

In Memoriam
Ralph Samuel Parker

Ralph Samuel Parker was born in Wolfeboro January 21, 1872, the son of John William and Abbie (Haley) Parker. He was educated in the Wolfeboro schools and graduated from Brewster Academy in the Class of 1893. He maintained his interest in

the Academy throughout his life and until a few years before his death, his class held annual reunions.

For many years after graduating from Brewster he was employed in Portsmouth in the Clothing business. While in Portsmouth he was prominent in music circles, for many years singing in church choirs and organized musical groups which provided entertainment for many types of organizations. He was a member of the Christian Church of Wolfeboro and for many years served as organist and choir director.

On returning to Wolfeboro he was employed in the clothing store belonging to the late Abel Haley.

Mr. Parker was a member of many of the Masonic bodies. He joined St. John's Lodge No. 1 F. & A. M. in Portsmouth, from which he recently received a 50-year membership medal. He was also a member of Morning Star Lodge, member and High Priest of Carroll Chapter R. A. M. of Wolfeboro, and held membership in the Scottish Rites and the New Hampshire Consistory.

Ralph Parker always was intensely interested in town affairs, serving for a time as Democratic town chairman, Selectman and for many years as one of the Town Auditors.

With his passing Wolfeboro has lost another link with one of the early families having a leading part in the development of the town. He will be long remembered for his years of faithful service to the town of Wolfeboro and for his wise counsel and service to his church and many organizations to which he belonged.

John Roscoe Clow

Born at East Wolfeboro, N. H., March 15, 1885, son of Henry A. Clow and Annie Philpott Clow. Was educated at the Whitten School until attending Brewster Free Academy. He then began the carpenter industry with his grandfather, a trade he followed all his life. He served the town as selectman, chairman, overseer of the poor and was also on the Water Commission. He was a member of Morning Star Lodge, F & AM and also president of the Wolfeboro Center Cemetery Association, which position he held at the time of his death. He married Miss Ruby Farnham of Sanbornville and left one son and two grandchildren.

Routine articles authorizing sale of property taken by tax title or otherwise, tax discounts, hiring money in anticipation of taxes, and appointment of Deputy Tax Collector were passed.

The article to sell the old Boston & Maine Railroad Station was passed over.

There was some discussion relative to the fees that the Tax Collector should receive for the collection of State Head Taxes. It was voted that the Tax Collector should receive \$250.00 or 30 per cent (of the 10 per cent provided in Chapter 40, 1953) whichever is greater, and that each Selectman should receive \$75.00.

There was discussion of the proposal that the Town purchase land at "Carry" beach, and a committee was appointed to study the matter and report at an adjourned Town Meeting on the last Tuesday in April, 1954.

The article relative to Zoning restrictions around Lake Wentworth was held over until the adjourned Town Meeting.

The article relative to a re-assessment of land and buildings within the Town by the State Tax Commission was passed.

The recommendations of the Budget Committee were approved and adopted. Total appropriations amounted to \$297,583.46.

ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

The motion to purchase land at the "Carry" beach was defeated.

The motion to extend Resident Zone 2 to include the shore properties around Lake Wentworth was passed.

It was voted to rescind the vote of the Town Meeting on Article 14 requesting the State Tax Commission to make a complete re-assessment of all the land and buildings within the Town.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, 1955

Warrant

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Wolfeboro qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Brewster Memorial Hall in said Town on the second Tuesday of March next, from ten A. M. until 8 P. M. for the casting of ballots, and at seven P. M. to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, two Auditors, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, and Town Constable for the ensuing year, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Water and Sewer Commissioner for three years, four members of the Budget Committee for three years and two Parks and Playgrounds Commissioners for three years.

ARTICLE 2. To select one or more Highway Agents or to instruct the Selectmen to appoint one Highway Agent.

ARTICLE 3. To choose all other Town Officers and Agents.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to adopt parliamentary rules of procedure to cover this meeting and subsequent Town meetings.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell any property taken by tax title or otherwise.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to authorize the Tax Collector to allow a discount on real estate taxes if paid before December 1st, at a rate of discount not to exceed the rate at which the Town can borrow money on short term notes.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire a sum of money necessary to pay expenses in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to appoint a Deputy under the provisions of Section 42, Chapter 80 of the Revised Laws of 1942 as amended by Chapter 7 of the Laws of 1945.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to recind the vote of March 14th, 1950 on Article No. 15 of that Warrant in so far as Removing the Railroad Station.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will approve and adopt the recommendations of the Budget Committee and raise and appropriate the various sums contained in the report and listed in the Budget.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money necessary to erect a canopy with seats and lights along the water front in the general location of the one that was removed last year. The new canopy to be completed and ready for use not later than June 25, 1955.

