WARRANT.

State of New Hampshire.

To the inhabitants of the town of Woodstock, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house in said Woodstock on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to pay town debt.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of highways.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Memorial day.
- 6. To see how much money the town will raise in addition to what the law requires for the support of schools.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair Potato Hill road.
- 8. To see how much money the town will raise for repairs on Lost River road.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to extend the Water System to the home of Luther F. Willoughby.

- 10. To see if the town will authorize the construction of a new bridge over Eastman Branch, near the P. Fox mill and if so what kind of a bridge.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to assume the debt that the North Woodstock Village Precinct owes the town on note dated Aug. 20, 1903, for \$100.00.
- 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the license fees on such classes of licenses as are permitted by law.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to construct a vault in connection with the selectmen's office at North Woodstock for the storage of town records.

Note—The selectmen made an extended examination of the tax collector's books covering the years 1898, 1899, 1900 and 1901, and after making such abatements as they felt justified in making they effected a settlement for the years 1898 and 1899. It was found that the collector for 1898 had not been credited with property sold to the town for taxes, which he was entitled to. Deducting this, together with abatements above referred to, left a balance

due the town for the two years of \$193.93 which the collector paid. The selectmen felt justified in settling this old account, thus clearing up the two years of back taxes. It will be observed that the assets reported Feb. 15, 1903, were \$12,126.63, or \$723.18 more than the assets reported Feb. 15, 1904. In the above statement of assets for the year ending Feb. 15, 1904, nothing has been figured in that did not appear to be collectable.

Deducting the cost of this extension from these figures leaves the net expense of the system to be \$541.68 or a net gain in favor of the system of \$202.52, what the extension cost; or in other words the system earned a profit over and above running expenses sufficient to pay for the extension above mentioned.



ERRATA.

On page 8 in demands againt the town the item of salary of \$130.00 due F. W. Selingham, collector, for 1900 and 1901 was omitted by mistake. This makes the town debt \$20,700.25, consequently the reduction of debt is \$2,379.17, instead of \$2,509.17.

On page 9 where it reads "due from collector 1900" it should read due from collector 1900, 1901 and 1903 respectively.

On page 9 the entry \$80.08 appears twice, thus making the assets \$9,370.76 instead of \$9,450.84 and the net debt \$11,199.49 instead of \$11,119.41.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

The schools for the year 1903 have been conducted along the same line as those of 1902. There were only two changes in teachers, viz: the grammar and primary schools at North Woodstock. The fall and winter terms of the grammrr school were taught by Mrs. Arabel F. Forbes of South Framingham, Mass. The closing examination of this school showed it to be in a well trained condition, especially in mathematics and grammar. Miss Goodwin, who taught during the preceeding school year, placed the school on a firm basis and the thoroughness of Mrs. Forbes carried along the work to the general satisfaction of the school board.

The primary school for the syring term was taught by Miss Affie T. Smith, who had previously been in charge of

it for two terms, and whose work proved satisfactory to all concerned as far as we know. The fall and winter terms was under the supervision of Miss Clarice V. Clark of this town, a graduate of Plymouth High School. This was Miss Clark's first term which proved to be a successful one. One noticeable characteristic was the prevailing quietness during school sessions.

The three terms at Woodstock center were taught by Miss Isa M. Clark of Danbury, who had the same school in charge for the year 1902, with the exception of a few weeks. We have no occasion to change our minds from what they were last year when we spoke in very complimentary terms regarding the work of Miss Clark.

There were two terms in the Tannery district, both under the direction of Miss Bertha M. Campbell, who taught the school last year. Miss Campbell had only three scholars but she labored with just as much zeal as though there had been a larger number, and her work was much appreciated by all.

The total membership for all the schools was 106. Average attendance, 78.

We believe that our schools are well up to the average of country schools, and in view of the fact that the laws of the State make it compulsory on the part of towns to provide High schooling when desired, it is very important that parents and school board should co-operate for the purpose of making our elementary schools just as good and complete as possible.

It is a noticeable fact that the mothers take deeper interests in our schools than do the fathers and for this reason we most respectfully recommend that they attend the annual meeting and signify their choice in choosing the officers that are to manage school affairs, as the law provides. If they do not care to do this we most earnestly suggest that they make their wishes known to their husbands, so that

their interests as mothers of the school children can be represented in school meeting. We are pleased to note the many names of visitors that appear on the registers and would recommend that the visitations be more numerous, for it is thus that parents can keep in close touch with school work. Teachers are often blamed for some little thing reported by the scholars when if the parents would only witness the work in the school room from time to time the teacher would be exonerated.

Owing to the many cases of annoyances reported by residents living near the grammar and primary schoools on account of water for the schools, we have inserted an article in the school warrant relative to the matter, to which we respectfully eall your attention.
