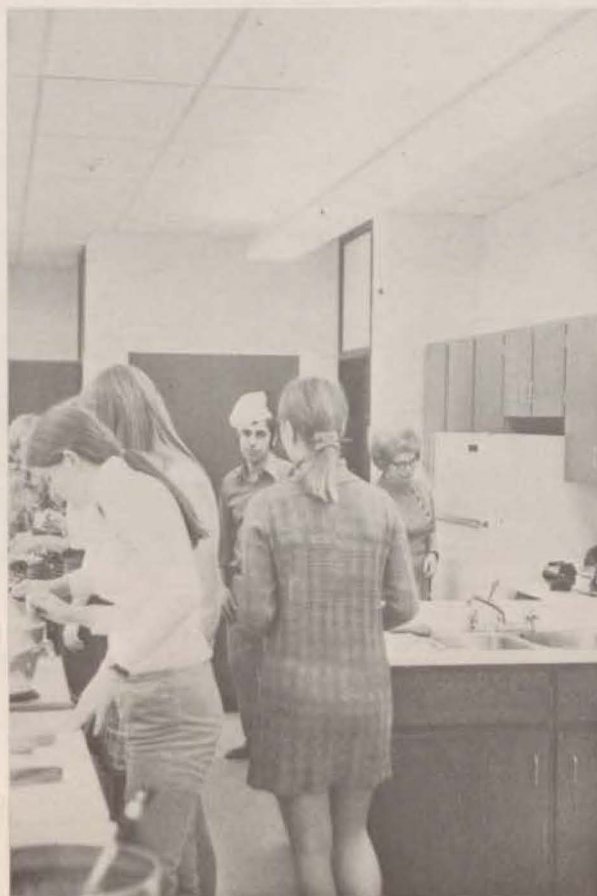




STUDENT PARTICIPATION LEADS TO SUCCESS

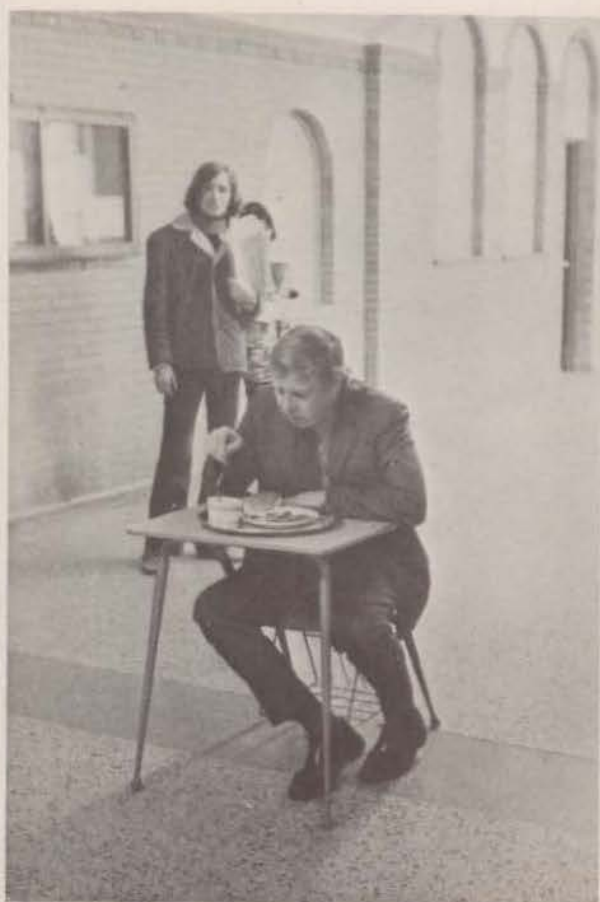


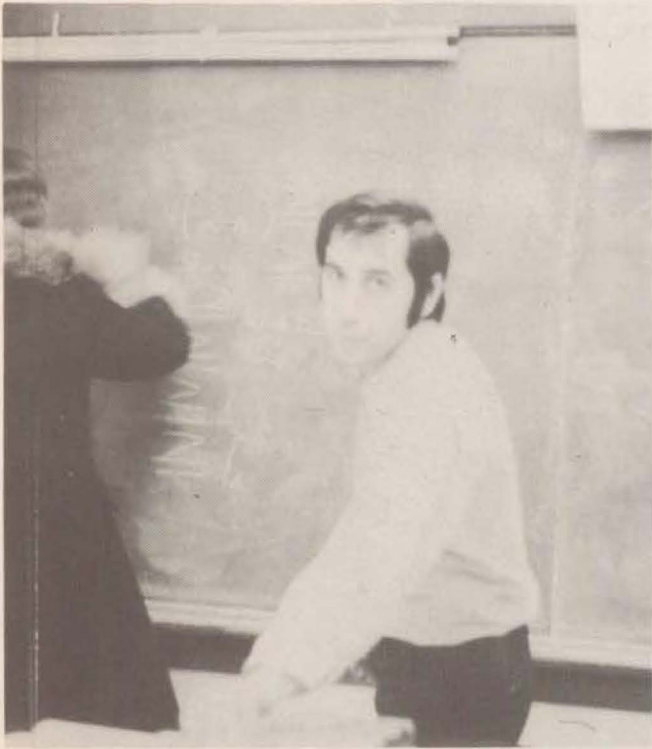


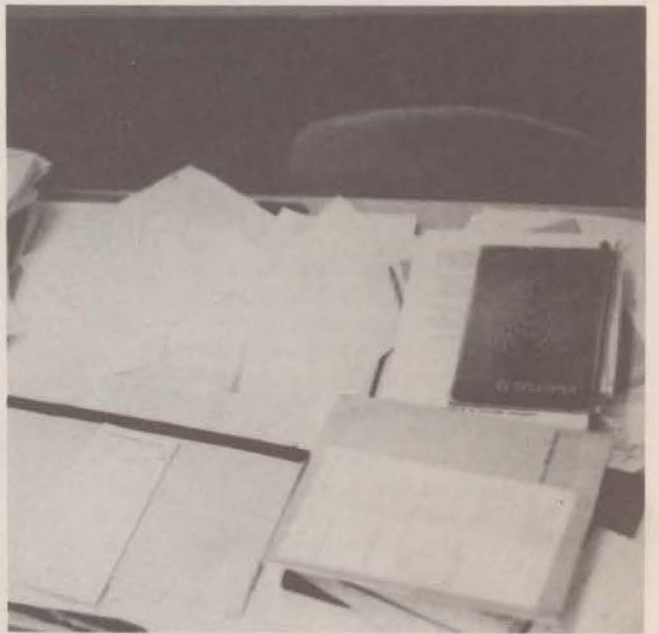
KENNEDY CONCERNED WITH COMMUNITY AFFAIRS