ARTICLE 12. We, the undersigned, request that a sufficient amount of funds be provided in 1955, to add Pleasant Street to our Town Sewer System.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to extend the limits of the Wolfeboro Village Fire Precinct to the Town boundaries; and will further vote to instruct the Town Officers to take all necessary steps to permit the elimination of the Wolfeboro Village Fire Precinct at the Town Meeting in 1956.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance of the Town of Wolfeboro by striking out Section 3-A of Article III and inserting in place thereof the following:

A—Permitted Uses.

The same as permitted within the Business District Zone 1.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will add \$200.00 to the budget of the Parks and Playgrounds Commission, for the purpose of developing land now owned by the Town between Brewster Beach and Clark Road. To provide parking facilities and better approach to Brewster Beach from Clark Road.

ARTICLE 16. (1) To see if the Town will vote to establish a commission to be known as the Police Commission and to transfer to said Commission the powers and duties at present held by the Selectmen of the Town with respect to the Police Department. Said Police Commission to consist of three members, one of whom shall be elected at each subsequent Annual Town meeting, to hold office for three years, but for the ensuing year to choose three members, one of which will hold office for three years; one of which will hold office for two years; one of which will hold office for one year;

(2) To determine the amount of compensation to be allowed the Police Commissioners for their services by the Town.

ARTICLE 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

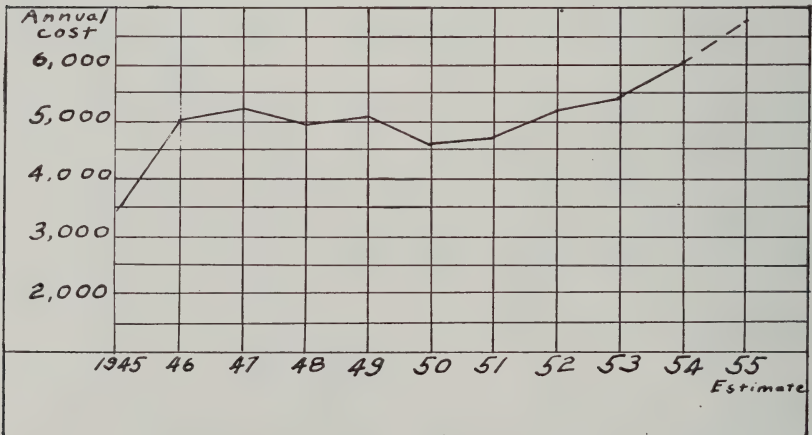

BUDGET COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Budget Committee is required by the Budget Law to hold a Public Hearing so that all interested citizens may submit requests for budget action, and may become better informed, through inquiry, of the Town's activities. Two such Public Hearings were held this year. We regret that they are not better attended by more of our citizens.

There were five meetings of the Budget Committee at which the budgets of all town departments coming under its jurisdiction, were carefully studied in order that the needs of the town may be met at the least possible cost, consistent with sound investment and good service.

The Budget Committee submits the following Report and recommendations to be acted on by the voters at the Annual Town Meeting to be held March 8, 1955.

TOWN ROADS

No unusual requests were made by the Highway Department nor by the citizens for road improvements which would require appropriations in addition to the amounts of: 1) \$876.06 recommended to match (in 1 to 5 ratio) the state contribution

under "Town Road Aid"; and 2) \$3,140.00 recommended to match (on a 50 - 50 basis) the state contribution under "Apportionment B".

At the end of the last fiscal year, balances of \$1,831.71 in the T. R. A. account, and \$3,214.29 in the Apportionment B account are now held by the state for work on our roads. Adding these balances to the current recommended appropriations, plus the matching state funds, will give us totals of \$7,088.07 and \$9,454.29 respectively, for road work in Wolfeboro, with state cooperation.

It was the Budget Committees understanding that the cost of the few requests for road improvements could be readily covered out of the matching funds, and enough would remain to do more than the usual amount of work in cooperation with the State Highway Department.

