## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE Warren Town Warrant

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the report of Selectmen and other Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
'4. To raise and appropriate money to maintain Highways and Bridges, and take any action relating thereto.
5. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of $\$ 262.81$ as advised by State Highway Commissioner.
6. To raise and appropriate money for Civil Defense.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to be set aside for the purchase of fire equipment.
8. To raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 1,000.00$. to pay Town note due Laconia National Bank December 31, 1951.
9. To raise and appropriate money for Fire Department.
10. To raise and appropriate money to maintain street lights.
11. To raise and appropriate money for Town Library purposes.

12. To raise and appropriate money for Town Poor, Old Age Assistance and Soldiers' Aid.
13. To raise and appropriate money for Parks and Playgrounds.

16. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Week and raise and appropriate money for the same.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of $\$ 1,000$. for Sidewalk Fund and 'start some action on same.
18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of $\$ 54.59$ to the White Mountains Regional Association.
19. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen permission to sell certain Town property.
20. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Industrial and Development Committee and raise monev for same.
21. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in the town.
22. To see what action the Town will take relative to roller skating in Warren Town Hall.
23. To see what action the Town will take relative to clearing title of Glencliff School land and buildings to belong to Glencliff Community for Glencliff Community Chapel.
24. To see if the Town will vote to purchase the scales near Warren Railroad Station and take any action relating thereto.
25. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on property taxes of 1951 and determine date and percentage of same.
26. To authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Sceva Speare Memorial Hospital at Plymouth, N. H.

28 To see if he Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
29. To see what action the Town will take relative to the purchase of a piano for the Town Hall, and if favorable, raise and appropriate money for same.
30. To transact any other business that legally may come before said meeting.

Report of "Industrial and Development" Committee

In accordance with the vote of the town at the March, 1950, Town Meeting, a committee of five persons was appointed to investigate the possibilities of obtaining a permanent industry for the town.

The committee has corresponded with several summer residents relative to our objective and several helpful suggestions have been received. Senator Bridges, Senator Tobey and Congressman Cotton have been advised of this project and have indicated their approval and pledged support.

Contact has been maintained with the Industrial Division of the New Hampshire Planning and Development Commission and a conference has been arranged for a day late in February, at which time our problems will be discussed and the basis laid for future procedure.

Such a project presents problems and obstacles, but the committee is pledged to work for the establishment of an industry in the town and plans to do everything possible to achieve success.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS TEACHERS AND PUPILS: Principal H. J. Flem-

 ing and Mrs. Barbara Pike returned for another year when school opened on September 6.Mrs. Jesseman was replaced by Mrs. Hildred C. Hackett of Woodsville, N. H. to teach Grades V and VI. Mrs. Hackett is a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College and has a background of fifteen years experience.
Mrs. Helen K. Evans of Warren was employed to teach grades III and IV, replacing Mrs. Lavalley. Mrs. Evans is, also, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers* College and had previously taught for five years.
Miss Edith Emery of Monroe, New Hampshire, replaced Mrs. Goodwin as music supervisor for the district. Miss Emery is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Class of ' 47 , and had two years of teaching experience before coming to this district.
We are fortunate in again having a staff of fully certified teachers.
The school enrollment remains constant, there bein's 99 pupils as of September 1950, as compared with 10 . for the previous year.
BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS: Extensive repairs having been completed during the last two years, little work was done on the buildings during the past summer. The P. T. A., needing a storage space for school lunch supplies, was granted permission to build a storage room in the basement of the school building. An excellent room constructed of cement blocks, was built by that commendable organization. The lunch program, sponsored by the P. T. A., is one for which the citizens should justly be proud. The privilege of having a hot, well balanced meal at noon is an important asset to the child's health. The Board and your Superintendent are most appreciative of this worthy project of the P. T. A. for its part in
making for a better school program.
CONCLUSION: May I take you for a moment, as a concluding thought for this report, to look outside our district borders and view four specific tasks which triumphant faith in education has imposed on our schools during the past 150 years, as expressed by H. Commanger of Columbia University. THE FIRST AND GREATEST TASK was to provide an enlightened citizenry in order that self government might work. With independence the problem of self government bccame urgent. "To be long-lived," as Benjamin Rush observed, "republics must invest in education."
Has our investment succeeded? None can doubt that it has. Americans have, in short, made democracy work. Through all their history they have elected some mediocre presidents but never a wicked or a dangerous one ; they revealed in every crisis an ability to select able leaders. Only people taught self goverment could record these achievements.
THE SECOND GREAT TASK imposed upon education and on the schools--the creation of national unity --was equally difficult.
We created unity out of diversity, nationalism out of particularism. These were the contribution of poets and novelists, editors and naturalists, historians and jurists, orators and painters--and the medium through which they worked was the school. These men gave to Americans, old and new alike, a people's common language with which to voice a people's common heritage.
"God sifted a whole nation that He might send choice grain over into this wilderness; As for me, give me liberty or give me death; If they mean to have a war, let it begin here; One if by land, and two if by sea; These
are the times that try men's souls; I only regret that I have but one life to lose for my country."
And then there were the songs and the pictures, too. In school and lyceum, children came to learn and remember at least snatches of the "Concord Hymn" or "Old Ironsides" or the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere."

THE THIRD TASK IMPOSED ON EDUCATION, and particularly on the public schools, was that which we call Americanization. Each decade after 1840 saw from two to eight million immigrants pour into America.
THERE IS A FOURTH AND FINAL SERTICL THI SCHOOLS have rendered the cause of American democracy. This most heterogenous of modern societies has ever scemed the most easy prey to forces of riotous privilege and ruinous division. These forces have not prevailed; they have been routed, above all, in the schoolrooms and on the playgrounds of America. In the classroom, the nation's children have lived and learned equality. On the playground and the athletic field the same code has ruled. Who can seriously doubt the cause of democracy is served when it is a Murphy, a Schwartz, a Groglio or a Levitsky that the cheering stands applaud?
If, through the 19th and well into the 20th Century; American schools performed such magnificent service, the question remains: do they still serve the nation well?
In a day of specialization schools are called on more and more to prepare not so much for life, citizenship or democracy as for particular tasks and competences. Schools reflect the society that they serve. Many of the failures we ascribe to contemporary education are in fact failures of our society as a whole.

For a century and a half American schools have served and strengthened the commonwealth. If society clearly defines the new duties it wishes our schools to fulfill and if it steadfastly supports them not only with money but also with faith, they will surely justify that faith in the future as they have in the past. The acknowledgement of my appreciation to the teachers; to the school board, collectively and individually; as well as to the citizens of the district, for their continued cooperation and support is hereby gratefully expressed. .