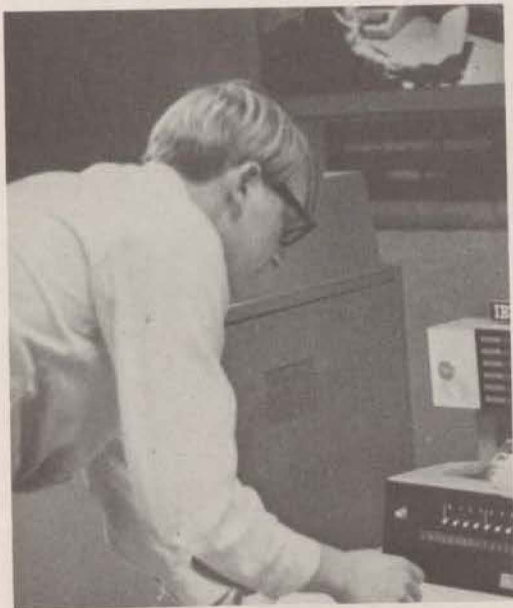

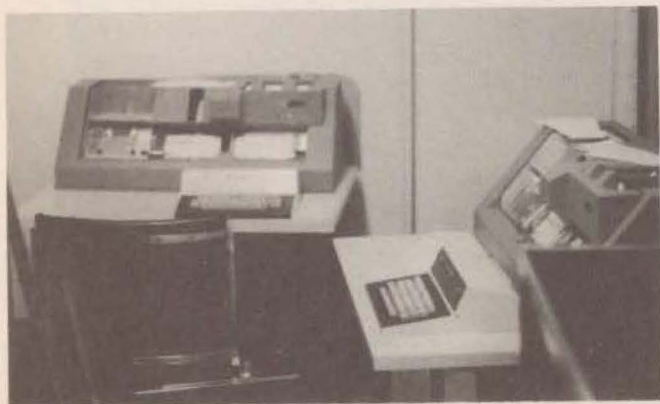

Still further there are the annual math contests for both Junior and Senior students. Kennedy students have done fairly well in these contests since they first entered them a few years back.

For students who are not inclined towards Mathematics, Members of the math department spend long hours before and after school trying to help them understand mathematics better.

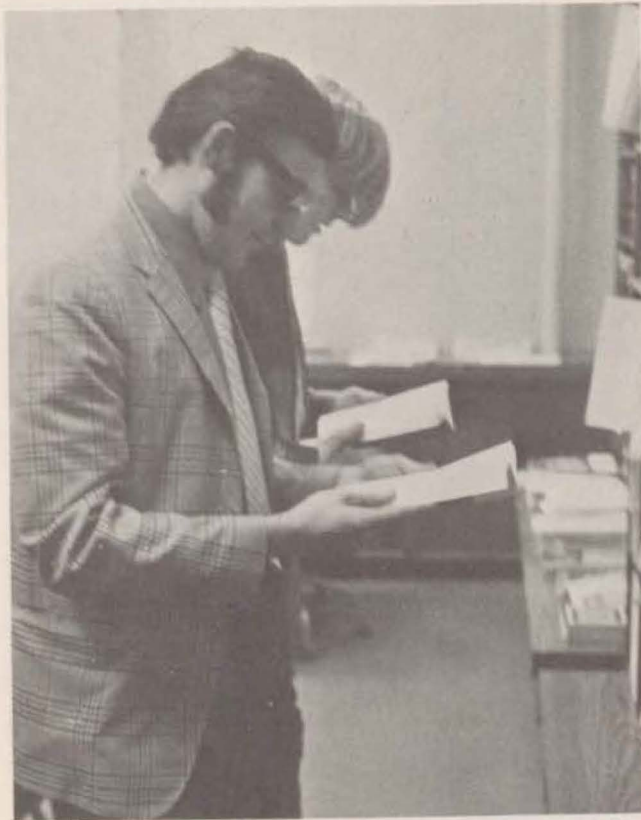

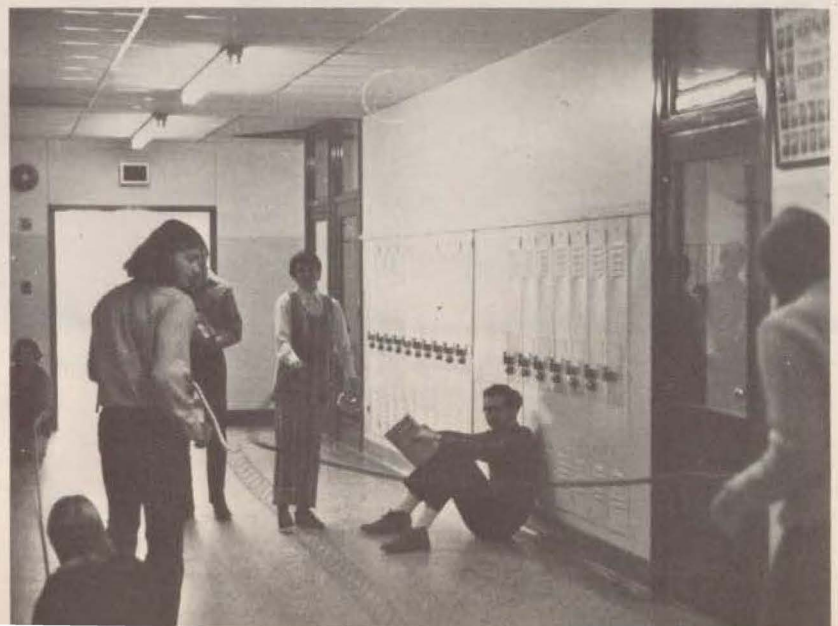
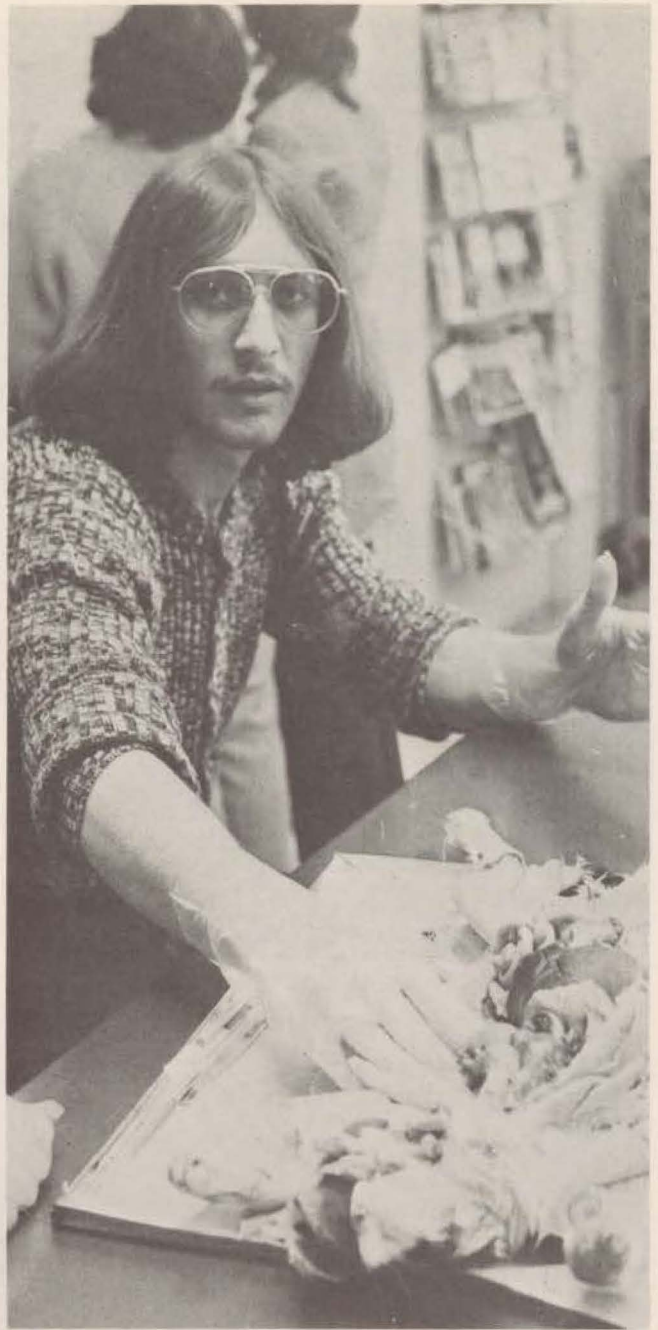