SCHOOLS

The new four-room addition to Carpenter School was completed and furnished during the past year at a total expenditure well within estimates. Furthermore, the schedule of financing by serial notes on a ten-year basis instead of a twenty-year basis, as originally proposed, will result in an interest saving to the town of approximately \$8,000.00. The retirement of debt and payments of interest are to be met in ten equal installments. The School Board and Superintendent are to be congratulated for their sound planning and management in providing the much needed additional school rooms and facilities at Carpenter School.

At a Public Hearing and again at a meeting of the Budget Committee the budget needs at Carpenter School and tuition costs at Brewster Academy, to be raised by taxes, were explained and discussed. The School Board demonstrated clearly by comparative figures the advantages and savings, over a period of years, in changes which include 1) the purchase of a new school bus; and 2) the purchase of a new oil burner to replace the coal stoker. The change over from coal to oil fuel would result in a net annual saving through economies in janitor services. Furthermore, there would be a much needed gain in space for the school lunch program in the basement area. It is anticipated also, that the basement would be cleaner (less dusty) with the use of oil fuel.

As the unusually large school population of the lower grades advances, a large quantity of new school books and supplies are needed. The cost of these, and the new schedule of increase in teachers' salaries, account for the larger school budget. Fortunately, however, the amount to be raised by taxes will be reduced by an anticipated gift from the Brewster Estate.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

The budget for the Police Department was increased this year to provide funds to give improved police supervision of parking and traffic in the business area.

After careful consideration of suggestions made by members of the police force, Chief Thompson and the Retail Merchants Division of the Wolfeboro Chamber of Commerce, the Budget Committee feels that the sum set up this year should provide satisfactory police service.

With the cooperation of the Merchants, proper notice through signs and the enforcement of the two-hour parking limit in the business area, better parking conditions for shopping should prevail.

Improved facilities for contacting police officers together with better public information relative to the operation and availability of the Police Department is bound to result in more effective protection to our people.

WHARVES

Three of the four town wharves are in such poor condition that they must be rebuilt before another summer season. For the past year the Insurance Company covering the town's liability for accidents on this property, maintained protection only because assurances were given that they would be put in a safe condition before another season.

The Budget Committee unanimously agreed that these wharves are essential to serve the needs of our boat owners and recommend that they be rebuilt and that the Selectment be authorized to borrow for that purpose, on a five-year serial. The first payment to be made in 1956.

With the completion of the Sea Wall last year and the wharves this year, we will have excellent accommodations for our boating fraternity.

The question of just what should be done to provide appropriate landscaping, adequate shelter and seating facilities, should be settled in conjunction with this Wharf appropriation. The water front area is one of our greatest assets and used by a great many of our summer and local residents. We should see that it provides facilities for all those that enjoy its use.

TOWN DEBT

The Town Debt was reduced \$19,300.00 in 1954. Payments from tax funds were \$10,500.00 and from the Water and Sewer Department earnings \$8,800.00.

This year the payment from tax funds will be \$8,500.00 and Water and Sewer funds \$8,800.00.

If the article for the purpose of approving the erection of the new standpipe on King Hill near Brewster Dairy, as well as the extension of the sewer to include Pleasant Street is approved, the Water and Sewer Department debt will be increased about \$35,000.00. The payments on these notes can, however, be made from earnings as the \$3,000.00 annual payment on the Water Bonds will be completed this year.

