Off Campus

Youth Services

Homelessness and Hunger

Homelessness and hunger affect many in Manchester, which is why volunteers are so important at places like <u>Families in Transition</u>, <u>New Horizons for New</u> <u>Hampshire</u> and the <u>New Hampshire Food Bank</u>. There are so many activities volunteers can choose from, such as assisting with food preparation and delivery, connecting resources with the people who need them, transportation and even store management.

Animals

For people who like to work with animals, <u>Manchester Animal Shelter</u> is a "pawfect" place to volunteer. Volunteers can help take care of sheltered animals and help these furry friends find good homes.

Education

Every college student knows how important education is, and that's why <u>Southern</u> <u>New Hampshire Services</u> and the Manchester City Library work to help adults get the education they need to succeed. Show your support for those who have served by volunteering at the <u>Veterans</u> <u>Affairs Medical Center</u> or <u>Liberty House</u>, which connects homeless and struggling veterans to available resources and provides a safe, substance-free transitional home.

There are many ways students can volunteer through the clubs, student organizations and classes at the <u>UNH Manchester</u> campus! Here are some ways you can get involved:

- Join a club. Groups like the Intervarsity Christian Fellowship and the <u>Student</u> <u>Coalition for Service & Empowerment</u> offer ways to volunteer in the community, such as through annual mission trips called ServeUp and group visits to local volunteer sites. - Take public service courses. The <u>Public Service and Nonprofit Leadership</u> <u>major</u> offers students a bachelor's degree centered on new and improved public and nonprofit services to help the people who need it most. If volunteering is great but not enough, then this major is definitely something you should look at.
- Sign up for the Colleges of the Queen City Day of Service. Teamwork makes the dream work at this annual event where UNH Manchester partners with other colleges around the city to make big change right here in Manchester.