EXPERIMENTS PROVIDE INTEREST FOR SCIENCE STUDENTS

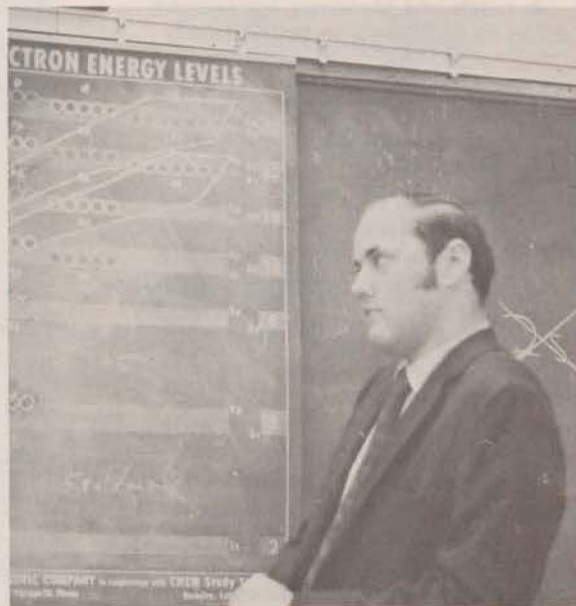
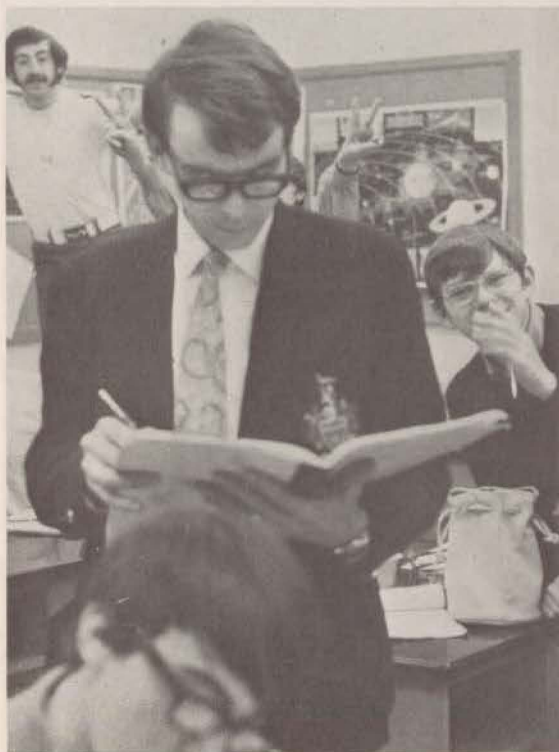
However, in spite of all jokes, many students take an active interest in the various sciences offered at K.C.I. and are guided towards interesting careers after high school.

HOME ECONOMICS

"Understanding" is the key to successful living in today's world as life becomes increasingly involved and complicated. The course in Home Economics is designed to promote a better understanding of many aspects of modern life.

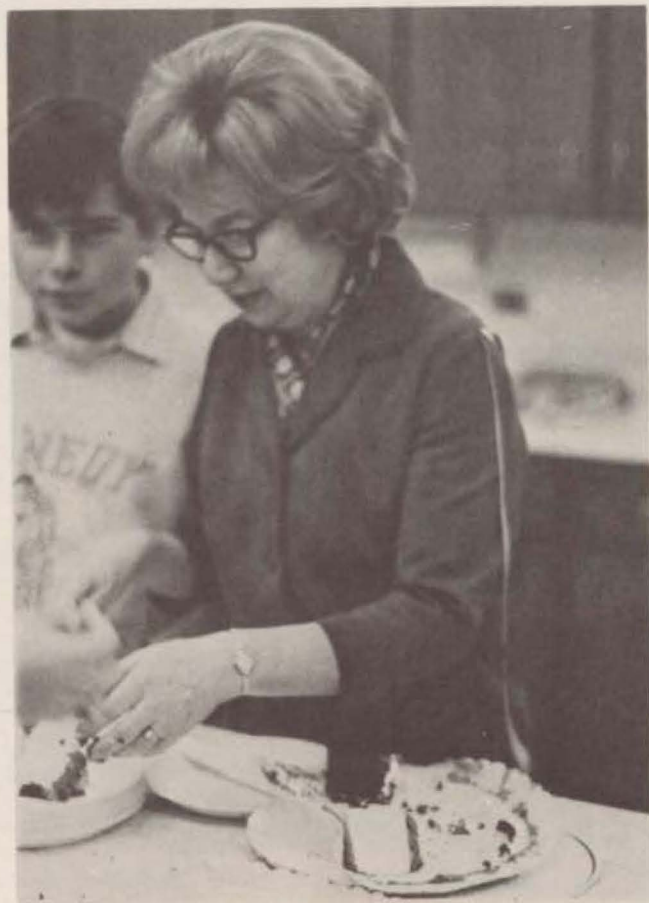
We begin with the individual, helping her to understand herself, her needs and problems, her creative talents and her ability to contribute to happy family living.

Secondly, we study the family unit. We discover ways of providing a well-organized, harmonious and attractive environment for all members of the family. This includes a study of housing and home decorating, nutrition and meal preparation, child care and care of the aged, consumer education and money management. It also includes a study of family conflicts, how they may be resolved and how they may be kept at a minimum.

Thirdly, we study the community in which we live. This provides an insight into the social customs of various ethnic groups, as well as an understanding of how our present life style evolved over the years.

The fourth unit involves the study of world problems such as pollution and over-population, food problems in underdeveloped countries and a comparison of living conditions in rich and poor countries.