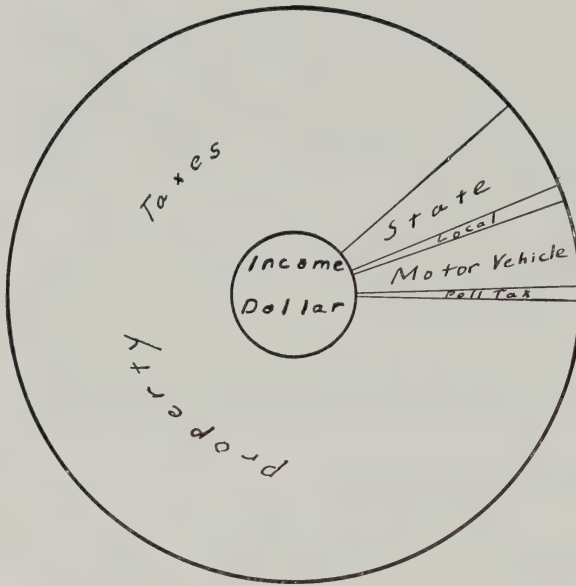

Where the Dollar Went in 1954

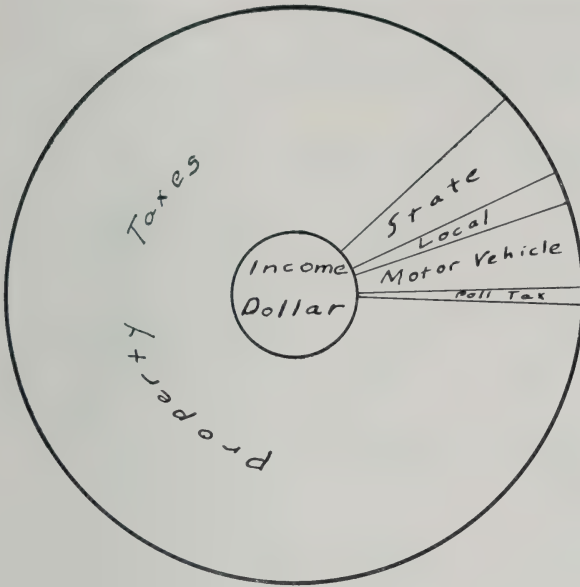

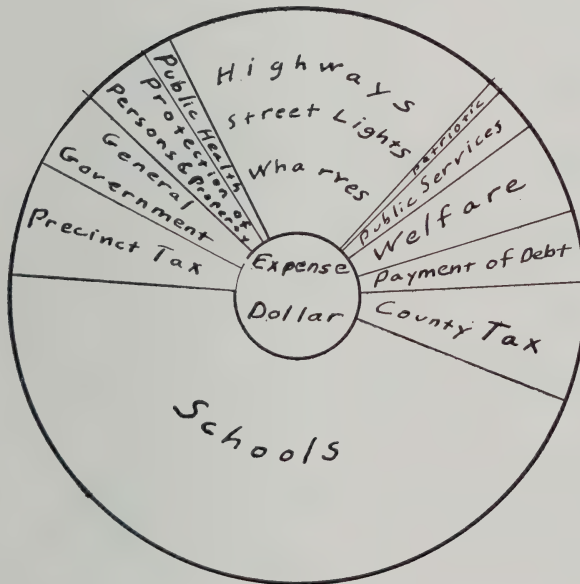
Where the Dollar Will Come from in 1955

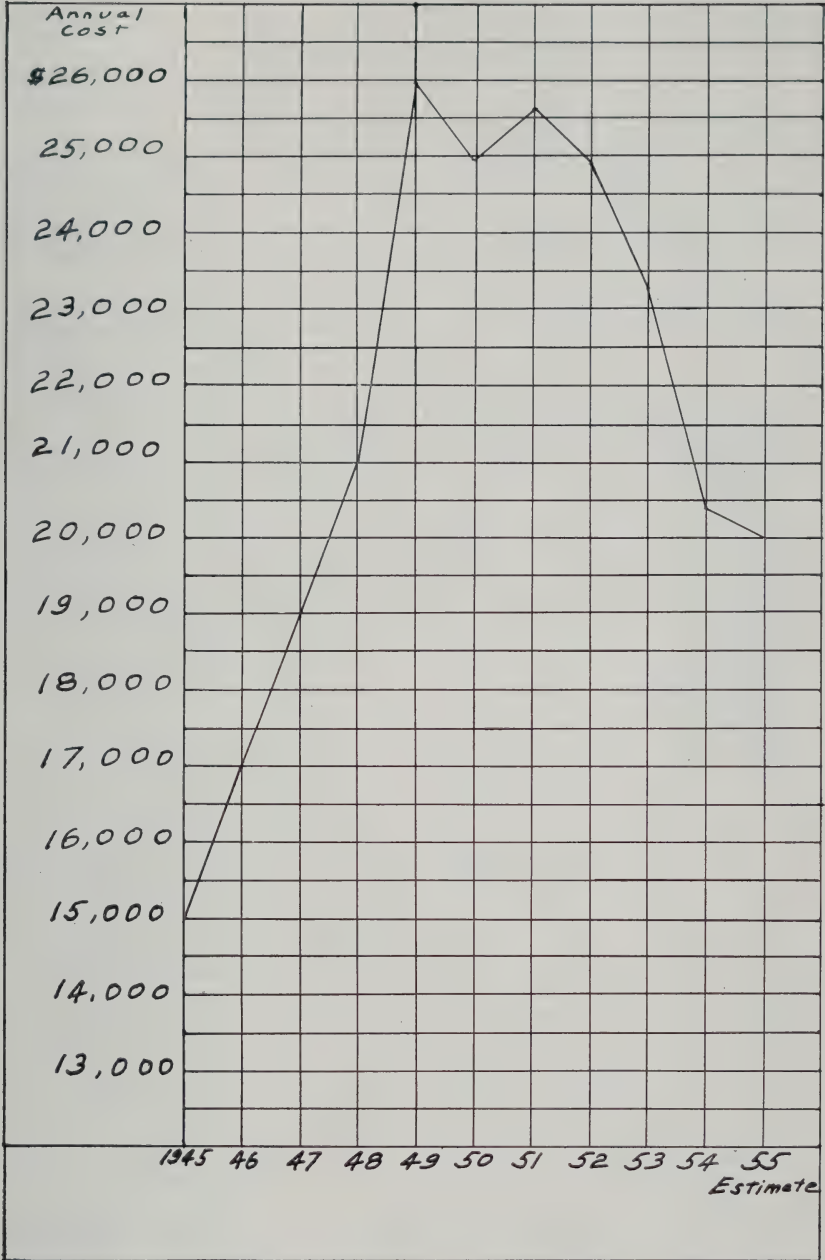

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT

There are a few facts that as Tax Collector I should emphasize.

Poll Taxes and Head Taxes are Demand Taxes and due when the Tax Bill is presented.

Any tax unpaid by December 1st of the year of the levy not only has a penalty added but can be collected by various means as provided by law, any of which hurt.

If a person does not receive a Tax Bill for one of many reasons it is their equal responsibility to ascertain why.

If there is any question as regards a tax bill the matter should be inquired into promptly to avoid extra charge for delayed payment.

Persons involved in the transfer of property should notify the Board of Selectmen of such a transfer with name and address of the new owner. In 1954 there were nearly eighty tax bills delayed in mailing because of lack of addresses accurate up to date.

The Tax Collector maintains Office Hours three days a week from 9 A. M. to 1 P. M. at the Town Offices and is available at home. Part time Tax Collectors are only required by statute to be at the Town Office one day a month. The Tax Collector of Wolfeboro is classified as a part time officer, and so compensated.

Ski Slope

The entire \$220.00 was not spent because of the light snow fall. This of course cannot be anticipated in advance, therefore we are asking for the same amount for 1955.

Skating Rink

The same explanation is true of the skating rink as of the ski slope.

Care of Parks

We ran over this appropriation because of the increase of labor charge and the fact that greater time was spent in keeping the area clean due primarily to the accumulation

of trash under the so-called roof, which was moved from the waterfront to the park.

The increase we are asking for is partly due to the increased cost of routine caring for Cate Park. The additional money would be spent as follows:

