## TOWN WARRANT

---

### The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To hear the reports of selectmen and other town officers, and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To raise and appropriate money toward support of town poor.
5. To see if the town will vote to raise money sufficient to secure State Aid on State Aid construction.
6. To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building, and repairing highways and bridges.
7. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library.
8. To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.
9. To raise and appropriate money for cemeteries in town, and pass any vote relating thereto.
10. To raise and appropriate money for other town charges.
11. To authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

12. To see if the town will vote to allow discount for the prepayment of taxes on real estate and personal property and decide the dates and percentage for same.

13. To authorize the selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see if the town will vote to make any change in the salary of town officers, and raise the wages of general laborers from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day.

15. To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay notes held by F. B. Little.

16. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising a bonus for Dr. F. J. Kasheta, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To raise and appropriate money (aside from article 6 of this warrant) to repair the road from the Jewell bridge to Breezy Point Hotel.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to machinery for snow removal and to pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally.

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the Citizens and School Board of the Warren School District:

I hereby submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

No changes have occurred in the teaching staff since my last report. The percentage of attendance was above the state average. The attendance in the primary room and list of 15 pupils of perfect attendance in the district are particularly commendable. For some time the supervision has stressed the fundamentals of arithmetic and those having reached a reasonable expectancy, attention is now directed to written English, penmanship, punctuation and spelling.

Both at the Village and Glencliff an opportunity has been afforded all parents to confer with the Superintendent. From these conferences it developed there was considerable sentiment for music supervision. There appears to be no possibility of working this out with neighboring towns and a music supervisor would cost approximately \$400.00. However, it seems probable that for \$200.00 a senior student teacher from the Plymouth Normal School could be secured. It appears to the Superintendent that it is worthwhile to try this out. Some may consider music a "fad and frill," but many people derive as much benefit and pleasure from singing as they do from computing compound interest, and possessing detailed knowledge of far away countries.

The Board has purchased 8 adjustable seats for the Glencliff school and budgeted 8 more for next year. It is replacing a Kaustine tank at the village. Further than painting the inside of the Glencliff school there

appears to be little necessary to be done in keeping up the plants of the district.