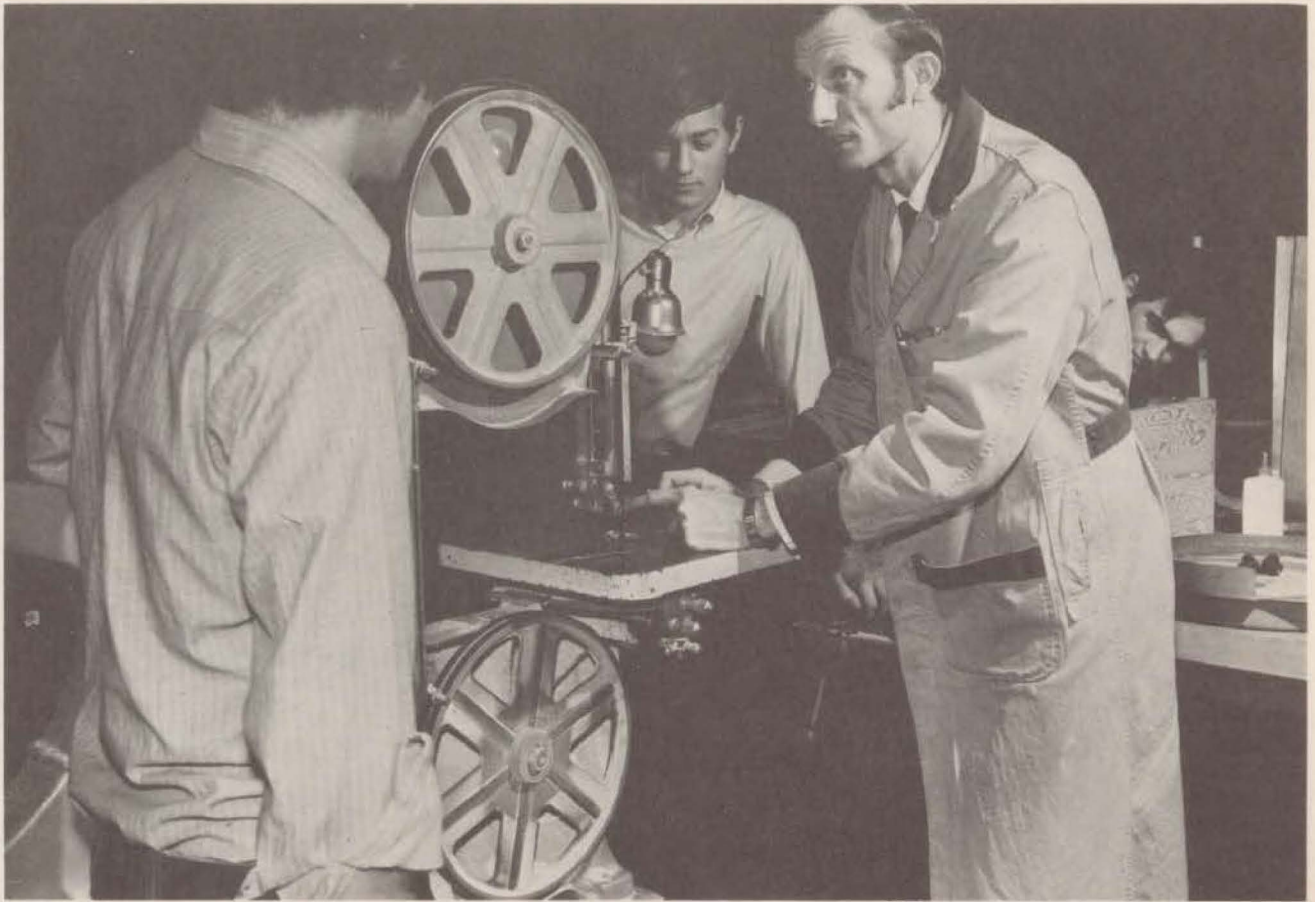

SOLVING INDUSTRIAL ARTS PROBLEMS PROVIDES VALUABLE LESSONS



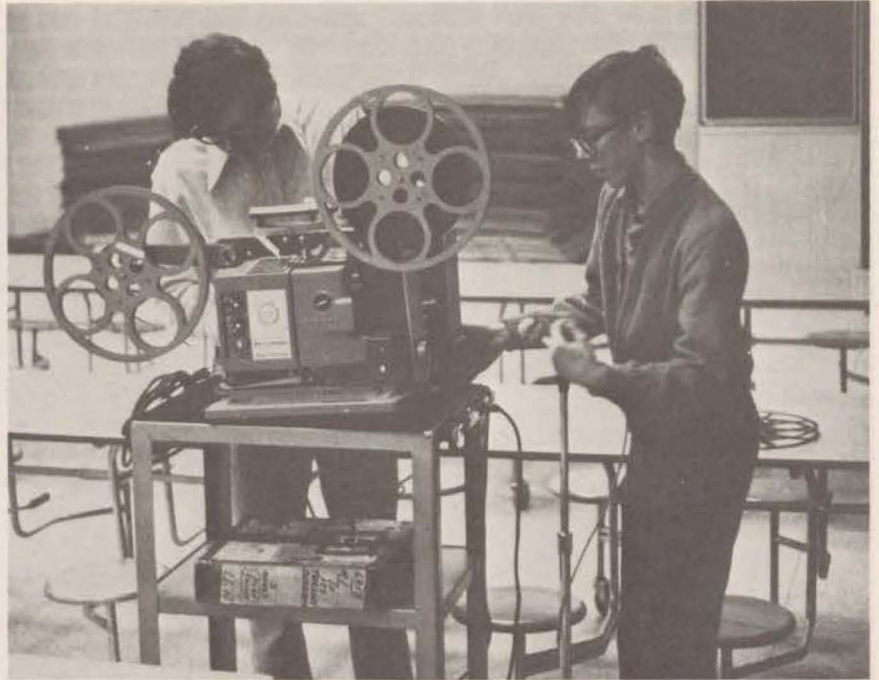
Understanding the students who take industrial arts can be a challenge especially when their previous experience in shop is so varied. If the student understands the processes used to shape various materials using different methods, he will be better equipped to solve other problems he may encounter.

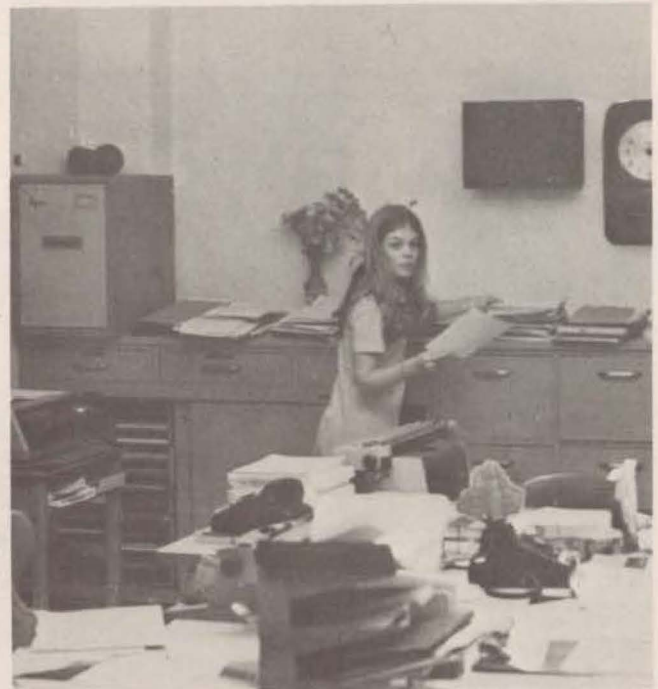

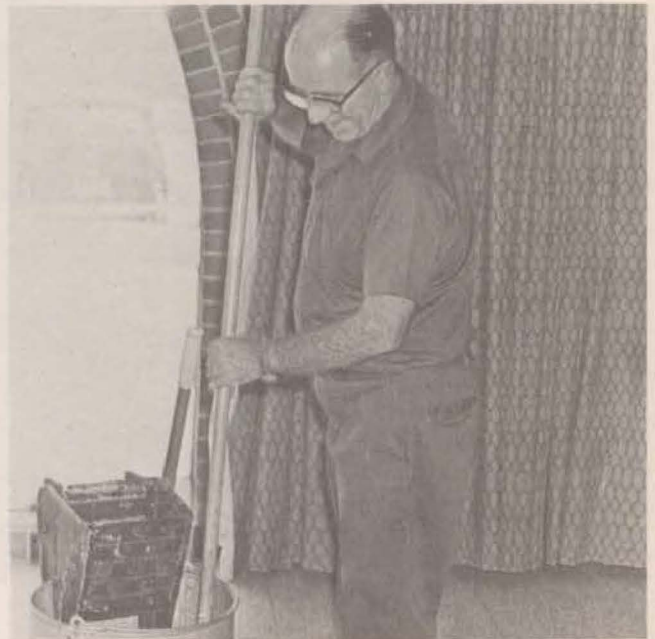
SECRETARIES SOLVE PROBLEMS QUICKLY, EFFICIENTLY