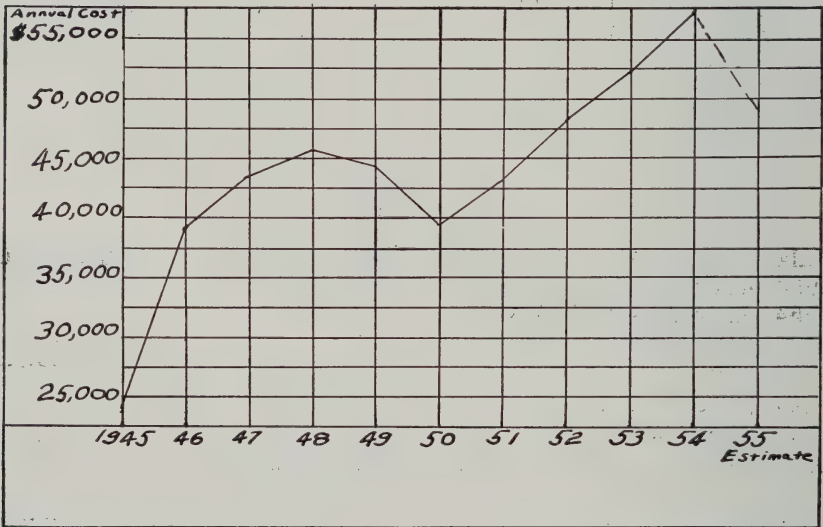

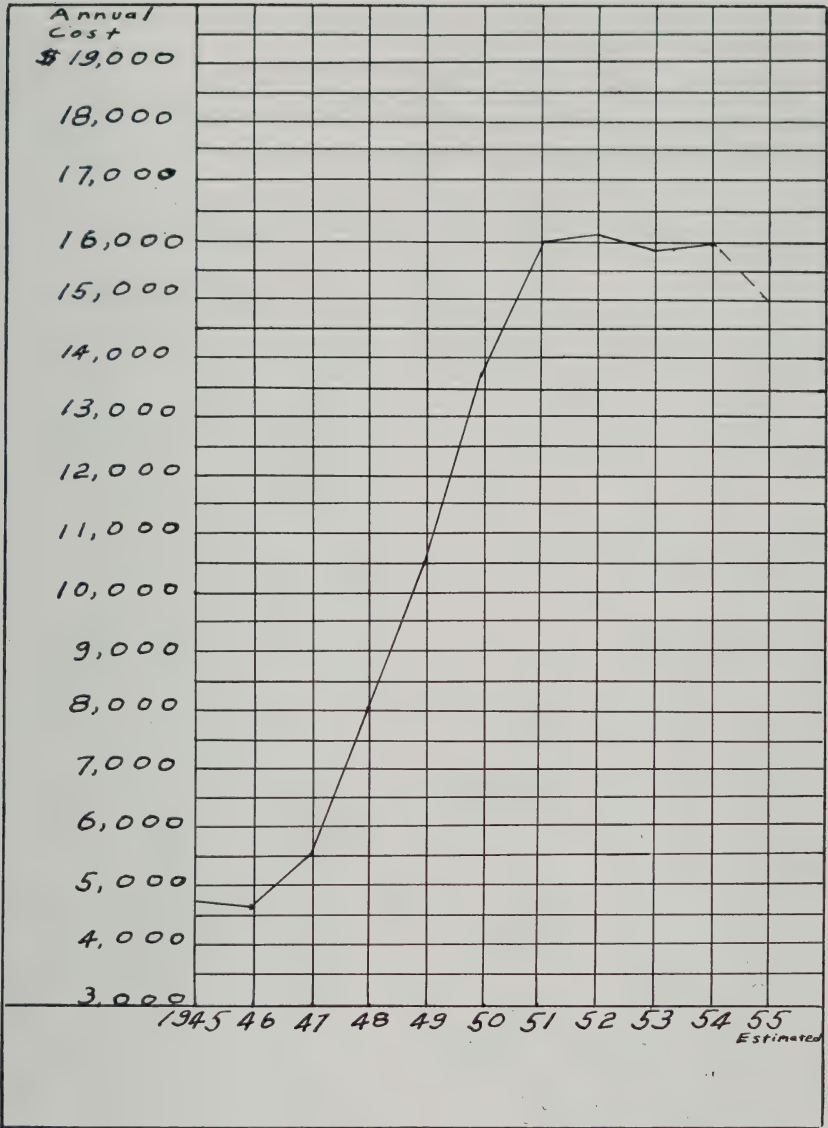

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — SEWER DEPT.

During the past year there was very little new construction work done in the Sewer Department only three new customers were added making a total of 260 connections to the Sewer System.

We still have considerable trouble with the Imhoff Tanks at the Treatment Plant due to conditions beyond our control.

The Trickling Filter Beds at the Treatment Plant had one treatment of H. T. H. as recommended by the State Board of health.

By constant treatment of the Imhoff Tanks we have reduced the amount of Lime used to about 100 pounds per year.

As usual visitors are always welcome to inspect the Pumping Stations and Treatment Plant.

Once more I wish to thank the Commissioners as well as the citizens of Wolfeboro for their cooperation during the past year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT — WATER DEPT.

During the past year much new work as well as many new replacements were accomplished in the Water Department. On Clark Road 680 feet of old one-inch pipe was replaced with 1¼ inch pipe to supply the new Camps near Mr. Jordan's driveway as well as supplying Sandy Beach with a much needed drinking fountain.

At Whittens Neck we installed 5010 feet of 2 inch and 1¼ inch Galvanized pipe in order to supply the many new Camps built or building on the so-called Holden Shore with a supply of Town Water.

The old 1 inch Galvanized pipe on the so-called Scott Road was replaced with 1¼ inch Galvanized pipe to the extent of 186 feet.

On Birch Road we replaced 358 feet of the old 4 inch pipe with new 6 inch Cast Iron pipe.