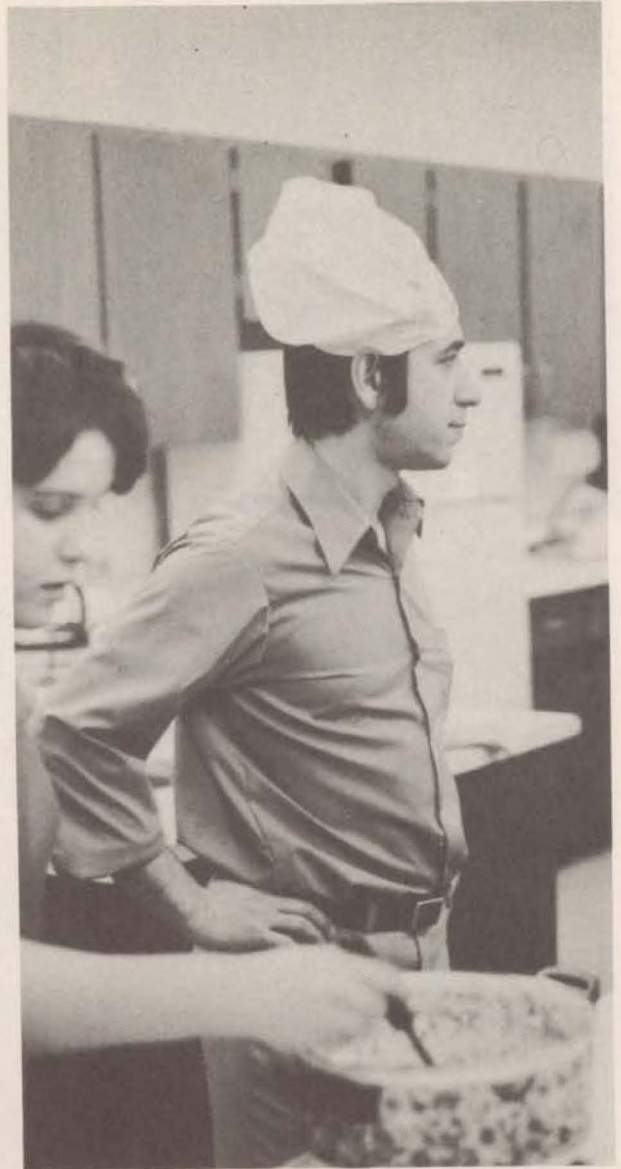

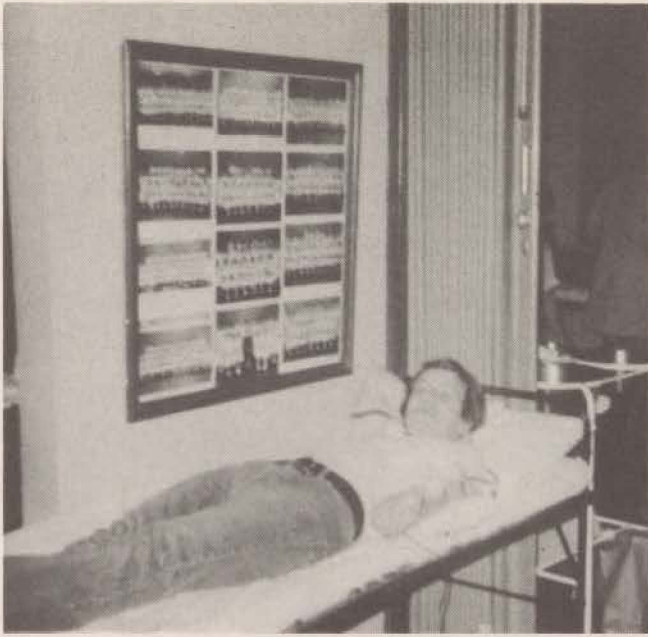


RED CROSS CONTRIBUTES TO HARMONY

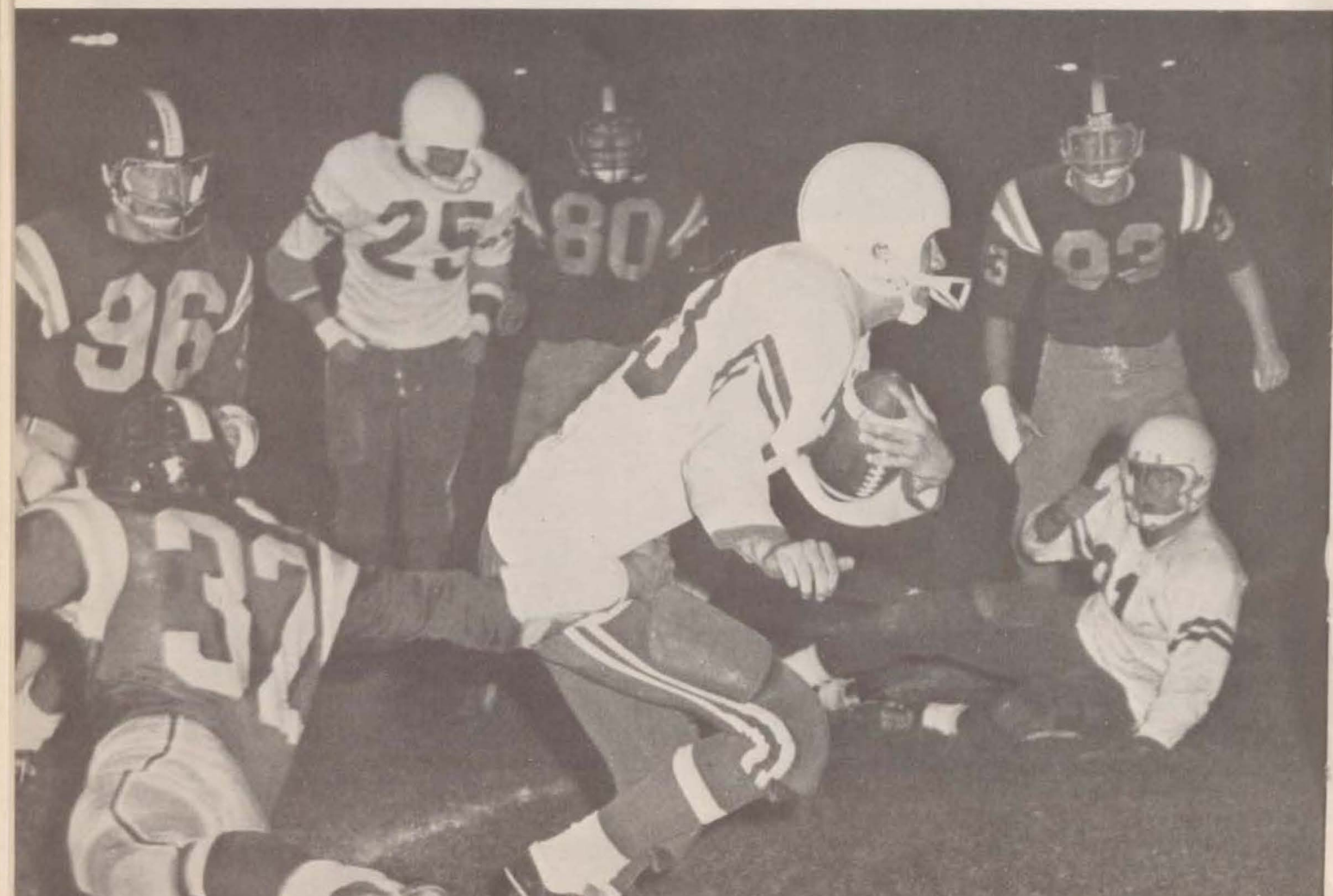
DESPITE TROUBLED WATERS CLIPPERS SAIL PROUDLY

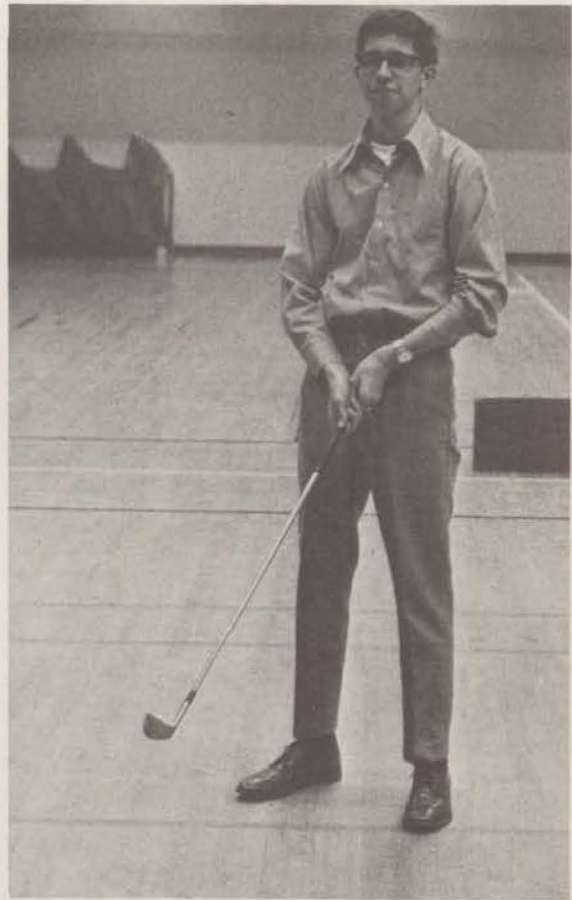

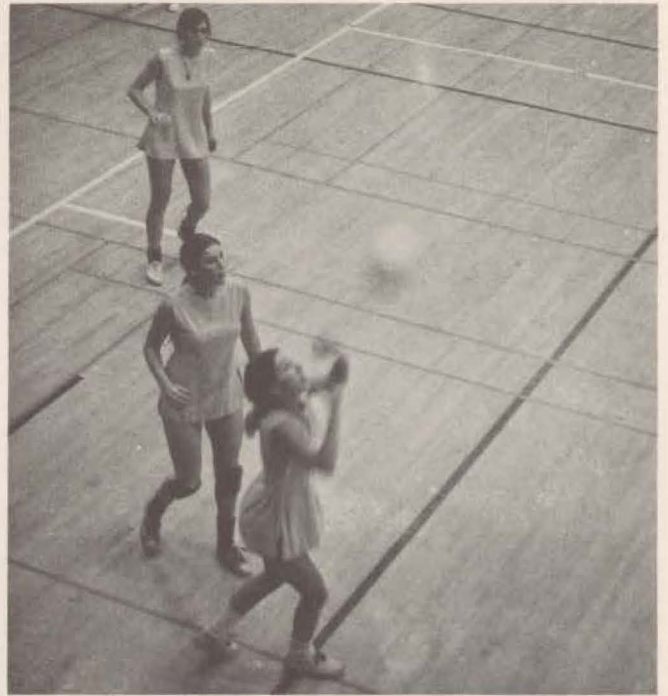

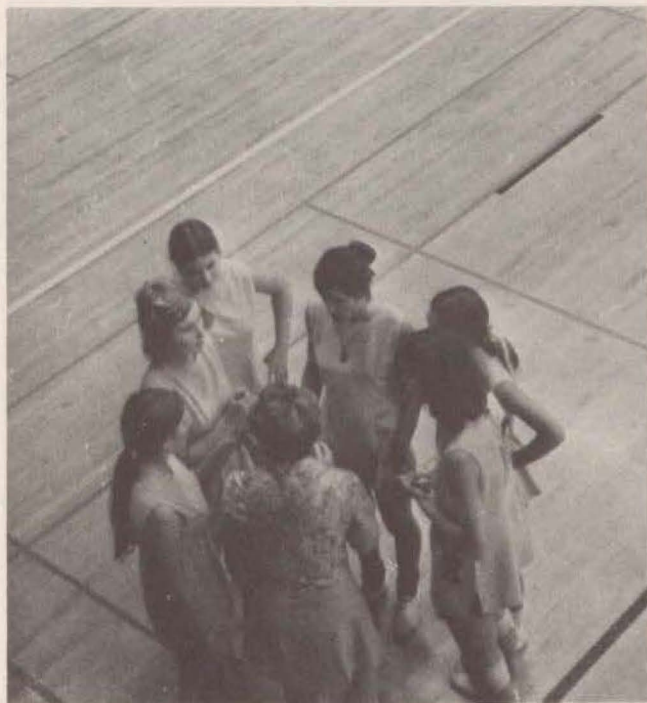

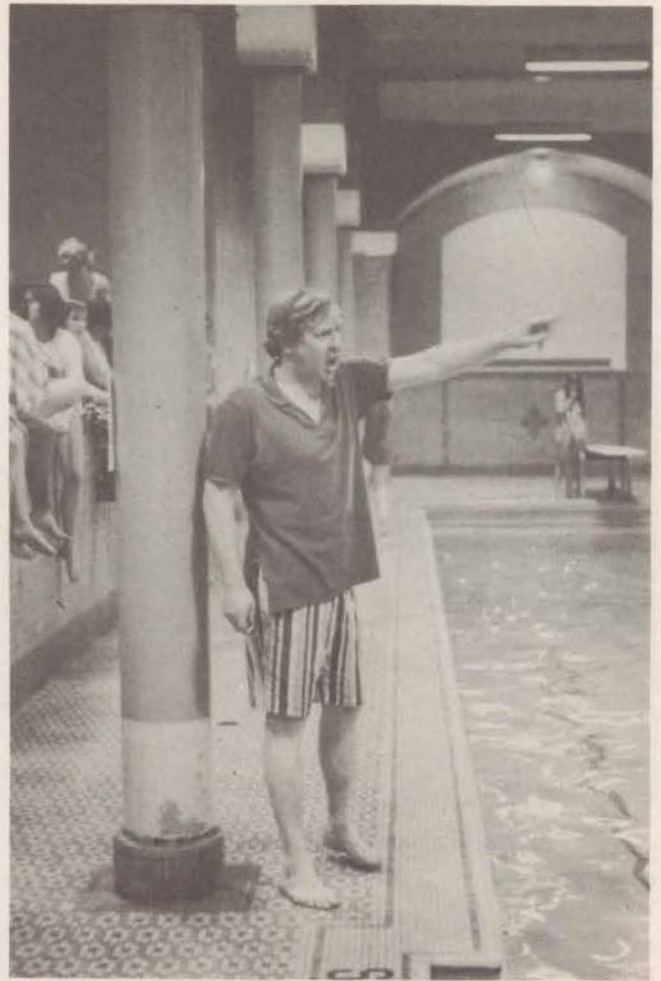
SPEED SWIMMING

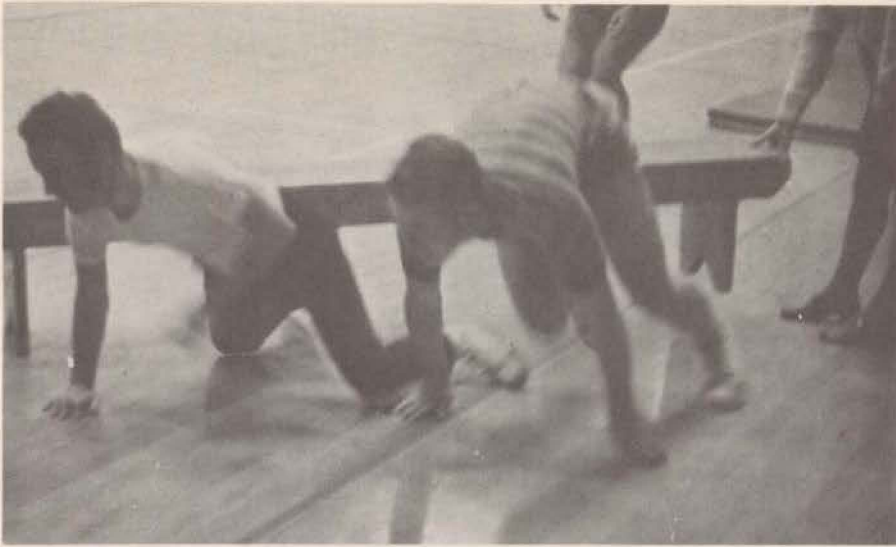

SURVIVAL DAY AT K.C.I.