The old Holyoke Hydrant on Birch Road was also replaced with a new Mueller Hydrant with a steamer connection topside for better fire protection.

There were 30 new services connected to the Water System during the past year making a total of 1160 Water customers. Twenty-one of the old services were replaced with Copper Tubing. There were a few breaks and leaks in the Water System which were taken care of as soon as possible.

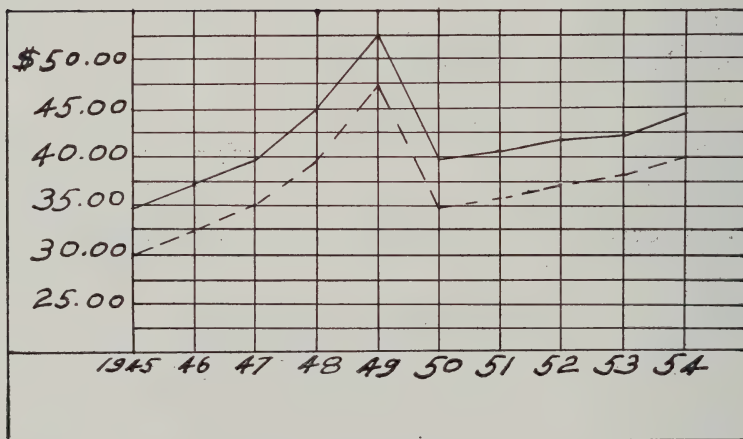

Report of Forest Fire Wardens

Howdy Folks. This is your friend smokey, the fire prevention bear talking for Guy L. Foss, your local forest fire warden.

You know how he is always asking you people to take it easy with fire in the woods? Well, he wants you to know that forest fires decreased last year. He knows it did rain some but it was the help of all you people who are giving their time and money and carefulness to prevent this shameful waste of our woodlands. But please remember this folks, forest fires still do a lot of damage each year. And we got to work and work to whittle them down to our size. So when you're around forest areas, crush out your cigarette, hold your match till it's cold, drown your campfire and drown it again. If you have to burn grass or brush or rubbish, ask about the law first, also get your permit from your warden and last, have plenty of help handy. Please remember a permit is required for all open fires whether in an incinerator, or on a piece of ploughed ground. Your local forest fire warden will help you in your burning problem and he is as close as your telephone. Please call him.

Each year forest fires destroy enough saw-timber to build all the homes in a city of one-half million people.

Each year forest fires eat up enough saw-timber to make ties for 50,000 miles of railroad tracks.

Each year forest fires destroy enough pulp-size trees to provide a 12-months supply of newsprint for every newspaper in the United States.

Gentlemen:—

Last March at its annual meeting your town made an appropriation for continuing control of the White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with this Department. Final returns to the Forestry Commission indicated that 107 other towns and cities voted like-wise.

As is our annual custom, there is attached herewith a statement briefly summarizing the control measures performed in your town during the 1954 season, together with a record of town and cooperative expenditures. Since the details of blister rust control will vary considerably from town to town, it is not possible to report them in a brief account. However, the district leader in charge of the project in your town, whose name and address appear below, will be pleased to supply these details upon request from your Board or other citizens.

That white pine still maintains its rank as our major forest tree is evident from the 1953 lumber cut. The total production of all species, as reported to this Department, amounted to 302,258,000 board feet. The cut of white pine was 208,679,000 feet, or 70.4 percent of the total. Including sales of stumpage, logging operations, transportation and manufacture of finished products, the state-wide income assumes an impressive figure, estimated at over \$20 millions of dollars annually.

The destruction of millions of wild Ribes within and around white pine stands has been instrumental in bringing about commercial protection to this valuable asset. Where years ago white pine woodlots, with 20-70 percent or more of the trees infected, were common, the number today by contrast is small. Although evidence of those early outbreaks are still apparent in the form of dead and dying trees extensive outbreaks are no longer so much in evidence.

However, during the past 10-15 years a new problem in blister rust control has developed. This has been brought about by extensive cutting of white pine and the resulting disturbances of the soil through logging with modern machines. This has stimulated a re-occurrence of wild Ribes and with natural re-seeding of pines, new centers of infection are developing in many of these

cut-over areas. It is important that this future crop be given adequate protection from the Rust.