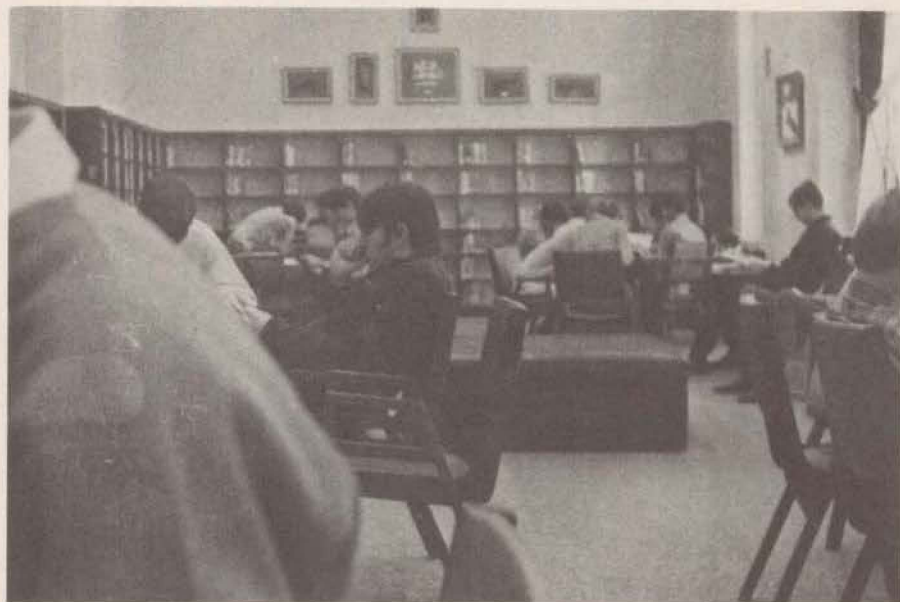

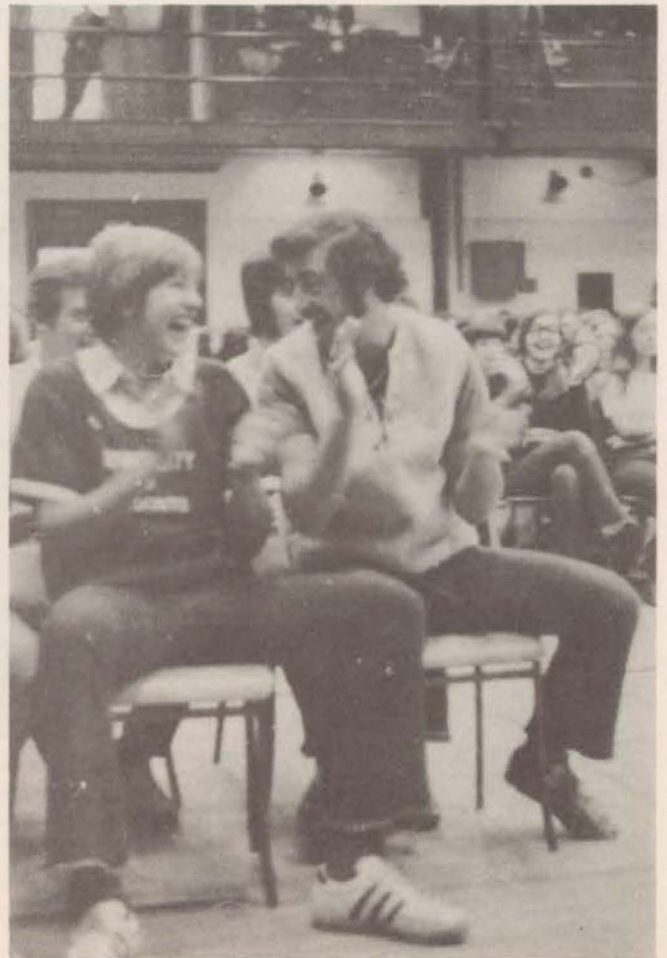

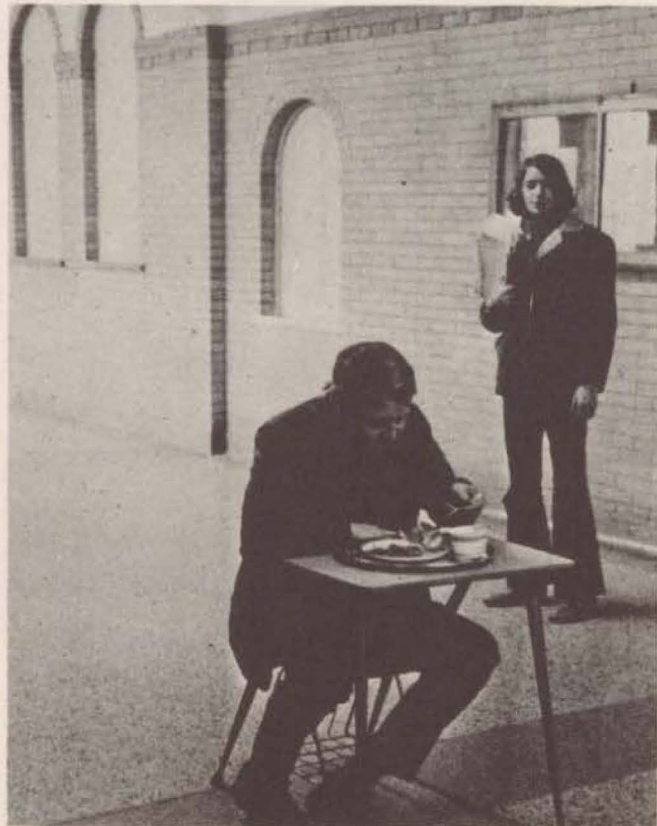

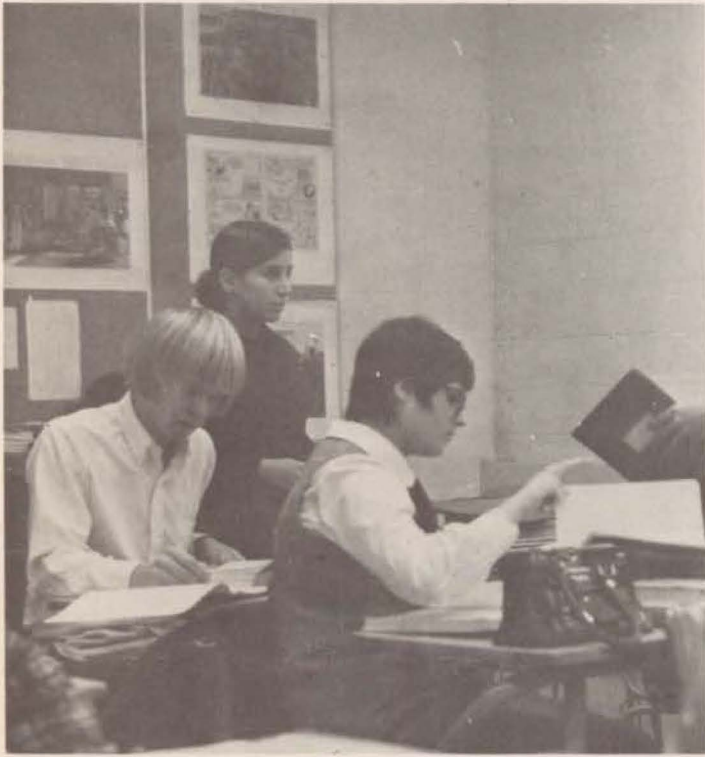
The Junior Squad, led by Carol Parnes provided the vocal support for the junior teams and at some senior games.

Happiness is. . .

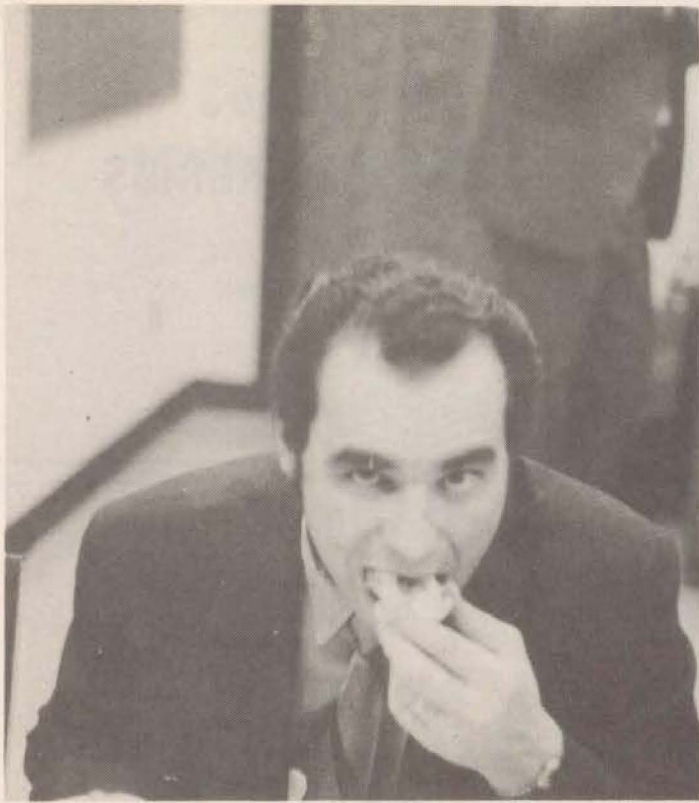

Five years of Kennedy Collegiate, five years of meeting new friends and having new experiences, five years of growing up, and becoming happy me.



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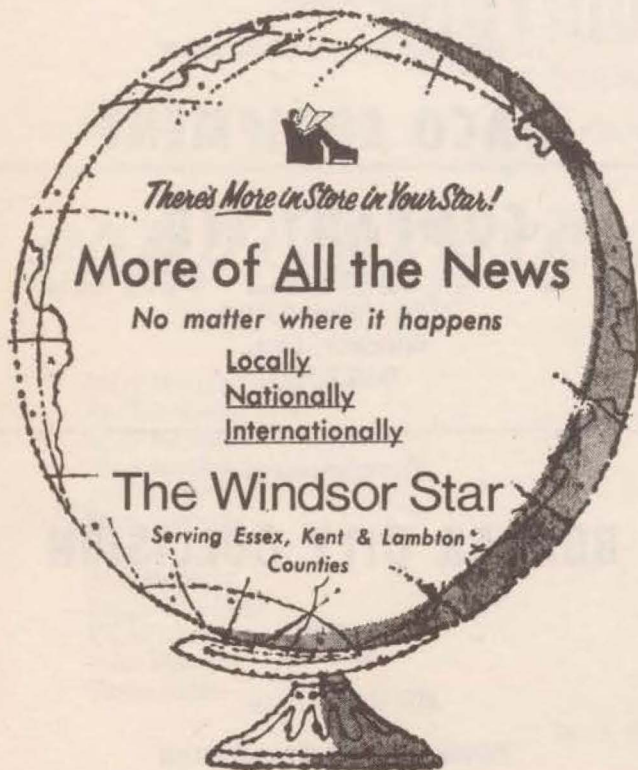


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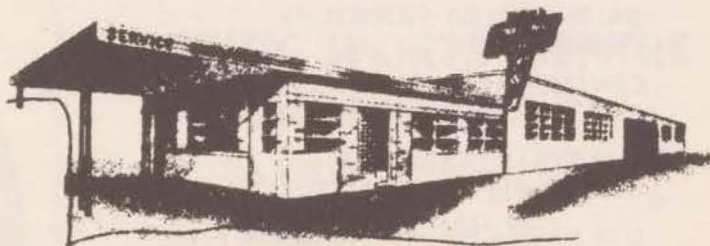