White Pine Blister Rust Control

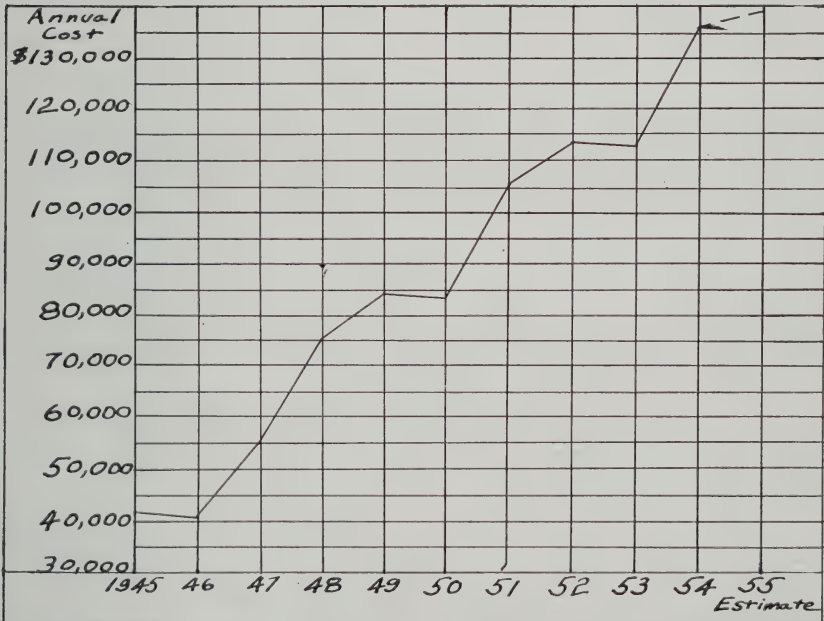

The Public Health Nurse, Mrs. Howard Bean has been well occupied keeping up with the responsibilities of the home nursing program and the school health program. Both of these programs have continued to expand each year as more services are offered and more people become aware of the service available.

Physical Examinations were done by Dr. Harold Gregory, the school physician on Carpenter School pupils in grades one, three, five and seven. Each examination included tests for eye-sight, hearing, posture abnormalities, hemoglobin and a general check-up. Notices were sent home to parents in cases where corrective treatment seemed indicated.

The Dental Clinic was conducted by Dr. W. Douglas Kipp and financed by generous gifts from trust funds and service organizations in Wolfeboro.

The Orthopedic Clinic was conducted by Dr. Howard Halfman of Laconia under the sponsorship of the State Department for Services to Crippled Children. As a result of the school physical examinations, thirty-four children will be referred to this clinic.

The first Well Child Clinic was held in three sessions in the spring of 1954 under the sponsorship of the State Department of Public Health. All of the physicians in Wolfeboro participated in this clinic and judging by the number of pre-school and school children who attended it seemed successful.

The Nursing Association is grateful to Huggins Hospital for frequent use of the clinic rooms as well as for the hemoglobin examinations given to the school children as a community service.

The co-operation and interest of the people of Wolfeboro and Tuftonboro have made possible the continued growth of this organization.

REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

To the Board of Trustees of the Wolfeboro-Brewster Memorial Library.

Gentlemen:

The report of the librarian for the year ending January 1, 1955 is herewith presented.

It has been a year of serious reading and activity, a year when the summer circulation of books was the largest in the history of the library. The books borrowed from the State Library ranged over a diversity of subjects testifying to the varied interest of the patrons.

The librarian has continued the story hour at school; classes have visited the library for instruction; teachers have had book collections in the classroom and at the library. There have been adult books placed in convalescent homes.

The summer reading program sponsored by the library, aroused a great deal of interest among the pupils in the lower grades. The results were broadcast over the Gray Birch Network, Station WWNH.

In the fall the members of the Great Books Discussion group met at the library for the second year course. Although some did not resume the study, others joined the group.

Patrons are becoming more and more aware of the valuable service of the inter-library loan as is shown by the large number of books borrowed through the State Library and the Bookmobile. In 1954 the number borrowed by mail was 131.

During the year many books and magazines were presented to the library, thus adding to the value and number of books.

For all these gifts the librarian is very grateful.

The circulation of books for the year was 30,934 books and magazines of these classes: adult fiction 12,527; non-fiction 6,387; children's books 12,020. 361 new cards were issued. The largest day's circulation was 257, and the smallest 21.

This year 586 books and pamphlets have been added. Of this number, 121 were contributed.
